Mortgage Sunday at

St. Paul's Lutheran church, Wayne, will hold a mortgage-burning ceremony Sunday, Dec. 12, at 2:30 p.m. It will mark the final payment of the building debt for the congregation.

Dr. Gerhard Gieschen, president of Central seminary, Fremont, will be guest speaker. A former pastor of St. Paul's, he served the parish from 1940 to 1942.

Pastor R. E. Shreck, checked the history of the church and found many items of interest tying the history of town and church together. The sturmiest part was its founding as St. Paul's Lutheran church of Wayne at LaPorte.

The first Lutheran church service in Wayne county had been held in May of 1880 at LaPorte by Missionary G. H. Schurr. For a year he held services in school houses and private homes.

In September of 1881, the church was organized in LaPorte at the courthouse because there was no suitable meeting place in Wayne. Plans were begun at once for construction of a chapel in Wayne.

An 18 by 26 chapel was built at Fourth and Logan, a block north of the present REA building. It cost \$543 to build and in order to help others in the community it was made available for \$5 a month to the school board. Presbyterians and Methodists also made use of the chapel for services.

As the congregation grew, the chapel proved inadequate and land was procured at Fifth and Pearl. In December, 1884, a \$2,300 church 33 by 54 was dedicated. Just 20 years later the building was remodeled and enlarged at a cost of \$2,880.

In 1950, after various remodeling plans had been discarded, definite plans were made to build a new church. Groundbreaking and cornerstone ceremonies were held in 1951 and May 8, 1955, the present \$300,000 church was dedicated.

Sunday afternoon's festivities will climax the celebration of the tenth anniversary of the structure. Pastors and congregations from Wayne and all Northeast Nebraska have been invited.

Following the services, men of the church council and their wives will host a coffee and fellowship hour. Everyone is invited.

Families Willing to Take AFS Boy Should Volunteer

Stan Hanson, head of the drive to get an American Field service exchange student in Wayne next term, reports the need is greatest for families willing to take foreign boys for a year. Last year AFS did not have enough homes for all the boys wanting to come to America.

Boys who do come are eligible to take part in sports and other activities. Any family wanting to keep a boy under the plan should contact Hanson.

So far three families have volunteered to take an AFS student for a year. More applications are needed since requirements are strict and it is important for the local chapter to have at least one family meeting all specifications.

Interview forms are ready for families and must be turned in to AFS by Feb. 15. The money does not have to be sent in until a student is accepted for Wayne.

Any other help that can be given will be appreciated. The groups that have already offered money are asked to turn it in and any other money available should be turned in at once.

Shoplifting to Be Object of Close Scrutiny

Shoplifting in Wayne is getting special attention under a new police plan. A "plainclothesman" has been hired to concentrate on locating shoplifters.

A group of Wayne stores have banded together to pay for the service until after Christmas. The man who will get this assignment will be on duty all hours the stores are open, including Thursday nights.

He will not be identified as an officer of the police force as he is not a regular member of the force. He will wear a badge concealed in case anyone doubts his authority.

The route he follows will be unspecified and he may even look like a shopper with packages and purchases. His work is outlined to curb a specialized shoplifting procedure which is being carried out in many stores throughout the nation and could spread here.

If you are in the habit of shoplifting, and have not gotten your Christmas shopping done early, Wayne is not the place to do it. Those picked up on the basis of the special officer's findings will be prosecuted.

Calf Weighing Day New Feature in 4-H Program

A new plan for weighing calves has been set up for Wayne county 4-H club members with beef projects. County Agent Harold Ingalls said it will take the cooperation of all concerned in order to succeed.

Scheduled Saturday, Dec. 11 is a calf weighing day at the Wayne Sales barn. It will start at 9 a.m. and continue as long as calves are brought in.

The animals weighed will be tagged and appraised. This is particularly important for the 4-H members with commercial pen projects, according to Ingalls.

Previously the agent has gone to the farms of individual members to do the weighing, tagging and appraising. This has resulted in the process dragging out over weeks and days whereas the new plan should accomplish the job in one day.

Letters have been sent to as many beef project 4-H club members as are known about. Anyone in the county who has not received one should contact the agent's office.

Pens for the projects must be started by Dec. 25. Individual calves as projects can be started at a later date.

New English Curriculum Gets Approval of Board

A thorough study of the new English curriculum, planned by the faculty of Wayne high school working with Supl. Francis Haun has won wholehearted approval from members of the District 17 board of education.

Meeting Monday night, the board learned the new set-up is essentially an attempt to correlate the grammar units for all grades in order to avoid repetition as well as omission of vital grammar units. Most of these units are incorporating "the modern grammar approach."

In literature, the set-up incorporates portions of the new Nebraska English curriculum into grades eight and ten. The plan is to revise this curriculum annually to keep abreast of current teaching methods for literature.

Supt. Haun pointed out this is a step forward because it is the first time the school has had such a program. Now all English teachers are aware of the sequence of grammar and literature study and other teachers will know what is taught.

Heretofore, teachers sometimes repeated lessons because they were not aware of what was being taught in other grades. In the new way, some units of study had been omitted because one teacher thought it would be covered the following year and the teacher in the grade ahead figured it was being covered the previous year.

The board also discussed the Title I program under federal aid, guide lines and application forms having been received. Authorization was given for a committee to study possible projects and report back to the board after plans have been formulated as to what See NEW ENGLISH—Page 5

The closing of the post office was a surprise to Mrs. Kuhl. She had been training to take over as postmaster for two months when she received word the office would be closed. Her term extended from July 31 to Dec. 3 as acting postmaster.

Winside Lagoon Plans Completed

Plans for a new sewage lagoon were completed the past week and presented at the Monday night meeting of the town board. Work is scheduled to get underway in the spring.

A six-acre parcel of land south of town has been secured for construction of a state-approved lagoon. Sid Magdanz, Wayne, will be engineer for the project.

Mayor N. L. Ditman said the lagoon would be a big improvement over the present system. For years Winside has been dumping raw sewage into Logan creek south of town.

The Monday meeting was the last of the year for Winside. Several improvements were brought about under direction of the board and plans were made for others throughout the year.

School District Case Dropped Before Meet

There was no hearing Monday on the proposal to transfer land from Districts 24 and 3 to District 33. The petition was withdrawn before a hearing could be held.

District 33 had sought the land where children had been attending its school in the past. Small parcels of land in the other two districts were involved.

A crowd of 55 residents of the three districts assembled in the court room along with attorneys, county treasurer, county clerk and county superintendent.

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Sioux Contractors Seeking Restraint

Sioux Contractors, Sioux City, has filed in district court seeking a restraining order and injunction against Local 1140 of the Laborers and Hod Carriers union, according to John T. Bressler, jr., clerk of the district court.

The case is scheduled for a Friday hearing. It grows out of off-and-on picketing by the union at projects of Sioux Contractors on the Wayne State campus.

Another new case filed the past week lists Commercial State bank, Hoskins, as plaintiff. A chattel mortgage foreclosure is sought with C. A. Bethune the defendant.

For the orchestra's part of the program, Dr. Benjamin Bernstein, director, chose a variety of music, several of Christmas theme: "Christmas Music" by Grieg-Hopkin and "White Christmas" by Berlin, arranged by Bennett. Roger Lueders of Wayne will play a trumpet role with orchestra in "Song of Jupiter." In addition, the orchestra will do "Le Lac Des Cygnes" by Tchaikovsky and "Farandole" from Bizet's

"L'Arlesienne Suite No. 2"

Choir and orchestra, directed by William McMurtry, will join in "Gloria in D Major," a choral masterpiece by Antonio Vivaldi, the outstanding late baroque Italian composer of instrumental works (1669-1741).

The "Gloria" is the second of six divisions which form the Ordinary of the Mass. McMurtry explained. It contains powerful choral numbers and lyrical arias, polyphonic movements and sections of transparent simplicity. And all these scenes are depicted by an artist guided by sincere devotion and ardent religious convictions.

Four soloists have special roles in the "Gloria," Janet Bracker of Neola, Ia., Joyce Piskac of Omaha, Nancy Wolters of Wayne and Connie Beermann of Dakota City. For the finale, the choir alone will sing a modern work, "Gloria in G Major," by the French composer, Francis Poulenc (1899-1963) and "Farandole" from Bizet's

dance so closely associated with French art. Poulenc's "Gloria" possesses a wealth of fresh, spontaneous melody which lends itself well to contrasting moods of exultation, gaiety, solemnity and mysticism. The sincerity and overall simplicity of style have made Poulenc one of the great religious composers of our time. This work, too, features soloists — Miss Bracker and Paula Koch of Linn Grove, Ia.

Telephone Company's Check for Taxes Big

Wayne county received a \$12,311.36 check last week. It was delivered to County Treasurer Leona Bahde by D. L. Titze on behalf of the Northwestern Bell Tele-

phone company. Titze, Wayne manager, said the payment was the first half of the firm's 1965 personal property taxes. He said the total bill last year in the state for this type of tax was \$12,400,000.

In the future there is some relief for telephone taxpayers, according to Titze. The federal excise tax cut will reduce taxes on local and long distance calls from 10 per cent to 3 per cent in 1968 and then one per cent a year will be taken off until it is all removed by 1973.

Customers pay taxes and Bell has passed on the savings by offering lower priced service. The savings to the telephone company will be reflected in smaller telephone bills.

Veterans Advised to Keep Policies Current

Wayne county veterans should not neglect keeping GI insurance policy beneficiaries current. County Service Officer Curtis Baranitz reports. Benefits are paid the way policies read and if not updated they may not read the way veterans want them to read.

A recent state sampling showed six out of ten veterans wanted to change beneficiaries. They

were given forms for making changes, forms which the VA has available at its regional office, 220 S. 17, Lincoln, or from Barghest.

In Wayne county are some veterans with service-connected disabilities who will get higher compensation starting next month. It is

the second increase in payments in three years.

Amount of the increase depends upon the seriousness of the disability. Those with disabilities over 50 per cent will get the most increased compensation and in some cases additional allowances for dependents.

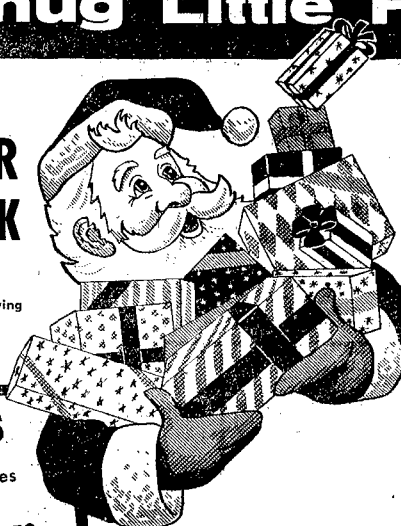

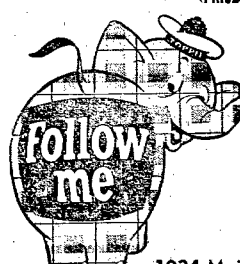

Band at WSC Will Present Concert

Wayne State's band presents its annual free Christmas concert Thursday, Dec. 9, at 8 o'clock in Ramsey Theater of the Peterson Fine Arts center, directed by Dr. Raymond Kelton. The public is invited.

An unusual feature will be solos by two music faculty men, baritone vocalist William McMurry and clarinetist Leon Brooks. Other features: the woodwind quintet, coached by Brooks, and the Madrigal Singers, directed by Antony Garlick.

McMurtry, director of the college choir and instructor in voice, has chosen for his solo "Where'er You Walk" from "Semle" by Handel-Hindley.

Brooks will play the well-known Weber "Concerto for Clarinet." Last summer he had an unusual experience as a member of the American Wind Symphony orchestra directed by Robert Toudreau. Its players, chosen by audition, include only high caliber wind instrumentalists.

This symphony orchestra—unusual in having no stringed instruments—annually performs frequent concerts at Pittsburgh, Pa., its home base, and also tours a number of states in that region.

Subsidized by industry, it plays from a specially equipped barge which anchors at the shore of towns along the Ohio river. Daily concerts attract large crowds, Brooks said, at Pittsburgh and on tour.

The orchestra plays entirely music on direct commission from composers in the United States.

Dr. Kelton's selections for the Wayne band concert include the first movement from Berodini's Symphony No. 2. This symphony is one of the more popular works by the Russian composer, who

distinguished himself both in music and medicine.

Other band selections are excerpts from Puccini's "Madame Butterfly," "Academic Procession March," and "Yellowstone Suite."

Mozart's "Divertimento No. 8" will be performed by the woodwind quintet, which consists of Trudy Parsley, flute; April Swan, oboe; Bill Wohlers, clarinet; Mary Wetrosky, french horn, and Bob Hilligas, bassoon. This quintet, recently represented Wayne State at the state music educators convention in Columbus.

The madrigal singers will perform "Of All the Birds That I Do Know," "It was a Lover and His Lass," and "Sweet Honey-Sucking Bees."

The band's percussion section will be featured in "Concertino for Percussion and Band."

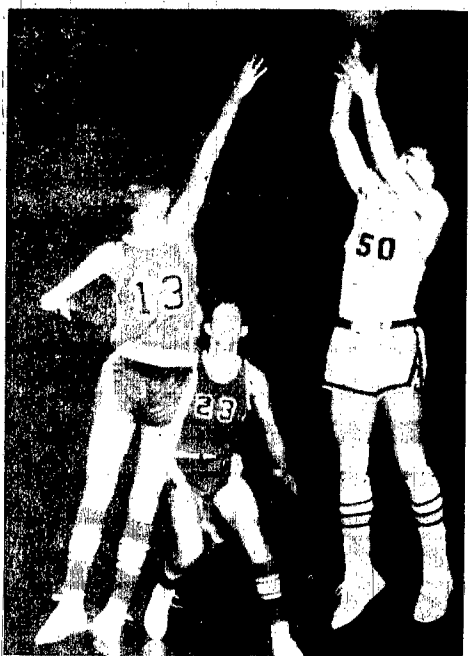

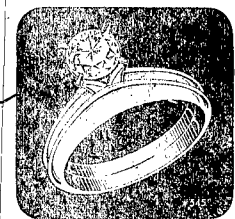
A. D. Benson Finishes High in Cross Country

Mrs. Fred Berry Receives Plaque as 'Woman of Year' in Jackson Deanery

Mrs. Fred S. Berry, Wayne, is one of two recipients of "Woman of the Year" plaques presented in the Jackson deanery of Catholic women. The other lady honored is Mrs. Carrie Day, Newcastle.

Presentation of the plaque was made Thursday, which also happened to be Mrs. Berry's 85th birthday. Deanery officers and a few friends and relatives were invited in for the presentation and a coffee at Mrs. Berry's home.

Mrs. Berry is credited with getting the Jackson deanery started and keeping it going. This achievement by itself would have been sufficient to earn recognition but she has been active in other church and community work.

She is a charter member of the Wayne Woman's club, charter member of St. Mary's Guild, was first archdiocese vice president, served as deanery president 16 years, taught catechism in a rural public school near Willis, instructed converts in Wayne for years during Father Kearns' pastorate. Is known as a generous bene-

Has been active in women's club organizations and always stressed Catholic and Christian principals, inspired Catholics and non-Catholics in a wide area of the Omaha archdiocese, received the Pro Ecclesia award from Pope Pius XII from Archbishop Gerald Bergan in 1957 and served as a good wife and mother.

Her husband was an attorney in Wayne 60 years and served, on the state normal board 12 years. Berry hall on the WSC campus is named after him.

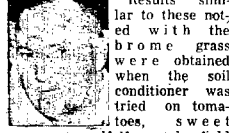

Supporters-Opponents Still Battle Over Income Tax Act

LINCOLN — The battle over the Nebraska Income Tax Act appears to be tightening again as supporters and opponents of a broad-base tax system exchange verbal blows over the tax referendum drive.

Touching off the latest fireworks was a promise by supporters of the income tax that a lawsuit will be filed soon challenging the validity of petition signatures to place the issue on the November, 1966, ballot.

John Klosterman of David City, head of a group called Nebraskans For Fair Taxation, said he will file the suit in Lancaster District Court. He said the referendum petitions violated the State Constitution because they failed to provide signers with an accurate text of the income tax bill.

The controversy centered on an amendment attached to the bill late in the last legislature session. The rider virtually exempted farmer cooperatives from the tax.

Sponsors of the campaign to place the tax act on the ballot for voter determination were undaunted, however. They said the petition drive will withstand any court challenge.

Atty. Gen. Clarence Meyer said he doesn't think the amendment is sufficient grounds to invalidate the drive. "You cannot defeat the right of the people to hold a referendum simply by minor amendment to the bill," Meyer said.

Thus far it has received \$61,000.

Schools May Be Closed

A State Education Department official says many small schools in Nebraska are not living up to minimum state school rules and regulations.

Melvin Olsen, department consultant, said he visited 78 approved high schools recently and virtually all were deviating from minimum standards.

Stromer To File Suit

State Sen. Marvin E. Stromer of Lincoln says he will probably file a lawsuit early next year challenging Nebraska's present Congressional redistricting.

According to the Lincoln lawyer, Nebraska's Congressional districts do not comply with the U. S. Supreme Court's one-man, one-vote decree.

Over 6,500 Plants Turn Red Just in Time at Greenhouse

It is no coincidence that 6,500 poinsettia plants at the Wayne Greenhouse are almost completely red now. That's the way it was planned when they were brought in from California Sept. 1.

Kent Hall, owner and operator, said the potted plants are grown here and constitute the largest plantings of poinsettia in Northeast Nebraska. It's just one of the facets of a Wayne firm that does business on the wholesale level with florists many miles from here.

The poinsettias are rooted and potted here so that they start turning red in November. It takes six weeks for them to turn completely red and lose all green.

Wayne greenhouse wholesalers potted plants the year around to 15 flower shops in this part of the state and sometimes in Sioux City and Yankton. With over 30,000 potted plants, it does business as far west as Ainsworth, as far south as David City and to the South Dakota and Iowa borders.

Visitors at the fourth annual Christmas open house at the

greenhouse last week saw thousands of plants. All are contained under 11,000 square feet of glass (around one-fourth acre). Poinsettias are some trouble, but nothing compared to Easter lilies. Easter is a holiday that moves around yet the shipment of bulbs is always made the same date so the plants have to be bled along so they bloom at the right time.

Growth of Easter lilies is controlled by the temperature, growing faster in warm air and slower in cool air. One hot April a few years ago almost was ruinous as the temperature could not be held down enough and the plants grew and bloomed too fast.

Easter lilies are also susceptible to diseases. One year the greenhouse lost almost all plants to root disease. The entire area had to be cleared out and everything that touched the lily area had to be sterilized until the disease was controlled.

Mums are in demand the year around so 200 come in every week. When flowers are cut off, the plants are thrown away as it is easier to get new plants than to try to get additional cuttings. About 400 cuttings are made every two weeks.

A bird of paradise plant at the greenhouse has "seniority" on the owner. It is over 40 years old, which is older than Kent Hall. Cuttings have been taken from it for years and it still comes forth with its unusual flowers regularly.

A new feature at the greenhouse is an automatic watering system. It serves about one-fourth the greenhouse by automatically turning it on and off.

Potted whole plants that go out of Wayne in the big greenhouse truck include azaleas, chrysanthemum, hydrangeas, begonias, poinsettias, cyclamen, geraniums, caladiums and Easter lilies. Of these the two biggest sellers are poinsettias and lilies.

The Hall family is an institution in Wayne. D. Hall, 92, started the Logan Valley nursery in Wayne after he came here in 1922 from Kennard. He had bought the greenhouse but built most of the buildings now contained in the business.

His nursery was sold to Merle Tietzert, a nephew who still oper-

ates it. Tietzert had worked for Mr. Hall for 17 years.

Born in Denmark, D. Hall came to the United States in 1892, living first in Iowa and then Omaha before going to the Kennard area and finally to Wayne. Although he is 92, he painted his house in year and is still active.

His son, Wilbur Hall, worked with him at the greenhouse from 1946 to 1950. Since his son's death, Mrs. Wilbur Hall has operated the flower shop and Kent Hall the greenhouse. Jan.

1, 1966, Kent Hall takes over as sole owner of both greenhouse and flower shop.

A fascinating business, the greenhouse is a source of beauty in flowers and related items the year round. Possibly few realize how widespread its services extend built up over a four-decade period by three generations of Halls.

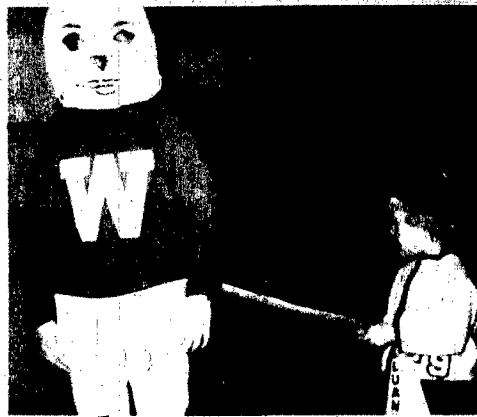

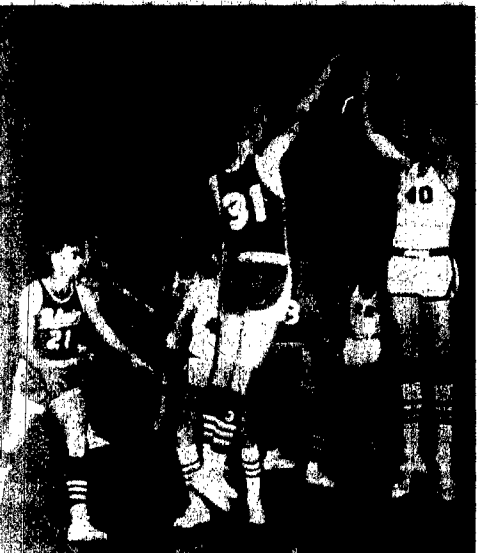

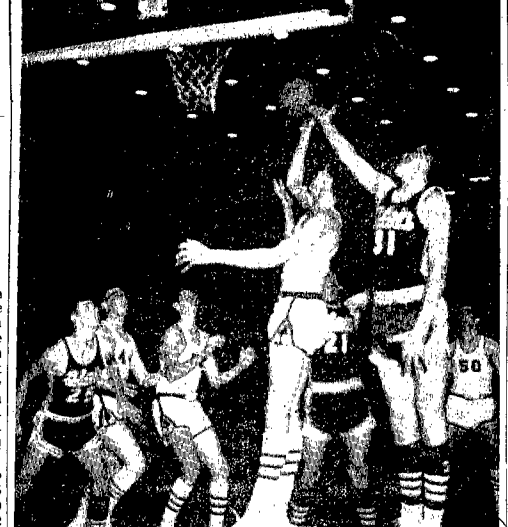

Coach Al Svenning summed it up this way: "I would really have been pleased if we had beaten St. Thomas, but we should not have let Macalester beat us."

St. Thomas was among two favorites to win the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic conference — and looked it against the Wildcats. 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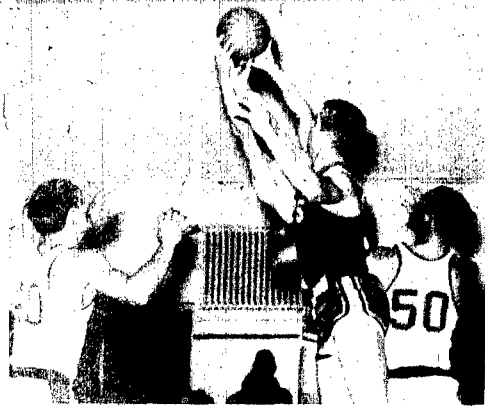

Over 65? You May Not Understand SSA Rules

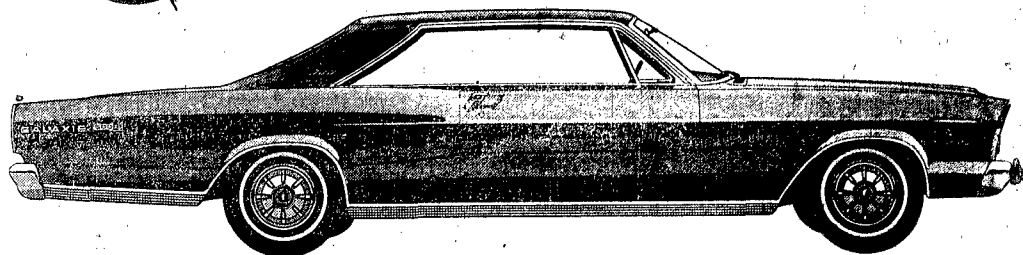
Are you over the age of 65 and still working? Social Security administration officials wonder if you might not understand the retirement provisions of the law.

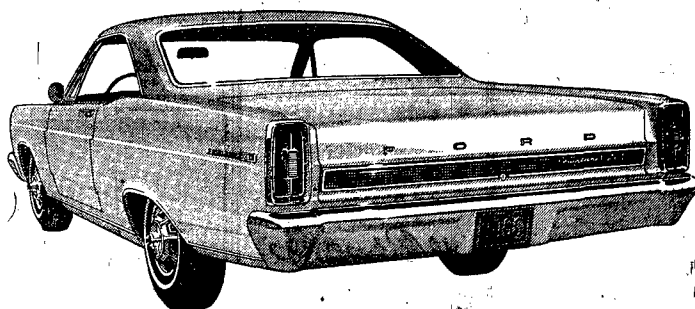
