




Fig. 1. Tel 3.4 an insection of the control of the

our world population is growing faster than our food supply. The United States supplies two-thirds of the import needs of grain of the import needs of grain in the bood deficit regions of the world. The United States produces half the corn and two-thirds of the soybeans grown in the world. These crops, along with wheat, have become our three most important export crops. Because of the growing demand for our grain crops in the world market and our increasing domestic use of the grain crops, we can expect to utilize all available cropland in the United States by 1975. As we increase acreages of corn. soybeans and wheat, we will produce less oats and hay. We must make greater use of corn stalks for feed for ruminant animals. Because of the competition between man and animals for grain, hog population will probably decrease rather than increase over present numbers by 1975. Because ruminant animals can utilize pasture and crop residues particularly corn stalks, be ef cattle numbers should continue their t-end upward. Dairy cattle numbers should continue their t-end upward. Dairy cattle numbers should level off after declining since 1945.

Finally, to meet the food needs of the world in 1975, enough additional food must be produced to feed 700 million people—more than live in India or in the western hemisphere today.
