Eight WSC Students Presenting Recital

A free meal at noon, free gifts, valuable door prizes, movies and a lot of helpful information will be offered, according to Don Swanson, local chairman. Committee meetings are being held to make final arrangements.

Major sponsors are: Allys-Chalmers, planting and harvesting; DeKalb, corn and sorghum; Amchem, weed control; Shell, soil insect control; Purina, hogs; and Behlen, drying and storage. All their local retailers are helping.

Assisting in planning the event are Everett Rees, George Thorbeck, Alan Cramer, Richard Kern, Fred Gildersleeve, Leonard Schmid, Orville Sherry, Claire Larsen of Coleridge, Harold Leberg of Carroll, Russell Nash of Lincoln, Marvin John of Columbus, and Paul Grossardt, West Point.

Those attending will find booths with displays of all types to help them with their farm work. They will hear experts in every field and will attend panel discussions where more valuable information will be presented.

Purpose of the clinic is to acquaint farmers in the area with the latest research relative to successful raising of corn and beans, netting use of different hybrids and planting equipment and fertilizers. In the past, farmers have been shown that they can make as much as \$20 an acre more profit each year.

Last year a similar clinic was held at South Sioux City. This year the nearest points at which clinics will be held are Wayne and Columbus.

Details are being worked out weekly on the clinic and news stories each week until the clinic itself will tell the story of what is being offered, all at no cost. Farmers are being asked to mark calendars now to keep that date open for the big event.

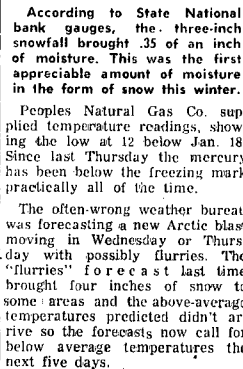
According to State National bank gauges, the three-inch snowfall brought .35 of an inch of moisture. This was the first appreciable amount of moisture in the form of snow this winter.

Peoples Natural Gas Co. supplied temperature readings, showing the low at 12 below Jan. 18. Since last Thursday the mercury has been below the freezing mark practically all of the time.

The often-wrong weather bureau was forecasting a new Arctic blast moving in Wednesday or Thursday with possibly furries. The "furries" forecast last time brought four inches of snow to some areas and the above-average temperatures predicted didn't arrive so the forecasts now call for below average temperatures the next five days.

Contracts Signed for Wayne County Jail, Sheriff Residence

Contracts were signed Tuesday approving Otte Construction Co., Wayne, as the general contractor for the new jail and sheriff's residence to be built northwest of the courthouse on the courthouse square. The \$120,000 structure will replace one that has been in use for around 80 years.

Money for the project is already on hand. It was brought in from a 1 1/2 mill levy started two years ago and from inheritance tax money.

Containing 4075 square feet, the new one-story structure will be fireproof and will furnish the county with some much-needed storage space, some vaults and other facilities needed. Facing north it will include a three-bedroom home for the sheriff's family, offices, private rooms for interrogation, cells for prisoners, with separate facilities for juveniles and women prisoners and modern equipment.

A basement will be constructed under the residential portion and the sheriff's office area. There will be no basement under the jail wing of the structure. Present garage facilities will be retained instead of building new ones.

Providing the steel work for the jail itself will be a professional firm, Southern Steel Co., San Antonio. Electrical and plumbing work may be sublet by Otte.

Present for the signing of the contract Tuesday were Commissioners George Solz, Henry Hokene and John Surber, Clerk C. A. Bard, Attorney Charles McDermott and Sheriff Don Weible.

The board has not gone into the matter fully and wants to find out the costs and types of meters. Discussion will continue when information is secured from meter-supply firms.

Between 25 and 30 others attended the session, most of them to speak against granting of a liquor license to Mrs. Lois Nethoroda. Many were heard and after some discussion the council voted to reject the application as any additional liquor permits in the city would require a change in the city ordinances the present permits being the total allowed under existing ordinances.

Closing of an alley officially came up. The Methodist church has sought to have the east-west alley between Main and Pearl streets on the block between Fifth and Sixth streets closed.

At present this alley is not open but one is shown in city plats and the Methodist want it officially closed before considering building plans. Church representatives were asked to get views of other residents of the block to present to

the council before a decision is made.

Richard Carman's application for a building permit is still alive. The zoning commission had recommended rejection of the application since it would convert a building to use as a multiple-occupancy structure in an area where single-unit dwellings are zoned under the new zoning plan. The council sent the application back to the zoning commission for further consideration.

Storz-Wachob-Bender, Omaha, was given an additional three-year contract as consultant on investment securities for the city. The firm has helped with bonds and other finances for several years.

The engineer's certificate on Sanitary Sewer District No. 25 was considered and accepted. A date will be set later for a hearing by the council on assessments and to review of the project. Residents in the district will be able to appear at this session.

In other action, the council voted to pay half the costs on new uniforms for personnel of the street and light departments with the other half to be paid by workers so employees would be uniformly dressed and voted to hire Donald Tanner, Salix, Ia., as a new police officer.

(Continued from page 1) there is Jan. 15. New rates are 4 1/2 per cent for one-year time savings certificates, 4 per cent for six-month certificates and 3 1/2 per cent on savings pass books.

Similar raises of one-half of one per cent are reported at First National, President Adon Jeffrey said: "We feel that these adjustments in interest on both deposits and loans will keep us in line with what is happening over the state." Effective date was Jan. 13 on certificates and Jan. 1 on savings at First.

The upward adjustment in loan rates is part of the deal at the banks. But the extra interest to savers should be an incentive to savers to keep money working in the county.

Dave Warnemunde, Winside State, said the effective date for the new rates is Jan. 15 at that bank. He indicated an explanation of the benefits can be obtained by anyone inquiring at the bank.

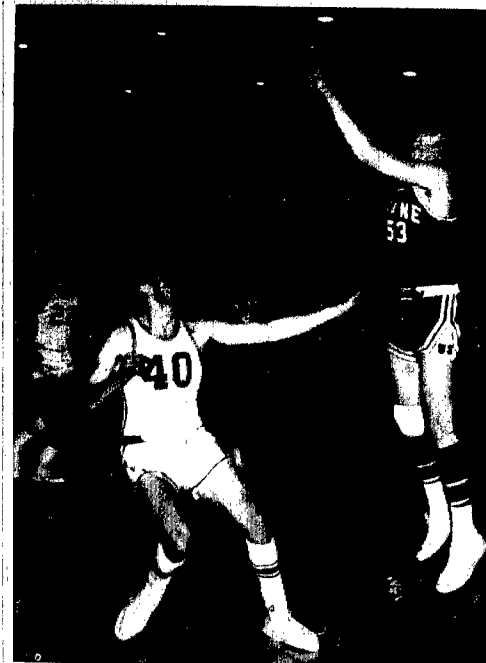

County Judge David Hamer issued a discouraging report this week. It showed his court cases for criminal and traffic violations had risen by about one-third for 1965 in comparison with the previous year.

There were 139 traffic violation cases handled in 1964. This was way below the 198 handled in 1965.

Speeding was by all measurements the most frequent violation in 1965. The judge handled 94 speeding cases. This was 1 1/2 times the number of traffic cases covering violations ranging from stop sign to illegal parking offenses.

Discouraging was the report on the number of cases involving minors in possession of alcoholic beverages — 31. There were also 17 reckless driving charges, 19 violation of weights on trucks and three cases of hit and run.

Other cases and their frequency included: Burglaries, 2; no-fund checks, 9; petty larceny, 8; dumping trash on highway, 2; carrying concealed weapons, 1; escape from jail, 2; obtaining money under false pretenses, 1; Assault and battery, 3; indecent exposure, 2; disorderly conduct, 1;

destruction of property, 1; trespassing, 1; and game commission violations, 7. This brought the total for traffic and criminal cases to 273.

But a judge also has other duties besides court cases. Judge Hamer handled 229 other cases that come under a judge's jurisdiction.

For instance, civil suits and cases came to 55; marriage licenses were issued 55 couples with five marriages performed by the judge; adoption cases numbered five; guardianship ruling came to seven; delayed birth registrations came to 43; and there were 67 probates of estates.

Money was involved in the court cases, fees, inheritance tax and estates. Judge Hamer's probate of estates involved property worth \$1,846,927. He collected \$7,708 in fines, \$3,933.45 in fees and \$7,546.12 in inheritance taxes.

It was a busy year for the general judge. He would be happy if no new records were set in 1966 and instead of the ever-increasing total of criminal cases he could report in January of 1967 that he had experienced a decrease in such cases for 1966.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

You may not agree with an editorial -- but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

A Growing Trend

Two neighboring newspapers printed information last week on a trend in counties of Nebraska to publish tax lists. Going beyond publication of the delinquent tax lists, they urge two more types of publications.

In Antelope county, the Elgin Review pointed out that two more counties have adopted resolutions to publish complete lists of individual personal property valuations. In Madison county, the Newman Grove Reporter said the county commissioners had considered publishing a list of those delinquent in paying personal taxes.

Publishing individual personal property tax valuations in Wayne county might be interesting. In Boone and other counties the valuations jumped when taxpayers found the value they put on personal items was to be listed. Who benefited? The county and everyone in it.

Those against publishing such lists might think it an invasion of privacy. Those downright antagonistic toward it would probably have a personal reason for not wanting their valuations published.

It is doubtful if there would be much use in publishing a delinquent personal property tax list in Wayne county for there is little delinquency here on that score. However, the other list sounds interesting, not only to this newspaper as a taxpayer and as the only place where such a legal would be published but as a service to you people who would benefit in the long run.

If you have ideas it would be otherwise, the columns of The Herald are open for your use.

On Road Maintenance

A caller last week wanted to know why road maintainers traveled on the left side of the road all of the time. It started some thoughts running through our mind for indeed it seems as if maintenance work is always done traveling in the wrong direction.

It proved to be otherwise. Maintainment on the right side of the road one time and on the left the next. Perhaps it seems to be always on the left because a vehicle of any type coming at you on the wrong side of the road seems more obvious.

Wayne county road maintenance men report that the reason they do it one way one time and the other way the next is to keep the gravel on as much as possible and to keep the road from slanting one way exclusively. They say if they traveled on the right at all times the road would slant more and more in one direction and eventually would have to be rebuilt.

A recent accident in Wayne county occurred when a driver collided with a maintainer just over the crest of a hill. Had that maintainer been going the direction the driver was, the freshly smoothed road would have indicated a grader was ahead. However, this happened to be the time for grading from the left and so there was no warning. Maintainer operators are no happier about the many hills and blind spots than anyone else but that's the way it has to be done.

One solution seems to be to get some surfaced county roads. With roadways

every mile both north and south and east and west, it is hardly possible to surface them all but certainly it is time to look into comparative costs to see how many miles could be surfaced for the cost of maintenance of main roads.

A little mileage in District 3 on main roads one year would help. Next year District 2 could get the funds and the following year it would be the turn of District 1. Granted this would be slow progress toward a network of county surfaced roads but at least it would be progress.

In the meantime, you take your road and you take your chances when you travel county graveled roads. Over the next hill may be a maintainer and if it's the turn to grade on the left, it could be in your lane. Slowing down until you're sure will help.

Why Not Drink?

A teacher in a Wayne Sunday school said the matter of drinking came up for discussion. He was stumped when a boy asked: "Can you give me one reason why I should not drink?"

The boy pointed out that fellows coming back from college drank, many of his friends drank and they "got by" without any bad results and to be one of the gang one had to take a drink now and then.

Why shouldn't teenagers drink? There are hundreds of answers but if a teenager does not want to be convinced, he will not be and if "being one of the gang" is all-important then all the reasons in the world will not be enough.

In this day and age it is apparently quite important to be "in" and what the "in" group" decrees at the time is the thing to do. This goes for hair cuts, clothing styles, dance steps, music and conduct among themselves. Most important it is the "in" thing to do just the opposite of what the adults approve of, in just about everything.

Adults drink. Most do not approve of teenagers' drinking. But, who cares what adults think because they don't approve of teenage-type music either so they could be wrong about everything. In case of doubt, do what you want to do and find out later who was right and who was wrong.

Alcohol is a narcotic drug that is habit-forming. Alcoholics are people who have a disease -- a disease that cannot be cured even by AA -- and they are always just one drink away from being trapped again. No one starts out to become an alcoholic but everyone thinks others are in danger of getting this disease -- not themselves.

Those who can drink moderately under normal conditions can become alcoholics overnight under stress. The only way to avoid alcoholism is to avoid alcohol.

There isn't a parent in Wayne county who wouldn't tell his son or daughter: "Don't ever try dope. You may become a dope fiend." Yet becoming an alcoholic can be just as dangerous and parents still fail to get across to their teenagers how important it is that they not start.

Alcoholics can expect to live 51 years. Those who abstain can expect to live 70 years. Are those 19 years worth living? There may be an answer there to the boy's question: "Give me one reason why I shouldn't drink."

Re-elected Power Chief
Osceola attorney William Norton has been re-elected chairman of the State Power Review Board. He is a Democrat. Named vice-chairman was Ed Crowley of Kearney. The board has given tentative approval to an application to build a high-voltage transmission line in central Nebraska. The line would cost about \$3 million and would stretch from Grand Island to North Platte.

The Platte Valley Public Power and Irrigation District asked to construct the line, which would complete a 230-kilovolt loop tying together Nebraska's grid and U. S. Bureau of Reclamation facilities in South Dakota.

Commands Closing Effort
Nebraska Banking Director Henry E. Ley has cited the successful closing of the defunct Valentine State Bank as an "outstanding example" of the state and federal governments working together.

He said without this close co-operation, victimized depositors of the Sanchitis community would have been involved in lengthy court litigation to recover their losses.

"This operation was a tremendous accomplishment. It showed what can be done when the state and federal governments work in harmony toward a common goal," Ley said.

The complexities of the embezzlement scheme, which went on for 15 years, left the State Banking Department and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. (FDIC) with a knotty problem.

But a proposal was drafted whereby the assets of the Valentine Bank were purchased by four correspondent or city banks, which in turn repaid depositors every cent.

Two veteran State Education Board members say they probably will not run for re-election this November.

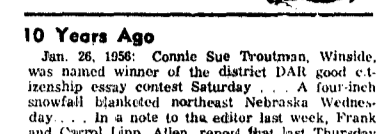

are easier to eat with low-temperature meat cookery, because there is less burning of fat in ovens, and in pans and racks.

Cooking time is an approximate guide to the degree of doneness for tender cuts such as steaks, chops and ham slices. But the meat thermometer is a more accurate guide, especially for roasts, because it registers the internal temperature of meat and indicates its degree of doneness.

The American homemaker is never at a loss as to what meat dishes to serve because there are some 100 kitchen cuts of beef, veal, pork and lamb to choose from. There are also the variety meats, including hearts, kidneys, tongues, sweetbreads and brains, plus an array of ready-to-serve meats.

Area Swine Days
Nebraska swine producers can learn how to save more pigs and then how to do a better job of raising them, keeping records on them and testing them, all by attending the annual University of Nebraska-sponsored Area Swine Day at Madison, January 26.

Topics run the gamut of swine production and management, beginning with the effect of energy and protein on reproduction and control of reproductive diseases to swine building and equipment programs, the role of minerals in swine production, and finally the use of records in boar selection and a discussion of central testing stations.

Expected to stir considerable discussion is a talk by Albert Gehlbach, Lincoln, Illinois, pork producer who is an advocate of controlled environment as an ideal tool in stepping up efficient and cutting operating costs.

A special feature this year will be a discussion by Robert Casey of Consumers Cooperative Ass'n, Ida Grove, Iowa, central testing stations in swine improvement.

The talk is of current interest because of the construction underway on a testing station near Clarkson, the first such CAA-operated facility in Nebraska.

A full day program for Swine producers will also be held at the Sioux City Auditorium on Wednesday, February 2.

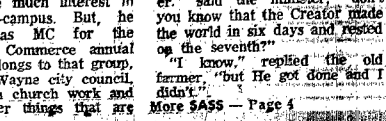

Most Nebraskans Find More Missing from the Paychecks

LINCOLN — More than 400,000 Nebraska wage earners discovered when they received their first paychecks, of the new year that social security taxes have gone up.

The maximum annual amount they and their employers will pay went from \$174 to \$277.20 a year.

The new law, which went into effect New Year's Day, boosted basic social security rates for employees and employers from 3.625 to 3.85. Another .35 per cent was added to cover the cost of hospital insurance, bringing the tax rate for both programs to 4.2 per cent.

In addition, the amount of income that may be taxed was boosted from \$4,900 to \$6,600.

The social security tax for self-employed persons also jumped. Last year they paid 5.4 percent on earnings up to \$4,900 annually, but now the rate is 6.5 percent on \$6,600.

The maximum tax for the self-employed, now \$289.20, goes up to \$405.50. This is not payable, though, until March of 1967.

A spokesman for the Nebraska Social Security Office said one reason for the increase was the Medicare Program for the aged. Another is increases in retirement pension and other benefits.

The spokesmen said all is not over after this year. He noted that Congress approved a new long-term schedule of increases in the payroll tax. This year's rates are only the first installment of that schedule.

A little less than a year from now, Jan. 1, 1967, the social security tax rate for employees will rise to 4.4 per cent. It will go to 4.9 per cent in 1969; to 5.4 per cent in 1973, and finally to 5.65 per cent in 1987.

Land Sales Frozen
The State Board of Educational Lands and Funds has agreed to stop the sales of state-owned school lands until the Nebraska Supreme Court decides if it or the tenant owns all improvements.

Three tracts were to be auctioned off, but court-imposed injunctions halted the sales. Law suits were started in Hall and Morrill counties.

The 1965 Legislature directed that the 1.6 million acres of school lands be sold as present leases expire. More than 290 leases were up Jan. 1. They cover some 70,000 acres.

Board Chairman H. L. Blackledge of Kearney said the board could see no point in putting the land up for sale until the pending litigation is settled. He said all leases that expire will be offered to the tenants for another year.

University Regent Named

Governor Morrison has appointed Norman farmer Robert Raun, 37, to the University of Nebraska Board of Regents.

He replaces Val Peterson of Hastings, who resigned to seek the Republican nomination for governor. The term expires in January, 1969.

Raun is a Democrat. The other five regents are Republicans.

State Employee Dies

Mrs. Loretta Ann Walker, administrative assistant to the State Board of Pardons and Paroles, has died at the age of 69. She had been ill for some time.

Mrs. Walker was a state employee for 32 years, serving 11 of those with the State Highway Department and 21 with the Parole Board.

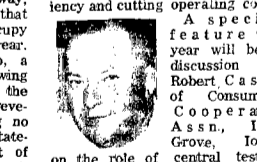
She was the first Nebraskan named to the executive council of Interstate Probation and Parole Compact Administrators.

Trade School Approved

The State Board of Vocational Education has approved a 16-county petition for Nebraska's first area trade school. Action was taken after a hearing.

If accepted by county voters in a May 10 primary, the vocational-technical facility would be located at the Hastings Naval Ammunition Depot.

The petition proposes the school open next fall. It estimates

N.E. Extension Notes

Low Temperature Cookery
Meat cookery is not difficult because it involves only six basic methods: roasting, broiling, braising, pan broiling, pan frying, and cooking in liquid.

Tender cuts are best when roasted, broiled, pan broiled or pan fried. The less tender cuts are made tender by braising, which means cooking in a small amount of liquid or covered with liquid. Pot roasts and Swiss steaks are cooked by braising, while stews are cooked in liquid.

Terms often used in meat cookery are dry and moist methods. Dry heat being suitable for tender cuts and moist heat for less-tender cuts of meat.

Meat will shrink or decrease in size and weight, regardless of the cooking method. Therefore, it is important to keep shrinkage at a minimum because excessive shrinkage is hard on the family food budget, and the appearance and flavor of meat is affected, too.

Years of expert testing prove that low cooking temperature reduces meat shrinkage as much as from 15 to 20 per cent. The low temperature rule applies to roasting, broiling, frying, braising or cooking in liquid. In addition to less shrinkage, meat looks more appealing and is much juicier and flavorful when it is cooked slowly. 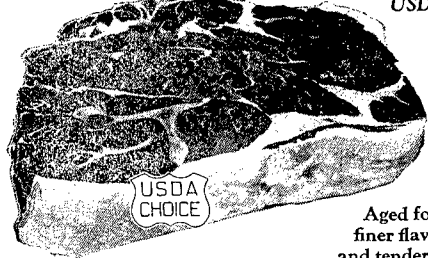

Dixon Man Keeps Busy Woodworking
Retired nine years, Ed Sala, 77, Dixon resident who moved there 20 years ago from Wayne, has been almost as busy in retirement as he was when working. He has woodworking for a hobby but he has many other interests too.
Sala is in charge of the Wayne City auditorium for six years. Then he and his wife, the former Eva Hintz, Coloridge, moved to Dixon to operate a produce station. After 10 years in business, they retired. That was nine years ago.
Both were too active to just sit back and rock in chairs. She liked gardens so he has been spending one (and a big one at that) for years. She also has other flowers and he has his rose bushes, probably more than any other resident of Dixon.
In the summer he fishes and he also likes to walk, sometimes walking a mile or so down the railroad tracks. But woodworking is his main hobby and his family and friends have received many items he made by hand as he uses no mechanical tools in his work.
To start with, he bought some walnut trees near Dixon nine years ago when he retired. Sala had them hauled to Ponca to a saw mill, cut into lengths that could be handled and hauled back to Dixon. He still has a big stock of walnut wood on hand.
He has four sisters so when he makes an item for one he makes identical items for the other three. When it comes to his own family, grandchildren, friends and the church, he usually makes one item of a kind.
The six sons are: Howard, Denver, Rex, Austin, Minn; Richard Munster, Ind.; Raymond, Minneapolis; Vernon, Rapid City; and Esbel, scenic, S. D. Only Howard is in a field that shows any relationship to woodworking, being an industrial arts instructor.
Items Sala has made include bookends, napkin holders, smoking stands, sewing stand, candle holders, picture frames, what-nots, lamps, pipe holders, tables, jewel boxes and trays. He also refinishes furniture and works a little with cypress knee wood but most of his work is with walnut.
One of his interesting items is a framed pair of powder flasks from his father's muzzle-loading shotgun. It is well over 100 years old and a glass in the front of the frame protects the antique flasks.
Sala doesn't think his age and activity are so unusual. He and his wife would be bored without their many interests. A step into their home is a revelation as to the variety of work that can be done with wood and if every item he has handmade were removed it would be a bare home indeed.

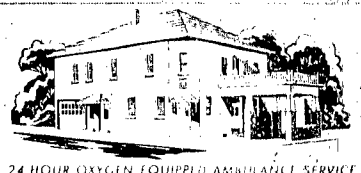

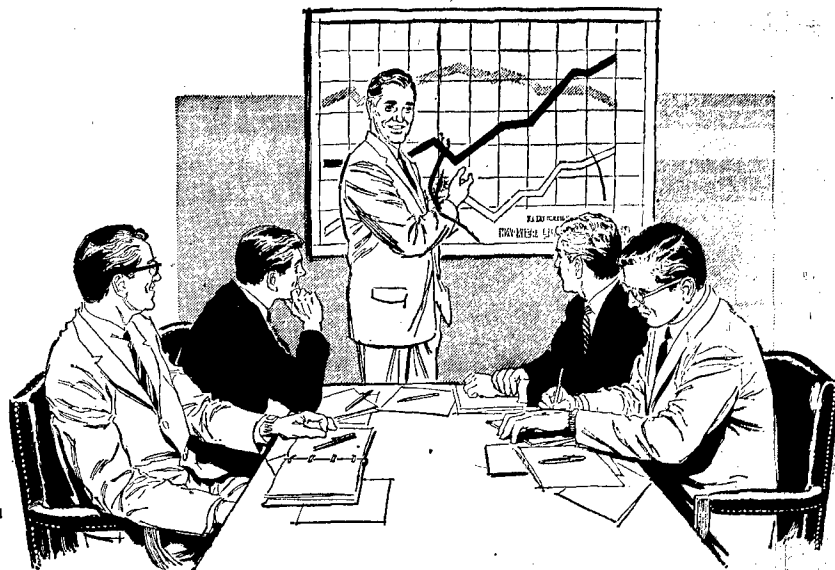
