In addition, the performance will feature two ballet numbers by WSC students of Nina Youshkevitch and the first appearance of two newly-established instrumental groups, the symphonic wind ensemble and the stage band.

Also in the spotlight will be a well-known ensemble that has played at numerous functions, the trumpet trio of Kenneth Heidler, Roger Luenders and Dennis Montgomery.

The ballet class, in its first Wayne appearance this year, will do the "Valse Triste" by Jean Sibelius and "Empire Waltz" by Johann Strauss.

The ballet students this year

The symphonic wind ensemble directed by Dr. Laymond Kellner is a select group from the full band. It will play Tchaikovsky's "Five Miniatures" and Strauss' "Also-Spellen."

The kindergarten teachers will be on hand to greet parents and children. Following a brief visitation in the kindergarten room, parents will attend an orientation session in another part of the building while children take part in activities conducted by the teacher.

### Homemaking Class Has Play School for Week

Wayne high school's advanced homemaking class had "play school" at Northeast elementary Mar. 30-Apr. 6. Mary Serantini, student teacher, handled duties at WHS for Mrs. Dorey Chambers while the latter was on a leaving play school.

There were 14 children in the morning group and 13 in the afternoon group. To choose the children (ages 3 to 5) who would attend, each pair of girls was allowed to choose one child to attend for the project.

One of the purposes of having pre-school children in was to provide companionship for a small group of children in about the same age group, offering the children an opportunity to learn how to share group experiences, experiment with varied play equipment, express book and story interest and increase independence from home and liking for others.

For the girls in homemaking, it provided an opportunity to observe and study behavior development and children. Mrs. Chambers said she was greatly impressed with the success of the project from the standpoint of children and home-making pupils.

The girls planned the activities, including action songs, reading stories, flannel stories, creative activities, rest periods and free play time. One of the most popular original ideas was a mural painted by Vicki Bauer who had children cut out pictures of pigs, chickens, cows and other farm animals and pasted them on the farm mural she had painted.

The school was the culmination of the child development unit for the advanced class. Presence of a student teacher gave Mrs. Chambers the time needed to be away from WHS and observe NES work with the children.

Like the WHS pupils who presented an operetta, the orchestra had to be heard and yet the singers often could not be heard above the accompaniment even close to the stage. Let alone in the rear of the auditorium. Microphone troubles seem to be the rule here for Ramsey, the City auditorium and Rice all have these problems.

Vocational School Neligh Meet Topic

An area vocational school to serve 26 northeast and north central counties is to be the subject of a public meeting Monday, April 11, at 8 p. m. in the Neligh high school auditorium. Several from Wayne county and other nearby counties plan to attend.

County commissioners, educators and business leaders are especially urged to attend. They will hear about the law which allows adjoining counties to band together to form a vocational school district.

Wayne, West Point, Norfolk, O'Neill and South Sioux City residents got the ball rolling on the project. They formed the steering committee that has pushed the project this far. Bob Carhart, Wayne, is committee chairman.

With a total population of 243,969 and an assessed valuation of \$661 million, the district would include Keya Paha, Brown, Rock, Loup, Boyd, Holt, Garfield, Wheeler, Valley, Greeley, Knox, Antelope, Pierce, Boone, Madison, Stanton, Cedar, Dixon, Dakota, Wayne, Thurston, Cummaud, Burl, Colfax, Dodge and Washington counties.

Carhart of Wayne said the meeting was "a key one in the steps toward making an area vocational school a reality. It will gauge the interest of counties in participating in an area vocational school."

Representatives of the state department will be on hand to explain the need for vocational facilities in this area and the procedures to be followed in forming an area vocational school.

Before the election, Dixon had been expecting about 20 voters to show up. A last-minute flurry of political activity resulted in almost three times that many showing up at the polls Tuesday.

All three incumbents were returned to the village board. However, one candidate received only two more votes than a written candidate and received less than one-half the total votes.

Dwight Summers had 53 and John Young 50 votes. Both are incumbents and both were seeking another two-year term in office on the town board.

Don Knott, incumbent, had a closer call. He received 18 votes. There were 26 written votes but they were split up, 16 going to Tony Meloyan and 10 to Allen Prescott. Knott thus won another one-year term on the board.

Three Incumbents Lose at Winside

Three incumbents lost in school district and village voting at Winside Tuesday. Clerk Helen Witt said the turnout was well above average and more than twice as great as the turnout two years ago.

In the school district election there were 194 votes cast in selecting two school board members. In Winside itself, there were 131 votes cast for town board members.

Leading vote-getter for village board was John Gallop, incumbent, with 108 votes. Dale Langenberg with 95 and Vernon Hill with 90 were also elected to two-year terms. Incumbents F. C. Witt with 43 and Alfred Miller with 39 lost out.

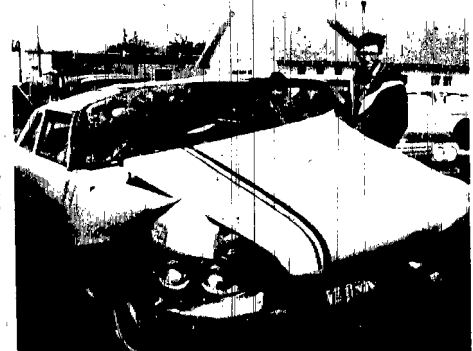
## Judy Bilson in Phi Mu

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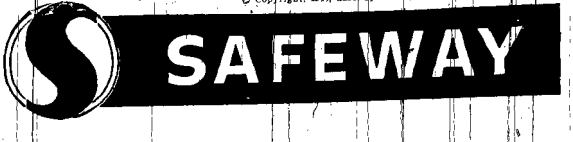

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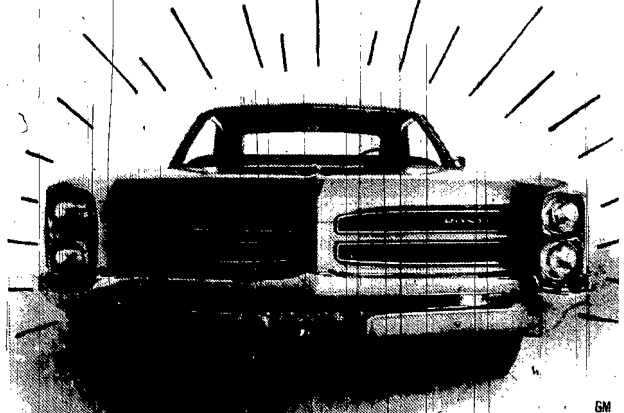

Musk Thistle to Be Eradication Goal

Wayne, Cedar, Dixon, Thurston, Cuming, Stanton, Madison, Pierce and Dakota counties are in the two-thirds of the state where a drive is scheduled against musk thistle in May. Eradication of the weed is essential to the livestock industry.
May 1-5 has been proclaimed "Musk Thistle Control Week." In the eastern two-thirds of the state 67 counties will be taking part.
University of Nebraska, weed districts and extension agents are cooperating in the drive. The aim is to get everyone to spray musk thistle the first week in May.
Musk thistle can ruin pasture for livestock grazing. With an \$845 million range industry at stake, it has been pointed out that those not cooperating would be most foolish.
The weed produces 10,000 or more windblown seeds per plant so even a few can provide seed to infest pasture or range of many neighbors. It has been a threat since 1950 and was classified a noxious weed in 1959.
"Be a good neighbor—kill musk thistle," Gov. Frank Morrison said in proclaiming the week. It's one week every farmer should observe as it's the best time to kill musk thistle.

Consumers Distributes Money in Area Counties

Consumers Public Power District has distributed \$160,210.15 in 11 area counties as the second half of Consumers' payments in lieu of real estate and personal taxes in 1965. In the entire state, \$882,512.04 was paid in 71 counties.
Payments in this area in lieu of tax payments, and five per cent gross revenue tax were: Madison, \$48,304; Cedar, \$7,739; Dixon, \$6,538; Cuming, \$4,530; Pierce, \$3,495; Dakota, \$2,630; Thurston, \$2,527; Stanton, \$1,873; and Wayne, \$807.

## Eleven Lettermen Out for WSC Baseball; Open 23-Game Schedule With Wesleyan

Return of 11 lettermen fortifies Wayne State baseball hopes for another conference championship in 1966, but Coach John Jorgensen still makes some caution signals, saying "We have to replace the hitting of Duane Wehner and Ron Radler," both graduated, who hit .404 and .323.

Among the lettered prospects most capable of hitting are Omaha Bob Gaeta, who two years ago rated first team NAIA All-America and last year was an All-America honorable mention. Gaeta is a medium hitting right fielder.

Gaeta hit .400 in 1964. Versatile fielder, Gaeta may take a turn at catching, the position he played at Omaha's Creighton Prep and he may also work the outfield or return to the third base job he manned the past two years.

Heading the pitching staff is fireballer Dean DeBurr, who won five last year and lost one, to Omaha University in the NAIA Area 3 South playoff. The senior righthander's career record is 11 wins, 5 losses. Earlier this year he was a Chicago White Sox choice in the college draft, and he plans to join the Sox farm organization after the college season.

The mound has four other lettermen in Jim Mau of Wayne,

Bernie Robinson of Malvern, Ia., Larry Hulme of Ralston and Fred Pierce of Lake City, Ia.

Jermier figures on returning lettermen Rich and Bob Bymonds, brothers from Cumberland, Ia., to their second base and outfield positions, and Steve Feinstein of St. Louis Park, Minn., to shortstop.

Tom Fulcher, Wayne, moves from catcher to the first base spot vacated by Wehner, who was an NAIA All-American second team choice last year.

A leg fracture last summer that kept linebacker John Boek of Templeton, Ia., out of football still plagues the peppery outfielder who ranked third in batting at 308 last year. Unable to manage the outer garden-running, Boek may sub at first and pinch hit. He has a knack for getting on base one way or another.

Newcomers boosting the pitching staff are Bob Strathman, a basketball starter from St. Louis, Denny Schulenberg, Scribner, both lefties, and Jim Rasico, Bloomington, Minn.

Mike Malone of DeWitt, Ia., a junior transfer from the University of Iowa, likely will catch. Roger Hobbs, York, is a contender at first. Brothers Don and Rich Helgren of Wayne are scrapping for
