## Two Youths Break Out of Wayne County's Old Jail

Two youths scheduled to come up for district court hearing on charges arising from alleged forgeries about July 23, broke out of the ancient Wayne county jail Sunday night or Monday morning. A Wednesday morning their whereabouts were unknown.

Sheriff Don Weible has put in lots of overtime investigating every lead. He has been to Yankton, Beemer, West Point and other towns checking on clues.

His best information came from the sheriff at Lake Andes, S. D. By telephone, the South Dakota sheriff reported the pair had been seen at nearby Wagner at 8 o'clock Monday morning.

Descriptions of the two, John David Barr, Jr. and John Ambroz, have been sent to all area state law enforcement groups by radio. Since then there have been several calls about two young men being in various locations, each of which has to be checked out.

Sheriff Weible said there is probably a connection between the escape of the boys and the loss of a car in Wayne. The breakout was thought to have taken place between 10:30 p.m. Sunday and 8 a.m. Monday. Jack Bede, 1108 Douglas, reported at 11:50 a.m. Monday that his 1960 white over blue Chevrolet, was gone. It had been last seen in front of his place at 10 p.m. Sunday, he told Police Chief Vern Fairchilds. License number is 27-2675.

The sheriff's wife was the first to discover the break. She was watering the yard of the sheriff's house and the yard when she noticed a brick on the lawn. She went over to pick it up, wondering who could have thrown that in the yard, when she saw the hole in the fourth side of the jail near the ground.

A quick check by the sheriff revealed the two had taken out bricks and mortar, made a small hole and apparently slipped out. They had no money on them and are thought to have left with just the clothes they had on.

The jail built around 1885, is scheduled to be replaced. A new home for the sheriff and more lock-up and secure facilities for the prisoners have been contemplated for some time. This escape may or may not speed up the process.

ASC, SCS and Chamber in Native Grass Plot Project  
The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the Soil Conservation Service and the Wayne Chamber of Commerce have joined in a project which is recommended for Nebraska cities for centennial promotion—a native grass plot.

To be planted this year, it is hoped such plots will be retained at least through the centennial year, 1967. As many towns as possible are urged to have Nebraska native grass plots.

Wayne county's is located on city property on West Second street in front of the fire station and the police station. A plot six-feet wide and 21-feet long has been donated for this purpose.

Planted in the plot will be ten varieties of grass native to this state. The plot when full grown should be of interest to young and old, according to centennial officials.

Plans call for these grasses to be planted and marked: Big bluestem, Indiangrass, switchgrass, little bluestem, buffalo grass, needle and thread, western wheatgrass, side oats grama, blue grama and sand bluestem.

## Wayne Area Prepares to Welcome Hunters Again

Wayne Chamber of Commerce game committee has started plans for another hunting season whereby farmers welcome hunters who wish to stay on farms while they hunt. A meeting to discuss the plan will be held Tuesday, Aug. 24 at 8 p.m. above the fire station.

Letters are being sent to farmers, but even those who are not contacted are still welcome to attend and participate. "The Broken Bow plan" for welcoming hunters and accommodating them will be discussed.

Indian Dancers Leave After Dance at Dixon  
The Indian dancers from Kearney Industrial school left following their dance at the Dixon diamond jubilee celebration Saturday. The troupe is two of them did not leave via the bus.

An unidentified pair, one from Winnebago and the other from Niobrara, did not check in at the bus. A search was started but neither could be located so the bus left for Kearney without them.

Sheriff Gus Schutte of Dixon county was joined by Sheriff John Ribbe of Cedar county in looking for the pair. They spotted them north of Dixon and the two boys then split up.

Sunday both of them were found near Coleridge and the other still north of Dixon. They were returned to the industrial school, apparently to get punishment for not staying with the Indian dancers.

Wayne County Historical Society has about everything set but the date in plans for a hobby show in September. Work on the city auditorium floor makes it impossible to set a date yet.

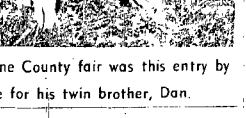
Meeting last week in the courthouse, WCHS members named committee heads and members. They also discussed various facets of the show.

Thursday is entry day and general preparation day with horses judged before the grandstand at 6:30. R & L Midway shows, rides and concessions will be on the grounds all three days.

Friday morning judging is completed with exhibits opened to the public at 11. At 2 the Hal Garven company will present free acts and Wakefield merchants will give a free watermelon feed.

In spite of high heat and humidity, around 8,000 attended the Wayne County fair Thursday, Friday and Saturday. A cooling off Friday evening helped considerably but Thursday evening the air was hot and hot.

The "free" barbecue was the big attraction. It was free, once you were inside but there was a little matter of gate admission which made it something more than free for those over 15.

The barbecue itself drew around 2,000, going by the plate count. This could be off slightly as some ate only ice cream bars or drank coffee, milk or orange juice, none of which required plates.

Meat served was prepared in coats Wednesday night and was the best yet. Potato chips, beans, ice cream bars, drinks and pickles were served efficiently. Double lines of cars were enroute to the fair an hour after the barbecue started.

The Dieter Tasso show that night was in front of a packed grandstand and offered a variety of acts to suit most family members. The Thrillarama was a disappointment in some ways with only two really daring stunts in cars and a daring dynamite explosion act.

Horse races and foot races were held two days, the Wayne band gave two concerts, the Humby five (seven men) gave two concerts, farm, home, open, 4-H, school, stock, equipment, commercial and other displays were as good or better than those of recent years.

Renewal of Driver Licenses Delayed  
Don't plan on renewing your driver's license the first part of September even if that is the date it expires. County officers have been notified that the state does not have the forms ready so renewals cannot be handled.

Anxious to avoid inconvenience to patrons who ordinarily mail or bring in licenses for renewals, she asked that they make note of the change.

Miss Bahde said word would be sent when the forms were available and she would make an announcement then. There is a 60-day grace period in which to renew anyway so licenses will be good through October.

Cost of this year's two-year renewals will be the same for adults. Teenagers will pay more, the cost having gone up from \$2 to \$3. Further details will be given later.

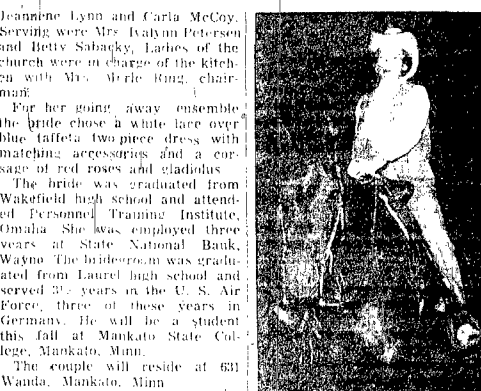

Randy Polster and Phil Kellon are two year lettermen back and

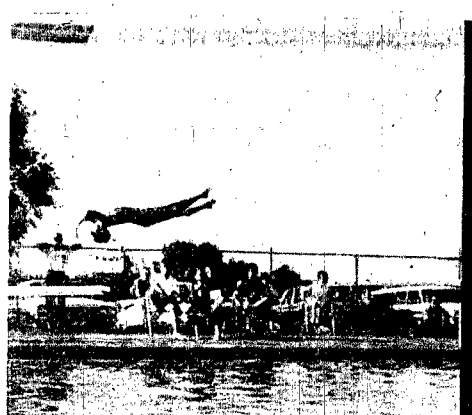

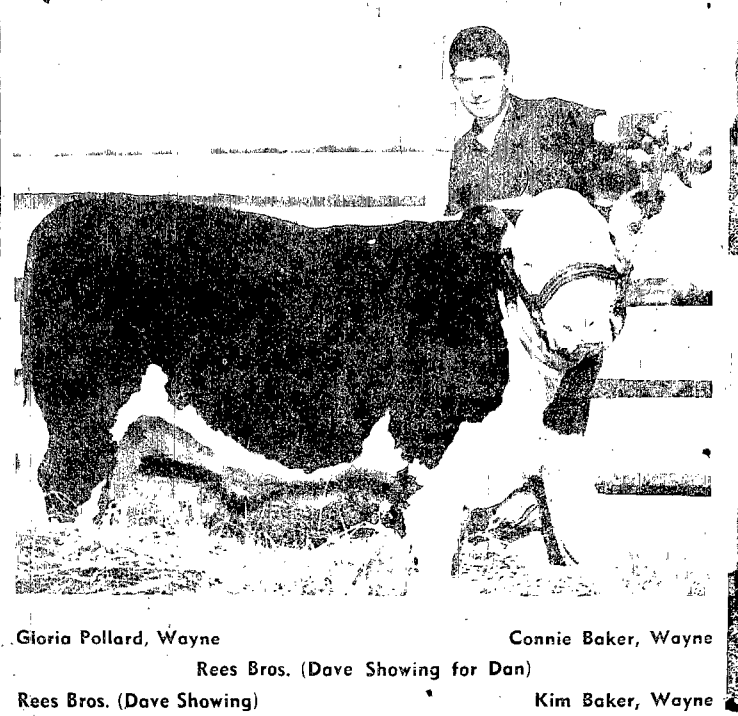

Plenty of Nebraska veterans wanted to reinstate GI insurance, according to Chris Bargholz, county service officer. He reports 581 applied for reopening GI insurance since May 1.

State offices report more than 90,000 have applied throughout the nation. This is 10,000 more than the veterans administration had expected.

Eligible veterans are those with service-connected disabilities or non-service-connected disabilities unable to obtain commercial insurance. May 2, 1965 is the final date for reopening GI insurance.

## Income Tax Petitions Have Number of Signers Needed

Wayne county residents have signed enough signatures on petitions asking a vote on an income tax to repeal the five percent mark. They are still seeking twice that many so the law creating an income tax will not go into effect before a vote is held.

Adon Jeffrey said Monday there were six completed petitions and seven others out, representing 268 sign at 10 o'clock. The county needs only 200 to exceed the five per cent of votes at the last vote for governor.

Goal of local boosters is ten per cent, or about 400 signatures. If enough counties get ten per cent of the voters to sign, the income tax cannot be levied at all before a vote is held. With five per cent, the tax can be levied just before the election is held.

Petitions are not being actively circulated. They are in business places and offices. A goodly number of the signers are farmers who do not like the idea of a higher property tax but like even less the idea of an "open end" income tax which has no ceiling to prevent the legislature from going higher and higher each term so more money can be spent.

Petitions are being taken to Carroll, Winslow and Hoskins this week. Those signing in those areas are asked to observe carefully the rules and to give proper addresses, dates and precincts.

Sept. 6 is the target date for Nebraska to have enough signatures to kill the income tax until

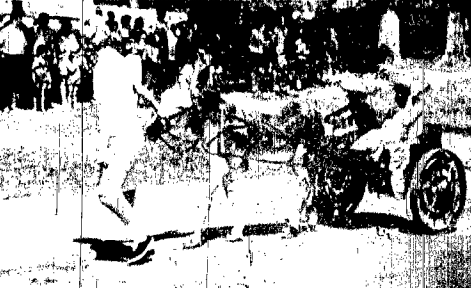

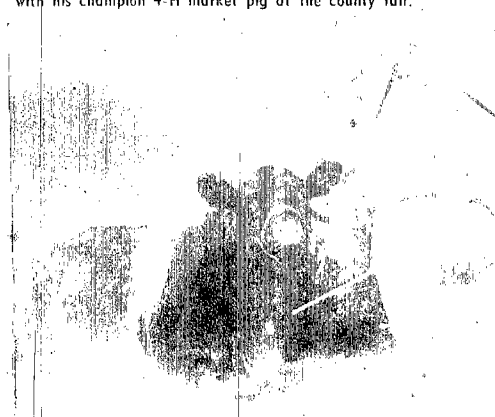

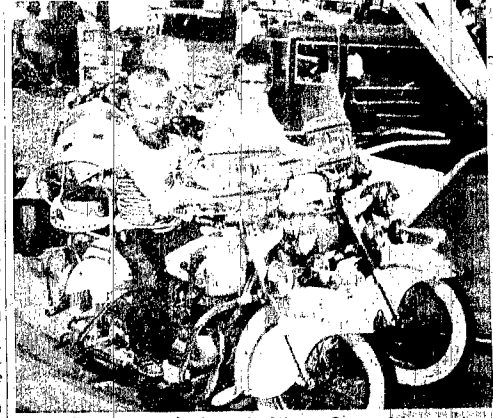

In addition to the plots, almost every home in Concord has mums

and other flowers. Businessmen say the community has caught the spirit and is cooperating wholeheartedly.

"Nebraska's Mum City" is a title Concord is after. With such complete cooperation, it could get the nation's attention too.

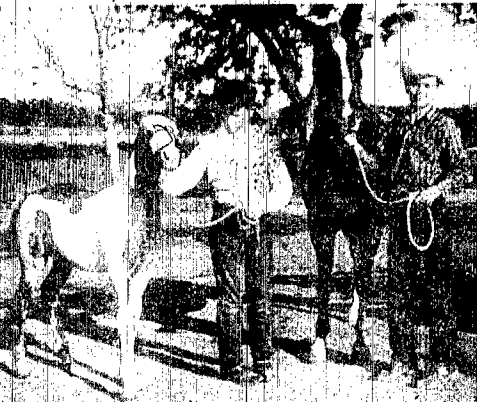

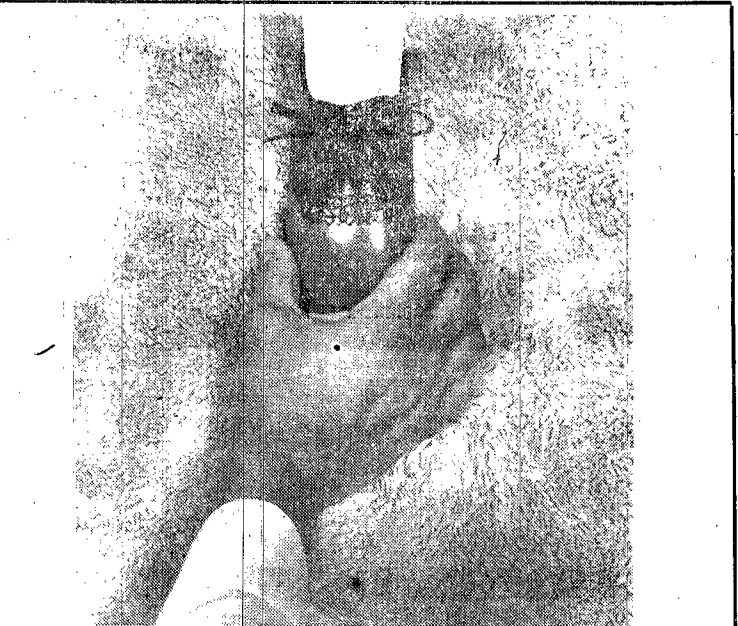

2 pounds grapes (Thompson seedless — the large, deep purple grapes.)  
— the sweet green grapes. Cardinal 1 egg white  
or Malaga — the red grapes. Ribier granulated sugar

Wash grapes and dry thoroughly. Separate into small clusters. Beat egg white until frothy. Dip grapes into egg white, then granulated sugar. Place on aluminum foil in the frozen food compartment of your refrigerator until sugar hardens and grapes are frozen. Use as a garnish for salads or with molded custard type desserts.

Super Tip — Grapes such as Cardinal, Malaga, and Ribier which have seeds may have their seeds removed before freezing them, by carefully cutting a slit in each grape with a sharp knife or razor blade and then squeezing out the seeds. This must be done with care so as not to separate grapes from the clusters.

Gwen, a Wakefield high graduate, has been attending Morning-side college. The school sponsored a 44-day trip to Europe, including nine days on the ocean aboard ship and a flying trip home by jet for the World's Fair.

She feels her glimpses of life in communist countries, even behind the Iron Curtain were the most revealing. However, she found that just as people in other countries have misconceptions of life in America she had others in the group also had misconceptions about life in Europe.

In the first place, she did not expect to see horse-drawn traffic. Nevertheless, she saw a lot of it all over Europe along with ox-drawn vehicles and some modern transportation methods.

Lack of bathing facilities were most disturbing. Some hotels had baths available at \$1.50 in addition to the room price. Others had none available at any price. Tour members expressed appreciation for the showers and baths they are accustomed to in this area.

East Berlin was one eye-opener. The devastation? No, she expected to see ruins. What Gwen was surprised at was the better conditions

than she had heard about, but not terrible.

Their East Berlin guide was young and helpful. He was a university student and would have given anything he owned to get out, asking them to help him, which in itself was a dangerous thing to do. Checkpoint Charlie as a stopping point was not as thorough as some checks they had heard of and Gwen brought out some East German coins in her shoes and scenery of East Berlin in her camera. The guide said pictures were all right as long as they were not taken of guards along the wall.

Yugoslavia was another communist country visited. They went by a road little more than a trail through the mountains into that country. They found the people backward but friendly, obviously longing for better conditions but trying hard to impress the visitors with how well-off they are.

Switzerland, about everyone's favorite, was Gwen's favorite too. The Matterhorn, Zermatt (city without motorized traffic of any kind), watch factories and the incomparable scenery made it a country not soon forgotten.

Souvenirs were brought back from every country and Miss Olson will always remember such things as the "skyscraper" in Holland—the stories; the Heidelberg brewer; Salzburg, Vienna, Paris, the Vatican, Pisa, Trevi fountain, the catacombs, Rome's opera, England, Holland, Germany, Austria, France, Belgium and Ireland. It was a fun trip, a learning trip and a friendship trip for Gwen will not forget the friends she traveled with and those she met in other lands.

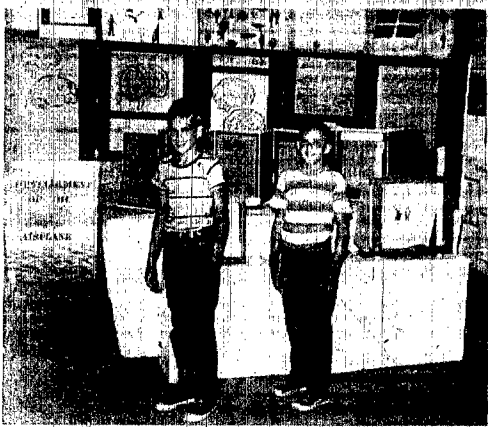

### Postmaster Urging Use of ZIP Numbers

Postmaster Don Wright in a Wayne, is urging patrons to use ZIP code numbers on parcel post. He said the use of ZIP codes will speed up delivery.  
For several weeks all mail has been directed through sectional center offices, another step in the ZIP code program. Mail from this area goes through the center in Norfolk and is combined with mail from other towns, eliminating handling by making "directs" for other towns and cities.  
By using ZIP codes, parcel post packages go with packages headed for the same area and often to the same town for direct connections. This is said to speed delivery as much as 48 hours to the east or west coasts.  
Without ZIP codes, packages may lay out in cities like Omaha until handled manually and sorted to sacks by city names. This naturally takes more time.  
The postmaster said postal employees will be glad to give patrons the ZIP code numbers for towns, but asks that once you get a town's ZIP number you make a note of it so you do not have to ask clerks

to look it up each time. He said ZIP code is working the way it was intended and he urges use of it on first class mail and all other mail.

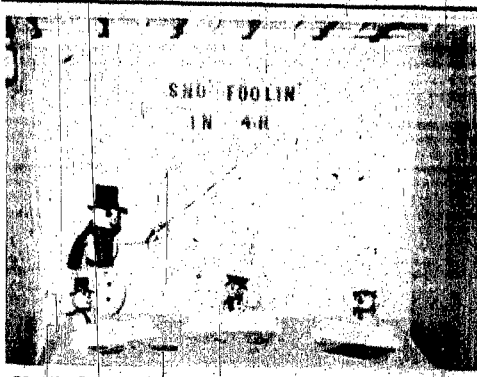
### Wayne Policemen Bear Bad News Some of Time

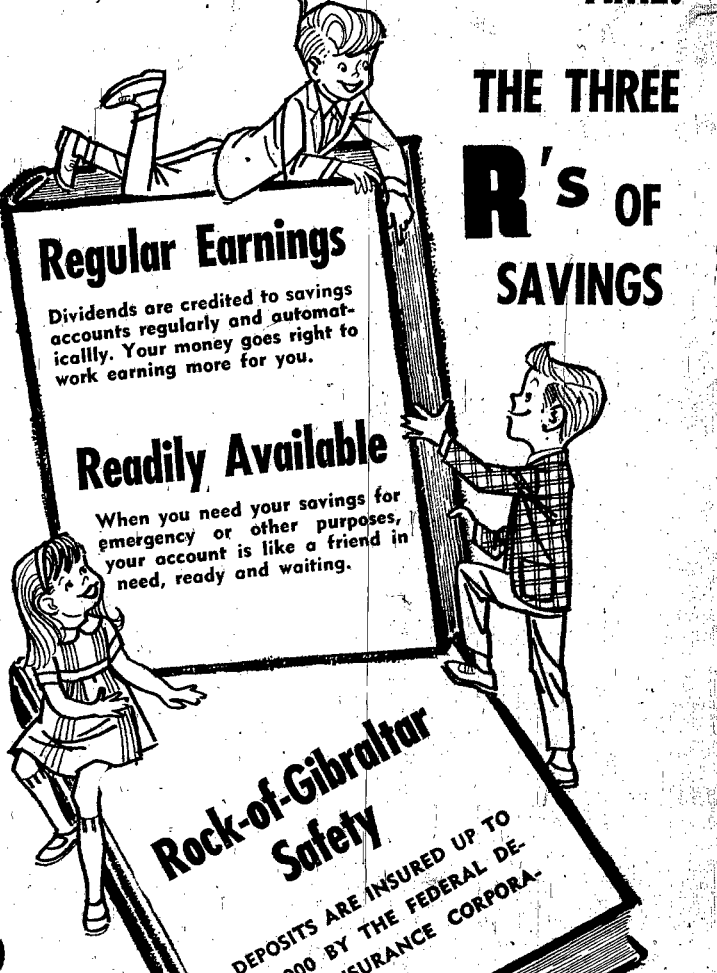

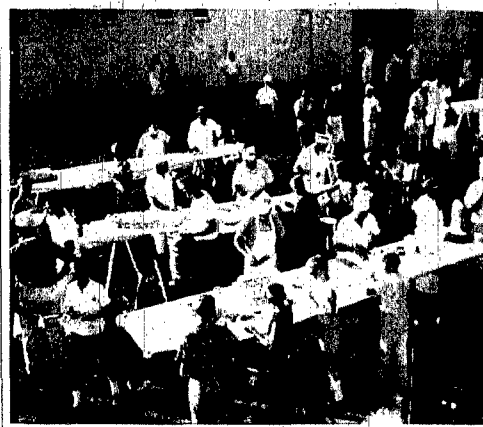
