Kruse and Mintken, who room together off campus, probably are the team's most dedicated weight lifters, working the year around. In addition, they eat a remarkable diet — quantities of meat at nearly every meal, a dozen eggs daily, a huge assortment of fruit and vegetables.

Wayne State Wildcats Open Season at Northwest Missouri State Saturday

Wayne State's 1965 football campaign opens Saturday with the Wildcats journeying to Maryville, Mo., for a return engagement with Northwest Missouri State college. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

Coaches of both teams have been using the "crying towel" in recent days to mourn their lack of depth — Wayne Coach John Jermier because of player injuries, Northwest Coach Ivan Schottel because of shortage in

experienced talent. Jermier and his troops — minus several key players — will go on the field with a strong memory of last year's tussle here with Northwest Missouri, a miserable event which opened in pelting rain and finished in a swamp of mud, Wayne losing, 18-0.

Early in the game, the Bearcats cashed a Wayne fumble into a touchdown and from then on waged a defensive battle. Frequent punts, on third and even second downs, kept Wayne far from the goal line — smart strategy in the mud, Coach Jermier conceded.

The Missourians, though short of lettermen, boast a formidable asset in two-time all-conference quarterback Leo Pappas, a passing wizard. Whatever Coach Schottel lacks in depth, he probably will make up in determination, Wayne coaches predict. Assistant Coach Max Lundstrom, who played football at Pittsburg State college, Kan., recalls the powerhouse teams Schottel coached at St. Benedict's, a member of the Central Intercollegiate conference before dropping football.

When St. Benedict's abandoned the sport, Schottel moved to Northwest Missouri and took several of his top players with him. Wayne coaches reported improvement in Wildcat defensive play this week, but promptly added that more improvement is needed to offset losses to injuries.

Brightening the hopes is the performance of transfer Randy Bernard of West Point, linebacker. Jermier describes him as a "football player," using a tone of voice on that phrase which he reserves for a select few players. "He smells the plays coming, and he's right where the tackle needs to be made," Jermier says.

Another bright spot is the showing of Phil Sock as a defensive halfback. Last year an occasional "offensive halfback, Sock is pushing hard for a starting assignment on defense.

Jermier told Kiwanis club Monday the Wildcat offense will be more diversified this year, of necessity, because the opponents will key on the potent Wayne rushing attack. That means more passing is likely.

Luckily, Wayne has two capable passers using two different styles. Senior quarterback Dean DeBurr depends on the dropback pass suited to his 6-3 height. Sophomore Steve Feinstein, only 5-9, has difficulty seeing over the line to pass, but is a terror with his scrambling maneuvers on agile feet. And if he can't get a pass off, he runs — after giving coaches and spectators heart failure, says Jermier.

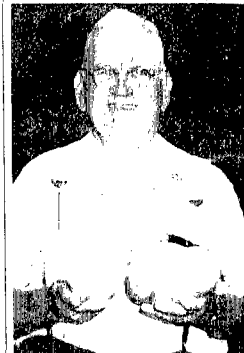

City Institutes Proceedings to Obtain Land for Extension of Airport Runway

Meeting Tuesday night, the Wayne city council instructed the city attorney to institute condemnation proceedings on a tract of land in the northeast quarter of section 8 immediately north of the municipal airport for use in relocating a road.

The road prevents extension of the runway of the airport and the council has already received permission of the county commissioners to relocate it. When this land is available, the runway will be extended and paved.

Drivers around Wayne will find some new sign changes around town soon. Resolutions change the stop signs at the T-shape intersection of Pearl and Thirteenth. The two on Thirteenth will be removed and one will be put on Pearl so northbound traffic will stop instead of east-west traffic.

Other stop sign changes approved include some at the east and west approaches to Nebraska street at its intersection with Ninth and a stop sign on Tenth at the east approach to Sherman. No parking signs will go up on the west side of Sherman from Ninth to Eleventh.

The office of sanitation commissioner was created with jurisdiction over landfill, sewage disposal lagoon and other sanitary sewage facilities. Henry Victor is handling those duties, and will probably be the first commissioner when one is named. Another ordinance changes the ruling on hours of landfill use, leaving the decisions on this up to the sanitation commissioner.

Wright Tree service, Des Moines, had the low bid on a Fitchburg brush chipper. The council approved purchasing the device to "chew up" limbs, branches and trees for \$3650.

Farmers Union is open to all farmers of Wayne county. Anyone interested is welcome to attend the meeting next Wednesday night.

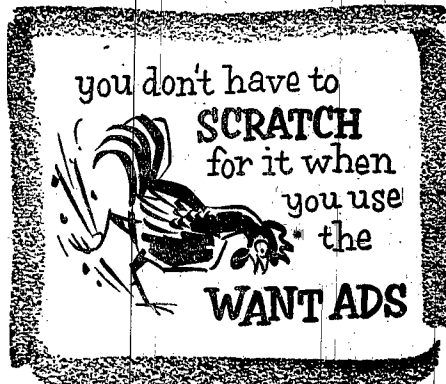

Roy Corvett showed pictures he took while traveling on lakes on the Canadian border. It was a real travel experience for the Ikes without leaving town.

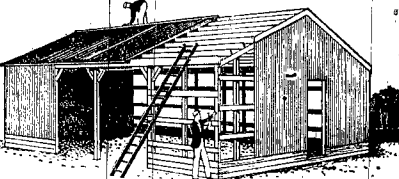
Heads Allen Fund Drive

East German Cars Ordered Eight Years Ahead, Not Too Big, Cost About \$8,000

Thinking of getting a new car? You could probably go to any dealer today and drive one away with a minimum of difficulty. In East Germany it is not so simple, according to Mrs. Maria Lippman, Wayne county farm woman who spent almost two months there.

In the first place, it takes eight years of waiting to get a car of average size—the big ones are the government's. Cars cost 18,000 to 24,000 marks which would be \$4,500 to \$8,000.

Other items are correspondingly high. A package of cigarettes costs 2 1/2 marks which sounds reasonable enough unless you consider that the average wage is 2 1/2 marks an hour. In American money, 2 1/2 marks would equal \$2.50, pretty good wages but pretty high priced cigarettes.

A pound of butter costs about \$1.25 and you have to get stamps

to get it. Every week each person has butter stamps and as a visitor Mrs. Lippman was without any.

There are no bananas, oranges, or other fruit on sale in stores. Relatives told of waiting in line four or five hours at Christmas time to buy one orange for 75 cents.

A refrigerator can be obtained in much less time than it takes to get a car—just a five-year wait for a small one about stove high that costs \$420. Shirts cost about \$19, nylon hose \$4 and television sets \$600. Stores have little to sell and are "dead" in that there is no hum of activity.

Mrs. Lippman told of needing trousers for her son. She went to three stores before she finally found any trousers at all, yet all stores were the type that should handle the merchandise. She

found just one pair of trousers and had to take them, whether they fit or not.

East German people are friendly, according to the local farm woman. However, they are cautious about speaking to anyone new. She was staid at wherever she went as her clothes indicated she could not possibly come from East Germany. Besides, her children were too well-dressed also.

When people get television, their antennas must be pointed east or be taken down. "You have horns on your head. You'd better get them off" come the warnings on the radio, meaning people with antennas pointing the wrong way had better change them fast.

Getting out of East Germany if you're young is all but impossible. But everyone thinks about it. Even children remarked: "Oh, I wish you could put me in your suitcase and take me with you when you leave."

Five miles of wire and barricades shut off East from West. Mrs. Lippman was told not to take pictures of the barricades as she would get the relatives in trouble if she did. She cautiously did anyway and about passed out when leaving East Germany as guards started checking.

She made her son Ron pretend to be sleeping as the guards came through and asked how much money she had. Her purse was on the seat and Ron was asleep on it (and the films and her money).

Mrs. Lippman did show traveler's checks but the guards spoke no English so couldn't understand her and she pretended to speak no German. (She speaks German like a native—which she is). Finally she said she'd write out what traveler's checks meant but she couldn't write German (she pretended) and he couldn't read English. Exasperated, the guard finally gave up and went on.

Without exception Mrs. Lippman's relatives expressed a desire to leave even though there was a chance of being overheard saying such things. She said in many conversations names were never mentioned because the people did not want others to know who were their friends or relatives if they could help it, just in case reprisals of any form were meted out for something they did, their friends did or their relatives did. Police showing up and taking someone away without explanation is still common, she said.

Children in East Germany are healthy, looking in spite of the lack of fruit. In fact, Mrs. Lippman remarked at how rosy-cheeked the children in both East and West Germany are, making

her children look "about as colorful as cheese."

The children get physical exercises every day in school no matter what grade they are in. Men and women also get exercises. Children are in bed by eight o'clock in both sections of Germany, a situation which she thought was good, for American children seem nervous and jumpy from lack of sleep but in both parts of Germany the children are healthier looking.

Young people learn Russian as their first language but the older people see that they learn German too. Few are confirmed in church as those who are confirmed have trouble getting jobs and holding them. As a result only the older people go to church.

College is offered free to those who want to be doctors, lawyers, teachers, engineers and other specialists. Why? Because so many fled East Germany there is a shortage. One elderly doctor got a young doctor to help him this year—one of the first young doctors around since the war and the mass exodus.

Mrs. Lippman told much more about life in East Germany. Another installment will appear in next week's Herald.

Concord Club Seeking Better Road and Dump

Concord village board members want a better road south from the University of Nebraska Northeast station. If they can get Dixon county commissioners to straighten the road, they feel they will have a logical site for a city dump.

The road east of Concord is paved to the station but south from the station it is crooked and gravel. The fact that there have been no bad accidents on the road is no sign there will be any, Concord men believe.

What they propose is that the county straighten the road and eliminate a big "U-turn" around a gulley. Then the city would take over the land in the "U" and use it for a controlled dump site.

This is not the first time the town has asked for the work, an appeal having been made to Dixon county commissioners a year ago. Now the town will send another appeal in person to the meeting of the commissioners.

Mayor Bob Sherry said there is no controlled dump at present. He did not know where residents were dumping their waste, but he thought the straightening of the road and the controlled dump at one site would be of benefit to town and county alike.

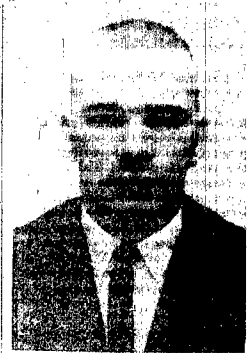

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BARRELS OF HONEY in a Dixon warehouse are the product of 65 million bees Don Roeder is working for him. He ships honey by the truckload to markets all over the Midwest.

Dixon Man Has Over 85 Million Workers; Warehouse Regular Beehive of Activity

A regular beehive of activity is located in Dixon. With over 85 million workers, Don Roeder (RAY dr) is happy there is no brand law and no social security reports to fill out.

Roeder is known as "the bee man" or "the honey man" in the Dixon area. He has over 1500 hives in Dixon county and ships out honey by the truckload.

The 32-year-old bought the business in Dixon last year from Dave Kuhl. Like Kuhl, he had originally lived in the Randolph area and Randolph calls itself "The Honey Capital of the Nation."

One could hardly expect Roeder to have gone into the business of tending bees years ago because he was allergic to bee stings. In fact, his arms and hands were often swollen to twice their normal size after being stung twice by bees.

Undaunted, he kept on, gradually building up an immunity. However, he says bee stings still hurt but if you are gentle you don't get stung often.

Another thing, he says people don't know how to take care of a bee sting. The stinger should be scratched out and then the scratching should stop, he said. Even though the area itches, scratching will only make it worse. Most

bee stings are not serious anyway, he said.

After growing up at Randolph, he served in the navy, spent two years in California and then went to Aurora, S.D., where he raised bees in the Brookings area. He had the chance to buy the bee business at Dixon so moved there from South Dakota.

He ships wholesale honey to Kansas City, Sioux City, Chicago, Michigan, Kansas and other places in 55-gallon barrels. To get an idea of what a barrel weighs, he points out that there are 12 pounds of honey in each gallon.

Buying honey by the pound may not be strange but he also buys bees by the pound. He figures there are 5,000 bees to a pound and each of his 1500 hives has about 10 pounds of bees.

With the end of a summer near, he is making plans to cover the hives that are in the open. Hives in sheltered spots will need no covers. Next spring he will remove the covers so the bees can go to work again.

Bees do not seem to mind him taking the honeycombs out because he leaves enough honey to last them through the winter and what he takes is excess. However, he

checks the hives in the winter and sometimes has to put some honey back just to make sure the bees are not going hungry — no one wants 50,000 bees angry because someone took their honey!

In a former garage building on Dixon's Main street he has extracting equipment to take the honey syrup out. Honey is kept in big tanks to settle and then runs out of spigots into barrels when ready. He has several hundred barrels of honey on hand most of the time.

The original frames that go into hives are man-made but once the bees make the wax it is left and the honey taken out each year. This saves the bees the trouble of getting wax combs installed before they fill them with honey and enables them to start on honey production at once.

Roeder pays people to let him put hives on their farms although it is a known fact, bees benefit crops. In some areas the farmers pay the bee men to put their hives on the farms. Bees help pollinate any crop and are especially valuable in clover, corn and alfalfa.

Mrs. Roeder helps work with the bees and both have protective clothing they wear. She is a former California girl and works as hard as a man in the business.

Oh yes, one more thing. When Roeder served in the navy there was only one logical place to put him. He was put in the Sea Bees! No one knows whether they put him there because he had been in the bee business or whether it was just coincidental.

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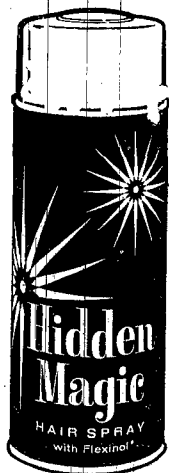
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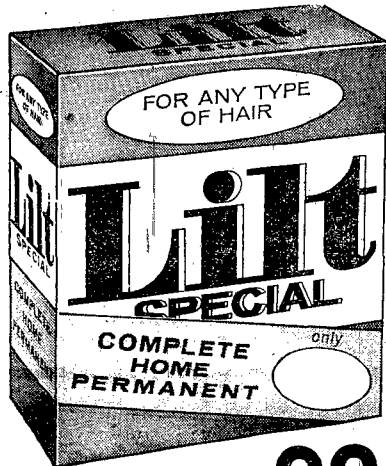
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
