The over-the-year gain led division analysts to hope that the stepped-up pace of job may generate enough new employment in the near future to keep up with the constantly expanding labor force.

Since August, 1953, the state's labor force has grown from 634, 200 to 1633, 200 — a reflection of the fast that more new workers are lepking for jobs each year.

But the number of available jobs has not begun to keep pace with the labor supply, the division said.

During the same period the non agricultural jobs rose from 354,600 to last month's record 412,400, or an average yearly gain of 5,254.

Have Any Peach Pits?

Have Any Peach Pits?

No one around this area is searching for peach pits as far as this newspaper knows. Peach pits are apparently useless anyway.

But they're not worthless in Santa Clara, Calif. A man in that community devised a way to make charcoal briquets from them and is now employing 40 men the year-around to make use of the tons of peach pits available.

What has this to do with Wayne county? Very little except that if there is industry to be started in peach pits, there must be other industries waiting to be started from other waste materials.

Blessed with the most fertile soil in Nebraska, Wayne county has no waste land but it has crops which are not entirely used, some part being thrown away daily. Somewhere there is possibly a need for what is considered waste here.

"Business in Nebraska," a publication of Nebraska resources division, says Nebraska communities can do as well as Texas communities have done in establishing home-grown industries. The Herald says Wayne county can do.

It doesn't have to be big. Columbus is growing because it promoted home industry and then attracted national manufacturers. America can discoverwayne county just as America discoverwed Columbus.

Winside has a dehy plant, locally owned and using local products. Oshkosh set up its own electronics industry with a payroll of 15. Five years later it employs almost 200 in Oshkosh and has a branch in Gering.

These communities too thought indus-

These communities too thought industry was something that only went to other towns. But to cities everywhere, Winside, Gering, Columbus and Oshkosh are "other towns."

Maybe we don't have peach pits in Wayne county but we should have some commodity that would be the key opening the door to industrial development.

Turkeys Tempting Year-'round With the holiday season fas With the holiday season fast approaching, we are remifided again of some of the plentiful foods. However, not only for the holiday season, but year around, the homemaker can serve her family tempting dishes containing turkey.

Thanks to new advances in production and processing, easy-to-prepare, economical turkey is now abundant throughout the year. Marsh termed this a "remarkable feat" and said it indicated the campaign was "well handled with a minimum of failure. Bin Drying May Be Needed

You may do well to consider drying your grain crop this year. The wet fall has held the grain at a high moisture level and much of it still is immature.

much of it still is immature, especially grain sorghum.

Field I os s es could be unusually high unless steps are taken to handle the crcps properly. There are a number of well-engineered drying bin units available and farmers may buy them with assurance that they will do the job they are assigned to do. They should be selected with care, however.

be selected with care, however.
There are two basic methods
of drying sorghum and shelled
corn in a bin. The batch-drying
method consists of heating the
air to 100 degrees to dry grain
fast but in small batches. Grain
is then moved to final storage.
Batch-dryers can handle up to
3,000 bushelse pere day, but
some management and experience is needed to know the correct amount of heat, proper
drying time and the cooling
procedure.

drying time and the cooling procedure.

In-storage or "controlled humidity" drying is done in the bin where grain is to be stored. Grain is dried as the bin is filled. Drying proceeds at the rate of about a foot of grain depth per day. Air is heated no more than 20 degrees and the maximum depth of undried grain is about five feet.

For example, a bin filled to

grain is about five feet.
For example, a bin filled to
a depth of 15 feet over a 10day period should contain ten
feet of dry grain and only five
feet of wet grain on the day
filling is completed. You will
need to keep damaged or broken kernels to a minimum.
Trash and broken kernels shut
off air flow and speed spoilage.

Grain should be probed with a stick or rod each day to determine the drying process. When a rod pushes easily it means it has struck dry grain. Grain distributors save work in leveling the crop in the bin and spread trash and broken kernels evenly throughout the bin.
