Central Catholic in Romp; One Game Left for Devils

West Point Central Catholic lived up to its much-publicized reputation by blanking Wayne High 47-0 at the Blue Devils' homecoming Friday night. A small crowd was on hand at the homecoming event to watch Reggie Smith lead Central Catholic to victory by scoring in every quarter for a total of 21 points.

Wayne started the game with two progressive drives, but both were ended by fumbles. The rest of the coin, preceding the coronation of the king and queen, found Wayne winning and electing to receive.

Steve Kurl received the opening kickoff on Wayne's 10 and returned it 23 yards to the 33. On the first play from scrimmage, quarterback Lynn Lessmann hit Kendall Longe with a pass that moved the ball to the 40. On the next play, Keith Lehmann picked up a first down by powering his way to the 44.

Following an offside penalty that forced them into a first and 15 situation on their own 39, Wayne committed one of its costly fumbles. The football was jarred loose from Lehmann as he crossed the 40, and WPCP recovered on the 42. Just 28 yards and two first downs later, homecoming king Mark Robinson stopped the visitors' drive by recovering a fumble on his own 14.

Following one play that gained only one yard, Lehmann again fumbled, and Central recovered, this time on Wayne's 20. The Blue Jays had no trouble in

making the 20 yards for the touchdown as Smith climaxed the drive with a dash of 7 yards. The extra point was good and WPCP led 7-0 with 6:07 remaining in the first quarter.

Lehmann returned the visitors' kickoff to the 25 where he was stopped by a host of tacklers. Following a 4-yard run by Bob Reeg, a deflected pass from alternate quarterback Steve Johnson was returned 29 yards by West Point's Dave Heywood for a touchdown. Smith ran around left end for the PAT, and WPCP was ahead 14-0 with 4:45 left in the first quarter. The first quarter ended with the Blue and White in possession on Wayne's 6.

On the second play of the second quarter, Bob Stieren made the score 20-0 with a run of 2 yards. The extra point was good, and the score found Wayne trailing 21-0. Following the kickoff, Wayne was forced to punt after picking up 4 yards on three downs. Lessmann punted from his own 27 to the 41 of Central Catholic where the football rolled out of bounds.

WPCP picked up their fourth TD of the night following three first downs and 35 yards. Rich McGill tallied for the six points on a run of 14 yards. Again Smith scored the extra point, and the visitors enjoyed a 28-0 lead with 8:58 remaining in the half. Neither team was able to move the ball the remainder of the

first half, and the Jays held a comfortable halftime lead of 28-0. Smith scored his second TD of the evening on a 10-yard sprint around right end following a sustained 65-yard drive. The PAT failed as an intended pass was incomplete, but Wayne trailed 34-0 with 4:12 left in the third quarter.

Wayne again was unable to move the ball following the kickoff, and was forced to punt from the 20 on a fourth and 22 situation.

Smith's most spectacular performance occurred when he returned the punt 60 yards for his third touchdown of the night. The extra point was good, and CC was assured of a victory as they led Wayne 41-0 with just 2:43 remaining in the third quarter. The winners' final TD came in the fourth quarter on a pass to Roger Wortman.

The extra point attempt was blocked by Lehmann, but WPCP had the lead that Wayne was unable to catch, 47-0.

Mark Robinson led the team on

defense with 11 unassisted tackles, followed by Bob Reeg with 6 and Kendall Longe with 5. Ed Sherry, Keith Lehmann and Phil Kelton each had 3 unassisted tackles.

Wayne traveled to Laurel Wednesday night and will end the season November 5 against Pierce at WSC.

NIGHT TIME FISHING

Successful night time fishing depends a lot on locating the feeding areas. If there's a yearning to fish for large-mouth bass, smallmouth bass, walleye, bluegill, striped bass or catfish, you can be taken on the experts' feet night time fishing is more sporty, in fact, a lot of a challenge.

The bluegill, or better known as the king of the panfish, often feeds after sundown, in the drop-off shelves and weed thickets of a lake. Shallow water seems to be the order of the night for this fish in depths of 2 to 10 feet and with a fly rod. Many fishermen claim more success when fishing for striped bass at night. The white bass feeds more from dark to dawn and will strike just as forcibly at night as in the day time.

Wayne FHA Will Conduct UNICEF Drive This Week

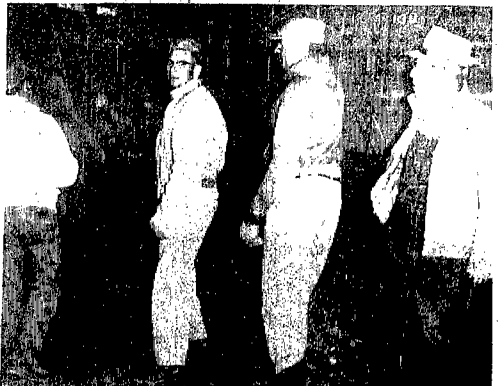

They're just a little proud of their place which offers Canadian catfish pan-fried the last Friday of every month and a three-piece combo plays music for dancing about two weeks after the fish fry. On and off sale beer and mixed drinks are offered.

Lamp Lounge has three extra employees on weekends and eight work at the firm the days of fries or live music. During pheasant hunting season they have a big trade from hunters from many sta-
