

## Crew Scheduled to Start on Cable Television Installation

Kenneth Everett, representative of Televis Corp., was in Wayne the past week making preliminary plans for the installation of the new cable television system which is to start serving the residents of the city later this year.

Wayne Cable Television, Inc., holder of the franchise for CATV in this city, has received approval from Federal Aviation Agency for a tower on which to receive programs.

All of the hardware, which includes pugs, bolts, electronic equipment and other needs, is on order and much is on hand. As soon as negotiations are completed with Bell Telephone Co. and the City of Wayne for use of utility poles, crewmen will move in.

The firm plans to have men here in a week or two and is seeking technicians to service and maintain the system here. Several local linemen and boys will be hired to assist with the work.

When the cable system is completed, Wayne will have a system offering reception of 11 TV stations as clear as the stations can be received in the originating cities.

A twelfth channel will offer time, weather and public announcements by "scanning" a clock thermometer, barometer, weather forecast board and bulletin board. Background music on the channel will be FM music.

The outlet will not originate programs. It will merely pick up programs offered by Omaha, Lincoln, Sioux City, Sioux Falls and Albion stations, boost them to greater power and send them to homes over the cables.

Residents can connect to the system and have reception guaranteed for about the lowest connection and monthly use fee available. Phadet Gamsombat, 19, has been accepted by Dr. and Mrs. J. M. Brown to live in their home for a year. He is expected to arrive here in July.

Phadet lives in Ban Por, Uthumphaphai District, Thailand. He is one of three children and has lived on a farm to help his widowed mother since his father died three years ago.

He is a member of the Buddhist faith, is past president of the music club in his school and wants to be a teacher. He plays the "oboen" in addition to the instruments mentioned above and plays badminton and "takran" in addition to the sports named.

He first gained an interest in America from talking to an American teacher in Thailand. He corresponded with a pen pal in Philadelphia for years and gained more interest in this country.

## Buses May Not Be Large Enough for All Passengers

Wayne-Carroll school buses have been used for transporting pre-high school pupils from Carroll to Wayne. The school board learned Monday night that the buses are getting more crowded and may not be able to handle the non-district pupils.

A small fee is charged those from outside the district and the board is glad to accommodate the youngsters and their parents. However, they cite the fact that their first obligation is to residents of the district and if there is not room enough for all in the future, the district will have no choice but to stop offering bus service to non-district pupils.

The board does not want to take this action and will not take it until the situation arises. However, giving notice in advance will enable everyone to understand why the action is necessary when it does take place.

Two districts to north of Carroll and 15 north of Wayne submitted written requests for contracting pupils this coming term. District 17 agreed to accept pupils from the two districts on a contract basis.

Two more Title I programs are approved. One, business education, is to be taught by Don Johnson. The other, recreation for math and reading pupils, will be handled by Judy Tietzert with two assistants.

Supt. Francis Hahn reported equipment for listening stations has been ordered. 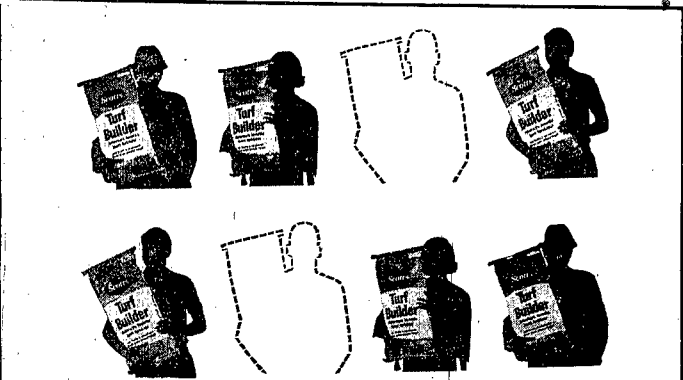

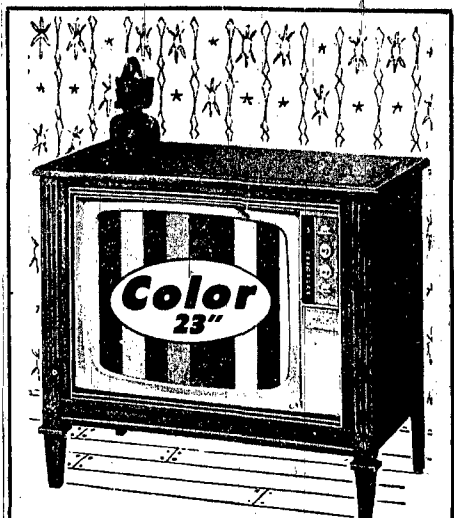

### Dixon County Talks of Past, Present, Future

Dixon County Centennial Committee met at Northeast Station Wednesday evening of last week. The "Ionia Volcano" in the county's past, the chairman in the committee's present and the queen contest in the county's future were the main topics discussed.

Taking them in reverse order, a centennial queen contest is planned. Each town in the county is to select a candidate and a county queen will be selected at the county fair.

L. F. Millie announced he could not serve beyond the present time as chairman of the committee due to ill health. Earl Weze, vice chairman, took over and arranged plans for selecting a new chairman. Janice at the station east of Concord Millie had prepared a report on the "Ionia Volcano" and the town

of Ionia which were famous in Dixon County in years long past. Some of the facts from that report are given here.

Volcano Hill was sighted by Lewis and Clark who camped near it and found that a vindictive Indian tribe related to the Arapahoes had lived in the area and worshipped fire much as the Aztecs. The Ionia Volcano with its fires was regarded as sacred ground.

Every full moon, tribes assembled at the volcano for sacrificial ceremonies. The old and feeble, prisoners taken in battle and children and squaws from conquered tribes were tortured and cast into the crater of the volcano.

George Catlin, early day explorer, viewed the fiery bluff in 1832 and Prince Maximilian with his artist companion, Carl Rulmer, also viewed the volcano. Many stories were told of the volcano by early settlers.

In 1878 the river eroded into the bluff, cutting away the heated portion of the hill. All that remains today is the southernmost portion of the bluff, along with the country where pioneers from the town of Ionia are buried.

Ionia itself was plotted in 1856. It later developed into a river landing and trading post. In 1860 it had a ferry boat to connect with Ft. Randall. Later it had a sawmill, a grist mill, two-story general merchandise store,

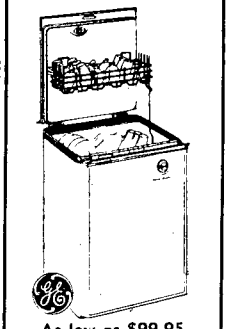

### Veterans Have Decade Available for GI Loan

Veterans living in the Wayne County area and everywhere else in the nation can complete GI loans on farm loans under the new GI Bill II they have had 180 days of active military duty and were discharged since Jan. 31, 1955, according to Chris Bargholz, Wayne County service officer.

The law brings veterans of the post-Korean period GI loan privileges previously available only to veterans of World War II and the Korean conflict. Deadline is ten years after the bill was signed, Mar. 3, 1966.

Those who discharged because of service-connected disabilities have 20 years in which to qualify. Those wanting to figure their own eligibility can add 10 years to the date of last discharge from active service plus one year for each three-month period of that service.

Home loans are available for \$7,500 or 60 per cent of the loan whichever is less. Farm real estate loan guarantees must not exceed \$4,000 or 50 per cent of the loan whichever is less and for non-real estate farm loans, the guarantee may not exceed \$2,000 or 50 per cent of the loan.

Loans may be made for the purchase of homes, for alterations, repairs or improvements already owned and occupied; to purchase farms or farm supplies or equipment to obtain farm working capital; or to refinance delinquent indebtedness on home or farm. Government guarantee is accepted by loan agencies in lieu of a down-payment, Bargholz said.

Certificates of eligibility may be secured from the VA regional office in Lincoln. Bargholz can furnish information at his office in Wayne and will have applications on hand after May 1.

## Bank Deposits in County at High of Over \$18 Million

All banks in Wayne County show an increase in deposits for the past year with deposits exceeding \$18,857,000. This represents an increase of over \$3,409,000 for the last 12 months.

The increase represents a 22 per cent rise in deposits in the five banks of the county. At the same time, loans rose only 14 per cent in the county.

Farmers State Bank, Carroll, increased its deposits by \$115,000 from \$488,485 to \$603,846. During the same period loans increased by

\$93,000 from \$354,917 to \$447,135.

At Winside the Winside State Bank increased deposits from \$1,645,352 to \$2,042,986 for an increase of \$397,000. Loans increased from \$1,099,502 to \$1,342,711 for an increase of \$243,000.

Third biggest bank in the county, Commercial State Bank, Hoskins, passed the \$2 million mark also as it grew in deposits from \$1,821,179 to \$2,330,238, an increase of \$509,000. During the period, loans

increased by \$278,000, from \$1,329,792 to \$1,607,892.

First National Bank of Wayne grew \$456,000 in deposits from \$4,371,014 to \$4,827,014. Loans increased \$410,000 in 12 months, from \$2,295,147 to \$2,705,931.

The biggest bank in the area, State National Bank of Wayne, grew by \$1,732,000 in deposits, from \$7,120,505 to \$8,852,519. Loans in the same period increased by \$498,000, from \$5,479,909 to \$5,977,404.

At present a sustaining membership enrollment drive is being held in the Mid-America Council. Goal is to make Scouting available to 50 per cent more boys in the council area by 1972.

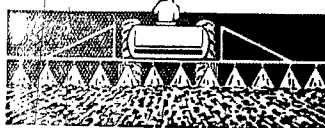

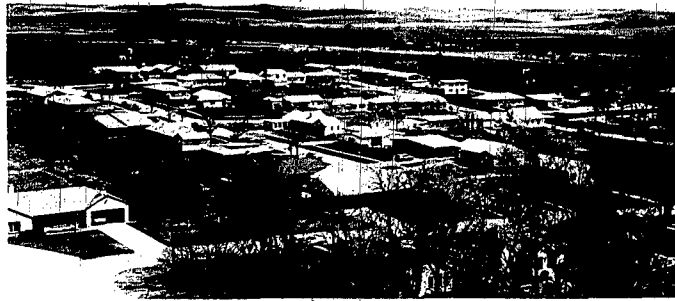

Holding over are Vernie Hurlbert, Clarence Morris and Jack Kavanaugh. They conducted routine business concerning the swearing in of members and preparing for the new year at the Friday session.

Vernie Schmorl of V & L Bar was granted Carroll's first liquor-by-the-drink license. Voters had approved liquor-by-the-drink at the April election. There have been no other applications for permits.
