## Building Work on Wayne Schools Completed

Work on two District 17 school houses is completed. Supt. Francis Haun reported at the school board meeting Monday night. Plans are now going forward on construction of the new high school.

Forrest Nottelton and Bill Vahlkamp were in charge of some changes ordered by the state fire marshal at Carroll elementary school. These changes, including new exit door in the northeast corner of the basement, were completed last week.

At Wayne the main work has been the remodeling job at the high school. Work on the roof is finished and workmen have cleared up the debris which has been flying from roof to ground.

All contracts for the new school have been let except for the one for the science equipment. Attorney Budd Bornhoff has also checked all school bonds, insurance and contracts and reports all are in order.

Brick for the new building has been selected. It will be mottled brownish-red and all red. Some bricks will be rough and others comparatively smooth to add contrast. Yankee Hill Brick Co., Lincoln, will supply these.

Adult education plans are almost complete. Details are expected next week on shop, bookkeeping, slim-nastics for women, intermediate knitting, interior decorating, beginning sewing, advanced sewing and other courses that may be offered.

Interest rates going up proved of interest to the board. First National bank sent word that the last \$100,000 invested will draw higher interest rates, about 4.70 per cent. This means the money for the school will produce more money than had been estimated earlier when interest rates were lower.

First Semester Ending  
Does it seem as if school just started for the 1965-66 term? It shouldn't for the second semester will be underway in just over two weeks. Supt. Francis Haun pointed out that first semester ends Friday, Jan. 28, and the second semester starts the following Monday.

Forensic Unit Initiated for WHS Pupils  
An affiliate unit of the National Forensic league has been formed at Wayne high school. As far as can be determined it is the first time such a unit has been active here.

County Commissioners Raise Salaries for Many Officers  
Wayne county commissioners have set higher salaries for seven officers and left an eighth salary the same. Two other county officers have salaries set by state law so there is no change.

Biggest jump is an \$800 a year hike for the superintendent and the sheriff. Where they have been getting \$4,200, they will now be getting \$5,000 each year.

Three other officers will get \$600 a year pay hikes. The clerk, assessor and treasurer have been getting \$4,800 and that has been boosted to \$5,400 a year.

Smaller raises were approved for the county attorney and the clerk of the district court. Their salaries were raised \$400, from \$4,200 to \$4,600 a year. Unchanged is the county veterans service officer's salary, still \$1,800 a year.

The judge gets the highest salary, \$5,500 a year. Commissioners get \$2,400 a year. Salaries for these officers are set by the legislature. Salaries are set once every four years by the commissioners so these salaries will be in effect at least until 1970.

## Commission Approves Board Plan for City Parking Meters

Should Wayne have parking meters in certain areas? The planning commission met Monday night and recommended to the city council that the meters be approved.

The council had sought an opinion on the matter but will make the final decision itself. Action of the planning commission (which was also named zoning commission recently) was to lend support to the idea.

Proposed is a group of about 100 meters. They would be in places where the present 15 minute parking zones are. All other spaces would provide free parking but for a few cents a vehicle could be parked in a meter zone.

The idea apparently stems from the fact it is difficult to police 15 minute zones for violators. However, with meters a violation can be spotted at once by checking the "violation flags."

In other action, the planning commission recommended approval of one building permit and recommended turning down another. A major thoroughfare plan for Wayne streets was considered but not approved.

The building permit for a new Masonic temple at Tenth and Lincoln was recommended for approval. Recommended for rejection was an application by Richard Carmon to remodel a house in an R-1 district (located at 925 9th Walnut street) to accommodate four families. Zoning of the town places the area in a part of town where one-family dwellings are standing and a multiple unit dwelling would not come under this classification so the commission thought it should be rejected.

Zoning regulations will be discussed at a public meeting Tuesday, Feb. 15, at 7 p.m. in the city auditorium. A map of the zoning recommended for the city will appear in an edition of The Wayne Herald later this month.

Wayne Airmen on Show  
Wednesday, Jan. 19, at 8 p.m., the Bob Hope show filmed in Vietnam will be shown. Of more than average interest is the word that a Wayne man, Melvin Ahlers, was one of these photographed sitting on a fire truck. He will be seen for a short time only but friends and acquaintances will want to tune in because this is a most interesting type of program. If all and this one will have added interest.

Two Filings Open County's Campaign for Top Offices  
With nine posts coming up for election this year, filing has started in Wayne county. Two filings the past week opened the campaign officially in the county.

Looga Bahde, county treasurer since 1954, has filed for re-election to that post. Roy Davis, Winside, has filed for commissioner from District 2, a position now held by Honey Holmbeck.

Only the county judge and one commissioner can rest easy. The judge and District 2 commissioner posts are not up for election this year.

Those that are to be elected are: Treasurer, clerk, assessor, sheriff, attorney, superintendent, clerk of the district court and commissioners from District 1 and 3. All are for four-year terms.

Filing deadline for these offices is Thursday, Mar. 10. The election will be held in April.

Sewer Petitions Start in Carroll  
Carroll, not content to rest on laurels already tossed that way, is considering a sewer system. Petitions are being circulated which would put the matter up for a vote of the people.

The project was explained at the meeting of the Carroll village board Wednesday night of last week. The board took no action but agreed to hold an election if the people petitioned for it.

Phil Olson represented the group proposing the sewer system for the town. Members of the board gave advice on the requirements for bringing such a matter up for vote.

## Omaha Man Dies Hunting Monday

An Omaha hunter, David Kruse, was found dead in a pasture two miles west of Winside Monday. He is thought to have died of a heart attack as he had a record of heart trouble.

Kruse and his wife had gone west of town, where he parked. He then proceeded by himself hunting pheasants while his wife waited in the car.

When he did not return after a longer time than expected, his wife became worried. She started walking along the railroad in the direction he had gone.

In the meantime, a railroad section crew had seen a man lying in the pasture. They found he was dead and were enroute to Winside to report when they saw Mrs. Kruse, assumed she might be looking for the man and notified her.

County Attorney Charles McDermett was called to the scene in the absence of Sheriff Don Weible. Death was confirmed as coming from natural causes.

## Shoplifters Have Record Success

Two cases of shoplifting were reported in Wayne Monday. The stores involved reported that in each case only music records were taken.

Wayne Book store had the larger loss. An inventory was just about to get underway so it is thought between 50 and 60 album-type records were taken.

Across the street at Barner TV & Appliance store, the story was almost the same. The management had just completed an inventory and discovered 46 stereo albums were missing.

All of the albums were good ones, most of them stereo. How the shoplifters could walk out with that many records and not be detected is a mystery to store owners and clerks.

The police department was called but no good clues were turned up. One man had noticed a car with out a front license plate that might have been involved but this information would have helped only if all and this one will have added interest.

## Brownings Please Crowd Tuesday at C of C Dinner

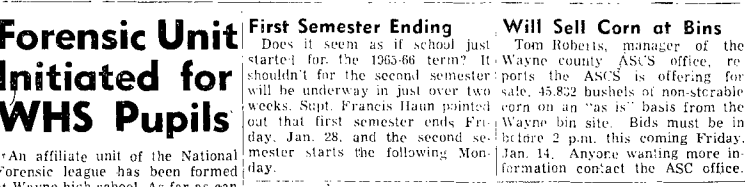

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### Repeat Radio Broadcast

### Set Special Conference

Cal Comstock, manager of the Wayne County Public Power district, reports a two-day conference in Lincoln may be of special interest to area farmers. He has information on it if anyone cares to phone or see him. It is a conference on "Ventilation for Livestock Housing," and covers dairy barns, hog houses, poultry sheds and other farm building ventilation. Purpose is to give a basic understanding of problems involved in livestock housing, the solution to problems and aid in developing better methods of designing, selecting and installing ventilation. The conference will be held in Lincoln Jan. 20-21.

### Leaders Learning More About Area

Starting off with some challenging questions, 50 extension leaders from Northeast Nebraska attended the study discussion training session at North-east station, Concord, Jan. 5-6, according to Denzil Clegg, area extension supervisor.

Questions included: Are there job opportunities for the young in this area? Per capita income is low here so are we slower to change as compared to other areas of the state? Young leadership tends to migrate but how can we keep it?

What kind of education should young people have? How do we inform people of job opportunities? What is the quality of living in Nebraska? How do we rank in our area. Best Evans, NU economist, and Jack Timmons, NU political scientist, presented information based on six human resource development leaflets: People, Jobs and Economic Growth; Our Manpower Employment Situation; When People Move; Americans on the Move; Education and Training; and Policy Alternatives for Increasing Employment Opportunities.

Those attending also learned Nebraska state and county economic and social data; John Orr, NU specialist in young adult work, presented information on methods and techniques for group discussions; and experience was given in working with discussion type programs. Each member attending is now trained to conduct local discussion meetings on "People in Nebraska's Future." Anyone interested in the subject of human resource development should contact their county agent or a participant in this training course.

### AFS Chapter Forms Filed for Student

At present all help on raising the needed money is greatly appreciated as the goal is still quite a ways away.

### More Support Use Has Effect on Local Price

More widespread use of price support loans by soybean producers has been an important factor in the recent rise of 20 to 25 cents a bushel in soybean prices, according to John H. Mohr, chairman of the Wayne County AFS.

Mohr said, "Soybean prices dropped sharply last fall as harvesting of a record 1965 crop began. Farmers, in an effort to strengthen prices, have been holding considerably larger quantities off the market under the price support program this year."

Over 48 million bushels have been put under loan, three times the amount a year ago. Loans are easier to get under a simplified procedure for farm-stored crops. Price supports usually go up, but mainly after producers have sold beans. This year, larger participation in the price support program will give farmers the benefit of the late season price advances, Mohr pointed out.

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

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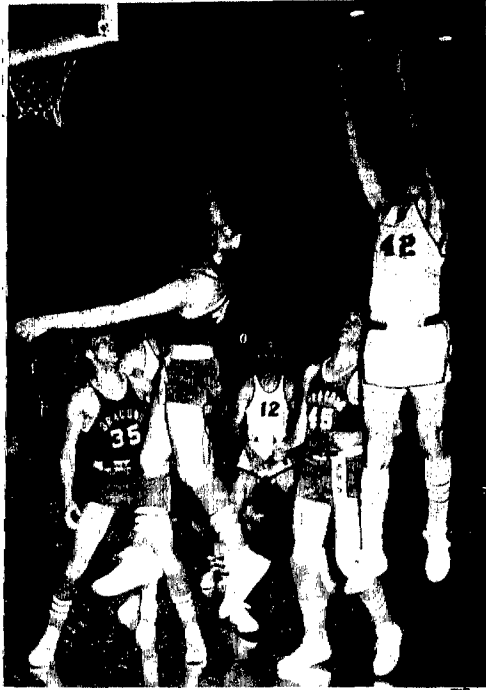

## WSC Wins 100th for Svenningson; Loses Next Night to Same Chadron Squad

Wayne State's basketball squad was prepared in advance for reaching a milestone Friday night. And they reached it — achieving the 100th victory of a Wayne cage team

coached by Al Svenningson. To commemorate the event, the Wildcats presented Coach Al a plaque noting his century victory since coming to Wayne as head basketball coach in 1959.

He began this season with a record of 93 wins, 56 losses, and two conference co-championships. Friday night, as the record stood at 99-59, the Wildcats met the Chadron State Eagles on the Rice court and after a close start set about getting that victory No. 100 in convincing style.

By halftime they amassed a 46-29 advantage, including 20 points by senior forward Dennis Neubrand. After intermission, the Eagles soared within three points, 56-63, but slipped back as the Cats rallied to an 87-75 decision. Neubrand finished with 26, Dean deBuhr with 24.

It was the Neubrand-deBuhr combination mainly that frustrated Chadron defenses. Geared to stop deBuhr, Chadron suddenly found Neubrand scoring merrily with a dazzling assortment of shots, many of them on lightning plays that fed him under the basket.

Then the second half Eagle strategy aimed at stopping Neubrand, but deBuhr picked up the onslaught with 17 in the closing 20 minutes.

Newcomer Gary Tewell, an air force veteran who became eligible for play during the Christmas tournament, indicated he will be a valuable addition. A husky 6-4 and about 230 pounds, Tewell scored seven and gathered five rebounds in brief action.

Came Saturday night and the visiting Eagles evened the series with a close 70-65 verdict which was not decided until 11 seconds remained. At four minutes left, the count was tied at 61. At 1:40, Chadron led, 67-65, and there the score remained through frenzied maneuvers until a Wayne foul at 11 seconds gave the Eagles a one-and-one free throw opportunity. Jerry Bartak hit the first for a three-point lead, then missed the bonus shot, but Joe Johnson snared the rebound and tipped in his 30th point.

Chilly Wayne shooting from the field, 39 per cent, contrasted with 51.6 per cent Friday night, and that difference showed up in the won-lost figures.

For Chadron, the Saturday victory had special savor. It was the first after nine straight losses to

### Wintry Weather Takes Over in This Region

For those who had doubts, winter is here. The past week was the convincer after the area had enjoyed some balmy days that ordinarily are not on the menu for Northeast Nebraska.

The mercury dipped below zero two nights and for three days the temperature was never higher than 24 degrees. Sunday it started warming up again and it appeared that more mild weather was in store.

It was, but only until Wednesday morning. A freezing drizzle started falling and then turned to snow, bringing less than an inch of the white stuff by noon Wednesday. Under the snow was a glaze of ice.

State National bank gauges showed .12 of an inch of moisture in the drizzle and snow up until 8 a.m., which took in most of the moisture-producing period. Sidewalks, streets and roads were hazardous even with this light bit of cold moisture.

Forecasters were calling for warming temperatures through the weekend with more moisture on Sunday. This may not be too reliable — they never forecast this moisture until it was practically falling already.

### What Would You Do In This Situation?

Suppose you were a farmer living near Wayne and dogs attacked your stock? Would you shoot the dogs? Would you call the sheriff? Would you just hope it didn't happen too often?

A Wayne area farmer has the problem and he does not know which way to go. He hates to shoot a neighbor's dogs (if they are neighbors' dogs) and he also doesn't like to shoot a licensed dog from town (if they are from town).

However, he cannot keep on losing out in so many ways on his feeding program. He is just hoping those with dogs will keep them home and there will be no problem.

Last Wednesday night dogs attacked his cattle in his feed lot. The cattle and calves were so "spooked" they were almost impossible to round up the next day and it will take a while before they are normal, even the slightest noise or fast movement frightening them now.

The cows went over the fence, through the fence and into fields Wednesday. In the process they broke down two steel posts, a braced corner, a wooden post and some strong woven wire.

The cattle were cut and scratched on the faces and heads by the wires. About 50 head were scattered all over the farm, 13 of them quite a ways from the feed pens and too spooky to come back in for many hours even though hungry and thirsty.

Two years ago the same farmer lost several pigs when dogs attacked. He was able to identify the dogs and was partially repaid but no one could repay him for the setback in growth the stock underwent.

Easy to get along with, he doesn't want to shoot a dog. However, he feels duty bound to protect his stock, save his fence and preserve his investment.

Town residents whose dogs roam at night might take note. Farmers having dogs that run loose at night may determine if their dogs could be involved. No one wants it to happen to their stock so they should understand this farmer's feelings.

# First of Four Dryland Corn and Sorghum Workshops Scheduled Jan. 18 in Emerson

The special programs director, Dr. Robert Johnson, had this comment on Miss Tureck's stature:

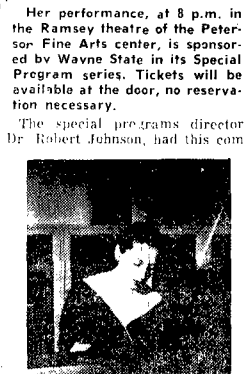
"Having heard her play, 'You've never really heard Bach until you've heard Miss Tureck!'"

# Police Warnings Outnumber Arrests by Over Ten to One

A report by Chief of Police Vern Fairchild shows the Wayne police department "enjoyed" another busy year. Of particular interest is the fact warnings issued outnumbered arrests by over ten to one.

The report for 1965 was prepared for the city council this week. It covered almost every phase of police activity from traffic accidents to radio messages.

There were 1,330 traffic warnings and 437 other warnings issued for a total of 1,767. Total arrests came to 141 with fines totaling \$2,580.

Improper parking and speeding (checked by radar) were the most frequent offenses for warnings with 20 each. They brought in \$190 and \$205 respectively and only one case was dismissed, that involving an alleged parking of fence.

Other offenses for which arrests were involved were: Disorderly conduct, 14; improper turns and speeding (non-radar), 13 each; petty larceny, 9; minor in possession of alcohol and stop sign violations, 6 each; driver's license violations and careless driving, 4 each;

Trespassing and carrying a concealed weapon, 3 each; vandalism, drunk driving, driving with more than .15 alcohol in blood, reckless driving, hit and run and intoxication, 2 each;

Driving with license suspended, following too close, failure to yield right-of-way, stop light violation, vagrancy, procuring liquor for a minor, disturbing the peace, destruction of property, provoking assault, obtaining money under false pretenses, breaking and entering, forgery and indecent exposure, 1 each.

Eight were released in custody of parents; eight agreed to work for the city; six complaints were not filed; six were dismissed; four were placed on probation; four received jail sentences; three had driver's licenses suspended; one speeding (non-radar), 13 each; was released and told to leave town and one charge was changed.

The policemen handled 712 complaints and requests for police service; took or sent 891 radio messages; handled 95 criminal complaints; cleared 26 criminal cases; made 19 criminal arrests; impounded 19 animals;

Drove 31,443 miles with police car, used 3,814 gallons of gas in the police car; investigated 167 accidents in the city plus five on the WSC campus; and issued 1,767 warnings. A 24-hour patrol of the town was kept.

The police are responsible for turning the traffic signals off at midnight and back on in the morning. They also check business houses on foot patrol and kept constant patrol on city streets.

The job is so big an additional policeman has been authorized for the force. Present members are Chief Fairchild, E. L. Hailey, Keith Reed and S. C. Thompson. Relief and part-time officers are Dick Hansen and Duane Henn.

# EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

You may not agree with an editorial -- but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

## No Parking

Wayne businessmen in general are pretty faithful in keeping their cars off the main business district streets. Employees also have the habit of leaving the main parking spaces for prospective customers.

With the advantages of no parking meters, it would seem foolish to discourage the people we're trying to attract by filling them up with our own cars. Some firms have private parking on their alley space and this helps the situation immensely.

One Wayne businessman has come up with a remarkable suggestion on another parking problem. He feels that the city should not permit parking on any residential streets at night. Right away the groans, moans, pleas and taunts will start.

No street parking at all? It's not impossible. In fact, in areas where no parking is allowed from midnight to 5 a.m., the property owners have put in parking stalls. The result is street cleaning is easier, snow removal is faster and children are safer with no cars to run between.

This is not to advocate such a plan, it is merely passing along an idea which came up among residents, brought gasps at first and finally appeared more logical than expected at first.

Parking is a problem now and will be a bigger problem in the future, both in the business and residential areas. A lot of plans to solve the problem may be offered. For your consideration, the above is one of them.

Let's hope you parents can be good for a year so the kids can have this event again. You youngsters might remind your folks that you want it under any arrangements possible and win or lose you want them to agree that those having anything at all to do with the contest are doing their best.

## Petition Signing

Another petition drive is going to be tried in Wayne county. On the previous sign-up campaign The Herald advised signing. On this one the advice is to refrain from signing.

Sponsored by the Nebraska School Improvement association, a petition drive is scheduled in this county asking that the county be "included out" of the area educational service unit plan. Outsiders have already come in to tell us what is best for us.

What they're deciding is that Wayne county does not want help for the retarded children — help the county alone cannot afford.

Wayne county doesn't need a nearby trade school, they would have you believe. (And, who is to say, a trade school for this area might even be located in Wayne because of the college facilities available).

You are asked to sign right now, to kill this issue before it is understood. Why they are in such a hurry is puzzling. Give the area a chance to find out what is planned. Wayne county can always withdraw. A blanket request to be left out of any planning is an invitation to the area to consider only other localities for the training this county alone cannot provide.

The Northeast Experiment station could not have been provided by Wayne county alone. Thanks to efforts from the area counties, it is providing services for all Northeast Nebraska. A similar idea in education cannot work, so sign a petition to be left out, the NSIA urges.

There is plenty of time to sign later when we see what is offered. Let's don't cut our own throat before we even know what benefits are to be enjoyed.

Control of Wayne county schools will remain in Wayne county no matter what anyone tells you. Don't sign a petition now that indicates you did not understand what was going on.

Be especially leery of anyone who suggests it is imperative to sign such petitions at once. There is no deadline. A county can withdraw later and not lose services in all fields involved. Don't sign these petitions. — CEG

# Guessing Morrison's Plans State's Political Puzzle

LINCOLN — Nebraska's most popular political parlor game — called "What's Morrison going to do?" — should come to a dramatic end soon this new year.

Democratic Gov. Frank B. Morrison is expected to announce his plans before mid-February.

Whatever the decision, a host of other potential candidates on both sides of the political aisle will follow up by announcing their intentions. They want to know what the Governor is going to do first.

Most observers think Morrison is considering three alternatives — running for the U. S. Senate, another term as Governor, or pressing for an appointment to a federal judgeship.

The senate seat up for grabs next November is now held by Republican Carl T. Curtis, a tough campaigner.

Morrison admits the challenge of a senate seat — a challenge that once caused him defeat — is attractive. But he must also ponder the question that many Nebraskans are asking: Is his prestige and popularity at a high enough level to upset the state's tradition of voting Republican in a U.S. Senate race.

The 60-year-old Morrison already knows who his probable Republican opponent will be if he seeks an unprecedented fourth consecutive term as Governor.

Former three-term Gov. Val Peterson of Hastings announced last fall he would file for the GOP gubernatorial nomination and at this point he's considered the likely candidate.

would be a dandy. Both are popular with Nebraska voters and both are relentless and effective debaters.

Other key races this fall will be for the state's three U.S. House seats, lieutenant governor and state treasurer.

At this point, there appear to be a number of bidders for the jobs.

## Director Named

Governor Morrison has appointed Mark A. Seamark, 32, of Lincoln to head the Nebraska Division of Employment.

The Governor announced a salary of \$9,300 for Seamark, who has been personnel officer for the division since July of 1960. His salary will be paid wholly from federal funds.

Seamark succeeds William E. (Pat) Daugherty of Lincoln as director. Daugherty resigned last Sept. 15 to become Nebraska's new budget officer.

Seamark was selected by the Governor from a field of 10 candidates. Competitive merit system examinations were given all nominees.

## Program to Expand

State Welfare Director John Gage expects several more Nebraska counties soon will participate in the federally-sponsored food stamp program for low-income families.

He said Sapp, Scotts Bluff, Banner, Sheridan and Morrill could join Lancaster and Saunders counties in the program this year.

Under the program, low-income families including those receiving welfare aid, are able

to purchase food stamps at a discount to exchange for staple foods.

Gage said it has a double purpose: Safeguarding the health of the state's poor families through better nutrition, and increasing the flow of food produced by farmers through normal trade channels.

## Penalty No Longer Levied

State Banking director Henry E. Ley has urged firms with large retirement investments outside Nebraska to return them to the state.

He said a 1965 law exempts retirement and trust funds from the state's intangible property tax law.

"I would ask all firms, including public utilities, to return these funds to Nebraska and place them in our banks if at all possible," Ley said. "They no longer will be penalized for their investments."

Last month Consumers Public Power District announced it is transferring a \$9 million employee retirement fund from a Chicago to a Lincoln bank because of the new legislation.

## Employment Rises

The number of Nebraskans working on non-farm jobs increased during fiscal 1965, the State Division of Employment reports, although not as rapidly as for the nation as a whole.

The division said 406,300 Nebraska residents held wage and salary positions during the 12-month period ended last June 30, compared with 400,400 for the comparable period a year earlier.

A spokesman said the wage-and-salary classification does not include farm employment but the Labor Department considers it a key indicator of work trend.

Farm employment, the division said, continued its fast decline, dropping from 141,600 to 130,900.

## Moves Ahead With Plans

The Nebraska Board of Education is moving ahead with plans to locate a second state-operated trade school at Sidney in western Nebraska.

The board has requested 1,703 acres of the Sioux Army Depot west of the city to be set aside for the vocational-technical facility.

The application now rests with the General Services Administration, which has authority to turn desired land, buildings and equipment over to the state.

The last Legislature authorized the establishment of a trade school at Sidney. It allocated funds for the school.

## Delay Concerns Officials

A nationwide delay in appropriating federal funds for educational projects is causing state officials concern.

C. Edward Cavert, state administrator of the Federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act, said allocations were to be announced last month.

"Some of our projects were ready to go in October or November but now it looks like it will be February or later before they actually go into operation," he said.

Nebraska seeks \$949,851 under the act for projects at Omaha, Lincoln, Alliance, Grand Island and Webster County schools.

## Conditional Order Issued

The State Power Review Board has issued a conditional order authorizing the Platte Valley Public Power District to build a high-voltage electric transmission line between North Platte and Grand Island.

A meeting will be held Feb. 2 with Platte and other interested power agencies to discuss the tentative order.

The order was issued to avert further conflict and a possible lengthy hearing.

# Co. Agent's Column

Farm Records Necessary Successful farm management depends upon complete records kept regularly and carefully throughout the year.

With good records it is easy to make periodic checks of income and expenses to determine the approximate income to date. This permits business decisions which will result in the greatest net income.

There should be no conflict between a wise tax decision and a good farm business decision, as the choice resulting should be the one with the larger net income after taxes.

Farm account books suitable for keeping adequate records for farm business analysis and for tax purposes are available at all county agricultural Extension offices.

Rats Cause Fires Perhaps as many as 1 out of 4 farm fires of undetermined cause is started by rats.

Rats like to chew insulation on electric wires, which may cause short circuits resulting in fires.

The gnawing teeth of rats grow continuously, so these rodents gnaw to keep their teeth short and sharp. They can gnaw through wood, lead, hard board, some concrete and other building materials. Sheet metal or heavy hardware cloth will usually stop them.

Control of rats will reduce damage to buildings, increase farm income by less loss of feed and food grains to rat consumption and contamination.

Many serious diseases are carried by rats. Bubonic plague and typhus fever, carried by rats have killed more humans than all wars in history. Other diseases carried by rats are lep-

Norfolk Burns, pre-tourney favorite, displayed an awesome rebounding effort to shell Winside 60-37 in the finals of the Lewis & Clark conference basketball tournament at Emerson Friday. Emerson beat Ponca 65-44 for third place honors.

Burns had won a chance at the championship by beating Ponca 69-52 Thursday night. This was followed by a 49-37 Winside

defeat of Emerson. Burns-Winside Winside started out against Burns with an upset in mind. The Wildcat offense clicked for a 12-7 lead late in the first stanza. But starting from 13-9 in first period Burns took over and was never behind again after going in front 14-13 and outscoring Winside 12-2

to move to an early second period 27-15 advantage. At the end of the initial stanza it was 13-9 in favor of Winside. The Knights had a 29-20 advantage at halftime and 1 in the third period but lost the lead to 40-27. Another surge came in the fourth period when Burns moved from a 43-31 lead to a 56-33 advantage, outscoring WHIS in that spur 13-2. The Burns points came time after time on "seconds" or "thirds" as they continually out-rebounded the smaller Wildcats.

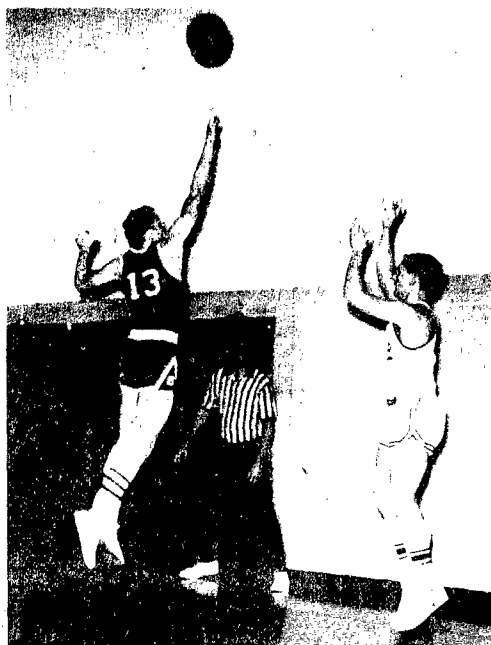

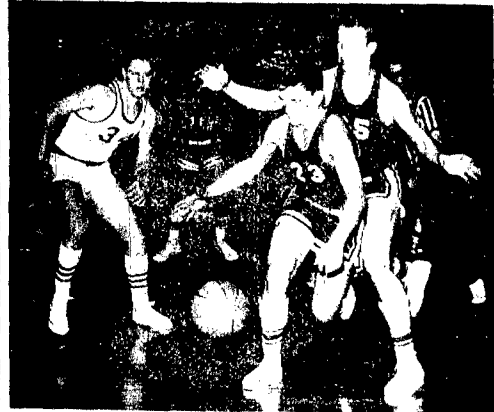

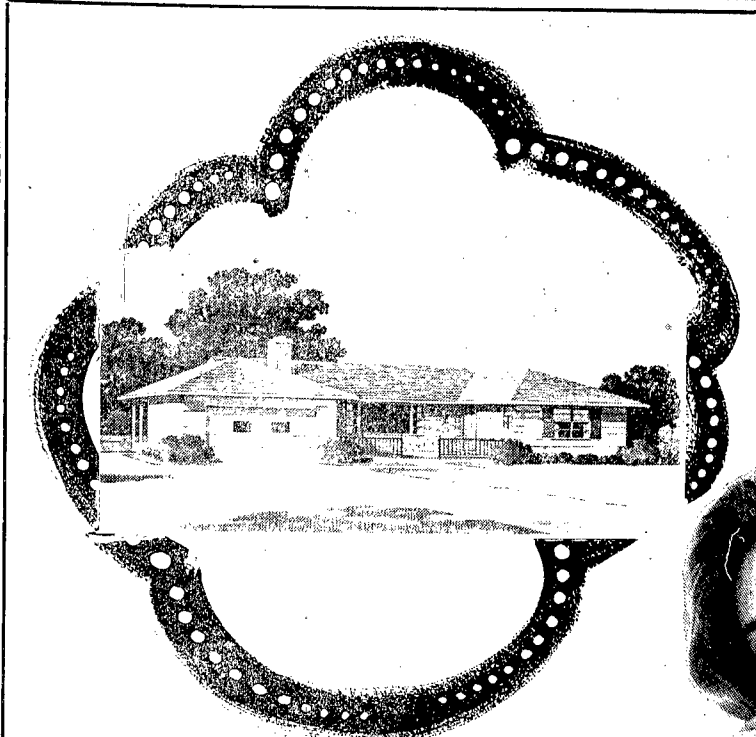
The right person found a billfold on the sidewalk in Wayne last week. A Winslow woman found the billfold near the bus station and took it once to the bus station.
