You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Elderly, Keep Your Insurance

You Wayne County people who are over 65 and blessed with the coverage of Medicare are not considering dropping other hospitalization insurance are you? If you are, think it over because there are many situations Medicare does

you? If you are, think it over occase there are many situations Medicare does not-cover.

If you go to the Wayne Hospital or the Wakefield Hospital, your room costs will probably be paid. But if you go to a bigger city where costs are higher, the program may not cover the room costs since the stipulation is that costs be "reasonable." Costs here are reasonable but they are pretty unreasonable other places.

Suppose you need blood. You must pay for the first three pints and then Medicare will pay for others. However, those first three could cost you \$40 each, which comes to \$120. (You can avoid this cost by getting someone to donate blood to replace what you needed).

If a pathologist is called in, Medicare won't pay for him. The same is true of radiologists, anesthesiologists and other specialists. Just because you need them doesn't mean Medicare will pay for them.

Suppose you're one of those persons who has relatives to keen you in their

Suppose you're one of those persons ho has relatives to keep you in their

home even though you require care and medication. Medicare will not pay for your medicine nor your care. You must be hospitalized to get Medicare payment. Maybe you have to take heart pills, diabetes medicine or something to counteract asthma, arthritis, gout or a blood pressure variance. Nothing in Medicare takes care of the medicine you need.

When you do go to the Wayne Hospital or, any other hospital, you must pay the first \$40. In addition, you have to pay \$10, for every day after the first 60 and if you stay over 90 days you must pay all of the costs of hospital care.

Then there's the doctor. You pay the first \$50 of a doctor bill and 20 per cent of the remainder. This means if your doctor the comes to \$100, you pay \$60 and Medicare pays the rest.

It should be obvious that the average person is going to need medical, surgical and hospital care over and above what Medicare provides. Very seldom can you get along with Medicare alone.

If in doubt, consult the man who handles your insurance. He will give you the facts and help you decide what part of your present health insurance you need to retain. By all means don't give up the insurance you have now. — CEG

'Wayne Hasn't Kept Up

An area resident leaving to make his home elsewhere says his biggest disappointment in Wayne is that the city has not kept pace with Wayne State College in growth and progress.

He did not live here long but from the moment he first arrived he was disappointed in Wayne as a college town. Specific disappointments were not mentioned, merely that he thought a college as good as WSC would be in a better town.

as good as who would be a seen town.

First inclination is to disagree. Wayne has made a lot of progress — maybe not as much as WSC, but the college has had state funds poured in at a faster rate than expected and the growth of the school has matched or exceeded the growth of similar schools.

Wayne can point to new homes, paved streets, airport improvements, power plant expansion, new schools, new business places and other progressive additions.

Just where has Wayne failed in this man's estimation? It could be industrial. We have seen industries such as Armour

go to West Point, O. A. Cooper go to South Sioux City and Iows Beef Packers go to Dakota City. Maybe we never had a chance for them, but the idea that we might have had is intriguing.

The zoning-planning commission is a big step toward a better Wayne. Our industrial commission is made up of dedicated men with investments in the city who want to see industry locate here and investigate every lead thoroughly.

Our business district lacks beauty but it has possibilities. Take a look at the improvements the past year and the improvements going on now, at least two major projects being set for early summer and a third major improvement being in the planning stage.

Perhaps Wayne does lag behind Wayne State, but be patient, for once the city gets moving it will be hard to stop. We look forward to the day when the growth, progress, beautification and industrial development of Wayne are so impressive someone will say: "Wayne State is a good college, but it just can't keep up with Wayne the way this city is developing!"

We Owe Omaha Something

Located about 110 miles from Omaha, Wayne County has some allegiance to that city. The state metropolis is our major supply, transporation, communication, entertainment and shopping center. Omaha has no competition in the area. The state has an annexation law which has enabled Omaha to make an orderly growth — right up to the county line. There it has stopped the city as if a county line really makes a difference. If you think it really matters, ask anyone at Emerson where the business district is split among three counties along with residential areas.

What is disturbing is the attitude of Bellevue that it can stand up to Omaha and grab off areas. In reality, Bellevue itself should be a part of Omaha.

The latest bureau of business research report shows Douglas and Sarpy Counties gaining 74,000 population, almost all in the Omaha-Bellevue area. How does this make the rest of the state look where the tdtal population gain in the same five years is estimated at 87,400? It appears the Omaha area is saving the rest of the state in growth.
