

## New County Reorganization Committee Sees Action Monday

A new County School Reorganization committee was selected Monday. The first action was to vote for having a seven-member board instead of a ten-member board in the past.

Mrs. Gladys Porter, county superintendent of schools is automatically a member of the committee and also the secretary. However, she is a non-voting member.

This has meant nine members have been elected in previous years. Since the size has been cut, it meant only six members could be elected.

The 46 board members attending Monday, one from WinStine and four from rural districts. Men or women were eligible but as it turned out an all-male committee was selected.

WinStine's representatives are Paul Danberg, District 95R; Wayne's is Dallas Haverer, Carroll, District 17; and the rural representatives are Fredrick Mann, District 51, Merlin Rinehart, District 5, Ralph Olson, District 36, and Stanley Langenberg, Hoskins, District 9.

These six will meet Monday, Dec. 6, at 2 p.m. in the courthouse to elect officers. Mann is presently the chairman and Lynn Warkentien is vice chairman. Gordon Naronberger, Wakefield, presided at the Monday session, having been named to preside by the superintendent. State law provides that the chairman must be one who is not seeking an office or membership on the committee.

Mrs. Lou Luff, Wayne, Dist. 17, teacher; Ed Kollath, Hoskins, Dist. 9, banker; Marilyn Rinehart, Wayne, Dist. 5, farmer; Mrs. Bernard Kinney, Wakefield, Dist. 1, housewife;

John Heinemann, Wayne, Dist. 2, farmer; C. A. Bard, Wayne, Dist. 17, county clerk; Bernard Barelman, Wisner, Dist. 32, farmer; and Fredrick Mann, Wayne, Dist. 51, farmer.

Purpose of the statewide plan is to enable districts to set up specific educational units of interested counties so facilities can be offered as a group the counties could not offer themselves. Gov. Morrison will choose one from this group of 12 to represent Wayne county.

## Zoning Body, New Clerk and Higher Gas Revenue for City

A zoning commission, a new city clerk and an increased revenue from the natural gas company were items that were approved at the Monday night meeting of the Wayne City council.

The council passed an ordinance creating a zoning commission and making members of the present planning commission zoning commission members also. It also decided the officers in each group would be the same.

Alan Gramer is presently chairman of the planning commission with Mrs. Charles McDermott acting secretary. Other members are Clarence Kuhn, I. G. Fuellert, Arnold Ross, W. L. Ellis, Robert Calhoun, Adon Jeffrey and Dr. William Koerber.

A zoning commission is necessary before a zoning ordinance regulating the types of structures allowed in various parts of town can be passed. The zoning commission would have to hear all cases regarding zoning and changes.

Don Sherry, retired feed merchant, is to be the new city clerk. A present city councilman from the second ward, he will resign effective Jan. 1 and a new councilman from the ward will be named.

Howard Witt is resigning to become director of dormitories at Wayne State college. Sherry is serving his first year on the city council.

## New Carroll Post Office Opens Wednesday Morning

A new post office was put in use in Carroll Wednesday morning. It is the first new post office building to be erected in Wayne county since the present Wayne post office was erected in the 1930's.

Postmaster John Rethwisch was postmaster for 11 years in the building which has been the Carroll post office for over 32 years. It was moved to that site when Franklin Delano Roosevelt was president.

The new structure has a modern look both inside and out. It has glass doors, fluorescent lighting, tile floors, new dial-type boxes, insulated ceiling, modern plumbing and concrete block walls with brick facing.

Located a block north of the old post office, it was built by Richard Carlson, Wayne. It has not been dedicated and a dedication ceremony will probably be scheduled later.

In addition to Postmaster Rethwisch, Mrs. Rethwisch is a clerk. Robert Johnson carries the mail on the rural route out of Carroll and Ethel Tucker is sub-clerk for replacements services.

Postmaster Rethwisch has assigned box numbers and has been getting dial directions to patrons. The move from the old to the new site was made Tuesday after regular business hours.

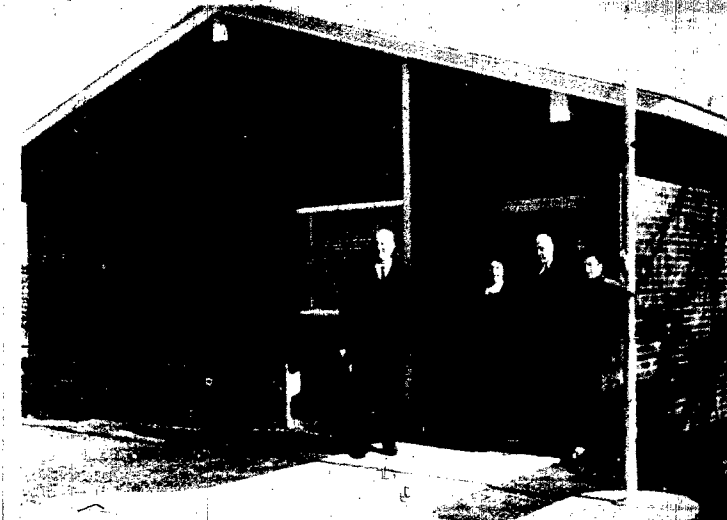
Registration is scheduled for 4 p.m. in the student center. State and county leaders in mental health are featured on the program.

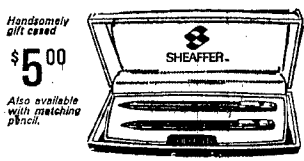

## WSC Cagers Open Season With Win Over Dana Team

Wayne State's new basketball season portended off to a sky-high score Tuesday night 107-91 over Dana—and picked up where the Wildcat cagers finished last year. The finale in February produced a 104-98 win over Peru.

Seven players tallied 10 or more for Wayne, led by Dean deBuhr's 25 and Randy Harkobus's 20. However, Ken Kemnisk took top honors with 37 for Dana. He and deBuhr both warmed to the battle in the second half, hitting 7 and 17 respectively.

The first six minutes produced an even game with scores tied three times before the host Wild-

cats pulled away to a 57-53 half lead. Dana added 56 in the second half while Wayne hit 50. Coach Al Svenningson used 14 players as he began substituting unusually early. In fact, 11 played in the first half, and nine of them contributed points.

A notable achievement, Svenningson thought, was the balanced scoring—often missing last year.

Denny Neubrand led rebounding with 17 for Wayne while Marv Enger had 14 for Dana. Neubrand scored 13, Dick Fransson 12, Bob Hope 11, Bob Strathman and Ron Hintz 10 each, Phil Borrero four and Joel

Parks two.

The Wildcats leave Thursday for a two-game Minnesota expedition against College of St. Thomas Friday night and Macalester Saturday night, both in St. Paul. They travel to Midland next Tuesday, then play a home pair Dec. 10 and 11 against Northern State and Washburn.

## Kirby, Bernard MVP at College

Dennis Kirby and Randy Bernard earned the honors of most valuable players on offense and defense, respectively, at Wayne State college this season.

Halfback Kirby, a junior from David City, won the vote of teammates on the basis of his rushing and scoring. He ranked second in rushing with a 465-yard net, averaging 51.6 per game and 4.9 per play (his play average topped the Wayne regulars).

Kirby led the team's scoring with 40 points on three touchdowns, 19 extra point kicks and one field goal on two attempts.

## Burt Matthies, Wayne State Fullback, Signs Pro Contract with Los Angeles

Burt Matthies, Wayne State college record setter at fullback the past four years, has signed a contract to play pro football with the Los Angeles Rams.

The Rams made him a ninth-round choice in last weekend's draft by National Football League teams.

Matthies, a six-foot, 232-pounder from Stanton, compiled an offensive record probably never equalled by a Wayne griddler and a four-year performance not often equalled anywhere.

Although statistics for Wayne's early grid years are not available, Matthies' career rushing total of 2,882 yards likely is a school record. In 34 games he averaged 84.7 yards, and on 540 carries he averaged 5.3 yards—a figure his coach, John Jermier, calls remarkable.

For his slamming drives through the line, Matthies earned such nicknames as "the horse" and "bulldozer," as he frequently carried tacklers for extra yards.

His scoring added up to 234 points, averaging 56.8 a season—66 as a freshman, a peak of 75 as a sophomore in nine games, then 63 in eight games, and 30 this year in nine.

Unusual for a fullback, he snared 16 passes for 240 yards. And this year took on the punting chores at mid-season and emerged with a 43.39 average—good for tenth place on the national college charts.

Before enrolling at Wayne,

Matthies spent three years in the air force, played football in the Hawaii Armed Forces league and was named most valuable player.

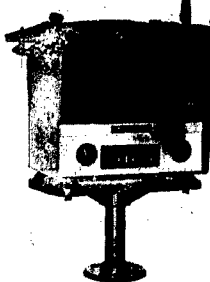

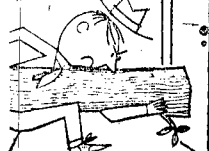

card and then saving a penny with a four-cent stamp instead of a five-cent stamp means the card will not be forwarded. What's more, if no return address is given, undelivered mail cannot be returned.

His suggestion is to use five-cent stamps and return addresses for cards. All post office employees are also willing to help secure zip code numbers to help speed delivery.

As for packages, complete addresses plus zip code should be used. Liquid pencil or wax crayon should be used to write addresses plainly on parcel post

packages. Zip codes are used for fast package sorting at terminals, Wightman said. Where there is no zip code, the package has to be passed over for later sorting by other means.

Packages can be turned down if they are in flimsy wrapping or poorly tied. He suggests that anything worth sending is worth packing, wrapping, tying and addressing properly.

America handles 75 per cent of the world's mail and much of it seems to come at Christmas time. It is the one time mail should not go astray but it can get mail to the right place. Senders do not make sure they have it marked correctly in the first place.

### VA Checks Go to Many This Week

Over 16,500 Nebraska veterans, widows and orphans are receiving nonservice-connected pension checks this week. About 14,000 will also receive annual income questionnaires, according to Chris Bargholz, Wayne county veterans service officer.

A change in the law regarding pensions makes it unnecessary for custodians of children to fill out these questionnaires each year. That accounts for the 2,500 difference in the totals.

Questionnaires must be completed and returned to the regional VA office in Lincoln by Jan. 31, according to Bargholz. If not received by then, the February pension check will not be sent out.

Bargholz offers his help to residents of the county in filling out the questionnaires. He is at his office at 108 Main, Wayne, daily.

Some will also get election cards and questionnaires. These also can be brought to the service officer's office for assistance in filling out properly at no charge.

## Boy Scouts Learn Much of First Aid

Around 20 Boy Scouts from Troop 175 know a lot more about first aid than they did six weeks ago. They have just completed a course in the subject.

All the routine procedures were learned plus some that are not so routine. Rowan Wiltse, who takes a refresher course each year, taught the class for six weeks with the final session Monday.

Two of the newer devices were plastic splints and "instant ice." The splints are plastic, firm when inflated and do not have to be

removed for xraying. The "ice" is a bag within a bag, which is crushed, releasing a chemical to mix with a chemical in the outer bag. The result: instant cold to put on injured spots.

Splints, artificial respiration, bandaging, methods for victims of various types of poisons and other useful information were studied. Those finishing the course and passing the test qualified for one of the most difficult merit badges to earn, first aid.

# EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers. It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

## Unhappy New Year

Wayne's Business and Professional Women's Club wants area residents to get through the Christmas holiday safely so there will be no "unhappy New Years." Some of the statistics on the yule holiday are a bit startling. With the warmth and glow of the Christmas season, they may seem a bit harsh, but certainly they are worth recalling. Last December, 9,700 accidental deaths were recorded in the nation with motor vehicle mishaps accounting for 4,190 of these. In addition to these thousands killed, 160,000 were injured. The three-day Christmas period last year cost 800 people their lives and left 28,000 disabled with injuries. Three out of four fatal Christmas accidents involved speeding or driving too fast for conditions. Drinking drivers cause more than half the accidents and two-car mishaps are the most common. Even walking is dangerous as one-fourth of the accidents involving cars also involve pedestrians. Wayne area residents should decide right now they'll have a merry Christmas by taking special pains to be careful. If they don't, someone may have an unhappy New Year. — CEG

# Nebraska Economy Affected By New Laws Now In Effect

LINCOLN — Hundreds of new laws bearing on every segment of the Nebraska economy have taken effect now that three months has passed since the 1965 Legislature adjourned. The first Unicameral, hailed as one of the most productive in state history, enacted a record 584 laws, ranging from taxes to medicine. Governor Morrison vetoed four bills. He had his veto overridden three times. The last session, ushered both in and out in a swirl of controversy, passed many far-reaching new laws. The constitutionality of some is already under fire and more will no doubt be tested. For example, retailers and wholesalers will no longer be able to sell cigarettes and dairy products below cost. The minimum price for cigarettes will be 29 cents for regular and 39 cents for king-size. These so-called minimum price laws, introduced to discourage the luring of customers with loss-leader items have been assailed by some store operators. They contend they violate the state and Federal Constitutions. A bill making it unlawful to display or sell obscene materials to persons under 18 may also wind up in the courts. The State Justice Department questioned its legality before the law was enacted. Three major education bills went into effect recently. They considerably change the state's school picture. Foremost is the law creating educational service units to assist the state. The units will offer special and vocational-technical education services. Another school bill requires a six-month interval before a de-

Here in Carroll, there is a sound two-story building with 6,800 feet of floor space not counting basement, part of which has been used for a post office. With the building of the new post office, the building will be completely vacated. The owners are deciding now to let the building go as it has for the past several years, sliding downhill, because there is no foreseeable use for it. But the point of the present situation is that the state will soon be in a position to tear down a structurally sound, but somewhat unkempt two-story building. The collegians did not confine themselves to campus matters. They queried the governor on taxation — specifically, broadening the tax base. They debated Vietnam, not only as a problem for students but for the federal government, and listened to and questioned First District Congressman Clair Calton, the Friday evening banquet speaker.

The association elected the following new officers: Carol Lambly, Kearney State, president; Richard Thompson, University of Nebraska, vice president, and Joe Rae Lively, Chadron State, secretary.

Seven colleges sent delegates: Chadron, Kearney, Wayne, the University of Nebraska, Dana, Hastings and Scottsbluff Junior college.

### Police Report Shows High Percentage of Parking Warnings Compared to Arrests

A special report prepared by Chief of Police Vern Fairchild shows 362 parking warnings given during a 15-week period. In the same period there were eight parking arrests!

Going further, the police chief shows 23 parking warnings and no arrests in August, 152 warnings and three arrests in September (after WSC opened for the fall term), 119 warnings and two arrests in October and 63 warnings and three arrests in the first 19 days of November.

Fairchild's report stated: "There can be no set policy on issuing warnings for moving traffic violations because traffic and weather conditions vary with each violation. Time of day and seriousness of the violation must also be considered."

Parking warnings are filed by license number and are kept for three months or more. It is the policy of the Wayne police to notify the owners of vehicles to appear in court upon issuance of a third warning for a particular parking violation.

Clipping college students' records, the report showed seven arrested since Sept. 1 for parking violations. In reviewing

them, The Herald eliminates the names of the students.

Student A was arrested for parking in a restricted area between midnight and 5 a.m. after two previous warnings within a six-week period; Student B parked too long in a restricted area after two previous warnings, all violations coming in an eight-day period.

A third warning on parking in the zone where no parking is allowed between midnight and 5 a.m. brought Student C in, all violations coming in a 15-day period; Student D parked in a restricted area after midnight the third time in six weeks;

Records on Student E showed he had been issued warnings Oct. 16, Oct. 17 and Nov. 3, also getting warnings for parking across sidewalk, making a u-turn in an intersection where this was a violation and proceeding a block before making another illegal u-turn;

Student F parked over 24 hours in a restricted area after warnings on Nov. 1, 2 and 3 and finally having his car towed in; Student G parked on the wrong side of the street facing traffic three times in less than a month and the third warning resulted
