## Wayne-Carroll Enrollment Increases to Almost 1,100

Enrollment in the Wayne-Carroll schools for the 1965-66 term reached 1090 Tuesday, an increase of 24 over a year ago. They are divided almost evenly between elementary and junior and senior high.

The sophomores and seniors have over 100 in each class, 104 tenth grade pupils and 101 twelfth grade pupils. Smallest class is the first where only 67 are enrolled in three grade schools.

Supt. Francis Haun reports 276 in the West elementary, 178 in Northeast elementary and 78 in Carroll elementary for a total of 530. There are 560 in junior-senior high, including 298 in the upper three grades and 232 in the three grades of junior high.

Following are the enrollments by grades: Kindergarten 81; first 87; second 78; third 79; fourth 70; fifth 81; sixth 74; seventh 75; eighth 94; ninth 93; tenth 104; eleventh 93; and twelfth 101.

According to the superintendent, Vernie Hurlbert is a white bus driver on the Carroll east route and Maurice Hansen will drive the Carroll west route. Hurlbert replaces Melvin Franzen, who was unable to accept the position.

First school board meeting in District 17 was originally scheduled for Monday. Since this is Labor day, the meeting has been postponed until Tuesday, Sept. 7.



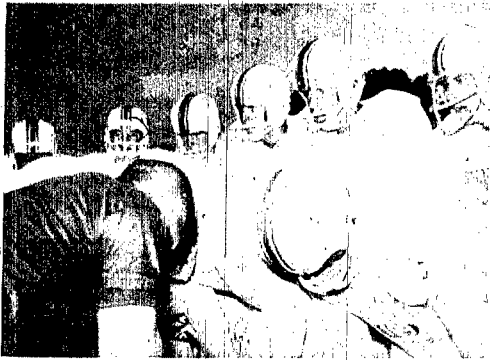

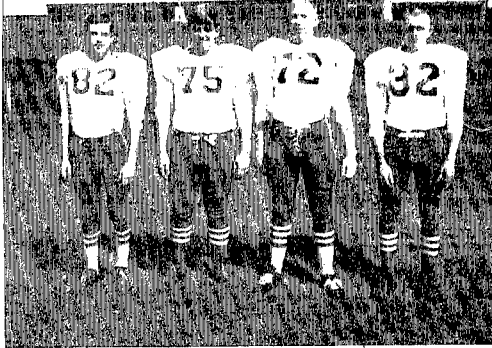
### Jerry Eulberg Loses Money but Gains Friends at Tuesday Appreciation Feed

been typed by the publicly-paid office secretary. The release was not so much an outline of farm bill facts as it was an attack on the Farm Bureau. The release observed that during debate on the bill, it was most interesting to note the coalition of bakers, millers, textile industries, feed, industries and the Farm Bureau in opposition to any part that would benefit farmers. Leading further...

It was most interesting to watch the voting record of some of our congressmen from rural western areas of Nebraska (there is only one, Dave Martin). Without exception they voted with the bakers, millers, etc., showing much evidence that their purpose was not to benefit agriculture.

So by the peculiar standards which are followed by U.S.A. from Secretary Freeman to the local county committeeman, the gospel is contained in the farm bill. And those who deny it to be the salvation for agriculture find themselves being called opponents of anything that would benefit farmers.

Such arrogance might be suffered more willingly if it did not result in publicly-supported campaigns to propagandize all the people, as Mr. Shuman charges. (The problem referred to is the use of public funds for propaganda.)

Two years ago, the American Farm Bureau opposed the wheat bill, backed by the USDA, which was defeated in a referendum vote. Since that time the Secretary of Agriculture, and his bureaucrats have conducted a strong campaign against the Farm Bureau. Mr. Mohr's article is a good example of this.

It is high time that not only farmers, but all citizens alert themselves to the unethical means which these people use to promote a federally managed agriculture in order to perpetuate their jobs.

Dear Editor: Recently President Shuman of the American Farm Bureau, in a letter of protest to Secretary Freeman, said "the expenditure of government funds to propagandize the citizens is an illegal, immoral and unethical use of public money and power."

Last week you printed a report by Mr. John Mohr, chairman of the Wayne County ASC committee, concerning his recent trip to Washington. Evidently he also sent a copy of this report to The Norfolk Daily News because it was the subject of an editorial in its Aug. 26 issue, part of which I quote:

"In the farm field, a local example of the nature of the problem was supplied this week in a press release from the chairman of a county ASC committee. He had joined others, at his own expense, to travel to Washington during House consideration of the farm legislation. Nothing wrong with that, certainly, though his part time job on the Agriculture Department payroll may help to make such trips possible."

On returning, however, he distributed a press release in an ASC envelope with postage and fees paid by the U. S. Department of Agriculture — it had

Dixon residents have been watching with interest a one-man construction project which a resident of that town has undertaken. Located on Main street just opposite the post office, progress is easy to note.

Marvin Anderson is a mechanic at Dixon motors by trade. However, all spring and summer he has spent his extra hours in the morning, at noon and in the evening improving his house.

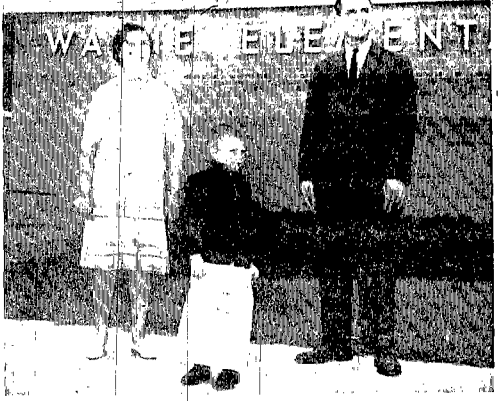

### New Method for Districts to Implement Reorganization Offered Under New Law

Wayne county residents may be interested in a new method of initiating and implementing school district reorganization. It came about through a little-publicized law passed by the legislature this year.

Only one vote was cast against it and since it had an emergency clause it became effective Aug. 17. The main points of the law as cited by the Nebraska commissioner of education, Floyd Miller, are:

- 1.—A Class I district may merge with a Class II, III, IV or V district. A merger of two Class I (kindergarten through eighth) districts is not possible.
- 2.—A Class I district may merge with another Class II or a Class III, IV or V district.
- 3.—A petition signed by 25 per cent of the legal voters in any Class I or II school district is enough to initiate an election on a merger proposal.
- 4.—No signer may withdraw his name from the petition after it has been filed with the county reorganization committee.
- 5.—Once the proposition goes on the ballot, a simple majority is enough to pass a reorganization plan.

Class II districts have K-12 in districts under 1,000 population; Class III have K-12 with a population between 1,000 and 50,000; Lincoln is the only IV district; and

Omaha is the only Class V district. After signatures of at least 25 per cent of the legal voters have been secured on a petition, it is filed with the county reorganization committee. The board of the district with which a merger is sought may either accept or reject the petitioning district's proposal.

If the proposal is accepted by the receiving district, the county reorganization committee may either approve or disapprove the plan. After this decision, the plan is sent to the state reorganization committee.

If either the county or state committee approves the plan, it is filed with the county superintendent of schools. The superintendent then notifies the board of education of the petitioning district that an election on reorganization must be held within 15 days and a simple majority is enough to carry out the proposed reorganization.

## McDonald Company Birth in Nebraska

The first store of what now is the J. M. McDonald Co., was founded in 1915 in Holdrege, Nebr. At that time the company was known as the Brown-Ekberg Co. The second store was opened in Minden, Nebr., in 1918, and this small nucleus of the present 100 store chain continued to grow, reaching a total of seven stores by 1927. The company growth continued until the early 30's when drouth conditions and a general financial depression forced it to seek further capital. It was in 1934 that Mr. Eben Brown made a trip to New York to confer with J. M. McDonald, sr., in a meeting that resulted in not only the needed capital for his firm but also added to the company the invaluable merchandising experience of J. M. McDonald, sr. In buying the interest of Mr. Brown's partner, Mr. Harry Ekberg, who wished to sell because of ill health, Mr. McDonald obtained controlling interest in the company and it became known as The Brown-McDonald Co.

With renewed financial vigor, The Brown-McDonald Co. opened four new stores in the next three years and continued to grow adding an average of five stores for each two-year period. D. G. McDonald, brother of J. M. McDonald, sr., headed the Brown-McDonald Co. from 1937 until his death in 1947, during which time Mr. J. M. McDonald, sr., was vice president of the company. In 1947 J. M. McDonald, sr., succeeded his brother as president and in 1948 the name of the company was changed to the J. M. McDonald Co., with Mr. J. M. McDonald, jr., being elected to the presidency. Mr. McDonald, sr., became chairman of the board until his death in 1955.

In 1950 purchase was made of the Bryant Link chain of five stores in Texas and New Mexico. Thirty-one stores were added in 1954 when the company purchased the stores of the W. W. Virtue Co. These stores are located in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas.

A merger with the J. P. Croff Co. in 1955 added 10 more stores to the chain. These stores are located in Wyoming, Montana, Idaho and Nebraska.

1957 saw the opening of a McDonald store in Longmont, Colo., and in the same year the J. M. McDonald Co., acquired its first store in California with the acquisition of Heath's Department Store in the South Sacramento Shopping Center, Sacramento, Calif.

In July, 1958, the company took over ownership of Fligelman's Department store, the largest department store in Helena, Mont.

In May 1959 the assets of the M. O. King Co. were purchased involving three stores located in El Centro and Brawley, Calif., and Yuma, Ariz. In the same year, new suburban units were opened at Wichita, Kan., and at Ontario and San Mateo, Calif. During the next few years additional units were opened at Santa Clara, Fresno, Rancho Cordova and Roseville, Calif., bringing a total of 99 stores in 11 states.

Mr. C. E. Blair was elected president of the J. M. McDonald Co., Sept. 14, 1960, with J. M. McDonald, jr., remaining as the chairman of the board and chief executive officer, and Val Peterson as vice chairman of the board.

In November, 1956, the Executive Offices and Warehouse Division moved into their new modern building located at 2635 West Sec-

ond street, Hastings, Nebr. This building is completely modern in every respect and contains 80,000 square feet of floor space. Here centralized buying departments, advertising and display, personnel, and operation departments carry out their duties in a well-organized, closely knit manner.

The J. M. McDonald Co., is a product of the great Middle West, essentially midwestern and western in character. Approximately 86 per cent of the stock is owned by people connected with the organization, and of the remaining stock, 90 per cent is owned by persons in the territory where the stores are located, with modern methods, quality merchandise and friendly service. Community interest and progress are prime interests of each McDonald store along with a sincere desire to serve and serve well.

## Started Career In Dad's Store

James M. McDonald, sr., was born July 20, 1881 at Kingston, Mo., and passed away Sept. 21, 1956, at Battle Creek, Mich. He was next to the youngest in a family of five boys who were destined to play an important part in the development of the chain store.

His first merchandising training came at an early age, his responsibility being the accomplishment



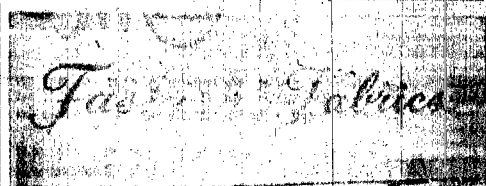

of all the odd jobs in his father's store at Hamilton, Mo.

In 1905, at the age of 24, Jim McDonald went to Kemmerer, Wyo., to help a life-long friend James C. Penney, open his first store. Mr. McDonald did not remain with the Penney Company at this time, but moved on into the traveling and wholesale field. He rejoined the Penney Company in 1911 at Mr. Penney's request, managing several different stores, then was transferred into the newly established New York office where in 1921 he became Vice President in charge of merchandising. He retired from the Penney Company in 1929 and opened an office in New York, acting as a consultant to manufacturers, retailers, and wholesalers.

In 1934 Mr. McDonald purchased the interest of Mr. Harry Ekberg in what was then the Brown-Ekberg Co. This company consisted of 18 retail stores in Nebraska. The name of the company was changed to The Brown-McDonald Company. He served as Vice President until 1947.

Mr. D. G. McDonald, brother of J. M. McDonald, sr., headed the

Brown-McDonald Co. from 1937 until his death in 1947 at which time J. M. McDonald, sr., succeeded his brother as president of the company. In 1948, Mr. McDonald requested the position of Chairman of the Board of Directors in order that he might devote more time to his other interests. During this year, Mr. J. M. McDonald, jr., was elected President of the firm and the name was changed to the J. M. McDonald Co.

Besides the merchandising field, one of Mr. McDonald's main interests was his farm located near the family home in Cortland, N. Y., where he operated one of the largest and best known purebred Guernsey farms in the United States. His charitable interests were many, and the J. M. McDonald Foundation was established by him to carry on his charitable work in the years to come. This Foundation maintains an office in the new Executive Offices and Warehouse building located in Hastings, Nebr.

## McDonald Head Born in the West

Charles E. Blair, president of the J. M. McDonald Company, was born in Laramie, Wyo. His father, one of the pioneer merchants in Wyoming, opened his first department store in Laramie in 1894, calling it the "White House." Over the years this grew into one of the leading stores in the state.

Blair was brought up in this atmosphere and it was here that his basic education and background of experience in the merchandising field was first developed.

He attended the University of Wyoming and was graduated from the Illinois Institute of Technology as an Electrical engineer. After working for a period with Commonwealth Edison Company he became associated with Butler Brothers as a management trainee.

He managed stores for this company in Aberdeen, S. D.; James-

town, N. D.; Liberal, Kan.; and Scottsbluff. Later he was made district manager with headquarters in Dallas, Tex., and subsequently moved to Chicago as vice president and operating manager.

Blair joined the J. M. McDonald Company in 1949 and was elected a director in 1949 and vice president of real estate and construction. In 1951 he became secretary and treasurer; vice president and secretary in 1954; and in 1960 was elected president of the company.

Blair has been an active participant in community affairs in Hastings. He has been president of the Chamber of Commerce and president of the Hastings Corporation.

He is a director of the City National Bank and a Kiwanian. He is married, has two daughters and a son.

Later, his father had retired from the Penney Company, and set up his own office in New York and Jim had the opportunity to meet many of the country's major executives in manufacturing and merchandising fields who came to his father with their problems.

During these years he gained the "feel" of the merchandising business, and a background which is invaluable to him today in his office as board chairman of the J. M. McDonald Company.

When the family moved from New Rochelle to Cortland, N. Y., McDonald entered Manlius Military School, graduating in 1939. He studied business administration at Ryder College, Trenton, N. J.

McDonald served as an officer in the 808th Tank Destroyer Battalion, a part of the 80th Division. He served in France, Luxembourg, Germany and Austria and was awarded the Silver Star.

He moved with his family to Hastings, Nebr., in 1946 and became an assistant in the merchandising division of the company. In May, 1947, at the death of his uncle, D. G. McDonald, he assumed his duties and was elected vice president and member of the board of directors.

In May, 1948, McDonald was elected president and in 1956 at the death of his father, became chairman of the board and president. He held both offices until August, 1960, and since then has been chairman of the board.

Under his able leadership the J. M. McDonald Co., has grown from 40 stores to its present 100 stores, located in 12 states.

McDonald has always been a leader in civic, cultural and community activities in a most diversified way. He is president of the J. M. McDonald Foundation, a charitable foundation established in 1952 by his father; president and founder of Lochland Country Club; member of the board of trustees, Mary Lanning Hospital; chairman of the board of trustees of the School of the Ozarks and a member of the board of governors of the Memminger Foundation.

McDonald, his wife, Future, and their three children live in Hastings, Nebr.

Val Peterson was born at Oakland, Nebr., July 18, 1903, the son of Henry C. and Herminda Swanberg Peterson, graduated from Wayne State Teachers College in 1927 and received a master's degree from the University of Nebraska in 1931. He holds honorary

from 1930 to 1933. He was Superintendent of Schools at Elgin, Nebr., from 1933 to 1939. In 1936 he became publisher of the Elgin Review

which he sold in 1946. Peterson was appointed Secretary to Governor Dwight Griswold in 1941 and served until he entered the U. S. Army Air Corps in 1942. As a Lt. Col. in the China-Burma-India theater he won the Bronze Star. He is

Colonel in the U. S. Air Force Reserve.

Elected Governor of Nebraska in 1946, Peterson served three terms. He was Chairman of the National Governor's Conference in 1952 and President of the Council of State Governments in the same year. He was Chairman of the Missouri River States Committee, 1948-1952, and also a member of the Missouri Basin Inter-Agency Committee.

In January, 1953, Peterson became an Administrative Assistant to President Eisenhower and served until appointed Federal Civil Defense Administrator. He also served by presidential appointment as a member of the Commission on Inter-governmental Relations and presided over several White House Governors' and Mayors' conferences. He sat in the cabinet by presidential invitation and participated in National Security Council meetings.

Peterson has been cited by the American Red Cross for his work in disaster relief and has been presented the Department of the Air Force Exceptional Service Award. He represented the United States in various NATO meetings over a period of years.

He was appointed Ambassador to Denmark in June, 1957 and served until March, 1961, when he became Vice Chairman of the Board of the J. M. McDonald Co. He is also Vice President and Administrator of the J. M. McDonald Foundation, Inc. While in Denmark he was decorated with the Grand Cross of Dannebrog by King Frederick IX of Denmark.

Peterson is a Director and Vice President of the Life Investors of Nebraska and a director and Vice President of the Investors Life Insurance Co., of Nebraska. He is President of the Wayne State Foundation and Regent, University of Nebraska, Director of First National Bank, Hastings, Nebr.

He is a member of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Air Force Association and the National Aeronautic Association. He pilots single engine fixed wing aircraft and helicopters. He belongs to the Omaha Club, the Lochland Country Club, Hastings; the National Press Club, Washington, D. C.; the York Rite, Scottish Rite, Shrine and other Masonic bodies. He is a Lutheran.

Peterson married Elizabeth Howells Peak in 1929. They live in Hastings.

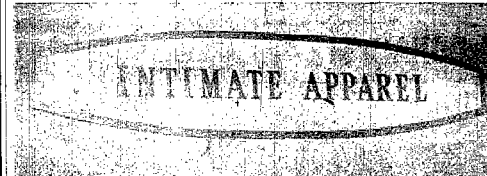

### Television System at State Hospital in Norfolk Offers Unique Service to Patients

A closed-circuit television system linking the Norfolk State hospital and the Nebraska Psychiatric Institute in Omaha is offering a unique service to patients from Wayne county and other counties served by the Norfolk hospital. It has been in use since the first of December.

"Fascinating" is the word that describes how patients come in, seat themselves at a table facing a television screen, a microphone and a TV camera. They see a specialist in Omaha who faces similar equipment.

Conversing as if they were in the same room, the doctor learns the patient's feelings on progress, plans for the future and success in overcoming problems. One doctor can handle many cases this way without leaving his office and without the long drive between Norfolk and Omaha.

The only such set-up in the state, closed-circuit television has been so well-received at NSH it is used for over 20 hours of consultation each week. Originally put in on a \$480,000 grant for seven years from Modern Communications to Assist State Hospitals, it has proved its worth over and over in cost-saving and patient-helping experiences.

Dr. Cecil Wittson is given credit for putting the idea forward and pushing for it ten years ago. Before then the Nebraska Psychiatric Institute had a circuit of its own used in Omaha area hospitals but the idea of using it over long distances was new.

Ron Titze, Wayne manager for Northwestern Bell, and this writer witnessed its use last week. They saw Barbara Brunckhorst, NSH vocational rehabilitation counselor, talk over cases previously referred to Irving Schaefer at NPI, while the two sat in offices over 110 miles apart.

Later they saw a youth at the hospital visit with Schaefer, telling of his outlook, discussing his desire to get back into the same type of work he did before he entered the hospital and getting encouragement from the Omahan who said he would check on requirements for such work in the Omaha area.

In addition to specialists using the system, the NPI serves interns from 17 states. Future vocational rehabilitation counselors from these states, converse with patients at Norfolk over the television system and work with them on rehabilitation.

The use of television has "opened new horizons" for patients and
