

A' year or more ago, when a school study committee was surveying the Wayne county educational situation, I did, some research and found that Wayne district '17 had an actual valuation for tax purposes of \$7.500,000 with 1400 names on the school census. A rural area which might legically be united with district 17 to form a consolidated district had a valuation of \$8.800,000 with 580 names on the school census. This meant that the rural residents with 30% of the children would be paying more than half the cost of the education. This past winter, the Nebraska Farmer told of a similar study made in Otoe county which showed that a like situation existed there.

The Wayne study committee agreed that the unfair tax situation in Nebraska was the principal deterent to school redistricting.

Another step toward making the United States a welfare state was accomplished when the President signed the \$7.5 billion omnibus housing bill containing an entirely new program providing rent subsidy payments for "disadvantaged" Americans. The bill additionally authorizes continuance of urban renewal, public nousing and other related program for four more years "Termed "renticare" by Virginia's Senator Harry F. Byril, Chairmán of the Senate Finance Committee, the rent subsidy program for some stone of the senate related program was retained in the oncibis bil; by a bare seven vies in the Senate and only six in the House of Representatives.

Great Society planners have determined that 25 percent of income should be allotted to rent, although the national average is in the neighborhood of 13 per cent. The rent subsidy program will provide that portion of the rept in excess of 25 percent of the income of eligible tenarits. For example, if a family's income is \$200 per month the planners figure that family should not pay more than \$50 per month for rent; but if they want to have more than \$25 percent of the "disadvantaged" family.

Cattle Chute Cuts Costs

A chute with a suitable head gate or squeeze for holding cattle is a key piece of equipment on any farm where cattle are handled. In choosing a location for the chute, make sure the area is well drained and convenient to pasture and livesfock pens. Be sure there are no sharp edges or projecting boards that will bruise or cripple the animal. It has been estimated that bruise damage in the U. S. amounts to over \$25 million a year.

A deflector board can be used along the corral fence to guide the animals into the chute. The chute should be 20 to 25 feet long in order to accomodate three to four animals.

Most cattlemen prefer a chute 36 inches tapering to 14 inches wide at the bottom with five to 5½ foot sloping side walls. With a tapered chute, all ages of stock are less apt to turn around.

The sides of the working chute should be boarded solid, 24 to 30 inches above ground. A walkway on the outside will complete the

High-Moisture vs. Dry Grain

Farmers who will be harvest-ing grain sorghum should con-sider the respective merits of both high-moisture and dry stor-

both high-moisture and dry storage.

Dry Storage facilities should include a drying system that will permit early harvest. This will help avoid field losses, which can run to 15 to 39 bushels or more per acre in some years.

The drying system should be big enough to keep up with the harvest. There are several drying systems on the market, including the large of batchbind drying units.

Reliable manufacturers should be able to tell

Reliable manufacturers should be able to tell the drying rate or capacity of their equipment.

High-moisture or wet storage has real advantages for the livestockman. Drying costs are eliminated and grain can be harvested early to help hold field losses to a minimum.

There are, several high-moisture storages on the market. A conventional sile can also be used for high-moisture storage. A plastic cover can seal the top and reduce spoilage until the sile is opened for feeding.

Be Careful When Filling Siloten Planning to fill any silos this year? If so, you had better practice caution. Both carbon dioxide and bethane gases are given off during the fermentation of the silage. These are heavier than air, colorless, and odorless gases that can cause suffocation due to the shutting off the dryen supply. Methane is also flammable, but will usually not, burn because of its low concentration.

These gases are both dangerous when the silo is opened during the winter.

Nitrogen gases such as nitrogen dioxide and nitrogen tervoide and nitrogen tervoide are also given off. These gases usually accumulate next to the surface of the silage. Nitrogen gas can be observed since it has an orange-yellow color. Against the blue background of the sky it may appear purple.

This gas has an odor, but it is repugnant to a person. If is dangerous in that a person builds up a tolerance to the smell in a short time. In this case, a person may not realize there is an excess and thus get too much of the gas.

Death can result from an overdose. A disease known as silo fillers disease may also occur. The symptoms of this disease are similar to pneumonia.

planning and preparation will
allow guests to "rough it" graciously.

Practical covers for a back-Practical covers for a back-yard table include suds-sponge-able plastic cloths and place mats — preferably backed with flannel or foam to prevent slip-ping. To outwit breezes, edge the cloth with a drawstring or elastic to secure it around the table. Then sew a colorful cot-ton patch to the cloth at each place setting; these serve as "pockets" for napkins and sil-verware. Be sure to choose a machine - washable fabric such as terrycloth or denim. Small terrycloth towels make

Small terrycloth towels; wonderful place mats, over napkins, and bibs to pr against drippy foods Or them as "oshiboris" — which the Japanese wring of hot sudsy water and di ute to guests for "hand lau after hand-to-mouth meals For ouldoor eating, assests of unbreakable plastic es — including covered

sets of unbreakable plastic dishes — including covered containers for individual servings and family-size quantities of sandwiches, pie, salad, dessert, and beverages. A colorful plastic dishpan makes a great bowl for salad or corn, when feeding a crowd. For setting the table quickly, take a tip from the airplanes and use plastic tote trays with compartments for food and beverage cups. Wrap individual sets of Jorks, knives, and spoons in napkins to keep

them clean. To protect a large platter or bowl of food from dust and insects, make a unique "tent" by stripping an old lamp shade and recovering the frame with unbleached muslin. Tack the bottom with long basting stitches and finish the top with a drawstring casing so it can be removed for laundering.

Set a large pail or tub of hot soap or detergent suds near the table, along with a waste cân. As guests finish eating, scrape the dishes into the can and slip them into the suds for a presoaking, Later, this makes it easier to wash them thoroughly either in the dishwasher or by hand and avoids haphazardly stacked dishes. Incidentally, the tub can be set on a dolly or a child's wagon for easy mobility.

Another convenience is to place a jur or pitcher of soapsuds, plus paper towels, near an outdoor faucet or the garden hose for convenient hand-washing and rinsing. Settling up this outdoor "sink" is a tactful way to remind guests that clean hands are a must before sitting down to any meal.

Pots and pans used over an open fire will be easier to wash if the bottom surfaces are first coated with a thick layer of soap or detergent suds — no scouring needed! And to prevent decorative candles from smoking, roll them between well-soaped palms till thoroughly coated, except for the wicks. Wipe off the excess suds, let the candle dry,

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




