Board Sells WHS Bonds But Turns Down Refund Bonds

The bid of Van Horne Investments, Inc., Omaha, on behalf of that firm and four other bonding companies was accepted for \$867,000 in high school bonds by the school board of District 17 Tuesday. Bids for refunding bonds for WHS were rejected.

Van Horne and Storz-Wachob-Bendor, Omaha, were the only two companies bidding as the bond market is down somewhat. However, the interest rate was better than the board had anticipated and the two bids over a 20-year period were only \$228.50 apart.

Bidding by Van Horne was for itself and for the White Weld Co. (Chicago), manager, White-Phillips Co., Inc., Chicago, Bosworth, Sullivan & Co., Denver, and George K. Baum & Co., St. Louis. Storz-Wachob-Bendor's bid was also made on behalf of several firms.

The bid of the successful company was for bond coupons from Sept. 1967 to Sept. 1973 at 3.00 per cent; Sept. 1974-Sept. 1975, 3.10 per cent; Sept. 1976-Sept. 1981, 3.20 per cent; Sept. 1982-Sept. 1985, 3.30 per cent. Supplementary coupons for 11 months, Oct. 15, 1965 to Sept. 1966 were at 1.6 per cent.

The interest rate of the successful bidder was 3.3976 per cent and that of the second bid 3.3396. Both bids were considered acceptable by the board.

Also up for bids was a \$347,000 issue for refunding bonds on the elementary school. However, bids would have saved the district very little money so the board voted to reject bids by both the above-named firms and consider calling for more bids later if the bond market looks better.

The grade school bonds allow calling up bonds any time after five years so if a favorable interest rate can be received and enough money saved, the board may seek bids again. A similar arrangement has been made with the high school bonds.

Four from Area Receive Degrees at University

Four area young people were graduated with a record summer school class at the University of Nebraska Friday. Raymond Harrison Kelton, jr., Wayne, graduated with distinction, one of 190 honored.

Kelton, son of Dr. and Mrs. Raymond Kelton, Wayne, will do graduate work leading to a career in college teaching. He received the highest academic honor granted by the school from the college of arts and sciences.

Robert D. Jensen, Carroll, Lonnie H. Wood, Stanton, and Joseph P. Ash, Emerson, received master of education degrees from the teachers college of the University. The four were among 560 receiving degrees.

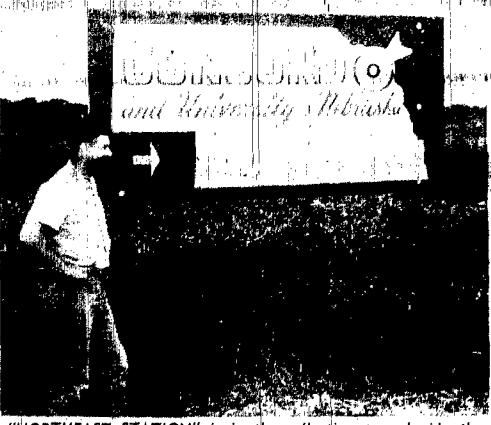
Wayne Girl Nebraska's TV Moppet

Signatures on Petitions Still Being Sought

Several completed petitions calling for a vote on the income tax have already come in but many more signatures are needed. Most of the signatures obtained so far have been voluntary.

Adon Jeffrey reports many have come into the First National bank to sign petitions and to get petitions right away, and others are still circulating them.

Wayne county would have to get over 400 signatures to get a number equal to 10 per cent of the vote in the last general election. This is the total sought to keep the income tax from going into effect until the people have a chance to vote on the issue.

Jeffrey said anyone wanting to sign or wishing to circulate petitions in any Wayne county areas should contact him as he has the petitions on hand. Felber's, The Herald, courthouse, McNatt's and the bank are getting signers and several individuals also have them.

The state has 90 days in which to get signatures. If 10 per cent of the voters in 35 counties sign, the bill will be thrown out and the matter settled by the people. If five per cent in the same number of counties sign, the law will go into effect but the people will get to vote on it in 1966 anyway.

Council Takes First Action Required for City Projects

Wayne City council started creation action Tuesday night for a sanitary sewer district and a paving district in Crescent drive, Westwood addition. The completion of sewer lines will put in the final utilities needed for the entire addition.

Initial steps were also taken toward creation of four street paving districts previously petitioned for. These are on Oak drive, Third street, Welcome way, Lawndale, Seventh street, First street and Blaine street.

Stop signs were approved for two locations near the West Elementary school. They would stop traffic on Sherman street where the one-way entrance to the grade school area is on Fifth and to the one-way exit from the school area on Fourth.

Here's the News All of You Kids Have Been Awaiting!

Classes for Wayne and Carroll high school and elementary school will begin Monday, Aug. 30, at 8:15. That's the news the kids have been looking forward to for weeks.

Busses will run and the lunch program will be in operation. For junior and senior high, the first day will be divided into two sessions; eighth, tenth and twelfth grades attend 9 to 11:30; seventh, ninth and eleventh grades attend 1 to 3:30. The school bus will make the route in the morning and at noon.

Beginning Tuesday, Aug. 31, all classes will meet on a daily schedule of 8:50 a.m. to 4 p.m. Rosters showing the pupils' names and room assignments will be posted outside each room in each school for the time being.

Boundaries for the Northeast elementary school will be the same as for last year, taking in pupils from Seventh street to the north and Lincoln street to the east. Rural elementary pupils will attend West elementary.

Classes for elementary school will be held all day Aug. 30, starting at 9:50 and dismissing at 3:35 for lower grades and 3:45 for upper grades. Kindergarten will be 8:50 to 11:15 for morning class and 1 to 3:30 for afternoon class. Kindergarten at Northeast elementary and Carroll will meet in morning sessions only.

New pupils are asked to register for elementary schools beginning Aug. 16 in the principal's office, West elementary. It may be necessary to contact some parents concerning transfer of children from one school to another in case class sizes are unfavorable at either school. This will be kept to a minimum, but it is felt smaller.

Mrs. Ludwig Kuhl Sholes Postmaster

Mrs. Ova (Ludwig) Kuhl is the acting postmaster at Sholes. An inspector from Hastings was in Sholes July 31 to swear her in for the position.

The new acting head of the Sholes post office is a veteran of 15 years service at that office. She served as clerk and leave replacement during the years her husband was postmaster.

Her husband retired the last day of July after 15 years as postmaster of Nebraska's smallest post office. Until Mrs. Kuhl was appointed, the future of the post office after that date was indefinite.

There still is nothing definite about the post office department's plans for Sholes. However, acting postmasters have been known to serve for weeks, months or even years.

Wayne Hogs Selected

A consignment of butcher hogs from Kenneth Frevert, Wayne, was named as one of the top 15 loads on the Sioux City market Monday. They were selected in the top quality hog contest, being conducted by the market. Owners of selected loads are eligible to compete in a special drawing for a color television set Sept. 22.

School Tax Requirements for District 17 Go Up Next Term

District 17, Wayne and Carroll, will require \$24,237.49 more tax money this coming year than it did for the previous year, the school board has estimated. This means an increase of less than three mills in the levy for the district.

Much of the increase comes about because of the higher costs for teachers, equipment and other needs. Last year this came to \$288,317 but the 1965-66 school term will cost \$320,136. Wayne district seeks the best in all fields and the best costs a little bit more.

Operation of the plant will be down slightly as will expense for new construction and some equipment. Increases are noted in office expenses, administration, transportation, school lunch, repair and maintenance of buildings.

The district will spend a total of \$315,839 this coming year compared to \$291,601 last year. This is a difference of \$24,237.

On the income side, tuition paid by contracting districts is expected to decrease by almost \$1,000. Other local revenue will be down almost \$2,000; state appropriations will be up \$1,500; school lunch will be up \$1,500; and national defense education funds will be up \$1,200.

Actual income for the district will be \$444,978; a cash reserve of \$190,000 will be maintained; \$163,738 is in the district treasury; \$33,000 is in the county treasury; \$112,905 is estimated income from miscellaneous income.

Of interest to most will be the fact that there is no added tax required for the purchase of any land, either that being sought or that already purchased. Funds on hand are sufficient to cover these costs.

In addition to tax monies, the bulk of the district's funds come from free high school tuition, state appropriation and federal aid. A complete report in legal form will appear in next week's edition of The Herald.

Mrs. Jenkins Graduates

Mrs. Cordelia Jenkins, Wayne, was one of the area residents graduated at Wayne State Thursday. Her name was overlooked in compiling the list of graduates. A longtime teacher in Wayne county rural schools—12 years—Mrs. Jenkins will teach this coming term in Cumung county about four miles south of Altona in District 90. She received her bachelor's degree with a major in education at Thursday's rites.

Give Three Awards Thursday at WSC

Three awards were made by Wayne State College and the Wayne State Foundation at Commencement exercises held Thursday, Aug. 5 in Rice Auditorium.

Mrs. William Hasebroock, West Point, who was commencement speaker, received the college's distinguished service award in recognition of her service to alma mater and leadership of 11,000,000 women as president of the General Federation of Women's clubs. She is a 1925 graduate of Wayne State and the wife of State Senator Hasebroock.

Two foundation awards were given, the first to Mrs. Cynthia Minkin Shaulls of Lincoln. She received a \$100 cash gift as the graduating senior who has been of greatest service to the college.

The second Foundation award, a \$200 scholarship, was given to Carol Paine, Blair, for maintaining the highest scholastic average of an undergraduate student in the preceding three terms. She had an overall average of 3.5 on a scale in which 4.0 is the highest possible.

Dixon County Fair Will Be at Concord

Concord will host the Dixon County fair Aug. 19-20-21. It has been the site of the fair since 1911.

Aug. 19 will be entry and preparation day with horses judged before the grandstand in the evening. Friday and Saturday will offer full programs.

New Subdivision Provides Lots for 20 Hoskins Homes

A new subdivision to provide room for 20 new homes is being opened in Hoskins by two firm developers in the future of small homes. Construction is to start at once on the first of the houses.

George Langenberg and Ed Kollath are opening Sunrise addition on the northeast edge of Hoskins. A 9 1/2-acre tract has been approved by the Federal Housing authority for building sites for homes.

Before announcing their plans, the two men received FHA approval for them. Called for are winding streets, building lots on hills and level ground and sewer and water connections.

The sewer and water pipe is on the land now ready for connection to the Hoskins system. In spite of the hillside location of some lots, no boosters will be required for either sewer or water.

Kollath is mayor of Hoskins, president of the Commercial State bank and has promoted Hoskins for years. Langenberg is a member of the town board, has a new home in Hoskins and also has worked toward keeping his home town from slipping backward.

Draft Board Gets Call for Physicals Doubled in August

The Wayne County Selective Service board has received a call for twice as many boys to take physical exams in August as had been planned originally, according to the selective service clerk, Mrs. Elda Jones.

Earlier Wayne county had been called on to send six boys August 26 to take physicals. The past week the board was notified that 12 boys should report for physicals that date.

The county is so low on eligible young men, any notices to draft men in September will have to take some of those sent for physicals this month. They will be in the 20-year-old group.

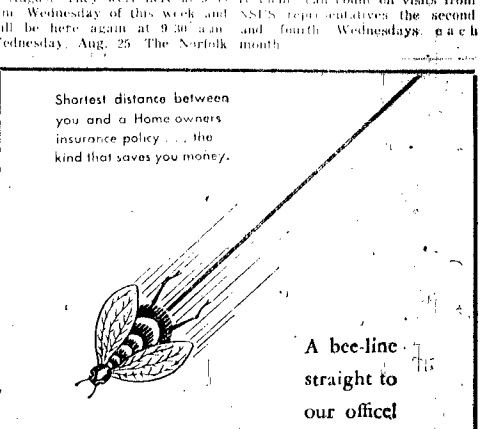
NSES Visits Revealed
