At issue in the Wyoming case was a state reapportionment law that set up senatorial districts on a county boundary basis. Backers of the act said the state constitution prohibited subdistricting within a county. But the Federal Court panel disagreed. It brushed aside the state constitution and split populaus Lincoln County into three districts.

The judges said there was no other way to apportion population in the counties and still comply

the judges sand there was no either way to apportion population in the counties and still comply with the U. S. Supreme court's one-man, one-vote decree.

The Wyoming case is very similar to the Nebraska reapportionment problem because both involve an apparent conflict of state and Federal constitutions. The 1965 Nebraska Legislature passed a new remap act that establishes 49 districts. The new law crosses, seven county lines.

Opponents of the measure ar-

establishes 49 districts. The new law crosses, seven county lines. Opponents of the measure argue that the state constitution specifically prohibits the cutting of counties in apportioning seaks in the nation's only one house body.

The volume of traffic on Ne braska's highway system increas-ed one per cent in the first nine months of 1965, according to the State Roads Department.



The necessity for President Johnson to undergo surgery, and the resulting convalescence, have brought to the public's attention once again the need for a constitutional amendment dealing with the inability of a President to meet the responsibilities of his office.

with the inability of a President to meet the responsibilities, of his office.

Such an amendment was approved by Congress last July and presently is before the states for ratification. Nebraska is among eight states which have ratified the proposed amendment. The others are Arizona, Oklahoma. Massachusetts, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Kentucky, and Michigan. Ratification by 38 states is required.

The proposed amendment sets out a procedure for succession by the Vice President to presidential responsibilities in the event a President should become incapacitated, and also for resumption of his duties by a President following such a period. There is also provision for selection of a Vice President, should that office become vacant.

Despite increasing expenditures by the federal government, both at home and abroad, the Administration's economists are hard at work laying the groundwork for another round of income tax reductions.

All of this is in the wake of increasing federal revenues which are expected to range upward about \$7 million a year or more, if present tax rates remain unchanged. As seen by the Administration's economic planners, the government will have to increase spending or cut taxes by about \$40 billion to \$45 billion in the next five years, or, they say, the nation's economy will not realize its growth potential. As noted in this column several weeks ago, these planners apparently give no thought to applying some of the additional revenue to paying off the national debt. And recent utterances credited to the President's Council of Economic Advisers give no hint that they intend to consider this possibility.

With the American taxpayers shelling out more than \$11 million during the 1985 fiscal year just for interest on the public debt, it appears that reduction of the debt should be high on the priority list of places to put the additional revenue they expect.

If your harvesting equipment is tuned to the ultimate and you still think you are leaving too much grain in the field, there are ways of determining just how much loss you are suffering.

Some loss can't be ave especially in corn that been damaged by stalk rot



especially in corn that has been damaged by stalk rot.

Harvesting losses can be figured by the following methods: Corn losses are determined by calculating both the shelled and corn per second by the following methods: Shelled corn losses are determined by figuring the number of kernels per square foot. One and one half to two kernels per square foot is equivalent to a loss of one bushel of shelled corn per acre. An average should be used by checking several different places.

Ear corn losses with 40 inchrows can be estimated by picking up the dropped ears between 2 rows in a distance of 185 feet. The ears are then weighed. The total weight is equal to the ear corn loss in bushels per acre. This method should also be duplicated to obtain an average.

The kernels per square foot that equal a bushel per acre loss for other fall crops are: grain sorghum, 28 to 30; soybeans, 4

Caution on Electric Fence
Are you planning to use an electric fence this year to pasture those stalks?

If so, the type of electric fencer you have, plus the way it is set up, may be very important.

There have been a number of fires started as a result of faulty electric fences.

In most cases, the fence had been placed close to a farm building or to some other combustible source. If the fencer is of improper construction, or if it is improperly placed, it can cause a fire.

Not only can a fencer be the cause of fire, it can also be the chuse of electrocution of both fumans and animals.

Perhaps the best rules to follow in regard to electric fencers afety are:

planning or remodeling a home. But experienced homemakers are beginning to realize the sad consequences of locating washer and dryer in an inconvenient area. To organize a first rate laundry center, here are some points to remember.

A laundry that has only a washer and a dryer is not completely equipped. There should be hampers to hold soiled clothing, a sink for pre-treating stains, storage space for laundry aids and a work surface for folding finished diothes.

A laundry should also be acplanning or remodeling a home.

storage space for laundry aids and a work surface (for folding finished clothes.

A laurdry should also be accessible to the area where most of the daily work is concentrated. This encourages a wash-as-youngo schedule that helps avoid the frustrating accumulation of amountain of laundry to be done all at once. One good location for where the heaviest concentration of soiled clothing collects. A nearby bathroom is an ideal spot for washer and dryer. A complete "vest pocket" laundry can be constructed in one end of a bathroom, yet occupy as little as 2½ by 6 feet of floor space. Folding louvered doors can be used to hide the endire laundry facility when not in use, as well as to add a decorative touch to the bathroom itself.

Spacious overhead shelved are possible, and can be the open type since the louvered doors are designed to screen off the entire laundry wall. There is room next to the washer for a built-in clothes hamper for soiled clothes, and the bathroom lavatory can serve for pre-treating stains and heavy soiling.

There are other good locations for laundries, of course, but planning for any of them should take into consideration the fact hat laundry work involves logical steps. A well-organized system includes collecting soiled clothes; reating spots and stains, washing, drying and finally irroning or other necessary finishing.

1. Near the kitchen, but not in it. When laundry appliances are incorporated into a general kitchen setup, food preparation and clothes handling competer for

space.

2. In a recreation room, particularly 'when appliances are color coordinated with the rest of the room, a laundry wall can actually enhance the decor of a recreation room.

3. A household utility room such as a ground floor gardening or "mud" room where sink facilities can double for both laundering and gardening purpos.

Above all, remember that fore-sight is better than hindsight. It really pays to put a little thought, into convenient laundry layout when planning a remodel-ing project for the home.



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
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
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
