Haun called attention to the bleak types who have never had to take responsibility, calling them parasites on the economy and culture of our time. "Too busy loving themselves to love their country," he said, schools, parents, teachers and courts should stand up to defend law, order and spiritual values, the things "we know to be right."

Concluding, he said, Americans need to have a thorough respect for the sacrifices of men and women who place the welfare of country above the welfare of themselves. These are the people Veterans day honors.

He added "in the first week of November alone 70 were killed and 237 wounded in Vietnam."

Four Accidents on Thirteenth Boost City Traffic Toll
Four traffic accidents Nov. 13 helped Wayne chalk up its worst week of driving since the snows of last winter. Causing a shadow of coming events when streets are icy, the city had nine accidents on fry streets last week.

Nov. 9 on Douglas street, David Noyes, 17, Wayne, suffered a cut under his nose when he was southbound and struck a car owned by Northwestern Bell telephone parked at the curb. Chief of Police Vern Fairchild investigated.

Nov. 12 at Seventh and Windom three cars were involved in a mishap. Danny Bilson, 16, Wayne, was westbound on Seventh, turned onto Windom and struck the parked car of Ronald Mau, Wayne, pushing it into the rear of the parked Midwest Land Co. car. Bilson suffered a bump on the forehead, according to Officer Reed. Damages came to \$140 to his car, \$240 to Mau's and \$97.50 to Midwest's.

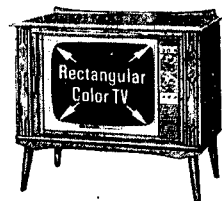
Debate Team Baptism Received at Heelan

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Wayne National Guard's Role in Nation's Reorganization Plans Told by Governor

Changing over from an infantry unit to a mechanized infantry unit is one of the roles for the Wayne National Guard unit as announced by Gov. Frank Morrison. It is part of the nation's plans for reorganizing the Guard and the reserves.

The unit was in the 34th Infantry. It is now Co. A, First Bn. (M) 134th Inf. (w/mess team aug). This means it is a mechanized unit with a mess team augmented.

General Lyle Welch presented the plan as a part of the army's security reserve force. Morrison noted that members and their families should be aware of the need for the stepped up training.

The alternative to more training hours at the guard units around the state (such as the one at Wayne) is to mobilize forces and take them to bases for training. This will separate them from families and remove them from civilian pursuits.

Phase I of the new training program includes completion of mandatory and recurring subjects. Phase II covers completion of training at company level to include testing of rifle companies and artillery batteries at home station. Phase III includes completion of army training tests by infantry battalions and artillery batteries.

All training objectives for the

67th brigade are scheduled to be completed by June 30, 1966. This means summer camp will come in June next year.

Units have been authorized full strength which means the brigade needs about 700 more men. Enrollment of men with prior service is preferred.

Objectives to be achieved by the SRF include: Training to attain the highest possible level possible at home stations, week-

end training sites and field training sites; personnel to bring the units to 100 per cent of qualified men; and logistics, support with equipment in combat serviceable condition.

Wayne's unit of the Guard is seeking more men. Anyone interested can obtain information any day of the week at the armory on East Seventh street.

Local Man Commands Baker Street Group

Richard Lesh, faculty member at Wayne State college, has acquired notoriety due to his work with the Baker Street Irregulars, most recent of which was the dedication of the Watson Room at the WSC library with Basil Rathbone doing the honors.

Lesh, an admirer of Sherlock Holmes, is commandant of Malwand Jezails society, was featured in an article in the Washington (D. C.) Post last January, a writer commenting on the unlikely combination of a man in Wayne, Baker street in London and Afghanistan being involved in negotiations.

Those negotiations concerned permission to erect a marker at Maiwand, Afghanistan, to mark the spot where a Jezail bullet struck Dr. John Watson. Because of that bullet, it is claimed Watson returned home and roomed with Sherlock Holmes, with the resulting publication of many Holmes adventures as related by Watson.

Of course, Arthur Conan Doyle wrote about Sherlock Holmes, but to the BSI, Holmes, and Watson did live. In fact, some believe they will always live on Baker street, "in a nostalgic country of the mind, where it is always 1895."

Devotees throughout the world study Holmes and Watson, join forces in meetings of the Irregulars and subscribe to the quarterly "Baker Street Journal." They claim their beloved Holmes was one of the best-loved characters in modern literature.

The Irregulars (called that in honor of the street urchins Holmes designated his "Irregulars" to do his bidding) revere Dr. Watson as the true author of the Sherlock Holmes adventures. They insist Doyle was merely Watson's literary agent and refer to Watson's accounts as "the canon" or "the Sacred Writings."

Karl Meyer wrote in the Washington Post: "An admiring reader of Watson's work who happens to live in Wayne, Neb., decided that a suitable memorial should be placed in Malwand, Afghanistan. Richard Lesh is professor of fine arts at Nebraska State Teachers college and is founder of the Malwand Jezails, an organization devoted to the study of Watson's chronicles."

Lesh did extensive research into the history of Afghanistan, publishing some of his findings in the quarterly Baker Street Journal. Last year, he approached the Afghanistan ambassador here, Dr. Abdul Majid, on placing a marker at Malwand.

Majid has recommended that the marker be placed there but just what has happened since has not been learned. At any rate, BSI members all over the world, ever anxious to read more about Watson, have a new cause and Richard Lesh of Malwand Jezails and Wayne is a leader among them.

Third Decrease in Gas Costs Planned

Wally Peterson, manager of Peoples Natural Gas Co., Wayne, has announced the third reduction in natural gas rates in the last 15 months. The lower rates apply to 20 communities served by the firm.

Effective Dec. 1, the rate reduction over all towns comes to about \$41,000. It applies to residential, commercial, industrial and rural customers with firm or interruptible requirements.

Sept. 1 the company reduced rates by \$41,000 a year and May 1 Nebraska rates were reduced by \$60,000. The three reductions represent a reduction of \$162,000 a year in 15 months.

In addition, Peoples Natural Gas will increase by \$42,500 a year its gross revenue payments to Nebraska communities. This will bring total annual gross revenue payments to \$48,500.

The reduction by Peoples is made possible because of lower wholesale rates inaugurated by the parent company, Northern Natural Gas, Omaha. The savings are thus passed along to customers through lower rates and higher gross revenue payments.
