An idea of things to come was encountered recently during the normal process of collecting research information on swine carcasses in a University experimental project, Lucas revealed.

The NU Extension livestock specialist said a carcass from a crossbred gilt in the game pool study had a loin eye area of 9.48 square inches, backfat of 1.0 inches and length of 32 inches.

"The huge loin of 9.48 square inches made this carcass an outstanding one," Lucas said. The measurement compares with the 2.75 to 4.00 square-inch loin eye, from the average hog marketed today, and the five to six square

Ever since their time, families have used this basic pattern, added favorite dishes to it, adopted it - but never changed it.

With the choice of small or large size turkeys, as well as parts, or gut-up pieces that are available, even the small family can enjoy this delightful tradition in the best style.

Since Thanksgiving is usually a family occasion with many mouths to feed, it is best to have some idea of how to plan the size of your turkey according to weight per serving. Count on 1½ pounds per person for nice servings and a little left. Over for those delicious secondary ideas.

The roasting is the golden touch. The over should be set at 325 degrees. A rooster bird of from 6 to 12 pounds should be in the oven from 3½, to 5 hours. An additional 1 to 1½ hours for every feur pounds is a good rule of thumb.

Unstuffed birds of 6-12 pounds need from 2 to 3½ hours, with an additional hour for every four pounds for eachy-to-cook weight.

The turkey should be placed in a shallow pan, breast side up. Small birds roast well without turning. Brush the skin with melted fat. Do not add water and do not cover.

When done the leg joint moves easily and the flesh is soft and plable. The timing should be planned so that the bird is done 20 to 30 minutes before serving easy, and gives you time to make the gravy.

Perhaps with these few things in mind, your holiday turkey will be just right for that traditional Thanksgiving Dinner.
