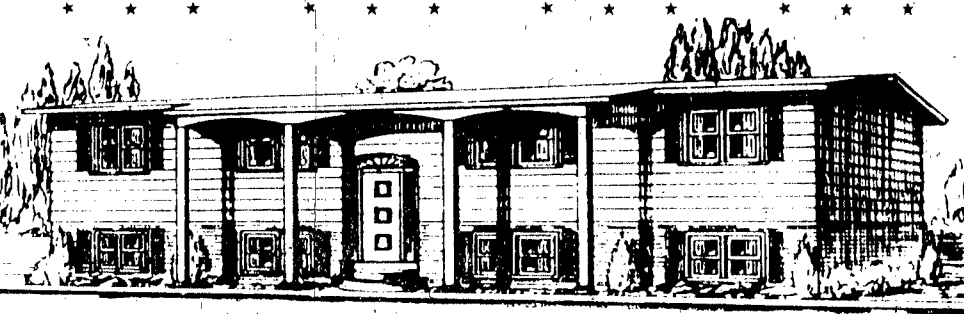
## Three Inducted; 25 Go for Physical Exams in January

# Approval Given Plans for 32-Unit Apartment House Complex in Western Section of Wayne



One of the largest private construction permits in recent years in Wayne was granted Tuesday night by the Wayne city council. It involves \$320,000 in construction of a 32-unit apartment complex.

Walt Moller, on behalf of himself and others, sought the permit. A week earlier the city planning commission had recommended the approval of the permit with minor revisions.

General rental appearance indicated in the drawing accompanying this article. Eight such buildings would be erected before the construction is complete. But there is no time schedule for starting all of them.

At present most of the land is vacant. The area would be prepared before construction and landscaping is planned along with the construction work.

Moller has no other details as to plans, simply stating that the job has been under consideration for some time. Construction in that part of town may spur other improvements in that area.

## ReflectORIZED Plates for State on Sale Next Week

Nebraska's first reflectORIZED license plates, red on silver-gray will go on sale Monday, Jan. 3. County Treas. Leona Bahde reports. Auto owners will have until Feb. 28 to get their new plates installed.

The new plates should be sturdy for they cost more than ever and they are scheduled to be used through 1968. Gone is "The Beef State" motto, replaced with "Centennial" in honor of the 100th anniversary of the formation of Nebraska to be celebrated in 1967.

A pair of passenger plates will cost \$8 this coming year. The additional cost of one dollar for every set of plates, commercial truck, farm and otherwise will represent 50 cents for state recreation road funds and 50 cents to pay for reflectorizing.

Wayne county residents with numbers from 27-1 through 27-999 will get their old numbers with an "A" in front of the number. Those in the 1,001 to 1,999 will get numbers with "B" in front such as B1, B999, etc. Those with numbers 2,001 to 2,999 will lose the "2" and get a "C" in front and the same plan will follow through D and E. No number in this county will be higher than 999.

The treasurer said checks for plates may be mailed to her office and plates will be mailed. Those buying plates should send in registration certificates and tax statements along with the correct amount of the plate fee.

Truck fees must include the additional cost for the recreation road fund and reflectorizing. Any questions about the plates can be answered by the treasurer or her staff.

## New Assessing Plan Starts Next Week in Wayne County

Gene are the days when the assessors called at homes, farms, and businesses in Wayne county. Under a new set-up which is effective Monday, assessing will be done in special locations and property owners must come to the assessors.

According to County Assessor Henry Arp, assessors will be in all county communities sometime during the assessing period from Jan. 1 through Feb. 28. All assessment work is supposed to be completed by Mar. 1.

As a convenience to the public, Arp will have his office open Saturdays in the courthouse even though other county offices will be closed. He also has scheduled an assessing work in all other locations on Saturdays.

The schedule at the courthouse is 8 to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturdays, Jan. 4 through Feb. 28. Mondays the assessor's office will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. to accommodate businessmen and others.

Winside hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturdays, Jan. 4 through Feb. 28; Carroll hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturdays, Jan. 10 through Feb. 28; Sholes hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Jan. 4 and Feb. 1-4; Hoskins hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturdays, Jan. 4 through Feb. 28; and Altona hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Jan. 7 and Feb. 11.

## City's First Mail Carrier Retires After Forty Years

Dec. 8, 1925, house-to-house and business district mail delivery started in Wayne. R. H. "Dick" Banister was one of the two carriers on the routes. Friday he is scheduled to carry mail for the last time.

Banister and George Berres were the original carriers. With four trains a day (two each way) on the Sioux City-Norfolk line plus a train from Bloomfield to Wayne and back, they had two residential deliveries a day and four deliveries to the business places.

Those were not "the good old days." They carried two mail pouches each because there were no relay points for mail storage. There also were no limits on hours they could work and they often worked for over 12 hours, making their last deliveries using flashlights to read addresses on mail.

Banister said his first delivery route went from the post office which was located on the site of the present Coast-to-Coast store. Later it was moved to quarters where Blake studio and Sportsland See BANISTER — page two

## Local Men Build Laurel Man's 'Crop Saver'; Seek Plant Site

An idea Ralph Wiebelhaus, Laurel, has had for years, one which he and William Mohr, Laurel, have developed into a working model by Stan and Alfred Morris, Morris Machine shop, Wayne, and a site for manufacturing it is now being sought.

The "crop saver" is a device that works in milo, corn and other row crops. Farmers who have seen it work claim it will be a boon to those with row crops as it will pay for itself several times over in the extra crop it saves, crop that is usually left in the field.

In milo it is exceptionally effective. Viewed by bankers, agriculture experts, farmers and laymen, it worked equally well in standing milo or downed (lodged) milo. It does not shatter heads as some machines do.

Lloyd Hugelmann, Wakefield, saw the machine work on his fields. He said 40 per cent of some grain had been lost with some devices he had used whereas the Laurel man's device was leaving only 5 to 6 per cent of the grain "under the poorest conditions."

"It is basically sound," Hugelmann said. "It performed well in my fields and I have a lot of faith in it. There is not a machine on the market now that will do the job this unit will."

Patent rights have been obtained and it is planned to put it into production. It is believed See LOCAL MEN — page two

At 2 p.m. a telephone call to The Herald revealed his body had been found about 100 yards from the car. He had apparently died of a heart attack.

His car was found stalled in the creek. It was thought he might have left it there so fields in the immediate area were being thoroughly searched by volunteers.

## Former Wayne Man Chosen South Dakota College Coach of 1965 by Newspapers

Gordon Zapp, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Zapp, Wayne, was revealed Thursday as "College Coach of the Year" in South Dakota. The choice was made by the South Dakota Sports Writers association.

Zapp led his Dakota Wesleyan university team from its usual dormat spot in the South Dakota Intercollegiate conference to the school's best record in 50 years. The Tigers finished in a tie for second with a 4-2 record and a seasonal record of 7 wins and 2 losses.

It was 1916 when the DW team last had that good a record. Zapp started rebuilding as soon as he got there, posted a 3-6 mark the first season and a 5-3-1 record in 1964 before his 1965 efforts produced the 7-2 mark.

He spent two years as football coach at Carlisle, Ia., another year at Missouri Valley. Last one season at Wayne State college as a graduate assistant and one year as head coach at Wayne high before moving to Dakota Wesleyan in 1963. He has concentrated recruiting on the Nebraska-Iowa area with 17 of his 1965 squad coming from those two states.

He is quoted as saying he believes strongly in competitive athletics as a builder of men. "However," he contends, "in order to achieve anything from athletics it takes a 100 per cent effort. Speed and desire as far as I'm concerned," he concluded, "are the most important attributes for an athlete. Without the latter, you have nothing."

Zapp believes the football field is a good place to impress upon kids that success in life comes only by hard work. By the time the first game rolls around each season, his squad is made up of those who like football. He says the ones who won't "pay the price" in practice won't pay the price in a game.

Zapp loses only one starter through graduation this year. South Dakota papers speculate that he could have an even more successful season in 1966.

Jim Wilson, sports editor of The Daily Republic, Mitchell, paid tribute to Zapp, devoting an entire column to him the day the honor was named. Zapp, his wife and three daughters were all pictured in the newspaper.

Wilson said Zapp had insisted upon "organization" from the start and that has been a big factor in his success. He added that DWU has a small budget and funds for recruiting are limited but Zapp used the available money wisely and with other coaches he has brought in boys who are a credit to the school in the classrooms as well as on the field.

He added that DWU is one of the few colleges in the nation with a two-man coaching staff. Both have had to compensate for the problem by working long hours and running practices on a rigid schedule to take advantage of every minute available with athletes.

Wilson's final paragraph says: "Zapp's achievements on the gridiron certainly warrant the honor bestowed on him today. We're lucky to have him in Mitchell."

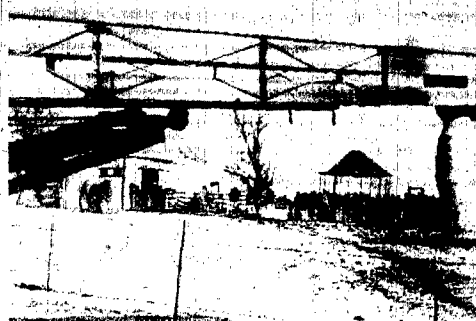

## 'Peace and Prosperity' Predicted by Authority

By Roger Babson

"Peace and Prosperity" should continue to be the dominant theme in 1966. President Johnson will push ahead in attempts to capitalize on the mood he has already made with his Great Society program. However, since 1961 will be a Congressional election year, he may find the going less easy than it was this past year; the Congressmen and Senators who are up for re-election will likely think twice before being so generous with the taxpayers' money.

I, of course, would like nothing better than to be completely optimistic in this Forecast but my more than 60 years of experience in predicting trends has taught me that unexpected events are most dangerous when conditions are brightest.

1. The health of world leaders may well be a prime factor in 1966. These include President de Gaulle, Mao Tse-tung, and even President Johnson.

2. Perhaps the biggest threat in 1966 will come from abroad. There is evidence that the coalition leadership in Russia may be centralizing into the hands of a strongman — something not seen since the Khrushchev ouster. Moreover, Africa could again hold the spotlight in the shifting pattern of the "cold war".

3. I do not look for war with Russia during 1966. Russia is still greatly concerned with trying to bring prosperity to her own people and is especially troubled about the lag in farm productivity.

4. The struggle for power within Russia may come to a head in 1966. If the strongman is anti-West, he could try to put on a good show by heating up the "cold war"; but this should constitute no more than threatening gestures, and bold talk.

5. The Berlin crisis is not likely to be a major issue in 1966, though there could be some nuisance events to "try our patience".

6. I do not foresee all-out war with Red China in 1966. Mao is not yet ready to risk major confrontation. His lagging farm and industrial programs still loom as major problems, and the task of extending Red China's nuclear progress is a heavy burden.

7. The foremost task for Red China still is to get a seat in the United Nations. While Southeast Asia is an attractive plum, territorial expansion may well have to wait in Red China's timetable, as a peaceful profile on her part would make gaining a seat at the UN easier. UN admission, of course, would greatly enhance Red China's prestige in dealings with the Afro-Asian nations.

8. Despite talks of a prolonged struggle in Vietnam, I forecast that it will be increasingly clear that the balance has swung our way. This should encourage our leaders to step up our commitment in Vietnam in 1966 in order to force a "peace conference".

- I foresee no crisis over Cuba in 1966. The agreement Castro has made to allow more Cuban refugees to enter the U.S.A. underscores the problem he has in feeding his people.
- The Vietnam situation and the Dominican Republic incident have convinced the Administration that the military might of our nation must be maintained at a "ready" basis. This means stepped-up defense spending, which should add another prop to the economy.
- While such defense spending will focus heavily upon conventional military equipment, our space program will not be neglected. Having come from behind in the space race, the Administration is not likely to falter and allow Russia to open another wide gap.
- The increase in defense notwithstanding, I forecast that the economy will be hard pressed to match the fantastic achievements of the past four years. Threats of major labor strikes have been playing an important role in stimulating inventory accumulations from time to time to keep things rolling along. I do look for industrial production to edge to a new high. However, I fear the peak will come before midyear and taper off thereafter. On the whole the business climate in 1966 may well prove to be one of high-level stability rather than of vigorous climb.
- Business capital expenditures, which have been a key factor in prolonging the business boom, should remain a strong bolstering influence. However, I predict that they will not provide as much in the way of upthrust for the economy as in the past two years.
- Business inventory accumulation, likewise, a big factor in the boom, should also become a less vigorous expansionary force. Perhaps fears of inflationary price increases will encourage businessmen to maintain a healthy volume of inventories; but unless war threats intensify, I see no need to pile up much more in inventories.
- Consumers will have more money to spend in 1966. I forecast a further uptrend in personal incomes to a new high ground. An important influence in this respect is the impact of automatic wage increases which are called for in existing multi-year labor pacts.
- Also, I predict a further rise in the general structure of wage rates, as many secondary labor unions seek to match the gains of the auto and steel workers.
- Unless another federal tax cut is enacted—which now seems remote in view of the war effort and the present fiscal deficit—ret income after taxes may not rise as rapidly as gross income. The social security tax rate is scheduled for a step-up. Also, higher state and local taxes—including sales levies—will place more of a burden on consumers.
- The all-important employment situation should remain generally good. We have seen the greatest portion of the rise in manufacturing employment. However, employment in government payrolls at all levels, and in services, should continue to score sizable gains.
- I forecast no radical change in the jobless picture. Let me warn readers, however, that the problem is far from solved, and in coming years we may well have to reckon with it. The draft step-up only temporarily eases things and gives a false sense of well-being.
- Retail trade should enjoy another excellent year. Much of the gain in dollar volume, of course, will come from price rises. Nevertheless, as long as personal incomes, employment, and business hold high, consumer confidence will encourage spending.
- Spending for food, apparel, and general merchandise should continue upward; also for leisure-time and vacation lines. Color television is catching on, and I look for continued strong demand in this field.
- The automobile business will not be left out in the spending spree. It will enjoy another prosperous year; but I foresee no significant upsurge beyond the high levels of the past two years.
- In view of the drain on our gold supplies, the government has been endeavoring to promote domestic travel and vacations. Nevertheless, I forecast further interest in foreign vacations. In one sense, I am happy to see this. I have done considerable foreign traveling, and I feel that such activity is definitely advantageous. Furthermore, I feel that foreign travel can help Americans to wake up to the advantages here at home and make them more thankful for the blessings they enjoy.
- Many readers—especially those retired and living on pensions and social security—are worried about the threat of inflation. I forecast no radical inflation during 1966. The Administration is committed to "non-inflationary progress". However, some price increases appear unavoidable.
- I predict that the greater danger will lie in credit inflation, rather than in price inflation.
- With the rise in defense spending and the cost of legislation for the Great Society, the federal budget will suffer a sizable deficit. In addition, states and municipalities are unable and unwilling to live within their means. Consumers will also go further into debt.
- Look for new increases in the cost-of-living index. The government may try to head off substantial price hikes in key areas, but selective price rises will occur.
- Industrial commodity prices should remain firm to higher, particularly in the first half of 1966. The primary bulwark against a price runaway is competition, which should be basically more effective than government influence.
- I look for an increase in domestic competition in 1966. This should become more evident as the business upthrust tapers off. Also, we must not forget foreign competition. With many nations feeling the pinch of a dollar shortage, they will work to remedy

- Those who invest (not speculate) on the basis of growth will sleep better nights. I have in mind the expanding population, rising income, scientific advances, greater leisure, and those of all impact of the Great Society.
- Investors should be pleased with cash dividend payments in 1966. I forecast they will show another increase. I would also expect a rash of stock dividends and stock splits, particularly in the first half of the year.
- If businessmen, consumers, and investors do not act voluntarily to keep inflationary pressures and speculation from getting out of hand, the monetary authorities may be forced to raise margin requirements on stock purchases, and perhaps tighten credit further.
- Look for somewhat lower bond prices in 1966. Although we are not in immediate danger of credit exhaustion, the banking system is under some strain from the rapid expansion of credit in recent years. My advice is to buy bonds which mature in five years or less. The time to buy longer-term bonds will come when the yields on short-term bonds exceed those on long-term issues.
- The dollar will not be devalued in 1966. Possibility of devaluation of the British pound will undoubtedly come to the fore again, but additional effort will probably be made to keep the pound from "going under". I fear, however, that all this is only "buying time" that devaluation of the pound may be inevitable.
- I foresee no cure for the outflow of gold from America's shores in 1966. However, in view of the importance of the U.S. in international trade and world monetary considerations, foreign bankers will be reluctant to withdraw their gold en masse. Bear in mind also that there is no country that can match our industrial and military might . . . and that, among the leading nations, the United States has suffered least
- Hence, I forecast that real estate conditions will remain selective. Well-located sites for homes and industrial and commercial complexes will do well, but study of local conditions is imperative.
- I predict, a further increase in farm land values in 1966. With costs still rising, the physical size of farms must expand so operators can benefit from mechanization. This places a premium on well-located land in the important and larger agricultural regions.
- The steady advance toward fuller automation should make further progress in 1966, helping industry to cope with rising operating costs and shorter work weeks.
- Trees do not grow to the skies; neither does the stock market rise upendingly. While I forecast that the stock market—as measured by the Dow-Jones Industrial—can surpass the high mark of 1965, I anticipate a volatile 1966 market with a good-sized drop-off a real possibility sometime during the year.
- Even though the stock market may push up to new highs, any further advance may not bulk large percentage-wise. If business and corporate profits show a tendency to taper off, the fundamental basis for a worthwhile advance will be removed.
- Speculative enthusiasm and inflation fears can be expected to figure prominently in the stock market during the course of 1966. The urge to make a quick buck is increasingly evident.
- I forecast that 1966 will not be the time for illogical speculation and gambling in the stock market. Above all, let me remind readers of the dangers of using borrowed money to buy stocks. Those who "go off the deep end" may well regret it before very long.

In order that we may assist you with filing your Personal Schedule according to law, it will be necessary for you to bring the following records with you at the time of assessment:

- Social Security number (if joint return, both husband and wife)
- Records showing items of equipment and fixtures as to type, model, year and cost (as ANY incomplete schedules will be returned). Also the list of equipment that has been depreciated out. This includes schedules from all taxpayers.

Farm records showing the number of head, age and type of livestock in your care as of January 1, 12:01 a.m., 1966, and records of inventory. Records showing the amount of each of the following: Money, checks, draft and checking accounts, bank accounts and certificates of deposits, savings accounts, postal savings, accounts receivable including Commodity Credits, Storage Receivables, Shares of stocks (number of shares, name and type), stocks or shares of Building and Loan Associations, securities, debentures and bonds (except U.S. Government bonds), notes, due bills, annuities, royalties, judgments, claims and demands for money.

Also records as to property and intangibles that you may have in your control, such as those of a wife, son, daughter or other members of the family. A schedule must be filed by those Trustee's, Guardian's, Administrator's and etc.

We wish to bring to the attention of all taxpayers, who own shares of stock, that the Legislature passed a law requiring all foreign corporations to send a list of stock-holders names, addresses and number of shares owned, to the State Tax Commissioner, who in turn will have schedules checked for the listing of such stocks. We advise owners of such property to declare a complete return to avoid a penalty, which would be 200% of the tax due.

Failure to bring the afore mentioned records will prevent us from assisting you in completing your schedule. A number of our taxpayers are already following this practice. It now becomes necessary that ALL TAXPAYERS do so.

All new improvements added to your real estate must be reported. A 50% penalty is added to the value of the improvements if not reported.

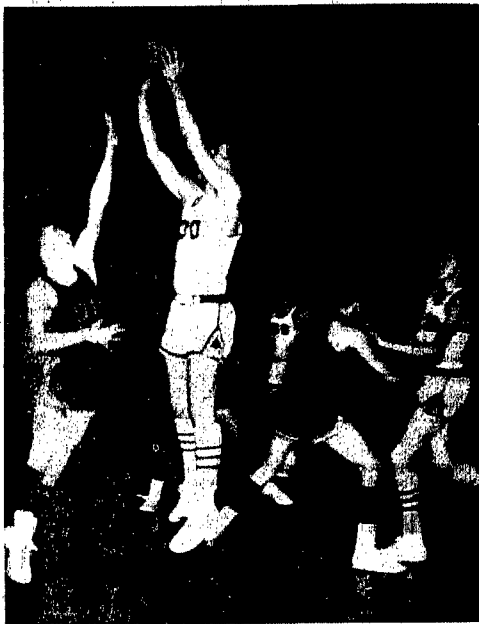

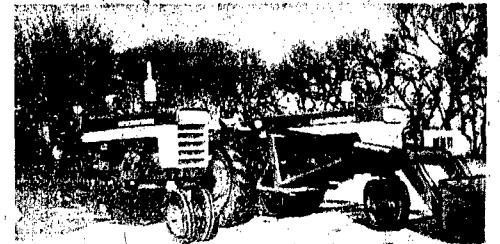
