Beneficial Spring Gives Lift to Area Economy

It started raining Friday, not the thunder shower type of rain that is expected this time of year, but the spring-type rain received in April or May. It was a general rain and this helped the economy of a wide area.

The only places where rain was not as welcome as it would have been a few days earlier or a few days later were communities where county fairs were scheduled. The fairs went on and the rain was genuinely appreciated by farmers and businessmen.

The Carroll area seemed to be the recipient of the largest amount of rain Friday. Over four inches of rain fell there with Richard Long and Wayne Kerstine among those reporting that amount northeast and southwest of Carroll.

Winds reported over 2 1/2 inches of moisture in the Friday portion of the rain. Randolph had about four inches and Emerson had two inches. Rainfall came to 1.99 inches in Wayne, according to State National bank gauges.

Tuesday morning the weather was a bit more normal. It was rain all right but the thunder shower type. Wayne received 3.1 of an inch in a brief period of the early morning marked by thunder and lightning typical of the season.

The rains came at just about the right time. One farmer said: "They sure would have helped more a week earlier." Another farmer was quick to respond: "Yes, and they wouldn't have done near as much good a week later."

No doubt about it, rain was needed. The area was beginning to show signs of the dry spell with curling corn, browning grass and a definite effect on beans, potatoes and other crops of the region.

Before the rain it was generally agreed that another good soaking would carry the crops through the critical period and insure a crop. Friday's moisture was just the right type and unless the mercury climbs into the high 90's for days on end, crops indeed do appear to be safe for this season.

Ten new teachers are on the 57-member Wayne staff for the coming term. This includes the high school, two grade schools in Wayne, junior high and Carroll elementary.

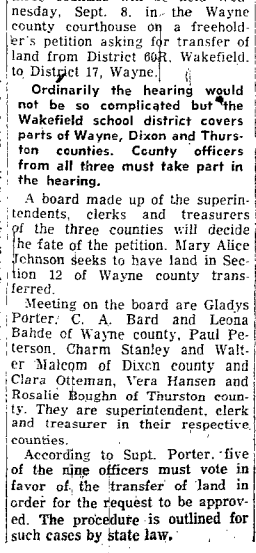

Community Chest Budget for Wayne to Be Record \$8,933

Wayne, a city that has never failed to meet its Community Chest quota will have a still assignment making it for 1965. The budget set Tuesday by the Chest board is a record \$8,933, compared to last year's \$8,408.

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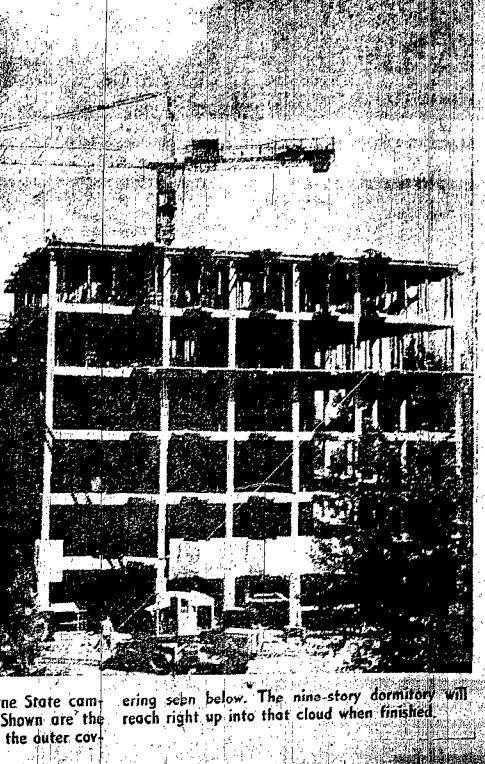

Letters to The Editor

Dear Editor:

Some time ago in your editorial column, you were shedding verbal tears for the unfortunate rural school children who still await to make the character-building dash for the out door toilet on a cold wintry day. Later you squelched the young lady who dared to remind us that there are advantages as well as disadvantages to out door plumbing. Here, I thought, was a man who was ready to work to improve the educational opportunities for the rural children.

Then I read the editorial in favor of the petition drive to repeal the income tax, and I knew that your tears were crocodile tears and that you were ready to champion the cause of those who would perpetuate an out-dated tax system that gives the Nebraska farmer such a dirty deal.

A year or more ago, when a school study committee was surveying the Wayne county educational situation, I did some research and found that Wayne district 17 had an actual valuation for tax purposes of \$7,500,000 with 1400 names on the school census. A rural area which might legally be united with district 17 to form a consolidated district had a valuation of \$8,900,000 with 560 names on the school census. This meant that the rural residents would be paying more than half the cost of the education. This past winter, the Nebraska Farmer told of a similar study made in Otoe county which showed that a like situation existed there.

The Wayne study committee agreed that the unfair tax situation in Nebraska was the principal deterrent to school redistricting.

In your editorial, you stated that "nobody wanted the income tax" which is not true because a majority of the legislature knew that there were plenty of people who wanted it and it was high time that Nebraska adopt a fair tax system.

The Nebraskans For Fair Taxation has been formed to preserve the income tax. Organizations associated with this group are: Nebraska Stock Growers Association, Nebraska Livestock Feeders Association, Nebraska Farmers Union, Nebraska State Grange, Nebraska Wheat Growers Association, Nebraska State Education Association, American Association of University Women, Nebraska Congress of Parents and Teachers and the Nebraska Farm Bureau. Maybe you feel that members of these organizations are "nobodies."

Heading the petition drive in Wayne County is a man who should know as well as anyone that Nebraska's present property tax is unfair. All he has to do is to go into his farm loan file and see what has happened to the net worth of his farm customers in the last three years while the rest of the people have been enjoying prosperity. Yet he wants to make his farm friends' pick up the tax tab while his rich Omaha friends ride practically tax free.

The Omaha World Herald for August 1 gives a list of those who

have petitions, and I wonder why so many are at banks around the state. Don't the money boys want to pay their share of the taxes?

I would appreciate it if you would print the review of the income tax law which was prepared by Clayton Yentler who authored the bill for the senators who introduced it. Sincerely,

Wayne State football Coach John Jermier speaks both cheerfully and cautiously of the season ahead.

Cheerfully because he awaits the arrival of 32 lettermen next week, plus a flock of returning squadmen and a huge crop of freshmen. Cautiously because, as he says, "Everybody else in the conference is going to be better, too."

The lettered corps includes all of last year's starting backfield when provided most of Wayne's high-ranking yardage—third in the nation for rushing and tenth in total offense among NAIA colleges.

This quartet, all seniors with three letters, consists of fullback Burt Matthes and Halfback Van Steckelberg, both of Stanton; Halfback Jerry Kileon of O'Neil, and Quarterback Dean Desuhr of Charles City, Ia.

Of course, the backs are quick to give credit to such fine senior lettermen as Center George Helker, End Roger Bentley, Tackles Dick Minton and Vic Hurd, and Guards Darrell Lahmann and Bob Kruse. These plus lettermen Dean Gertsch and Cliff Schilling should produce some exciting holes to run through.

Defense is causing the coaching staff some concern, especially finding replacements for graduated halfback Gene Hinrichsen and for linebacker John Buck, last year's most valuable player on defense who is lost for the season because of a summer baseball injury.

Capable performers back in the defensive line are Dean Welble, Dave Bross, Darrell Fenton, Gary Bemiss, Don Koenig and Minton. The defensive secondary is strong with Roger Dion, Dennis Radtke and Dennis Ard, two-year veterans, plus Bob Pearce and Bruce Miller, a pair of head-knocking, hard-driving fresh lettermen who also will do some offense.

Rounding out the lettered forces are Fullbacks Jim Wainsley and Fred Pierce; Quarterback Steve Feinstein, a fast and tough practitioner of the shotgun tactic; Ends Roger Parr and Gene Humming; Guards Roger Pohman, Jim Kloube and Randy Rogers and Tackle Jim McNamara.

The squad will check in Tuesday, begin practice Wednesday. Jermier has invited about 70 veterans and promising newcomers to attend pre-school drills. Another 40 or so likely will turn out the following week.

Jermier welcomes back line coach Max Lundstrom, who was on leave last year. Mike Olson remains as backfield coach. Al Svenningsson as assistant line coach until basketball practice begins in mid-October.

Larry Manfull, an undergraduate assistant last year, now a graduate assistant, will be head freshman coach and assistant with the varsity backfield. Another graduate assistant, Kent Stephenson, will work with the freshmen and varsity lines. Undergraduate Ron Trudo will be assistant backfield coach for the varsity and frosh.

A newcomer to the coaching staff and physical education faculty is Ralph Barelay, assisting as line coach. At Bradley University he was an All-Missouri Valley Conference tackle and linebacker. He coached at Galva, Ill., high school, Carthage College and Western Illinois University three years each, and has spent the past two years working on a doctorate at Columbia University. In addition to football, he will coach swimming and teach physical education.

Hunters Want to Come; Farmers Not Nearly So Anxious

Wayne Chamber of Commerce has received five inquiries for hunting accommodations this far including one that came Wednesday from Racine, Wis. The hunters are apparently more interested than the farmers for only one couple showed up for Tuesday night's meeting to give and get information on accommodations.

Wanda Owens, C. of C. manager, said the Wayne organization will have an ad in the September issue of Outdoor Nebraska and more inquiries on hunting accommodations are expected then. It is hoped by that time more accommodations will be known.

What the C. of C. had wanted was someone from each community to act as a contact. Then when inquiries came in from other states and other parts of Nebraska, they could be referred to the "contacts" and decide where they wanted to go to hunt.

Hunting season starts Oct. 23 and with South Dakota and other states cutting pheasant bag limits, Nebraska will be the goal of more hunters than ever. The state has publicly ready for hunting in Wayne county and other areas so the hunters are bound to come.

Recommended procedure is for farmers to offer board, room and a guide for \$10 a day per person. Anyone contacted should ask for one day's payment in advance to insure hunters showing up and as a sign of good faith.

The C. of C. itself does not make reservations. It will help and it will sponsor a hunting contest for hunters Oct. 28. An Isaac Walton trap shoot is also

scheduled for hunters the first of the season.

Any farmers who would be willing to take in hunters on the \$10 a day basis, should contact Mrs. Owens at 375-2240. If contacts can be arranged in each community the plan may be a success yet. Further information may be available by next week.

Nebraska Income Tax

(The following article is printed at the request of Robert Beckenhauer. His letter appears on page two.—Editor)

Introduction

Nebraska, until 1965 the only state in the nation with neither a sales nor an income tax, has finally taken the historic step of broadening its tax base. This occurred with passage in late June of LB 797, a state income tax. Though primary support came from agricultural and educational interests, it was an urban senator, Lincoln attorney Hal W. Bauer, who steered the bill to final passage.

The state income tax will go into effect on Jan. 1, 1967, unless its opposition, centered in the high income urban areas, is successful in bringing the bill to a referendum, and then in defeating it at the 1966 election. Under the Duis Amendment to the Nebraska Constitution, the state may not levy a property tax after LB 797 goes into effect. Thus, the income tax is a replacement tax, not an additional tax.

The Base

"Taxable income" will be the base used by all taxpayers. For the individual this will be line 11d of Form 1040, his federal income tax return. This means that the taxpayer will subtract from his gross income: (1) all business expenses; (2) \$600 for each dependency exemption; and (3) either his itemized deductions (charitable contributions, medical and dental expenses, personal taxes, etc.) or the standard deduction. These are the same deductions that are permitted under the Internal Revenue Code. No one will file a Nebraska tax return unless he also files a federal tax return.

The Taxpayer

LB 797 applies to individuals, trusts, estates, cooperatives and corporations. Small business corporations may, however, elect to be taxed as partnerships. The cooperative tax was added by amendment during debate on the bill. Its legal effect will undoubtedly be challenged, and the outcome is conjectural. The corporation tax was included to prevent tax postponement and occasional tax avoidance.

The bill contains reciprocity provisions to deal with situations where Nebraska taxpayers do business in other states, and vice versa. In general, these provisions tax income earned in Nebraska, irrespective of the taxpayer's residence, but do not tax income earned in other states.

The Rate

LB 797 deliberately avoids specifying a particular tax rate. During debate it was criticized for thus being "open end" in nature. Opponents alleged that this would

lead to wild spending and would discourage industry from coming to the state. The latter argument is a myth; first, because the property tax is also open end and, second, because every state in the Union has open end taxes. At least one tax must be open end in order to balance the budget. No legislature can bind its successor to a specific tax structure or tax rate.

Nor is there any reason to anticipate wild spending under an income tax. Appropriations will still be scrutinized by the Legislature, and the tax rate will still be set by the State Board of Equalization. In fact, the procedure is almost identical to that used for the property tax. One significant change is that in setting the rate the Board must consider the General Fund carry-over. This will prevent the build-up of a surplus.

It now appears that the appropriations of the 1965 Legislature will increase the state property tax levy for the next biennium from its present 9.14 mills to approximately 13 mills. Though the income tax will not be in effect during this biennium, a comparable rate can be calculated. Taxpayers may thereby determine the effect that replacement of the property tax by an income tax will have on their own particular situations. A 2.5% income tax rate should be ample for this.

Example:

Jones owns \$40,000 worth of property in his home, its furnishings, his automobile, and business property of all kinds. This is assessed at 35% of actual value, or \$14,000. At a tax rate of \$13 per \$1,000 valuation, his state property tax bill would be \$182.

Jones earns \$10,000 per year in his job. Subtracting his exemptions and deductions, he has a taxable income of \$7,000. At a 2.5% tax rate, his state income tax would be \$175.

Administration

From the above example, it can be seen that the taxpayer will have no difficulty in completing his income tax return. He will merely multiply the sum found on line 11d of his federal tax return by the Nebraska tax rate. This simplicity makes LB 797 uniquely adaptable to electronic data processing. And since the state is already purchasing computers for other purposes, the additional cost of using them for administering the income tax will be very low. In fact, once the transition costs of shifting from a property tax to an income tax are met, Nebraska should have the most economical tax system in the United States. It is estimated that administrative costs will be approximately 1% of the amount collected in taxes. A sales tax would run 1 1/2% plus payments to retailers, and the property tax costs 3 1/2% plus.

Federal and state tax returns will be computed in order to eliminate tax evasion. The design of LB 797, following closely that of the federal code, permits Nebraska to use federal tax enforcement at no cost to the state.

Estimated tax and withholding procedures are identical to those of the federal code. Withholding was included as a convenience to wage earners and to obtain revenue from taxpayers who move away from Nebraska during the year and, therefore, would not otherwise pay taxes to the state.

Summary

If Nebraska is to have a tax system based on ability to pay, it must have an income tax. This is the most important criterion of a fair and equitable tax system—but one which cannot be met either by a property tax or a sales tax. LB 797 has many other advantages as well, foremost of which is its

simplicity and economy of administration.

The state income tax should have a broad appeal—to farmers, implement dealers, lumber yards, and many industries, all of whom require large amounts of property in order to do business; to labor, since the majority of working men in the state are not in the high income category; and to educational groups, since the state now has a vehicle which can be used for tax relief at the local level.

This year all three members of the precinct committee will attend the county convention. In the past the chairman of the committee was the only one to attend from each precinct.

Soybean Rate for Wayne County Set

Prices for 1965-crop soybeans in Wayne county will be supported at an average of \$2.16 per bushel for soybeans grading No. 2 containing 13.8 to 14 per cent moisture, according to John H. Mohr, chairman of the ASCS county committee.

The price is the same as it was for the 1964-crop soybeans. Premiums and discounts are also unchanged from those prevailing for the 1964 crop.

Eligible producers may receive price support on their 1965-crop soybeans through warehouse and farm-stored loans, and purchases, either as individuals or through their cooperative marketing associations.

Applications for support may be made at the ASCS county office, Wayne. Loans will be available through June 30, 1966, and the loan maturity date will be July 31, 1966.

What's Going On at Northeast Station?

What's going on at the University of Nebraska Northeast Station? This question will be answered for agribusiness leaders at 9 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 11, at the Northeast Station, Concord.

At this time a four crop and soil research now in progress, will be conducted by Station Agronomists Ulverd Alexander and Gene Schwartz.

Those in attendance will observe such crops and soils research as chemical weed control in corn, narrow row spacing trials on corn, sorghum and soybeans; variety evaluations of grain sorghum, forage sorghum, corn, soybeans, castorbeans, alfalfa and clover; fertilizer applications on corn, alfalfa and brame grass may also be observed.

A special effort is being made to attract agribusiness leaders such as chemical company representatives, fertilizer dealers, seed company representatives, county extension agents, vocational agriculture teachers and all others who are involved in serving Northeast Nebraska agriculture.

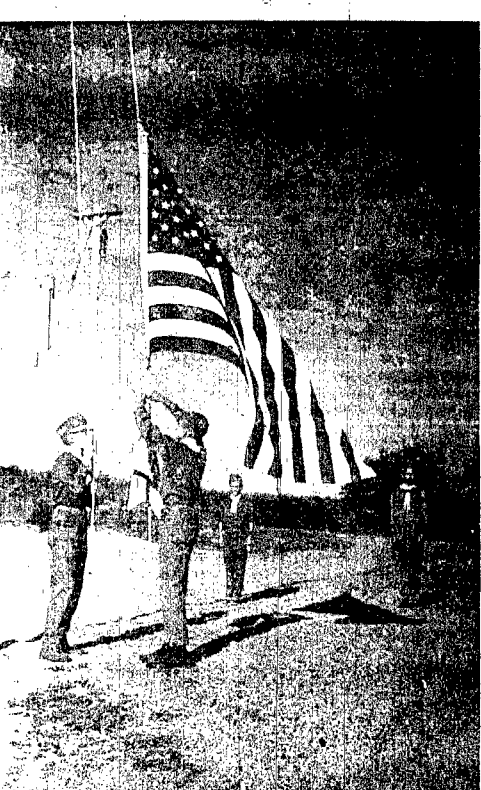

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Sleeping Sickness in Horses Near Winside

Three cases of sleeping sickness among horses have been reported in the Winside area with one horse dead. Over 500 head have been vaccinated there by Drs. N. L. Ditman and Donald Vrba.

At Wayne, Dr. J. M. Brown and Dr. L. A. Jensen report having handled no cases. However, they report vaccination for the disease is an annual affair and "the regulars" have already had their vaccinating taken care of.

They said the threat of sleeping sickness in horses seems to "hang out" in some localities. Sleeping sickness is caused by a virus carried by mosquitoes. Horses afflicted act strange as if they were dizzy. The main thing to do is to keep them standing, the vets said.

Dr. Ditman told of one horse that backed up to a barrel and was half-sitting on it to keep upright. Slings are sometimes used and in the old days men used to dig two holes, one for the front legs and the other for the rear legs so a horse put in them could not lie down and sleep. Once they're down, they're usually there.

There are many remedies for sleeping sickness today, according to the veterinarians. They said there has been no proof of connection between human and equine sleeping sickness.

Wayne Co. ASCS Committee Chairman Reports on Farmers' Trip to Washington

John H. Mohr, county chairman of the ASCS committee, was among five Nebraska farmers paying their own way to Washington to help promote good farm legislation. Following is his report on the farm bill:

The farm bill which was passed last week by the house of representatives is very broad and is composed of seven sections, each pertaining to a different commodity. Included in these are dairy, wool, feed-grain, cotton, wheat, cropland adjustment and miscellaneous.

The dairy program is a new approach and will support milk at two levels, one for grade A and the other for manufacturing milk. The wool and feed-grain programs are almost a continuation of the present programs with the support price on wool being increased.

One new feature of this bill is the cropland adjustment program whereby it will be possible to retire either a whole farm or part of a farm for a period of five or 10 years.

During the debate of this bill by the House of Representatives it was most interesting to note the coalition of bankers, textile industries, food industries and the farm bureau in opposition to any part that would benefit farmers. When visiting with the Farm Bureau members it was difficult to find one with a suntan or any evidence that showed him to be a farm operator.

The feeling in Washington is

that the senate will take up this bill in the near future and that it will also pass the bill with only minor changes.

It was most interesting to watch the voting record of some of our congressmen from rural western areas of Nebraska. Without exception they voted with the bankers, utilities, etc., showing such evidence that their purpose was not to benefit agriculture. —John H. Mohr

Club Has Cheered Up Hospitalized Kids Four Years with More Than 200 Puppets

Members have no count of the number of patients they have cheered up but Live and Learn Extension club, Wayne, has made over 200 puppets the last four years for children hospitalized in Wayne. Each child who wants to keep a puppet is allowed to do so. There are no scheduled times for making the puppets, the members simply gather to make them whenever the hospital's supply gets low. They furnish all the materials themselves, except for the faces which are purchased from a supply company.

Nurses at the hospital take care of all of this part of the program.

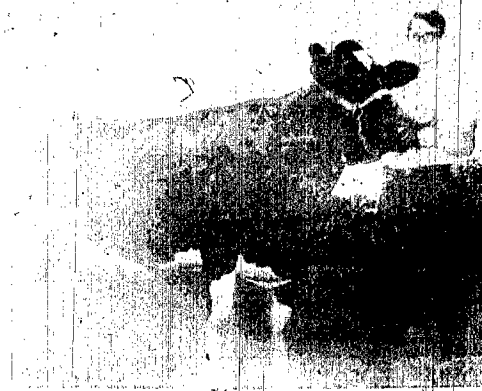
