Tekamah dominated the Husker Conference track meet at Wayne State Thursday. Nowcomers to the loop, the Burl County team was led by LeMaster, who was one of the outstanding performers of the day.

Coach John Tollakson takes the Blue Devils of Wayne High to Schuyler Thursday for the Class B district track meet. First and second places in all events except relays qualify for the state track meet at Kearney.

Tekamah finished 23 points ahead of Laurel with 56. Bloomfield had 53. Scribner 44, Wayne 41, Wakefield 33, Stanton 30, Wisner 25.5, West Point 25, Pierce 18, Lyons 10, Oakland 8, Pender 7, Neligh 3.5, Madison 1 and Plainview 0.

Leon Jorgensen, Wayne, set a new record for the conference and tied the WHS record in the 440 with

a time of :51.4. He also won first in the 220 at :23.6 and ran on the mile relay team.

Other Wayne points came when Dave Brown finished sixth in the high hurdles and sixth in the low hurdles; Mark Robinson ran second in the mile; Allen Rasmussen was second in the 880; the Wayne mile relay team finished fifth; and Ed Sherry was sixth in the discus

Cherny of Stanton set a new discus record of 152.45'. Boatman of Laurel set a new mark in the pole vault at 11'6 1/2"; and Lemke of Bloomfield set a new high jump mark for the conference at 5'10".

## World Communism Subject at College

A two-week seminar on communism has been added to Wayne State College's summer schedule. Dr. Gerald Hansen, director, announced Tuesday.

Elementary and secondary teachers especially will benefit from the seminar, said Dr. Hansen, a member of the college division of social sciences, which is sponsoring it. The seminar is open to anyone interested and offers credit, at the senior-graduate level, for those wishing to enroll. Others not wanting credit may audit the course.

The seminar is scheduled from June 26 to July 1, with two hours of lectures from 4 to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday both weeks. Among topics to be discussed are the history and theory of communism, Russian party and government organization, Sino-Russian ideological differences, the period of American intervention in Russia, Russian foreign policy aims, communist ventures in the United States, Latin America and Cuba, communism and agriculture, Chinese brainwashing, and the answer from the far right.

Lecturers will be WSC President W. A. Brandenburg, Dr. Hansen, Dr. Thomas Flickema, Dr. J. R. Johnson, Dr. T. H. Stevensen, Dr. Rafael Sosa, Dr.

A. Warren Williams, Allen Apper, all of the WSC faculty, and Charles Hubbard and Dietmar Kollerbaum, who will teach on the summer faculty.

**NOTICE OF INCORPORATION FARMERS COOPERATIVE OF WAYNE, INC.**  
Wayne, Nebraska.

Notice is hereby given that a cooperative corporation has been formed under the provisions of Article 21 of Chapter 21 of the Nebraska Revised Statutes for 1913 as amended.

1. The name of the corporation is Farmers Cooperative of Wayne, Inc.

2. The address of the registered office of the Corporation is Wayne, Nebraska.

3. The general nature of the business to be transacted is to own, conduct, operate, maintain and carry on the business of buying and selling, manufacturing, transporting, processing and storing farm equipment, supplies and products, petroleum products and the business of marketing farm products for members in the State of Nebraska, and at such other places or places as may be determined by the Board of Directors of this corporation, and to own and use any and all licenses, permits, and franchises necessary or useful in connection with the business. The corporation may carry on this business both for itself and as an agent for others.

4. The amount of the capital stock authorized is \$20,000.00 divided into 8,000 shares of stock of the par value of \$25.00 each. When issued, said stock shall be fully paid for and shall be non-assessable. Said stock may be paid for in money, or by the application of patronage, refunds, or by a combination thereof.

5. This corporation commenced on June 28, 1965, and has perpetual existence.

6. The affairs of this cooperative corporation are to be conducted by a Board of Directors and the following officers: President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and such other officers as may be provided by the bylaws.



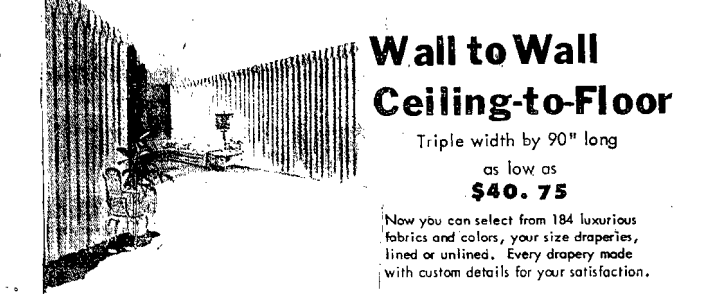

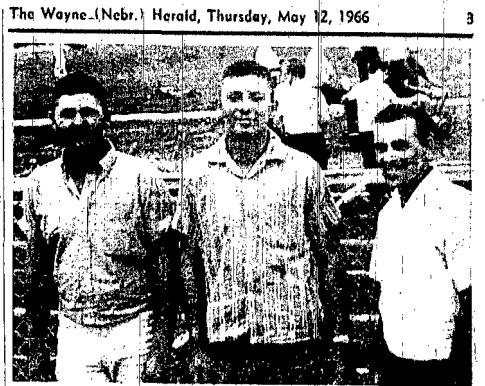
