Midgets, Legion in Action at Norfolk

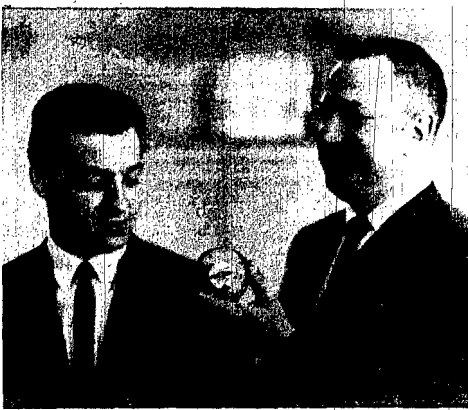

Leon Jorgensen ran the 440 in :51.2 which is a new school record but not good enough for a place among the top five in the state in Class B. Bill Witt had set the old record of :51.4 in 1959 and Jorgensen had tied it this year.

Coach John Tollakson's two-mile relay team finished sixth. David Brown ran the low hurdles in 21.5 to tie the school record set by Bob Schwarzenbach in 1956; and Mark Robinson failed to place in the mile run. Brown is a sophomore so the outlook for the years ahead is bright.

Winside had three entries in the state meet. They failed to score a point but had the honor of taking part. Bob Danberg was in the low hurdles, Roger Hill in the shot put and Reed Wacker in the high hurdles for Coach Pete Kropp's tilts.

Wayne Second in NCC This Season Over-All

Kearney State College athletes won the all-sports championship for over-all performance in nine sports of the Nebraska College Conference in the 1965-66 year.

Wayne State, champion last year, finished second in the ranking of five NCC colleges, followed by Peru State, Chadron State and Hastings.

On the basis of one point for first place, two for second, and so on, Kearney compiled 17 1/2 points, Wayne 23, Peru 28, Chadron 32, Hastings 34 1/2.

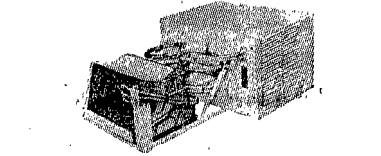
Kearney won titles in cross country, baseball and track, and tied for first in football with Wayne and Peru; Wayne gained championships in wrestling and

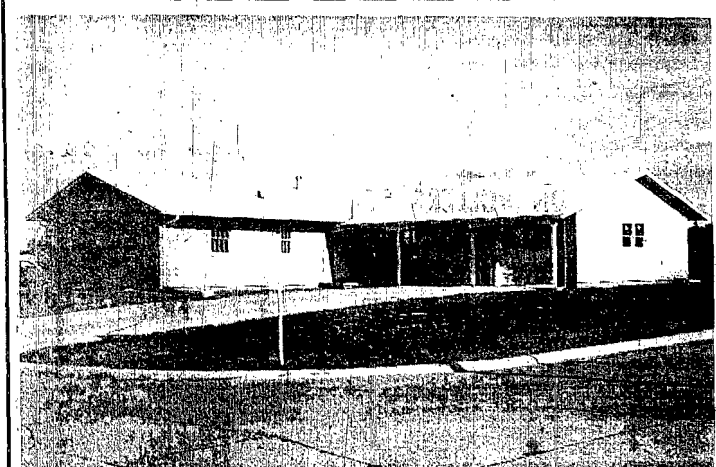

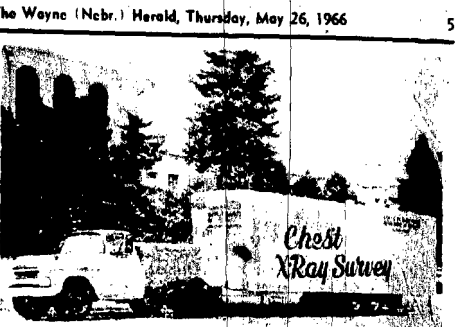

Three girls lead each group. Nancy Backstrom is beginning group leader, Jill Netherland leads intermediate group and Connie Ratze leads advanced group.



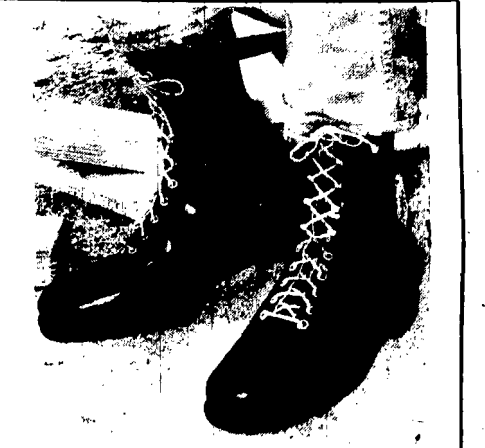

A one-room building, it was taught by one teacher who handled all eight classes. Since that peak enrollment it has been dropping off until the low point was reached this year.

Will classes be held there again? It is possible, depending upon the number of pupils in future years. There are no plans at present to reopen the school but the board is still functioning.

Sunday the people of the community gathered for a picnic at the school just as they had done for many years. Because there were no classes the people were not ready to give up that traditional spring gathering.

As one farmer put it: "We never see each other as much as we used to. This is a chance to get together with all the neighbors and just visit."

"Just visit" is not exactly accurate, for there were games for the kids, work by the women and eating—oh, how they eat at rural gatherings. Tables were jam-packed with food for the noon meal and then a lunch before the group broke up.

There were several kinds of meat, potatoes, vegetables, relish, salads, rolls and bread and desserts. No matter how many attend there is always plenty and some food is taken home. Homemade ice cream with cake or pie plus leftovers made up the late after-noon "snack."

Mrs. Louis Luff taught the school the last six years it operated. She and Mrs. Lawrence Ring, one of the first teachers in the district, were among those present for the visit. Mrs. Luff's husband was one of Mrs. Ring's pupils years ago.

President of the board is Mrs. Marvin Victor. Wilus Nelson is treasurer and Mrs. Dick Sandahl secretary. All were present along with several dozen others, young and old, in school and out, determined to get together now and then for a picnic, just as they did all these years, when District 47 school was holding classes.

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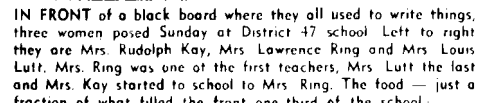
