Sell Cattle When?

Every cattle feeder must face the problem of when to sell his cattle. Many seek the answer by guessing what the market is going to doe But expected changes in the market are only one factor.

Three factors in particular stand-out: (1) the expected cost of the additional gain; (2) the estimated price the additional gain will bring; (3) the price rise on the present weight that additional finish might result in. Toward the end of the feeding period, each successive hundredweight of feedlot gain costs from 25 to 35 per cent more; than the previous one. Thus, the feeder with scales and feed records on previous gain can make a reasonably good cost estimate for gain yet to be put on.

If, for example, he estimates the last hundredweight cost for feed at \$25, the lenext hundredweight cost for feed at \$25, the lenext hundredweight would apply to cattle approaching prime grade or when weather is extremely hot or cold, or when feedlots are excessively muddy.

The next step is to estimate the additional feedlot time. Depending on the inherent quality of the cattle and their present finish, they might improve in

Then add at least two more cubic feet of space for entertaining needs. Families who entertain large groups will need more refrigerator should be checked before the purchase is made. The cold level should remain constant at 34 to 38 degrees in the general section of the refrigerator. In the meat section a temperature of 30 to 32 degrees is preferred. The accepted level for frozen foods is zero degrees or colder.

The freezer section is the most expensive part of a refrigerator. When comparing prices keep this in mind. The difference in price might be the difference in freezer capacity.
