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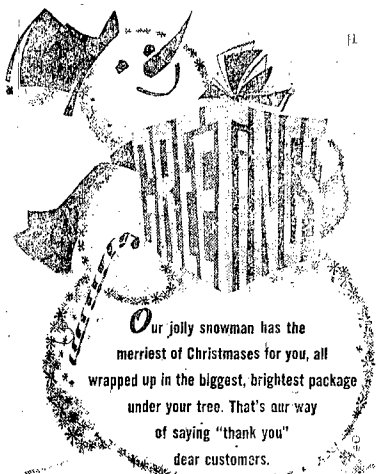

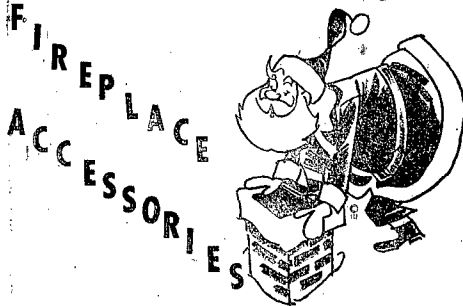

A district court jury reached a verdict in favor of the plaintiff in a case heard the past week. The action grew out of an accident near Carroll in February of 1965. City Officials in 'Class' for Pupils

Seated in the front of the Women's club room at the City auditorium Thursday morning were city officials. Before them sat over 50 WHS pupils, questioning the officials on city matters.

The mayor, city council, chief of police, city attorney and power plant superintendent made up the panel. Pupils were

members of the American problems class of Wayne high school with their teacher, Vera Ebmeier.

Written questions had been submitted in advance as the class undertook a study of city government. Questions were also "ad lib" as pupils thought up new ones as certain matters were discussed.

Here are some of the questions and answers in brief: Is Wayne promoting industry or is industry just not interested in Wayne? The city is promoting industry but

the lack of rail service weekends and regular service daily is a drawback.

Industrial Development Act bonds would be offered should an industry decide to locate here. The panel members said, an industrial plant is offered east of town, new businesses and industries are being sought and rarely a week goes by but what some contact is made in an attempt to lure industry here.

A proposed traffic signal at Seventh and Main was brought up several times. The gist of the problem seems to be that state approval is needed to get lights up on routes included in the state highway system and that intersection is on two state highways. A study has shown that 30 per cent of the traffic accidents in Wayne occur in that intersection.

One student asked: Is the airport to get a paved runway and if so is a quarter mile to be marked off on the runway? The quarter mile marking is important to those who are interested in drag racing or in testing how fast a car can get in a quarter of a mile from a standing stop.

Local, state and federal agencies are involved in airport work and that has made desired improvements drag on and on but panel members said bids should be let this winter for a 2,900-foot surfaced runway and work should start in the spring.

They pointed out that industry likes good airport facilities close to town as so much travel is by private plane now. When Wayne has a surfaced runway, it will have a new point for industry to consider. No quarter-mile marking is expected since federal and state bodies frown on using runways for anything except aircraft.

New facilities at the airport besides a runway would be better lights, taxi strips, parking ramps and other facilities. The job would cost \$60,000 with federal funds paying half and state funds for one-fourth coming in when the project is completed.

Students asked who is responsible for keeping sidewalks in good repair and clean, who maintains alleys and who is in charge of wires on poles. It was pointed out that north-south streets are 80-feet wide even though paving is narrower so trees and sidewalks on terraces are on city property.

The property owners must put in sidewalks and only if trees fall into the street is the city involved. City departments are in charge of alleys. Property owners must pay for alley and street paving. Utility companies and the city have responsibility for power lines.

Have parking meters or a parking lot ever been considered in Wayne? One councilman said "parking meters" was a dirty phrase as they have come up and met with opposition. However, the planning commission is expected to release information on a study and to make proposals on them. As for a parking lot, the council has to consider whether taxpayers want city money used for providing such facilities.

It was suggested that store owners and employees who park in choice spots in the business area hurt themselves by making customers park farther away and walk to the shopping area. Merchants and employees walking farther and leaving spaces

for potential customers would help the city a lot.

Why doesn't the community support the youth center and youth activities? It was pointed out that the swimming pool, baseball diamond and other facilities are city-maintained and that a levy raises money each year for full recreation program which includes Hank Overin's salary. A new skating rink, renovation of the baseball diamond, the biggest summer program ever and other work were cited as city participation in recreation program for young people while little is done now for recreation for the older people who have every right to expect something to be provided for them too.

Could Wayne's electrical system be more effective if privately operated? It was thought not. Wayne has a record of good service with few outages and Norbert Brugger was praised for his efficient work as plant superintendent. When lights were off in six states recently, Wayne had lights because the city has no ties with other lines.

However, Wayne has no alternate supply source if anything happens here either. A peccant caused the most recent outage.

flying into a circuit and putting some areas off power for over an hour. Wind, sleet and lightning are bigger threats when power is brought in a long way so Wayne's present system has advantages. At present the college is the biggest customer, using more current than the entire city of Wakefield.

Why can't kids get jobs at \$1.25 an hour? Because interstate commerce is not involved in most cases and help is available with experience at that price. Most fulltime employees in Wayne firms get that pay or higher but parttime help usually nets less.

The entire session was remarkable in the amount of interest shown by the pupils, the sincere efforts of the officials to answer every question and the general feeling of accomplishing something. The questions and answers contained in this article are only a portion of those asked during the 1 1/2 hour session.

they will be closed all day Saturday.

NYC Problem Dixon's Tool

Dixon shared New York City's water shortage problem for a while the past week. Pressure kept going down and down until there was just a trickle in Dixon spigots in homes and business places. Tuesday morning it was found that someone had hit a fire hydrant, breaking it off. It was located near Mrs. Ted Ballard's home. The strange thing was, there were no vehicle tracks to indicate such an accident. Water pressure returned to normal when workmen replaced the damaged hydrant. Dixon's problem was solved; New York City still has its problem.

Two More Big Farm Sales in Territory

Two more big farm sales are being planned in this area during the next ten days. One is Tom Bressler's and the other is Clarence Schlines'.

Bressler's sale is scheduled Monday, Dec. 27, at the farm 8 1/2 miles south of Wakefield on Highway 16. Land, farm equipment, 56 head of cattle, household goods and feed are among the listings.

Another sale will be held a week later Monday, Jan. 3, when Schlines will hold his sale two miles south, one east and one-fourth south of Wakefield. He will have a registered Shorthorn bull, 30 Shorthorn cows, several hogs, poultry, equipment, household goods and other items.

Smith, McGill, Robertson and Nelson are handling the auctioneering duties at the Bressler sale. Ivan Nixon and Orville Lage are auctioneers for the Schlines sale.

Allen Prescott, operator of Dixon Motors, is hoping Christmas will be a time of year for customers to think of him and pay up their accounts. He's in need of it since a break-in last week deprived him of almost all his tools and some major equipment.

Someone broke into his garage on the west end of Dixon by forcing open the rear door. They then took tools and equipment but as far as could be determined no merchandise or parts were missing.

Sheriff Gus Schutt, Ponca, was in Dixon investigating but as of this writing no good leads were reported. No cash was missing, but Prescott said he rarely left any bills and the night of the break-in there was just change.

Marvin Anderson opened up Friday morning and discovered the break-in. His tool box was on the counter and he never leaves it there. It had been moved from its regular spot to the counter and then left for some reason. Since then the garage has used his tools.

Offering Help for VA Questionnaires

Chris Bargholz, county veterans service officer, has volunteered to help Wayne county residents complete annual income questionnaires required by the veteran administration office in Lincoln.

His office at 108 Main, is open daily. He said that information from the regional office reveals many people are not filling out the questionnaires properly.

Questionnaires must be completed and returned to the VA by Jan. 31. Failure to receive an income and promptly filled out February pension checks will be held up. The questionnaires are sent yearly to Nebraska veterans and widows receiving non-service-connected pensions. If they come in and are not complete, they will be returned which may mean a delay in February checks.

Bargholz also said the service-connected veterans have until May 7 to reopen GI insurance. World War II and Korean conflict veterans who do not have the insurance and have service-connected disabilities can obtain it in various forms.

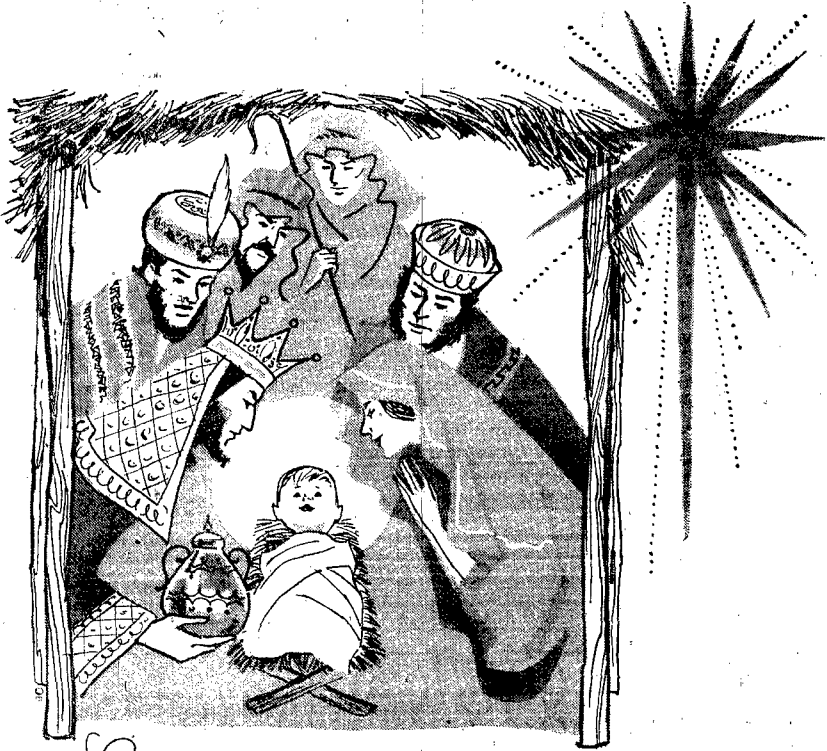

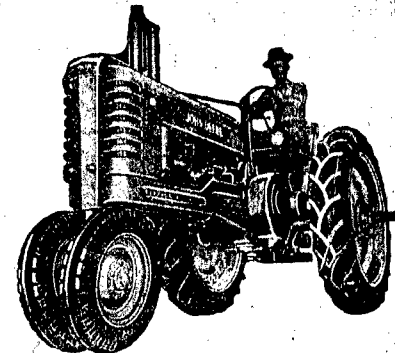

Pheasant Hunting in State 'Oversold'; Hospitality at Carroll Rates Accolade

"Pheasant hunting in Nebraska can be summed up with one word, oversold." That's the first sentence in an article in a magazine, "Oakland County Sportsman," published at Waterford, Mich.

Later on the author, Jack Greathouse, calls the hospitality and cooperation of the people in this area the greatest. A group of Michigan hunters were in the Carroll area hunting and the article was written by one of them.

Greathouse said the crops in the fields made hunting difficult but the birds were just not there. He said the opinion of his group seemed to be pretty general among hunters from all areas of the nation.

His second paragraph said: "The

hospitality and cooperation of the fine country folk left nothing to be desired, and it is our opinion that they were more concerned with the lack of hunter fortune than were the hunters themselves. Certainly the good people that our party stayed with did everything in their power to make our hunt a success. And when one writes to another state and asks for a place to sleep and eat and comes up with one of the finest we've ever encountered, he can count himself lucky indeed."

Later on, he told about arriving at Carroll where "we were greeted by Mr. and Mrs. Levi Roberts, two of the nicest people that Nebraska must turn out. They live on a fine farm

with a big house that breathes hospitality and comfort."

Greathouse said they had a harder time finding birds than they had in South Dakota the previous years. He said ratio of birds was about one hen to two roosters and there was absence of young birds. He asked: "How in the world can that kind of pheasant population stand a 90-day season on cocks with a hen season that runs from Jan. 3 to Jan. 23?"

Again he refers to the Roberts: "All this time we were eating and living like kings at the Roberts farm, with the Roberts doing everything in their power to make us comfy and see that our hunt was at least as successful as could be. If ever we should go back to Nebraska there is little doubt where every one of us would light—the Roberts."

The story itself was quite a lengthy one with Greathouse emphasizing the poor luck they had and the numerous hunters from

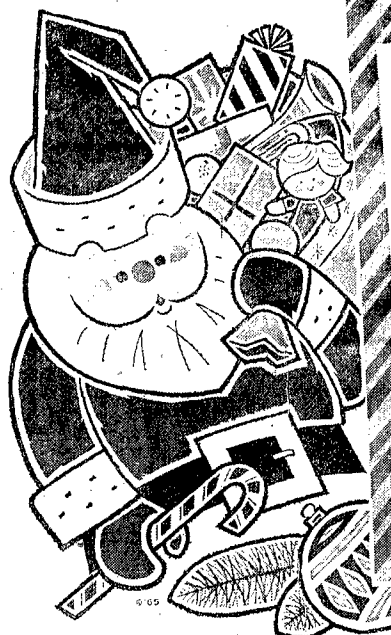

Winside Rocket Shots Succeed Although One Rocket May Be in Orbit Somewhere

Dec. 15 was a historical day in space history at Cape Kennedy and at Winside. Two orbiting capsules flew nose to nose in space rendezvous experiments from the Cape and at Winside several rockets were fired into the air, one of which was never found. Gemini 6 and Gemini 7 successfully met in space in man's greatest achievement yet in that work. The same day Winside Satellites from eighth grade science pupils carried out some rocket experiments of their own. One rocket went out of sight in a southerly direction. It may have gone into orbit with the Gemini rockets, although Terry Cleveland said it was not powered to go that high. It was never found. The operation of the blast-off

procedure was similar to those for Cape Kennedy. There was a launch pad, control dials, an altimeter to compute the height reached, second-by-second checks and blast-offs that sent rockets into the air at hundreds of miles per hour. One rocket had a malfunction which was corrected. When it finally lifted, it soared 2,300 feet into the air, according to the altimeter. Another blew up due to using a substitute fuel and a third came down without a parachute opening.

Wes Boydston, instructor of science, said the kits are commercially made for studies of rocketry. He said the six mem-
