## Overload Fire Cause Here Tuesday Evening

An overloaded plug in was the cause of a fire at Chome's Beauty Shop, 935 Main, Wayne, Tuesday evening. Little damage was caused but it could have been a major fire, firemen said.

The quick response of the fire department is commonplace but in this instance it was fantastic. No sooner had the fire alarm sounded than a truck was going. Explanation is simple. Some of the firemen were at the fire station when the alarm came in. All they had to do was open the big door and take off. That's why they were even speedier than usual in responding.

The fire was under control shortly after the first truck arrived and a second truck was turned around before it arrived at the scene. The overloaded plug, slightly melted, was kept to show what putting too many appliances on one outlet can do.

Firemen are meeting Wednesday evenings to learn more about fire causes such as this and ways to fight them. Bruce Wilson, state fire instructor, is also taking part in telling about new fire laws. A demonstration will be given the last night of the six weeks course.

Laurel will be the site of a meeting to discuss the proposed vocational technical school Thursday. A meeting is set for 7 p.m. at the Wagon Wheel.

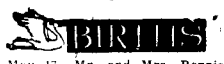

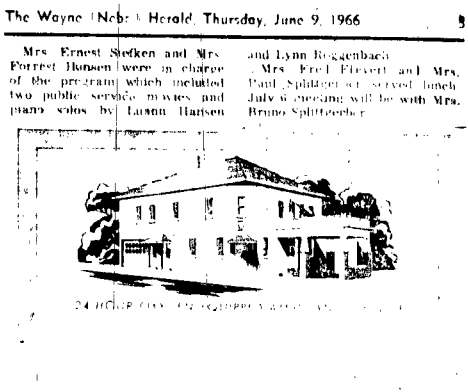

### Dodge Wins Over Wayne Town Team

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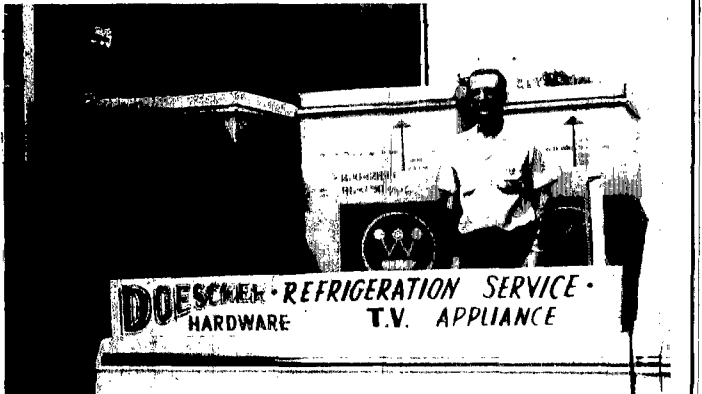

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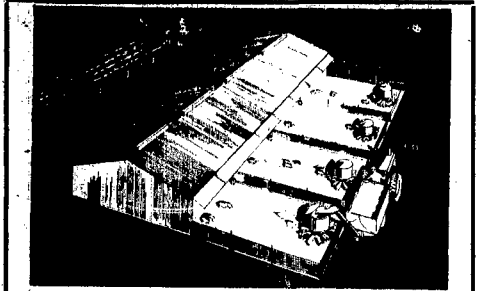

(Continued from Page 1) of the exhibits requires 15 to 20 minutes, and college semantics class students will be on hand to answer questions.

One of the exhibits, for instance, has a group of boxes containing various objects. A visitor sticks a hand through a small opening to feel the objects — and forms abstract opinions of what he feels. The results will be interesting.

Other exhibits seek to prove one of the basic principles of semantics — that things are not always what they appear to be; neither do words always say what they usually mean. An exhibit of modular art will prove this point, showing that a color can change as its neighboring colored objects change.

The May 28 issue of the New Yorker magazine reported, in its Talk of the Town column, a modular art exhibit staged by the New York Society of General Semantics. The Wayne demonstration, Liebig says, will present a similar exhibit — plus much more.  
The demonstration here actually is a pioneering effort to explain semantics in this area. Several students have spent hours on preparation.

The importance of semantics, which is defined as the study of how language influences thinking, is indicated, Liebig points out, by a multi-million dollar study in semantics which the

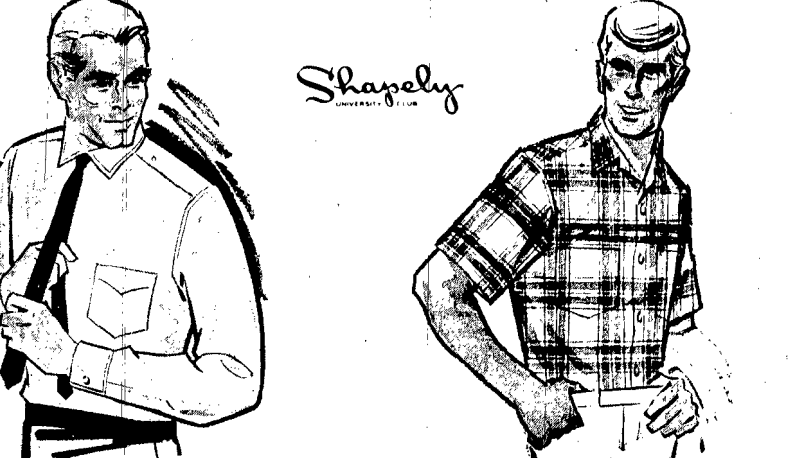
