Wayne City-School Sessions Set for Tuesday

City and school district caucuses will be held in Wayne Tuesday, Mar. 1. The two local political Citizens and Populist will hold separate caucuses for the school district followed by ward caucuses for the city.

Each will select candidates for two positions on the board of education of District 17. Don Echtenkamp and Mrs. Henry Ley are serving terms which will expire.

Those holding power on the school board are Dean Peterson, Lynn Roberts, Mrs. S. J. Salsburg and Dean Schram. Terms of Roberts are for three years.

Caucuses will be held at 7:30 in the firemen's room of the city hall to select candidates. Popular party will meet at 7:30 in the Wayne City auditorium.

At 7:45 the city caucuses will be held in the same location followed by ward caucuses. Citizens party ward caucuses include Ward 1, firemen's room; Ward 2, Wayne Public Library; and Ward 3, courthouse basement lobby.

Popular party ward caucuses will be as follows: Ward 1, City Auditorium; Ward 2, Willse mortuary; and Ward 3, courthouse main floor lobby.

The city caucuses will pick candidates for mayor for a two-year term. Following this each ward caucus is scheduled with the first ward to name one councilman for two years, second ward councilman for two years and one for one year to fill the vacancy left when Dan Sherry resigned (currently filled by Jack Kingston) and the third ward will name candidates for one position on the council for a two-year term.

Alfred Koplan is presently mayor in the first ward, Jack Kingston and Kent Hill in the second and Dick Koon in the third. Serving terms that do not expire are E. C. Smith for the first ward and Dr. Lyle Seymour for the third ward.

Tuberculosis Skin Test for Young Given

Tuberculin skin tests are available to anyone but the ninth and 12th grade pupils of Wayne county are the ones aimed at under a special testing program to be carried out within the next month, according to Mrs. Arnold Maurer at the Wayne County Tuberculosis association.

Letters are being sent home with these youngsters to get information and parental approval for the tests. Parents are asked to request these letters from their children in the ninth and 12th grades in case the pupils forget to offer them.

Christmas seals make this skin test activity possible. It is a local project of the county tuberculosis association in cooperation with the state organization.

Last year there were over 50,000 new cases of TB in the nation and there were about 9,000 deaths reported. This in spite of the fact tuberculosis is no longer the threat it once was.

The present seniors were the first to receive the tuberculin tests in this area. Now they are getting the second test. A continued program of testing ninth and 12th grade pupils yearly is planned.

World Day of Prayer to Be Held in Winside, Wayne

Two observances of World Day of Prayer Friday will be in Winside and Wayne. These are among thousands of observances being held throughout the free world, all following the same basic form.

Observed on the first Friday in Lent, the day is planned each year by women of a different country. Women of Scotland planned this year's service in the long-time tradition of the churches of that country.

Winside's services will be at 2:30 p.m. in the Trinity Lutheran church with Methodist women joining the observance. Wayne's will be at 9:30 a.m. in the Presbyterian church with Baptist, Reformed Lutheran, St. Paul's Lutheran and Methodist women joining them.

In both cases the services are open to all people of the area with women especially invited. Offerings will go to help Christian work throughout the world.

Rev. Otto Mueller, Rev. John Horner and Mrs. Fred Wittler will be in charge at Winside with special music offered. A program for children will be given at the same time in the church basement.

Wayne's observance will include Mrs. Howard Witt, president of the church women of the city; Rev. John Voith will speak and there will be special music.

Driving With Old Plates Unlawful

Monday, Feb. 28, is the last day you can legally drive with 1965 license plates on your vehicles. County Treasurer Leta Bahde advises that there are still several hundred who need new plates.

According to Miss Bahde, there are around 400 more sets of plates that should go out before all vehicles in the county are licensed. Her office is open Thursday, Friday and Monday before the deadline so there will have to be around 100 or more a day for renewals.

If you do not have new plates on your car Tuesday, don't drive it. Patrolmen and other law enforcement officers will be on the lookout for those driving with old plates. This includes those from other states or areas who have moved to Wayne county.

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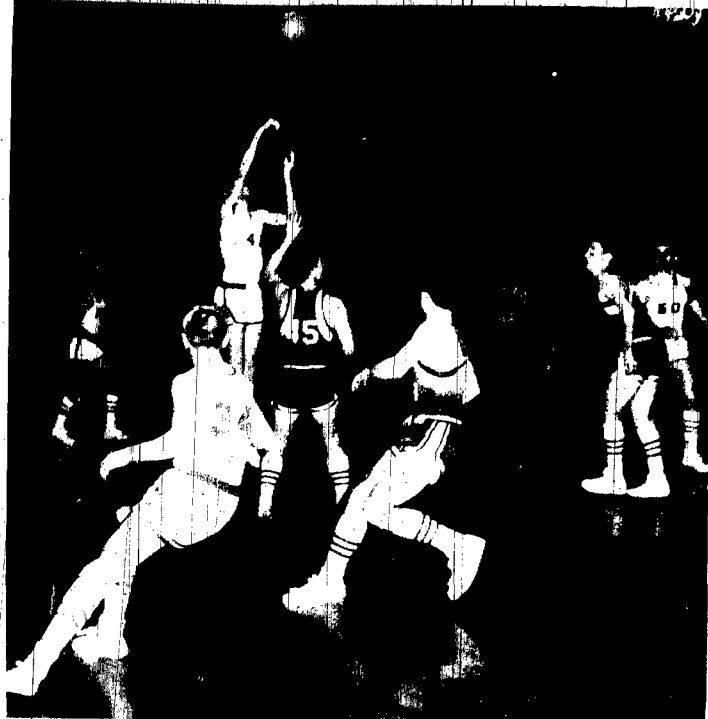

Farmers Responsible Now for Weed Control

Howard Gillespie, Dixon county agent, reports that area farmers may not be aware of a new law which says anyone who manages or controls Nebraska land shall be responsible for the control of noxious weeds on that land.

Each county now has a weed control authority made up of rural and urban residents. A superintendent will be named by them to work with land owners, managers and operators to help them establish control programs satisfactory to farmers and the state department of agriculture.

To start off the control program, the state and county extension services in cooperation with the state weed department will furnish this leaflet. Use of 2-4-D in late April or early May will usually control the weed.

Gillespie urges residents to contact their county agents for more information. Plans should be made now for this year's weed control program, he added.

Capitol News Political Activity Begins As Primary Election Nears

LINCOLN — Political activity in Nebraska, at a full scale since the fall of 1964, has begun to pick up as candidates announced their intentions for the May 10 primary elections.

Foremost was the decision by Governor Morrison, a Democrat, to seek the U.S. Senate seat now held by Republican Carl T. Curtis.

It shaped up as a dandy battle and many called it the match of the century. The winner will be decided by the November general election.

Both Morrison and Curtis promised widespread, vigorous campaigns. They indicated no issues would go untouched.

In deciding on a senate race and against a fourth term as governor, Morrison must buck tradition at every turn.

No governor has even been directly elected to the senate in the state's history. The last Democrat to win in a senate race was Edward R. Burke in 1934.

The race will be a rematch between the two popular voters. In 1948, Curtis defeated Morrison by 19,000 ballots in a contest for the U.S. House of Representatives.

It will be Morrison's second effort at winning a seat in the senate. He was defeated in 1958. Curtis has served Congress for 27 years.

On another political front, Lt. Gov. Philip C. Sorenson announced he would run for governor on the Democratic ticket. He is not expected to encounter strong opposition in the primary.

Sorenson is the younger brother of former legislative aide Ted Sorenson. His father was a Republican attorney general of Nebraska more than 30 years ago.

Decision Lauded

Nebraska legislators generally applauded the special three-judge Federal Court's decision upholding the validity of the 1965 reapportionment act.

They said it should give the nation's only one-house legislature real stability for the first time in four years.

But the speaker of the last session, Kenneth L. Bowen of Red Cloud, cautioned that the state's apportionment problems

are not over entirely. He said the State Constitution does not permit the lawmakers to redistrict themselves at regular intervals. This limitation, he added, may cause greater population disparities to crop up in the future.

The veteran senator said he favors constitutional amendments which would allow the Legislature to redistrict itself whenever it wanted to do so.

The redistricting plan was the first approved by the Federal Court, which had rejected two earlier efforts. It assured the 25 lawmakers from the odd-numbered districts that they will not have to run for re-election this year. They were voted four-year terms in 1964.

Projects Okayed

Seventy outdoor recreation projects have been approved by the State Game Commission for submission to the Federal Government.

Commission Director Mel O. Steen said they involve land acquisition or site development in 45 communities.

Estimated cost of the proposals is \$4.1 million. Projects range from metropolitan parks to community swimming pools to golf courses.

Dr. Stanley H. Flora of Miles City, Mont., has been appointed new Nebraska State Veterinarian.

He was selected by State Agriculture Director Pearl F. Finigan from a list of several candidates. He was recommended for the job by the Nebraska Livestock Industries Committee.

Dr. Flora is presently employed by the Montana Livestock Sanitary Board as a deputy state veterinarian. He attended the University of Indiana and graduated in 1959 from Michigan State.

CAPITOL COMMENTS

Those who would deny self-determination to the states and, in turn, the right of free choice to individual workers were rebuffed when the Senate twice within a week refused to shut off debate in opposition to repeal of Section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Act.

Both Nebraska Senators voted against the cloture move, and both have been active in opposing repeal of the Taft-Hartley provision which permits states to enact right to work laws.

Both served as "team captains" in the successful effort.

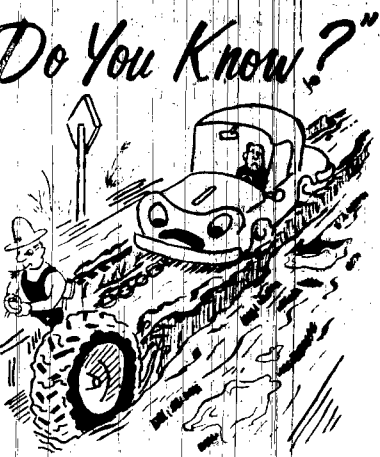
The recent votes came four months after the Senate similarly had declined to vote cloture on the same issue. Curiously, all three votes were on a procedural motion to call up the bill for consideration, and not on the repeal bill itself.

Had the cloture move been successful, it would not have meant an end to the debate, for then the Senate would have turned to consideration of the

bill, and the debate would have continued.

There is every reason to believe that repeal of Section 14(b) is a dead issue for the 89th Congress. Majority Leader Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.) said some time ago that the two efforts for cloture were unsuccessful, the bill would not be brought up again this year.

This does not mean the issue is dead for all time; far from it. We can expect an extensive "softening-up" campaign in the months ahead, in a desperate effort to sway public opinion in preparation for another try in the 90th Congress beginning next year.

Should You Have A Will? The American husband as a person of sentiment and ambition — so says one authority on estate planning. He works harder than husbands in any other country in the world to provide for his wife and children, and then in seven cases out of ten the husband passes on before his wife does, leaving only an insurance policy and a mortgaged home. He doesn't leave a will.

Have you made a will? Has your husband made a will? If there is no will, in case of death property and possessions are distributed as determined by Nebraska law. Do you know how the law will distribute your possessions? Is this the way you'd want your possessions distributed? Think it over.

Here are some considerations to help you decide if you should have a will. In case both husband and wife should die at the same time, as in an automobile accident, who will be come guardian for minor children?

Suppose no will is left by a deceased husband and father. After the husband's death, the widow decides to sell the family home. In such a case the sale must be approved by the court since the widow legally owns only one-third of the house —

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Co. Agent's Column

Market Hog Show Plans are taking shape for the 14th annual Midwest Market Hog Show to be held at Fremont Saturday, March 19.

The purpose of the show, which is held in cooperation with the Agricultural Extension Service, is "to further interest and knowledge of desirable type, weight and finish of market hogs."

Each exhibitor must be at least eight years of age and will be limited to entering one pen of three market hogs.

Swine will be exhibited in the five show in two weight classes: 200-219 lbs., and 220-240 lbs.

Carcase awards will be given to the top 30 pens, with prizes determined by total percentage of hams and loins of the three carcasses based on adjusted live weight.

In order to be eligible for premiums in the carcass contest, each carcass must meet carcass certification requirements of 29 inches in length and not over 14 inches of backfat.

Estate blanks will be available shortly from county Extension agents. Entries must be post-marked not later than March 12.

Planting Black walnut trees now could provide an income potential many years hence. There are sites on many of our farms well-suited to grow these trees.

Good management is essential to produce straight sound legs. Early pruning is important to prevent loss of containing knots.

Planned planting is desirable with thick stands the first few years, since this forces trees to grow up rather than spread out.

Thinning should be done about ten years leaving only the very best trees. Irregular patches of land in creek bottoms which often are not good for much else make the best sites. Land so used could well be the most valuable acreage on a farm in years to come.

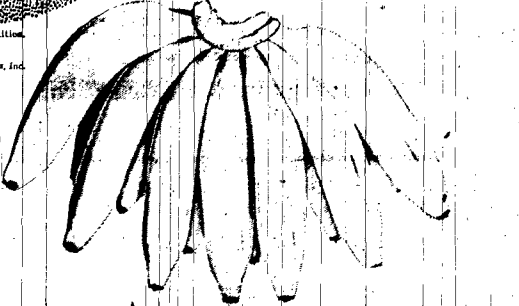

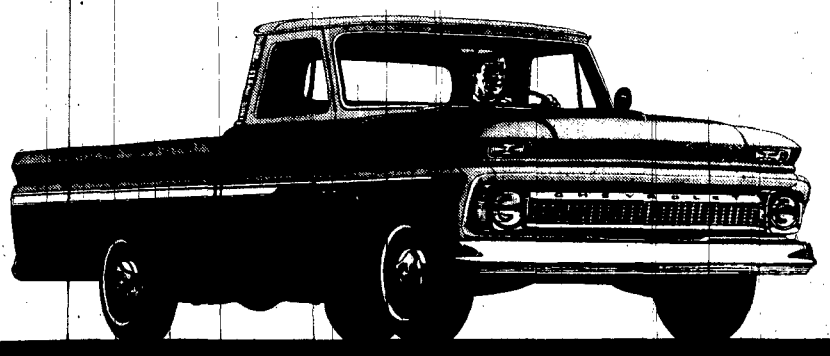
