## Wayne Hospital to Lose Patients Under Medicare?

Just how strict is the government going to be in requiring hospitals to accept Medicare patients under Medicare? That's a problem the Wayne hospital and other hospitals are facing.

Norman Olsen, administrator of the local hospital, told Kiwanis club members Monday noon there are a lot of "ifs" connected with the hospitalization of patients. No official survey has been made, but unofficially the government has the word out on requirements.

The 26-bed hospital is able to provide good adequate care and it is not about to make drastic changes or close, Olsen said. However, it does have a "space problem" that could be questioned.

In a nutshell, the situation is this: The government sets "standards" for specifications for patient rooms and for working areas. In See HOSPITAL page 5

## Hearing on City Zoning Law Will Be Wednesday Evening

The first of two public hearings regarding the proposed new zoning ordinance for Wayne will be held Wednesday, Mar. 23, at 7 p.m. in the Wayne City auditorium. It is open to all residents of the city and anyone living on property within the jurisdiction of the city limits.

Members of the planning commission will be present to explain the plan, answer questions and consider suggestions. A Richard Wojniak, professional planner from Powers & Associates, the firm that prepared the plan will also attend.

The planning commission will be able to incorporate changes into the zoning plan so suggestions will be welcomed. Residents may also call at that time to submit special circumstances and the zoning plan. A map of the proposed zoning districts and an explanatory article appear on page 5 section one of this week's paper. If those attending will bring this map, they will be better able to understand the zoning plan.

When the meeting has been concluded, the planning commission will meet to consider changes in zoning districts. A list of zoning changes will then be sent to the city council.

The next meeting will then be set by the council. It may be a public hearing at which time changes can also be suggested and questions asked.

When this hearing is over, the zoning changes deemed necessary can be made and the zoning ordinance will be ready for adoption. Until then, the city has no zoning law.

Comprehensive plans covering the city by Powers & Associates and the exact rules of zoning law are many pages in a book. Any one wanting more details should find out from the city clerk a planning commission member where copies may be obtained at no charge.

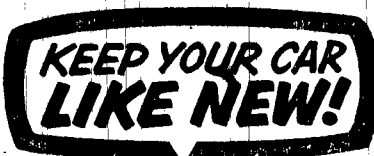

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# Wayne State Swimmers Add District II Championship

Wayne State swimmers concluded their 1966 season Saturday with a tidal wave victory in the NAIA District II tournament.

After the usual ceremonies — throwing their coach into the pool, followed by the team manager, the meet clerk and several co-ed timers — the swimmers returned to serious business, electing the team's most valuable and most improved.

As to the most valuable there was little difficulty deciding. Both Russ Nyberg and Jim Brown earned the honor by a wide margin on the basis of their performances. So both received the team's vote as Most Valuable. Last year Brown rated that title alone.

A tabulation of the season shows both swimmers won 22 individual races and swam on three winning relays. Nyberg, a freshman from Chicago, won four strokes while Brown, a sophomore from Omaha, won three seconds and one third.

For the title of most improved, the team found several strong possibilities. The final choice was Dwight Keith, junior from Fremont.

Brown contributed three individual firsts and a relay first to Wayne's 797 points in the district meet, held in Carlson Natatorium Friday and Saturday. Kearney State, with one first place, scored 103 points; Concordia with three firsts had 90. Chadron State did not enter.

Marty Sears, sophomore from Lyons, claimed two firsts and swam on two winning relays. Nyberg won two races, joined a winning relay, and finished second in the 100 freestyle — a disappointment that resulted when he missed timing on a turn and lost

momentum, disastrous in a short race.

Besides Brown, there was another triple winner, Concordia's Dennis Uecker.

Perry Ellis led the way with 13 points. Jerry Titz and Mike Livinghouse each made 8. Mike Creighton and Mike Biltoft 6. Ted Armbruster, Bruce Flueger and Les Echtenkamp 4. Dick Tietgen 3 and Pat Chambers, Doug Mauer and Doug Flege 2. P. Kaiser with 17 led the runnerup team.

This was the third tournament Wayne's team has entered this year. The boys won championships at Belden and Hartington, and lost a close battle to Sioux City's parochial league champions in the South Sioux City tournament.

Average offense for Wayne this season in compiling a new record of 11-25 wins and 2 losses was 46 points per game by Wayne while allowing the opponents an average of 26 points per game.

Livinghouse had the best individual average, 13 points per game. Chambers averaged 7 and Echtenkamp 6.7 per game. Averages would have been higher except substitution was the rule rather than the exception, giving more players more playing time and holding down the scoring as Wayne outshot most opponents.

Coach Overin said the outstanding games were the wins over the Columbus junior high teams and the loss to Sioux City Heelan in the tournament at South Sioux City. It was an outstanding year for a good team in an outstanding recreation program.

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As to the most valuable there was little difficulty deciding. Both Russ Nyberg and Jim Brown earned the honor by a wide margin on the basis of their performances. So both received the team's vote as Most Valuable. Last year Brown rated that title alone.

A tabulation of the season shows both swimmers won 22 individual races and swam on three winning relays. Nyberg, a freshman from Chicago, won four strokes while Brown, a sophomore from Omaha, won three seconds and one third.

For the title of most improved, the team found several strong possibilities. The final choice was Dwight Keith, junior from Fremont.

Brown contributed three individual firsts and a relay first to Wayne's 797 points in the district meet, held in Carlson Natatorium Friday and Saturday. Kearney State, with one first place, scored 103 points; Concordia with three firsts had 90. Chadron State did not enter.

Marty Sears, sophomore from Lyons, claimed two firsts and swam on two winning relays. Nyberg won two races, joined a winning relay, and finished second in the 100 freestyle — a disappointment that resulted when he missed timing on a turn and lost

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# Zoning Map Shows Wayne's Proposed Plan of Building

The proposed new zoning districts to insure orderly growth and a definite pattern of construction of all types are shown in a map on this page. The map was prepared by Powers & Associates after an extensive survey of the city for the planning commission, which is also serving as a zoning commission.

Until Wayne has zoning it is possible someone could put up a rendering plant next to a housing development, apartments could be built with insufficient off-street parking, a shack could be erected next to a mansion or other construction could be undertaken that does not fit in with nearby property use.

The zoning plan places land within the city and one-half mile beyond (as provided by state law) into seven districts. One agricultural, two residential, two commercial and two industrial districts.

A-1 is the agricultural district. It permits agriculture or truck gardening, single family dwellings, churches, schools or libraries, parks, playgrounds or community centers, country clubs, colleges, nursing homes and similar uses.

The R-1 residence district would allow any uses permitted in the A-1 agricultural district, two-family dwellings, offices of resident physicians, dentists, attorneys or other similar professional people, parking for permitted uses and accessory buildings incidental to the foregoing uses.

R-2 residential district is a multiple-dwelling district. It allows single-family dwellings, multiple dwellings, boarding and lodging houses, group housing projects, fraternities, sororities, parking for the permitted uses and accessory buildings incidental to the foregoing uses.

A highway business district (B-1) permits agriculture or truck gardening, filling stations, hotels, motels, laundries, greenhouses, farm equipment stores, barber and beauty shops, business offices, professional offices, drive-in cafes, drive-in theatre, bowling alley and other similar amusement places. Many of these are acceptable only when located at least 100 feet away from any residential district boundary.

B-2 business district allows all uses permitted in the B-1 district. It includes most retail stores, garages, clinics, printing shops, auto agencies, lumber yards, locker plants, mortuaries, general service shops (plumbing, painting, upholstery, etc.), off-street parking as required and accessory buildings as needed for the foregoing.

The light industrial district (I-1) allows any use permitted in B-2 business districts. It also allows bottling works, storage yards, coal yards, businesses or industries manufacturing or treating where there is a nominal amount of dust, odor, gas, smoke or noise and where not more than 10 per cent of the tract is used for open storage of products or equipment and for off-street parking.

I-2 heavy industrial district allows elevators, saw barns, wrecking yards (when inside or enclosed by solid 8-ft. fence) and any other use not in conflict with local or state laws regulating nuisances, provided no use emitting substantial amounts of gas, dust, odor, smoke or noise. Special cases will have to be reviewed by the planning commission and be approved by mayor and city council in order to protect adjacent property.

The law provides that anything permitted in A-1 will also be permitted in R-1; anything permitted in R-1 can be allowed in R-2; and anything provided for in B-2 can be included in I-1.

The zoning law also prevents new construction projecting beyond the building, sets amount of space required for front, rear and side yards, limits projections into yards, provides for increasing the size of yards as heights of buildings are increased and makes other lot provisions.

Parking requirements provide there be at least one off-street parking space for each dwelling unit; rooming or boarding houses must have two parking spaces for each three beds; same for fraternity or sorority houses, private clubs or lodges must provide one parking space for each 10 members.

Churches must have one parking space for each four seats in the main auditorium; hospital, one parking space for each bed; homes for the aged, one parking space for each six beds; rear and side yards for all other types of institutions from country clubs to motels, dance halls, offices, mortuaries, cafes, stores, and other businesses.

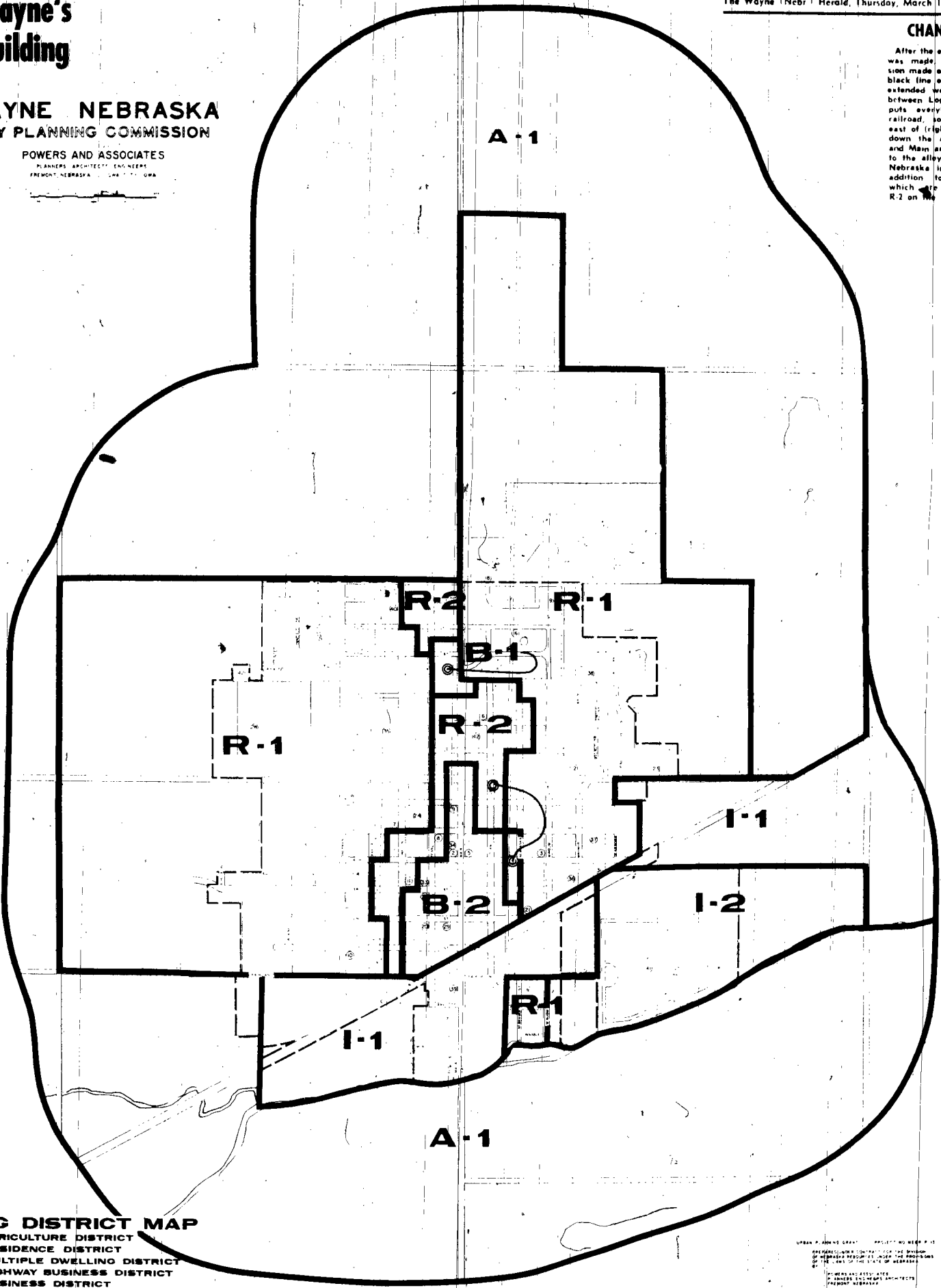
Special uses may be provided by the mayor and council after a public hearing. Cemeteries, greenhouses, hospitals, landing strips for aircraft, radio towers, housing projects, seasonal stands and other public-service set-ups are included.

Where businesses do not conform but existed prior to the adoption of new regulations, they will be allowed to continue. However, should a building in non-conforming use be destroyed by fire, it cannot be restored to its non-conforming use by rebuilding.

The zoning law is complicated and there may be plenty of questions. That is one reason a public hearing is to be held next Wednesday. Copies of the map as shown above are available, but for those

### CHANGES MADE

After the engraving shown here was made, the zoning commission made one more change. The black line on Seventh should be extended west (left) to halfway between Logan and Main. This puts everything north of the railroad, south of Seventh and east of (right) of that black line down the alley between Logan and Main and then east on Fifth to the alley between Logan and Nebraska in an R-2 district in addition to the other areas which are already designated R-2 on the map.

(Continued from page 1) quite a few of the service areas of the Wayne hospital (licensed for 23 beds) is falling short of meeting the square foot requirements.

Hospitals have to be certified to receive patients under Medicare. Surveys are made before certification is granted, and none has been made here yet but some of the problems are being anticipated in advance, according to Olsen.

The hospital administrator said the hospital foundation has been accepting donations for several years and will continue to do so. With an idea of what will be expected in the future, it is hoped more interest in the foundation will be aroused.

Olsen said he did not want to convey the idea that the hospital was inadequate or that it would have to close unless changes are made, but he did

want to get across the fact that the hospital may not qualify or may qualify provided the deficiencies are remedied within a specified period of time.

The local hospital hopes to qualify under a rule that states: "If a hospital is certified by the State agency as in substantial compliance under provisions for exceptions, the following information will be incorporated into the finding and in a notice of eligibility to the hospital: A statement of the deficiencies which were found; a description of the progress which has been made and further action which is being taken to remove the deficiencies; and a scheduled time for a resurvey of the institution to be conducted not later than the 18th month or earlier, depending on the nature of the deficiencies of the period of certification."

In the meantime, the survey will be awaited. It is hoped that the requirements can be relaxed somewhat and the Wayne hospital

with minor changes can qualify for care of Medicare patients.

#### Carroll Postmaster in Accident Near Belden

John Rethwich, Carroll postmaster, suffered cuts and bruises in a two-car accident at Belden Monday afternoon. Two Knox county men escaped injury but the car in which they were riding was heavily damaged.

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


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

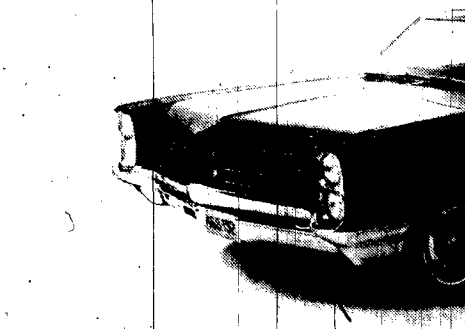

## An Accurate Count

Traffic counters were in Wayne recently. We have no argument with them since they have not made their report yet.

However, we had made a mental note that a good share of the time there was no one in the cars parked at traffic light intersections. We had been told they were counting the cars stopped by the signals with no cross traffic to "use" the green lights.

# Officials Do Not Anticipate Overuse of Health Facilities

LINCOLN — State officials say they do not anticipate a surge of overuse of health facilities in Nebraska when Medicare goes into effect July 1.

Health Director El A. Rogers and Welfare Director John Gage said persons must still prove need for health care under the new program.

"Just because a person is eligible for Medicare does not mean that he or she automatically will enter a hospital or some other medical facility," Dr. Rogers said.

Gage said the fact that Nebraska's population is largely rural will permit present facilities to handle Medicare patients without strain.

"There no doubt will be an increase in elderly people applying for admission to hospitals and nursing homes, but I believe we have adequate facilities to take care of them," he said. "If any problem does arise, it will most likely be in Omaha and Lincoln, not in outstate areas."

More than 170,000 Nebraskans 65 and over will be eligible July 1 for 90 days of hospitalization, 100 home health visits, and—if they've signed up for part B benefits—certain physician services.

Dr. Rogers said Nebraska's nurse shortage could become a greater problem when the nursing home provisions of Medicare go into effect Jan. 1, 1967.

Some Nebraska doctors have threatened to boycott the comprehensive medical care program when it goes into effect. Dr. Rogers said that decision is up to individual physicians. He expects many to participate.

Gage attempted to allay any fears among doctors that his de-

partment intends to get involved in actual medical care.

"The law (Medicare) forbids me or any other official to get involved in how medicine is practiced," he said.

Four University of Nebraska students have announced plans to float a goodwill raft from Omaha to New Orleans this summer to promote the state's 167th centennial.

They said the trip would begin July 2 and end about July 24. Stops will be made at port cities and state capitals.

The students are Mike Voris and Tom Lundgren, Scottsbluff; Tom Mason, Hastings; and Jeff Parkas, Lincoln.

Admiralships in the mythical Nebraska navy will be presented to governors and mayors along the route.

Meyer Reverses Tables. Atty. Gen. Clarence A. H. Meyer has joked in the past about being called upon to be judge and jury in legal matters. But no more.

Last week, Meyer served as a member of a Lancaster County District Court jury hearing an auto accident case. He did not exercise his right to be excused because he is an attorney.

District Judge Herbert Robin and Elmer Schelde said it was the first time a Nebraska attorney general had served on a jury while in office.

However, Meyer doesn't have to worry about disqualifying himself from the case later. The master coding is a material.

Legislators' Complaint. Nebraska legislators have accused the state's attorney general of losing the state

money by putting surplus funds in banks where they earn no interest.

"This is giving away at least \$100 a day," said Sen. Kenneth L. Bowen, Red Cloud, speaker of the 1965 session.

The State Auditor's office reported that Sorenson deposited \$800,000 in state funds in open accounts in 11 eastern Nebraska banks last year.

Legislator Dies. First-term State Sen. Ira E. Pomeroy, Grand Island, died last week of a heart attack. He was 72.

Pomeroy, a retired businessman, had been ill for some time. He was the second state legislator to die recently. Earlier Sen. Cecil L. Craft, North Platte suffered a heart attack.

Carl Curtis CAPITOL COMMENTS. One of Washington's marathon controversies is warming up again. This involves the Department of the Interior and the Food and Drug Administration, and concerns official FDA approval of high-protein "fish food" as suitable for human consumption.

Dating back several years, Interior's Bureau of Commercial Fisheries repeatedly has sought FDA approval for domestic human use of what the bureau describes as an inexpensive, protein-rich diet supplement. The bureau's claims are backed by a report of the National Academy of Sciences experts who have found the product "safe, nutritious, wholesome and fit for human consumption." FDA, on the other hand, has heard from housewives and others who object to use of whole fish—heads, gills and all—as a human foodstuff.

Very probably, FDA will have hearings on a new petition filed a few days ago by Interior Secretary Stewart Udall.

Interior claims the "marine protein concentrate" contains about 80 per cent protein with the other 20 per cent mostly "beneficial minerals" such as calcium and phosphorus. About six pounds of whole fish will yield one pound of the concentrate which can be mixed with other ingredients to boost nutritive values of bread, noodles, some beverages and other foods. It is claimed the "fish food" would serve as a supplement and would not materially affect use of wheat in these foods.

Such materials could be added to overseas food donations even without FDA approval, but severe criticism is foreseen if this is done absent the FDA's okay for domestic use.

person spends approximately 20 per cent more on a "per person" basis for food than a four person family. The two person family can estimate about 10 per cent more per person.

Family food expenditures are influenced by other factors such as entertaining habits of the family, eating out, food customs or likes and dislikes, and age of the family members. Food requirements of teenagers, especially boys, are considerably greater than those of small children and elderly family members. Eating out frequently causes food costs to increase sharply.

Many farm families spend less than the national average for food costs because they produce some of their own food. Milk, meat, eggs, vegetables and fruit produced and consumed by the farm family should be figured at market price, and added to the food budget, if comparisons are to be made.

Homemakers are often disturbed over the total amounts of their purchases when they check out at the supermarket. You must remember not all the items purchased are consumable food items. In that grocery cart you might have laundry products, light bulbs, magazines, etc.

To make a true comparison of your food budget with national averages, keep a record of your family's food costs for several months. You might be surprised to find that you actually are spending less than the national average. The number of farms remained unchanged in only three states.

Attention Senior Citizens. If you were 65 before Jan. 1 this year, Mar. 31 is the last day you can sign up for Medicare's voluntary doctor and medical insurance.

Don't confuse this with Medicare's hospital insurance. That is automatic if you are covered by social security or railroad retirement. If you're not covered, you're still eligible, but should contact your local social security office.

The voluntary doctor and medical insurance requires action on your part. You've probably already received an application form from the Social Security Administration. If not, call your local office.

Under Medicare, you can use your own doctor. You can go to the hospital, where your doctor sends his patients. Medicare will pay many of your hospital and doctor expenses. Remember, the sign-up deadline for the voluntary coverage is Mar. 31.

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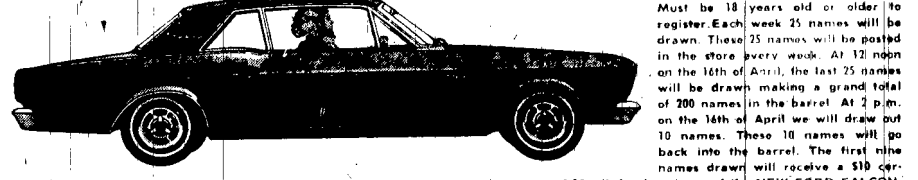

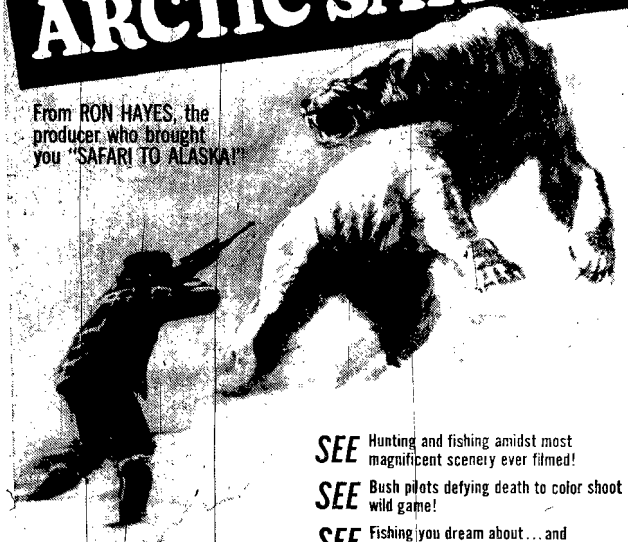
