

School Bond M Treasury Bills Interest

Bond money for the new Wayne high school is not laying around. It has been invested in treasury bills and draws interest at two rates, 3.90 per cent and 3.92 per cent.

A total of \$840,000 has been invested and \$22,375 is needed for bills due, such as architect's fees and other initial costs. There is also some cash in the bank.

First National bank, Wayne, through which the bond money was invested and where the building fund will be kept, has pledged \$50,000 in securities on the bank account for the fund.

John G. Neihardt Will Speak Here Tuesday Evening

John G. Neihardt, poet laureate of Nebraska and one of America's foremost literary figures, will come back next week to one of his homes—Wayne State College.

He is scheduled to speak at 8 p.m. Tuesday in the Ramsey Theater of the Peterson Fine Arts center, following a busy day of varied activities on campus. This lecture is part of WSC's special program series and will be open to the public, but with limited tickets available at the door.

Wayne was one of Dr. Neihardt's early homes. He attended the Nebraska Normal college here, graduating with the teachers' diploma in 1897—at the age of 15. Among his teachers at the Normal college was a young lady who had been on the school's first faculty in 1891 and who still lives in Wayne today—Mrs. Anna Bright. Dr. Neihardt plans to visit her next Wednesday at the Dahl Retirement center.

Bikes Not Toys!

Wayne's ordinance prohibiting the use of skateboards, scooters, tricycles or other such apparatus on the streets of the residential areas and the streets and sidewalks of the business district does not apply to bicycles. As worded, the ordinance calls for prohibiting such wheel toys. Bicycles come under the motor vehicle laws and are not considered toys. Purpose of the ordinance is to keep the youngsters off the "toys with wheels" in the business district and from using them on residential streets. Council members were besieged by telephone calls and personal queries following publication of the item about the ordinance last week.

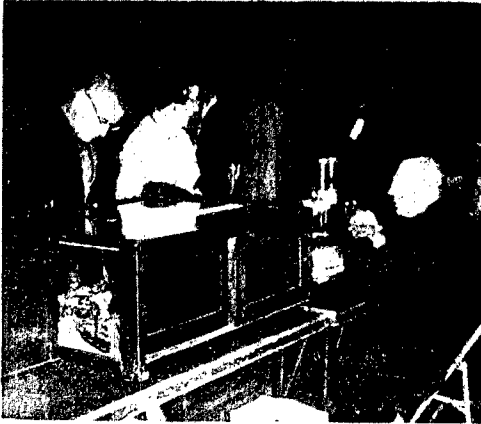

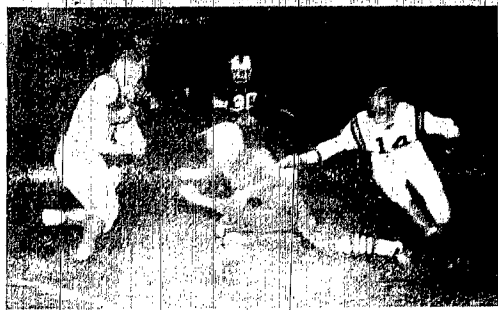

Stanton Edges Wayne 13-7; Plainview Here This Friday

A slow starting offense and an erratic pass defense gave Stanton the opening it needed to defeat Wayne 13-7 on the Mustangs' field Friday night. Stanton took full advantage of Wayne's inability to defend the airways, scoring both of their touchdowns on passes of 6 and 21 yards.

The Devil offense finally started rolling in the fourth quarter, scoring one touchdown and passing toward a second before time ran out, leaving the Blue and Whites on Stanton's 40. Perhaps the big break in the game for Stanton came in the first quarter when the Devils moved the ball to Stanton's 5-yard line, only to lose possession on a fumble.

Wayne started by kicking off to the 25 of Stanton, where the return was stopped after a gain of 5 yards. Forward punt after making one first down, the Mustangs stopped Bob Morris on Wayne's 35 after a return of 6 yards. On the next play Frank again hit Barr with a pass, but this time Barr was in the end zone and Stanton led 6-0 with less than a minute remaining in the first half. The extra point was good and the Devils trailed 7-0 at the end of the first half.

The third quarter was the best played, hardest fought period in the game. Wayne's defense held Stanton to less than 6 yards each time they controlled the ball, and the Devil offense had a 44-yard sustained drive that included five first downs. The quarter, however, failed to produce a score for Wayne and the Devils still trailed Stanton 7-0 at the start of the fourth quarter.

Stanton scored their second touchdown in the fourth quarter after a drive that originated on their own 42 and ended with a 24-yard pass from Frank to Remm. The PAT attempt failed and Stanton enjoyed a 13-0 edge over

Wayne with little more than four minutes remaining in the game.

Wayne's touchdown was the result of a 65-yard drive that was concluded by a 2-yard plunge by Keith Lehmann. The extra point was good, but the Devils still trailed 13-7 with time running out.

An on-side kick attempt failed, but Wayne gained possession of the ball after Stanton was forced to punt on a fourth and 12 situation. With 47 seconds left in the game, Wayne again assumed control of the football on their own 38. A series of four passes managed to move the ball to Stanton's 40, but the Devils' victory drive stopped there as the game ended.

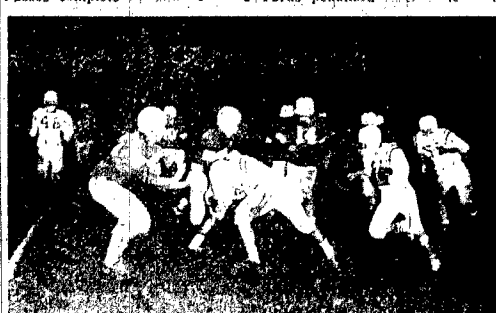

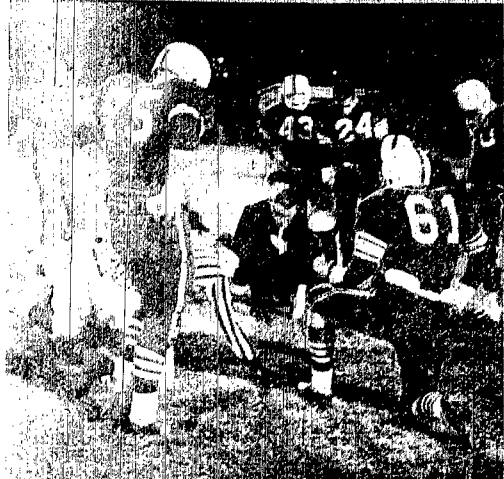

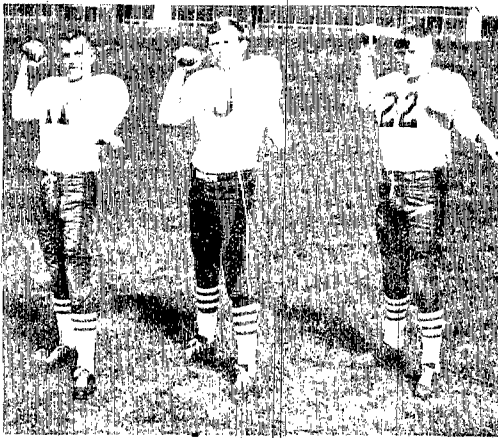
Freshmen-Sophomores Defeat Madison 14-0

Carroll's History Subject of Article

A 16-page article, "A History of the Welsh Community of Carroll, Nebraska," appears in the September issue of "Nebraska History," official publication of the state historical society.

Author is Richard Guenther, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Victor, Wayne. He received his M.A. degree at WSC in 1962 and has been awarded a graduate assistantship at the State University of Iowa where he is studying for a Ph.D. degree in American history.

Guenther tells about the migration of the Welsh people to Wayne county where terrain and climate were unlike their native Wales. Many first located in other parts of the country and then came to Nebraska.

Settlers acquired title to their land through homestead, pre-emption or timber claim acts with \$1.25 an acre being a common price. John R. Morris was said to be the first Welshman to come to this area, settling three miles west of Carroll and almost in the center of what was to become a

Welsh community.

He brought machinery with him leaving it on a siding at Northside. When he came to get it, pieces were gone, borrowed by other settlers who figured he would not need it for a while anyway. When spring came, they returned what they had borrowed, only to his homesite, not to Northside.

The article deals with the coming of the railroad, the naming of the town, moving of Welsh to the area to be among their own kind in a sign-like settlement, frowning upon marriage with "outsiders" and the starting of Welsh churches.

It also tells of Christmas observances, strict observance of the sabbath, the roles of schools and literary societies, sleighing, well digging, views on drinking, vigilante committees and the reporting of news in the Carroll Index under the heading "Welsh Community News."

Several copies of the magazine are in the hands of local people, members of the historical society. A copy is also available at The Herald office for anyone wishing to read the article.

ing his tuition in college. The bell now resting on a stone pedestal, is known as the Victory bell.

Though none of the buildings remain from the Neihardt era one current dormitory bears his name. And there he will stay during his Wayne visit, in Neihardt guest room occupied by numerous visiting dignitaries over the years.

Neihardt's visit to Wayne during homecoming week is part of an extended Nebraska tour he is taking to commemorate a similar tour in 1921 when the state designated his poet laureate.

By then he was a veteran at writing verse, having begun about the time he came to Wayne from his native Sharpsburg, Ill. He continued to write poetry while editing a newspaper in Bancroft—in fact, he began there the writing of his greatest work, "A Cycle of the West." All but two of his lyric poems and all his short stories were written during his Bancroft residency.

Dr. Neihardt, taught in 1923 at the University of Nebraska, which later bestowed on him an honorary degree. The University Press has taken over publishing of "A Cycle of the West," collecting its five epics into one volume, and has this fall brought out his lyrics and dramatic poems.

A "Cycle of the West" was selected as one of "The World's Best Books from Homer to Hemingway," covering the period from 1050 B.C. to 1950 A.D.

Dr. Neihardt, whose published works number some 25 volumes, in 1936 received the gold scroll medal of honor as foremost poet of the nation, for the "Song of the Messiah," one of the epics in "A Cycle of the West."

Now on the faculty of the University of Missouri as lecturer in English and poet in residence, Dr. Neihardt has lectured throughout the country for many years. His readings from his works have been presented on television and records—evoking lavish praise not only for the poetry itself but for the

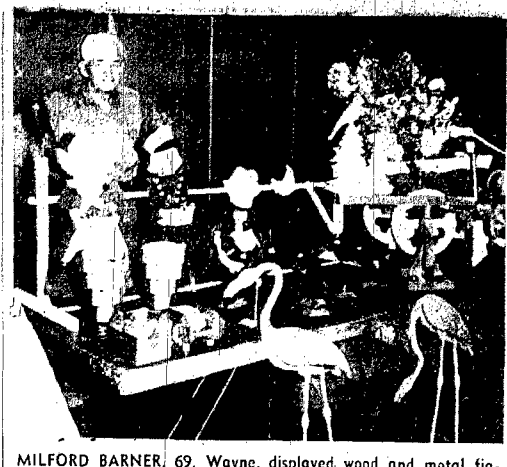

Winside high school pupils are taking part in the new teen section of the Omaha World-Herald. Jackie Jeffrey and Roger Hill are two of the first to be honored.

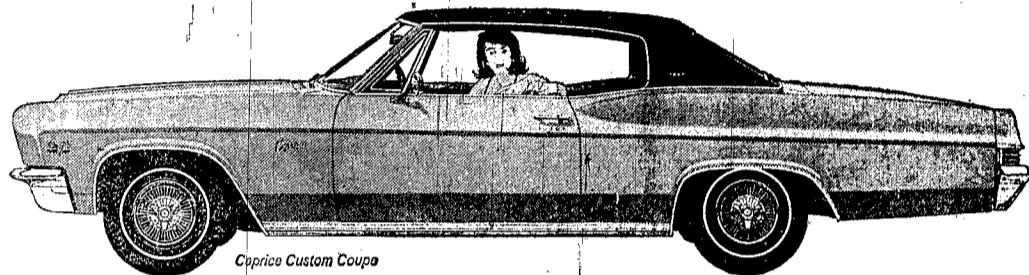

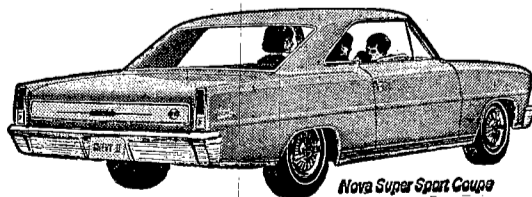

Winside Dehy Example of Homegrown Industry That Can Benefit Smaller Towns

Winside Dehy company, first proposed in 1963 is a good example of what smaller towns can do by developing industry with products available close by. Well into its second season, it provides year-around employment for several.

At present the plant employs 15, including the manager, Bill Fenske. Willis Ritze is plant foreman, he and Fenske being year-around employees. Alice Herscheid is bookkeeper part-time throughout the year.

The plant employs operators, truck drivers and cutter operators. It might have a few more employees but the latest electrical "automated" equipment is in use so fewer employees are needed.

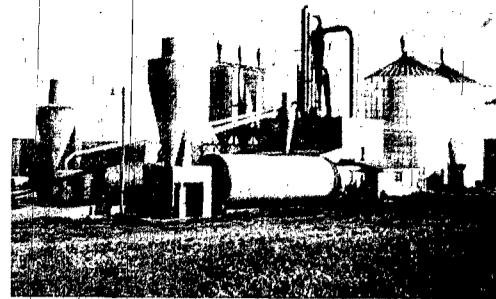
A quarter of a million dollar asset to the community, it is the largest true industry in the county, stockholders claim. It has a \$43,500 annual payroll, pays rent on hayland and purchases around \$150,000 worth of alfalfa from farmers.

Serving a territory extending

eight miles northeast of Carroll, four miles east of Wayne and southwest to Hoskins, the plant buys on two terms: \$8 a ton after dried out and pelleted or \$18 an acre regardless of whether it is the best crop ever with four cuttings or is completely hailed out or dried in drouth.

The pellets coming out of the two huge dehydrating drums are put in two silo-type storage bins holding 750 tons of alfalfa each. Pellets are fed in supplement or sent to feed mills to be mixed with feed. Some local feeders also buy the product.

Much of the crop has gone to Northeast Iowa and Southwest Minnesota this year where the crop was short. The Winside dehy product uses about the best alfalfa available, the local crop being a better quality and containing more protein and vitamins that that grown in Dawson county, home of the world's biggest concentration

of dehydrating plants.

There are 46 stockholders in the corporation which started building in 1963 and opened for operation in 1964. Farmers and

businessmen in the Winside area are the principal stockholders with Don Wacker president.

This has been a good year for

the work except for the month of September when wet fields prevented the plant from operating. In fact, the dehydrating was limited to ten days because of weather. Now the plant is going full blast again and even when the alfalfa being cut now is gone there will be 1500 tons of alfalfa in bales ready to be dehydrated at

the home-grown Winside dehy plant.

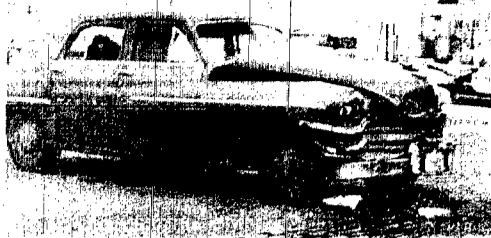
