### Bond Sale Will Be Held Week Earlier

The bond sale for Wayne's new high school has been moved up a week to take advantage of a favorable market. It is now set for Tuesday, Aug. 10, after originally being planned for Aug. 17.

An official statement on the offering of the bonds for sale may be picked up at the office in the high school.

The architect will be in Wayne Friday. All of the Wayne-Carroll board members are planning to meet with him to discuss the final plans for the new building.

At their meeting this week, the board members also discussed the new law which provides payment for schools for pre-opening and post-closing sessions for teachers. The new rate is \$3 a day instead of \$15 a week, enabling districts to get paid for portions of weeks when teachers are on duty.

The district received over \$6,000 last week. Federal aid in support of guidance and counseling came to \$1,470 and federal aid for science, history and English came to \$4,667.

Title to the Kemp land has been received and payment made so the board is now working on acquiring other land. Bus routes are also being discussed and it is expected new drivers will be signed by the end of this week.

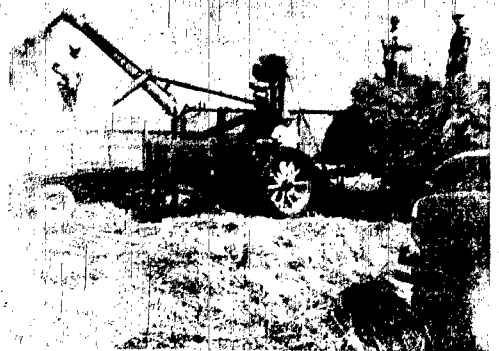

# Carroll Sheep Man Has Thousand or More Fair Ribbons

C. H. Morris, 85, Wayne county's premier sheep breeder, is still active in the business although he has retired from the registered sheep business after winning more than a thousand ribbons at state, county and sectional shows.

His wife, 87, is just as active as he is, doing the house work and preparing the meals for her husband and their son, Harold. However, she has no ribbons to show but shares the pride her husband enjoys in his work.

The ribbons were garnered over a 48-year period from 1912 to 1960, over 60 of them being purple "grand prize winner" ribbons. The best years for Morris as a winner of ribbons was 1931 when his entries won 112 county, state and other ribbons.

He still raises Oxforddown sheep, the type his father had. It is possible these are a Welsh sheep as the "down" breeds come from England and Wales, which is where his father came from.

Over the years Morris has shipped rams as far west as Washington and as far east as Pennsylvania. He still keeps 100 breeding ewes and ships out many head each year.

Residents of Wayne county 81 years and married 61 years, Mr. and Mrs. Morris are well-known for their active life. She learned to type when she was 81 and they have traveled to shows in Texas, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Iowa and Illinois with entries. Traveling was almost a hobby with them for a while. They drove to Canada in 1958 and also drove to both coasts. The rig they fixed up was a fore-runner of the "campers" on many pickups but uncommon then. Morris fixed a house on their pickup which provided for cooking and sleeping but which was admittedly not as fancy as the commercial brands available several years later.

Their most recent trip was to Washington, D.C., this spring to see their daughter and son-in-

# Hang the Editor!

Editor's Note: We editors generally come in for a few unkind words, and we expect them, but when an understanding "letter to the editor" comes along, we literally jump with joy. We imagine that just what the editor of the Elkhorn News, Independent did when he received the following letter.)

"A newspaper is a strange being, for like a human being, it has a personality—a name, and in a sense of the word—a soul. A newspaper having attributes of a human being, and being created by human beings, also makes mistakes—like all human beings.

"Newspaper readers are strange beings too. The reader knows his newspaper. He trusts it—it is a part of his life. He knows its contributions to his community—it is part of the American way of life to him.

"A reader enjoys seeing his name in the paper—when the news about him is good. When the news is unsatisfactory from the reader's point of view, he cannot see any reason for its being printed. It is the same way when a newspaper makes an error, typographical or otherwise. When an editor makes an error, readers scream 'hang the editor.' When a lawyer makes an error and loses the case, he appeals the case and gets paid anyway. When a doctor makes a mistake, the patient says nothing for he can't read Latin, and if he could, he couldn't read the handwriting. If a doctor loses a patient, those left behind thank him in a 'card of thanks' in the newspaper.

"So the editor is a 'fall guy'—for he falls for almost everything anyone tells him. He is a friend of everyone so long as he prints what the readers want to read. In this situation, an editor has no friends. Oath and duty to the principles of Journalism transcend friendship, relationship and amity.

"In keeping with these ethics, an editor is sworn to print the news impartially without fear or favor. This leaves no margin for deviation. It is like walking a tightrope—he must 'see the mark'—he must print the news without fear or favor or he becomes a farce and his newspaper becomes a common rag."

**Wayne Residents Take Unusual Vacation Trip**

With an 18-foot boat loaded on a trailer they went to Davenport, Ia., to visit their daughter, Mrs. C. E. Wallicks. From there they went down the Mississippi river to St. Louis.  
The Mississippi is not a "downhill flowing stream" anymore. It is a series of pools created by locks and they went from Lock No. 15 through No. 27.  
At St. Louis they visited three nights with his brother's family, the George Rogges, then returned "up" the Mississippi to Davenport. Going up is no more difficult than going down since either way it's matter of going through level ponds and not flowing river.  
Some locks took longer than others because barges get priority in the locks. Accommodations are good (like the Mark Twain hotel at Hannibal and a waterfront motel at Hamilton, Ill.) and gas prices are reasonable with "filling stations on both banks every few miles."  
The Rogges reported a scenic and economical trip, pleasure in the knowledge they always had a nine-foot channel maintained by the locks and pleasant experiences with people who are in charge of locks in all instances.

**Wayne Veterans Cannot Get VA Direct GI Loan**

Wayne is one of 11 counties in Nebraska where veterans will no longer be eligible for direct GI loans from the VA. There are 21 cities in the state also having vets not eligible for such direct loans.  
The VA office at Lincoln said word that private capital has always been the source of money for GI loans. VA loans, directly made and carried by VA, can be made only in sparsely populated areas where private capital is not available.  
Hurt, Cedar, Cumming, Dakota, Dixon, Madison, Pierce, Stanton, Thibault and Wayne county veterans are no longer eligible for direct loans. Schuyler, Columbus and Fremont are among the cities where loans directly from the VA are not available.  
The Lincoln VA office has been assured by lending institutions that the action will not be detrimental to eligible veterans. The institutions will also make regular GI loans. About 20,300 direct loans a month have been made in the areas covered in the clubs and counties now closed to such loans.

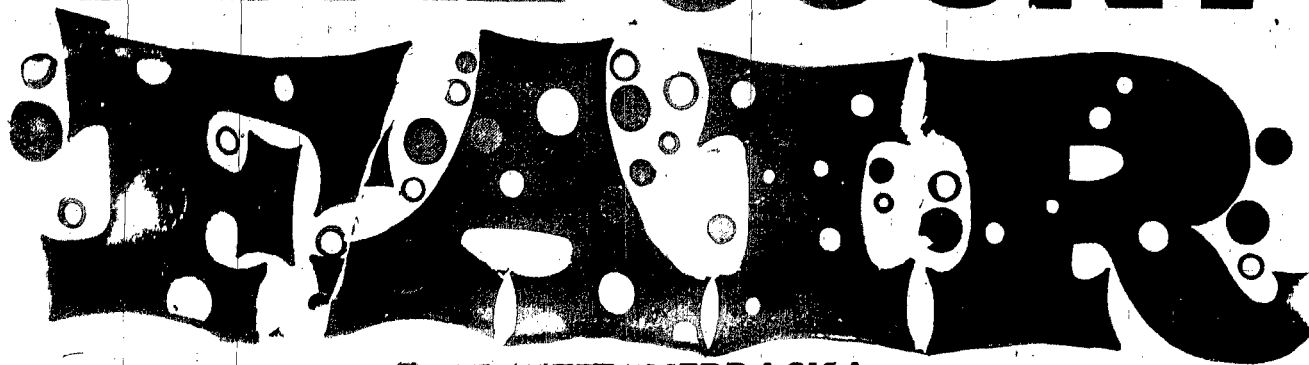

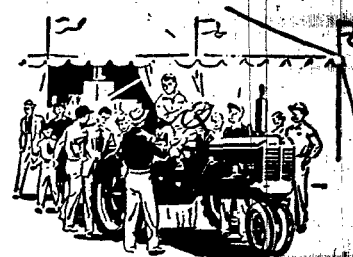

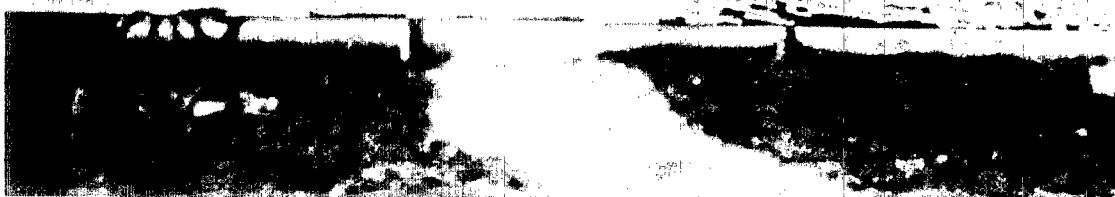

Each class rides for one hour per week. When riders are ready to advance to a new riding technique, they are graduated to a new class. The Drakes also board and train horses.





**F**OR the man who lives in town, or the city, the horse can be a source of great enjoyment . . . a means for relieving tensions . . . and, in fact a pretty good social status symbol. On the other side of the ledger, the horse can be a source of great enjoyment, as well as financial rewards for the country who caters to this popular sport.

Because the last census of agriculture did not count the number of horses, we do not know for sure how many horses there are in the country. However, calculated estimates indicate there are 2½ million head of horses, of which about 1.8 million are light horses.

While over the past decade or so the number of horses has gradually decreased, there is a decided trend now in the opposite direction. One of the biggest things that has caused this reversal is the suburban horse owners. There are an estimated 450,000 of these now and the number is increasing every year.

New opportunities are being opened up for the man who has the necessary land and know-how to satisfy the horse owner who must depend on someone else to provide the horse care. There are several avenues of service open. You can board horses; offer riding lessons; run a riding academy; provide horses by the hour with riding trails; raise breeding stock; or even provide the supplies horse owners must have.

The rate you can charge for your services will vary depending on what you offer. For boarding a horse you may get anywhere from \$15 to \$20 per month, to perhaps \$140 per month. The low figure provides little more than a place for the horse to get in out of the weather, a place to run and maintenance feeding. The high figure is for the care and feeding of race horses. The usual rate for most stables varies from about \$40 to \$65 per month. This usually includes a box stall, a good feeding program and a certain amount of available medications. Insurance on the animals is usually carried by the owner of the horse.

Riding lessons may carry a rate of perhaps \$2.50 per hour in classes . . . on up to \$10.00 or higher for more private lessons. Horses offered for use by the hour without instructions usually demand upwards of \$2.00 per hour.

Of course it is not all profit to operate a stable, or even a few horses on the farm. It often costs about \$15 or more per month to feed a horse right. Then there are medica-

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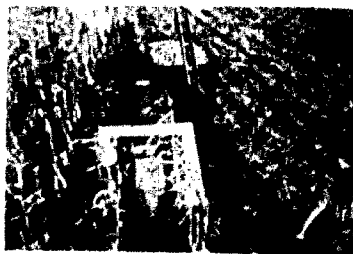

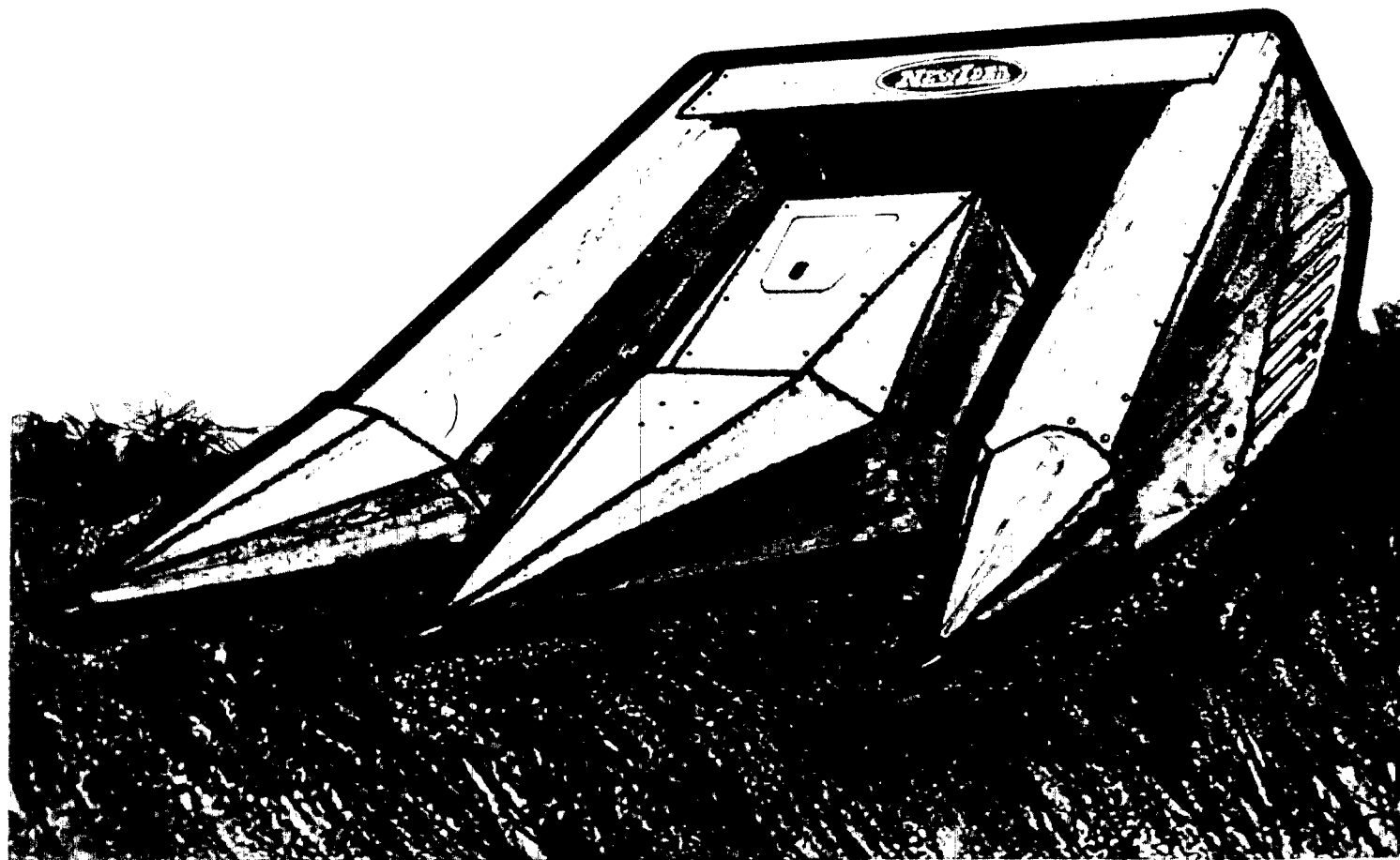

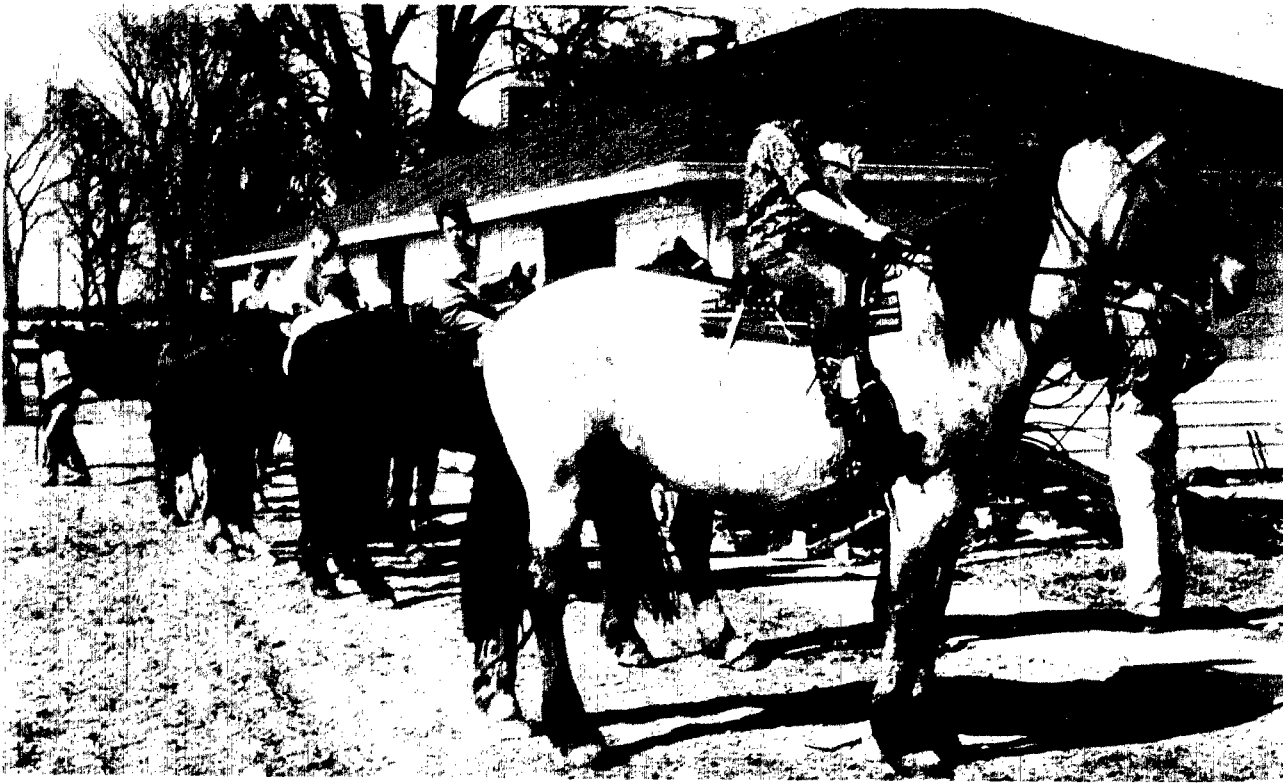

tions, shoes, saddles, labor, housing and a prorated cost for your land and taxes. But with careful planning and a price of \$50 or so per month you can come out with a good return per horse in your care.

To be a good horseman you should first of all love horses and then take the time and effort to learn all you can about their care, breeding, training and feeding. Knowing the fine art of riding and what to look for when you buy your horses shouldn't be taken lightly either.

Knowing how to teach what you know about riding is something that takes study and practice too. This is especially important when you consider that children represent a large percentage of the riding population. Most horse experts feel that a boy or girl who has reached his eighth birthday is old enough to learn to ride well. Sometimes, though, a six-year-old who is usually "not afraid of anything" can get behind the reins and do well.

On the other hand, some oldsters need more riding assistance than the youngsters... and there are 55 million Americans over the age of 12 who have occasion to ride horseback at least once per year. By 1976, according to a study made by Laurence Rockefeller, this figure will climb to 82 million. Most of them could benefit by having basic instructions in riding.

#### Buying Your Horses

The old saying "you can take it from the horse's mouth" is still a practical guide to go by. The wise buyer not only looks at the horse's mouth and general appearance, but at his personality traits. If you are inexperienced, here are a few guides that may be of help:

1. Select a horse you can manage according to your ability and experience. If the horse is to be ridden by others of less experience, consider this too.
2. Choose a horse that fits your size. If it is going to be ridden by children, get one that can be easily mounted by them.
3. Take your time... look at many... and ask to see them perform and ride it yourself.
4. Check for disposition. In addition to how he performs while you are inspecting him, you can get a fairly accurate indication to a good disposition if he has a wide, full forehead, well-carried ears and large prominent eyes.
5. Buy from a person or concern you can trust.
6. Check the horse's relatives for quality and performance. This may be a guide to the potential of the one you are thinking about buying.

#### About Housing

After you get your horses home, be sure adequate housing facilities are available. If you are offering riding lessons or even providing boarding facilities, you should have an area where indoor riding can be done at least to some extent. Horses have to have exercise even in cold weather. Box stalls should be about 12 x 12 feet and you'll need a tack room and a feed room. Several commercial building companies, as well as agricultural colleges can provide plans.



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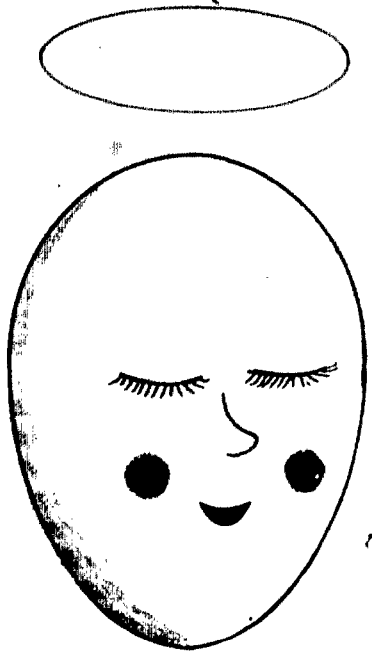
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# They're Good Eggs!



**T**HE old saying of "Good things come in small packages" was especially meant for eggs. They're so full of nutrients for their size, that nutritionists recommend one egg per day in your diet. They contain complete protein that is needed for body growth and repair and several vitamins and minerals. In addition to all of this, they taste good and are extremely easy to use in cooking.

A different kind of egg salad combines eggs with cottage cheese. This spread makes good dunking material for crackers or crispy vegetables such as celery or radishes. It's also a wonderful sandwich spread.

One quick meal which utilizes hard boiled eggs is Springtime Creamed Eggs. With the help of asparagus, toast and a creamy sauce you have a delicious, nutritious one-dish meal. If you wish, you can top the toast with a thin slice of ham,

turkey, chicken, cheese or luncheon meat before topping with the other ingredients.

There is a special technique for the preparation of hard-boiled eggs. The key to this technique is "no boiling". To get the best results, simmer in water which is just below boiling temperature for 20 to 25 minutes. Then plunge them into cold water to facilitate removal of the shell and also to prevent green coloring of the outer egg yolk. This method produces a firm yet tender egg.

Have you ever tasted a spiced egg? They're wonderful additions to most any meal. They are good as meat accompaniments or as a relish. You can use the recipe for Pickled Eggs or you can pickle by covering with beet pickle juice and refrigerating them. These eggs are especially colorful and tasty.

Eggs can be used in so many interesting and delicious ways. They're really "good eggs".

## EGGS AND COTTAGE CHEESE SPREAD

8 hard-cooked eggs, chopped	1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 teaspoon salt	1 carton (12 oz.) creamed cottage cheese, well drained
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard	
1/4 teaspoon pepper	
4 to 6 drops Tabasco	

Combine eggs and seasonings. Chill. If desired, press drained cottage cheese through a sieve. Combine with egg mixture just before serving. Makes 2 cups. Serve this spread with wafers, crispy bread-stuffs, celery pieces or radishes. The flavor and consistency make it an excellent sandwich filling too.

## SPICED EGGS

2 cups white vinegar	(4 peppercorns, 1 clove, cel- ery seed, mace, piece of ginger root)
2 to 3 tablespoons sugar	
1 teaspoon salt	
1 medium onion, sliced	1 dozen hard-cooked eggs, peeled
1 teaspoon pickling spices	

In a saucepan combine vinegar, sugar, salt, sliced onion, and pickling spices; simmer 5 minutes. Pour over the peeled hard-cooked eggs in a quart jar. Cover and refrigerate. For best flavor, let stand several hours or overnight.

To give additional flavor, a sprig of dill, or a few caraway seeds, or a clove of garlic may be added to the pickling liquid. Strips of green and red pepper or carrot add color.

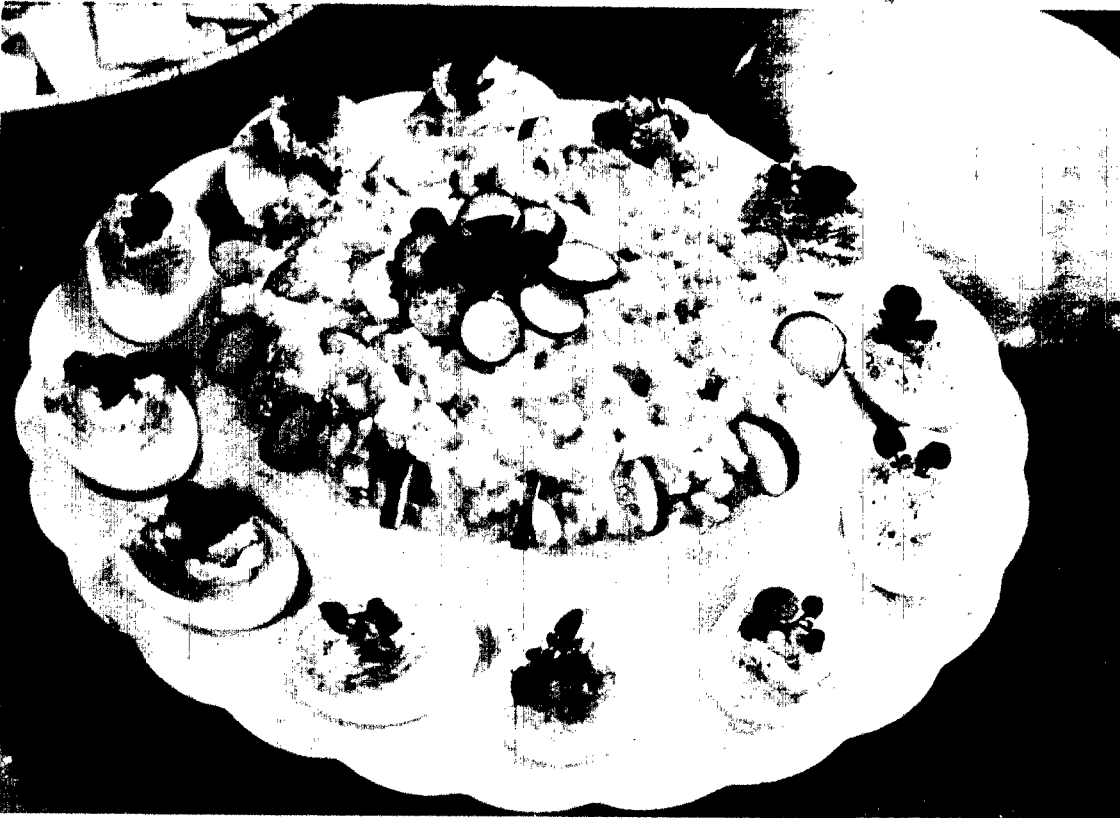
For variety, beet pickle juice may be used to spice hard-cooked eggs. Pour over peeled hard-cooked eggs. Refrigerate.

Spiced eggs may be refrigerated for as long as two weeks. After that time, they may become too pronounced in flavor for some tastes.

## SPRINGTIME CREAMED EGGS

4 tablespoons butter or margarine	12 spears asparagus, cooked or canned
3 tablespoons flour	4 hard-cooked eggs
1/4 teaspoon or more salt	Parmesan or sharp Ched- dar cheese, grated or crumbled
1/8 teaspoon pepper	Paprika
2 cups milk	
4 slices toast	

Prepare the cream sauce: melt the butter or margarine, add flour and seasonings. Blend thoroughly. Add cold milk all at once and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened throughout. Place 3 spears asparagus atop each slice of hot toast arranged on a baking sheet or heat-proof platter. Over each serving place one sliced hard-cooked egg, cover with hot sauce and sprinkle with Parmesan or Cheddar cheese. Place in broiler until bubbly and lightly browned, 4 to 5 minutes. Sprinkle with paprika and serve promptly.





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### CHEESE SUNBURSTS

| 1 tube mild or sharp cheese spread (1 cup) | 1/4 cup cooked peas or chopped green pepper |
| 2 cups hot cooked noodles or rice          | 1 tablespoon finely chopped onion           |
|  | 2 eggs                                      |

Combine cheese spread with noodles or rice, peas and onion. Spoon this mixture into two individual casseroles. Make a hollow in the center of each with the back of a spoon. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 15 minutes. Then break an egg into each hollow, season with salt and pepper and bake 10 to 13 minutes more or until eggs are softly set. Yield: Two generous servings.



### BAKED EGGS IN POTATO CHIP CUPS (IN CORN CASSEROLE)

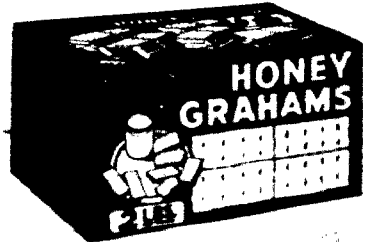

| 4 oz. package potato chips     | 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce |
| 3/4 cup diced celery           | 1/2 teaspoon salt               |
| 1/4 cup chopped onion          | 1/2 lemon thinly sliced         |
| 1/4 cup butter or margarine    | 1 cup coarsely chopped tomatoes |
| 2 tablespoons flour            | 6 eggs                          |
| 1 can (1 lb.) cream style corn |                                 |

Reserve 12 large potato chips; crush remainder and place in bottom of 2-quart shallow casserole. Cook celery and onion in the butter or margarine several minutes but do not brown. Stir in flour. Add corn and cook, stirring constantly, until uniformly thickened. Stir in Worcestershire sauce, salt, lemon and tomatoes. Pour over potato chips. Make 6 depressions for the eggs and break an egg into each. Border eggs with potato chips petal-style. Bake, uncovered, in a hot oven (400° F.) 15 minutes for soft eggs, 20 to 25 minutes for firm eggs. Makes 6 servings.



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
