

The White House entourage was insistent that the ZIP code be used throughout the executive branch of government. Then — to the dismay of departing Postmaster General Gronouski — it was announced to the world that there is only one White House, and that the ZIP code number would not be made a part of the President's return address.

Disenchantment is reflected even among Post Office Department employees. Writing in the September 1985 issue of the magazine published by the United Federation of Postal Clerks, AFI_CIO, the union's director of organization. Joseph F. Thomas, had this to say: "The truth of the majter is that ZIP at the present time; is extremely high in cost while the results obtained from it from a service standpoint are negligible."

Mr. Thomas termed resulting morale problems "the worst feature" from the union's standpoint, and he noted the extensive promotion campaign "at great expense to the American taxpayer undertaken by the Department. He called ZIP code "a

"Double-faced" Fabrics
One of the recent developments in fabrics is the "double-faced" fabric. Double-facing occurs when a fabric such as woo! flamel, knit, Jersey, denim or poplin is bonded to a tricot llining.
When the lining is made of acetate or similar fiber, a polyurethane adhesive is used to hold the two layers of fabric together. Some companies call this locklined fabric or bonded fabric.

Some companies call this lock-lined fabric or bonded fabric. Double-faced fabrics have an advantage for the home sewer, because no separate lining is necessary in skirts and jackets. The doublefaced fabrics provide the extra "body" and stability needed in the garment. Since these bonded fabrics don't fray, seams will look neat and facings can be catch stitched to the tricol lining. If a garment such as a Chanel jacket is to be finished and trimmed with braid, a jacket facing won't be necessary. Selam allowances should be cut dway around the edges where braid is to be stitched. These bonded fabrics are firmer than single layer fabrics. Bonding has almost eliminated the problem of stretching and the need for separate interfacings. Bulkiness in seams can be lessened by separating the lining from the outer fabric and trimming it away after seams are pressed open. Darts can be slashed, pressed open and treated in like manner to reduce bulk.

Another outstanding characteristic of double-faced fabrics is their resistance to wrinkling.

For upright silos, direct cut forage is an acceptable material for weighting the plastic.

A layer of 1 to 2 inches of finely ground limestone is a good weighting material for trench, bunker or stack silos, but will be hard to keep in place unless the lop is fairly flat.

The limestone can be fed along with the silage, since corn and sorghum silage tend to be short in calcium.
