Wayne Hospital Receives Medicare Plan Approval

Employed at NU College

Dianne Pollard, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Pollard, Wayne, is now employed at the University of Nebraska College of Medicine, Omaha. She completed a course in histotechnology training at NU this spring. Miss Pollard is a graduate of Wayne High School.

Wayne Hospital has been approved for Medicare. Norman Olsen, hospital administrator, was advised of the approval the past week. This approval is for an 18-month period as matters now stand. A review of the hospital to see if "deficiencies" have been corrected will be made in January of 1967 before the hospital is recertified.

Olsen said that patients in the hospital who are over 65 years of age will receive benefits after they pay the minimum required. This goes into effect at the hospital July 1.

Norfolk Firm Will Build Winside's Sewage Lagoon

L. E. Ball Construction Co., Norfolk, has been awarded the contract for construction of a six-acre sewage lagoon at Winside. The lagoon is aimed to bring about compliance with state orders to stop dumping raw sewage into streams.

The Winside lagoon will be constructed south of town on land already purchased. It is estimated that the total cost will be around \$31,139.75, which is the amount of the Ball bid.

Included in the work is a lift station which has been ordered. Electrical work and dirt-moving work will be sub-let by the Ball firm.

L. E. Ball said work should start within the next 10 days with completion of the project within two months. He said he will hire some local labor in addition to regular construction men employed by the company.

To create the six-acre sewage lagoon, 7,500 yards of dirt must be moved. An interceptor will be installed, pipes laid and a lift station connected. Around 2,000 feet of woven wire fence will be erected around the lagoon to keep out people and animals.

Dr. N. L. Ditman, mayor of Winside, said the town board had four bids on the project. The Ball bid was the lowest of the four.

Dr. Deniz Clegg Leaves for Colorado

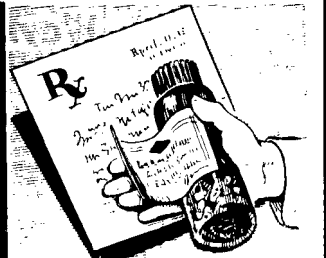

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New Fog's Danger Cited by Council

Wayne has a new fogging device to use in killing mosquitoes and other pests. It is efficient but creates more of a hazard for the young city council members' point out.

The new device puts out a hot steamy fog which hugs the ground and comes out in a more powerful cloud than the old fogger did. In fact the new unit can put out as much fog in one hour as the old one could in one day.

Because it is so efficient, it will not be used on streets. As recommended by the manufacturer and chemical companies, it will be used on alleys.

Vern Schulz, street department head, said it may be even necessary to do the fogging work in alleys from midnight on. The fog clings to foliage and alleys are favorite spots for foliage and mosquitoes so in spite of the noise the midnight hour may be the best time for fogging on alleys.

Parents who do not know about the device should warn children to stay out of it. The fog itself does not hurt the kids, but they cannot see since it is so heavy and hangs so low.

Schulz and a new member of the street department, Dick Danielson, have been testing the fogger this week. One accident occurred in the fog before it had been sprayed one-half block, prompting the decision to go to alleys first and then if necessary go to night spraying.

City Engineer (The place of Tony Reimer on the department Reimer resigned to take an odd job and Danielson resigned at Elton's to take the city post.

Reseal Rates for Storage Unchanged

Rates for on-farm storage of grain under reseal price-support loan for 1966-67 are unchanged from 1965-66, according to J. H. Mohr, chairman of the ASCS county committee. Rates are in line with those paid by CCC for grains stored in commercial warehouses under the uniform grain storage agreement.

Monthly reseal grain storage payment rates for 1966-67 are: Corn, wheat and barley, \$1.095 per 100 bushels for 1965 crop and \$1.004 for 1964 and prior crops; grain sorghum, \$1.960 per cwt for 1965 and \$1.797 for 1964 and prior; and oats, \$21 per 100 bushels for 1965 crop and \$30 for 1964 and prior.

Storage payment for grain under resale is based on the rounded number of whole units except the final payment is based on units and tenths of units. The on-farm reseal storage payment rates are based on units per month.

Corn under loan from 1962 through 1965 crops may be continued in resale storage. Also eligible for resale are wheat and sorghum from 1963, 1964 and 1965 crops and barley and oats from 1964 and 1965 crops.

All grains continued under loan in on-farm resealed storage are subject to call any time to help fill a CCC grain disposal commitment. When loans are called, producers can deliver grain or keep it by redeeming loans. Storage payments will be based on the number of months in storage.

Rural Districts' Reports Come Due

All Class I (rural) districts in Wayne County must have their annual reports in by Thursday, June 23, according to Supt. Gladys Keller, who notes that state law provides for the reports being in 10 days after annual meetings.

Districts held their annual meetings June 13. Some of them have sent in reports and others have not been heard from since the sessions.

Supt. Porter also has a deadline for treasurers in school districts. They have to get bonds in by June 23. State law requires posting bonds with county treasurers, by that date.

Anyone having questions about either the reports or the bonds for treasurers should contact Supt. Porter. There is not much time for the reports as Thursday of this week at 5 p.m. those districts not reporting will be violating state law.

Neihardt Here For WSC Class

Good news — Poet John G. Neihardt is coming to Wayne State after all to teach a class in creative writing.

Stricken with pneumonia several weeks ago, he was unable to take on the class duties when the three-week workshop opened June 10. In his place Mrs. Sally McCluskey taught it.

Then early this week Dr. Neihardt notified the college that he had recuperated and would arrive on campus Saturday from his home at Columbia, Mo. He will teach the creative writing workshop for the final week, assisted by Mrs. McCluskey.

Because Dr. Neihardt attracted fascinated audiences during his two-day visit to WSC last fall, college officials announced Wednesday that enrolled students will be able to attend his creative writing class — to the capacity of room space.

"This will be a fine opportunity for enrichment," Dean of Instruction Warren Williams noted.

Dr. Neihardt may also be able to fill another function originally scheduled — to speak at the dedication of the Mamie McCormick Dale School Museum on campus July 2. Verification of this awaits the poet's arrival. The public dedication of the one-room school museum is set for 11 a.m.

Dr. Neihardt was a 1898 graduate of the Nebraska Normal College (the predecessor of Wayne State) and has continued his interest in the college over the decades since. Last fall he collected a book award named the Conn Library Award named the Conn Library awarding room for him, and re-

vealed a new bronzed bust of him, cast from a sculpture created by Mrs. Neihardt nearly 50 years ago. Dr. Neihardt was named poet laureate of Nebraska in 1921.

Oscar Mann Dies of Accident Injuries

Oscar Mann, 74, died Monday in a Sioux City hospital. He had been taken there last week at of being in a semi-conscious condition for over a month.

Mann was injured in a one-car accident May 12 on a county road between Winside and Wayne. He had been in a coma for several days and then regained partial consciousness.

During the last two weeks he had lapsed into a coma and then regained consciousness at intervals. He was able to recognize relatives but was not able to carry on extended visits with any of them.

Funeral services will be held Thursday at 2 p.m. in Grace Lutheran Church. Details of his life are contained in an obituary in this week's Herald.

Jury Decision in District 17 Favor

The jury in the district court case of Fred Rohrke versus Wayne School District returned a verdict in favor of the school district Wednesday afternoon of last week, thus cutting \$6,500 from the amount the county had allowed for 13.9 acres of B. Burke land.

Originally the county court had set \$26,000 as the amount to be paid Rohrke. Clerk of the District Court records showed both Rohrke and the school district appealed the finding.

Burke had sought from \$40,500 to \$51,000 for the property. The school district had contended the market value of the land was actually nearer \$16,500.

State laws allow Rohrke 30 days from the date of the verdict to file an appeal to the verdict. School district officials are satisfied with the decision and have indicated they will not appeal.

Quite a case was made for continuing manned bombers as the backbone of the nation's defense in contrast to the argument that missiles should take over. It was pointed out that manned bombers flying low are able to evade missiles.

The mission of SAC headquarters at Omaha and its bases all over the world and the future of weaponry in general were included in the discussion which included a question and answer period. Don Reed was in charge.

Ask ASC Committee Nominations Soon

Farmers eligible to vote in community committee elections also can nominate candidates for the committee. Petitions nominating one farmer and signed by six or more eligible voters must be filed before July 8. Voters may sign as many petitions as they wish.

minutes don't want to walk a great distance but those who intend to spend some time parking don't mind walking a block or two.

How about Seventh and Main? That came up for considerable surveying and the state came up with this answer: No traffic signal, is needed but channelized driving lanes are needed so left turn traffic cannot hold up traffic going straight ahead or traffic turning right.

The plan drawn for Seventh and Main would give the lanes needed but would cut into property on all four corners. Since filling stations occupy three corners, they could give up space, but the northwest corner involved residential property.

Surveys showed that drivers going east or west often missed chances to pull onto Seventh when they finally did "get up nerve enough to pull out" they often pulled into traffic that was more congested than it had been, having missed several better opportunities to pull out and thus backing up traffic on Seventh.

In general, the state men seemed to think Wayne's traffic problem was one of inefficient lights, diagonal parking, unchanneled intersections and not enough traffic to warrant any lights at all. "With in a year or two the state will come in and take out two signals," the representative said.

Meeting with the state men were representatives of the Chamber of Commerce, the city council, the mayor and other businessmen. Copies of the report were left with the city, C. of C., Herald and other places for inspection of survey and recommendations.

In other matters not concerning the state directly, the recommendation was made that hot mix surfacing of Main would be desirable with state help provided on costs. Parking marks would last longer on this surface than on bricks. City application for state participation in clearing up the Seventh and Main intersection would probably result in state aid, but the state won't ask to be asked so the city has to take the lead and find out if funds are available in case it decides to do something about modernizing the intersection with channelized traffic flow.

The entire proceedings were recorded for future reference. For those who wanted to ask questions, the state was ready. There seemed to be no topic the representatives were not prepared to handle. Through years of experience the department has heard every question and answers came fast.

ing shipments at Fremont instead of Omaha should speed up delivery to Wayne.

The general consensus was that if the city was to have only two trains a week, Tuesday and Friday would be better than Monday and Friday as presently being run. Kranz said a third train could be brought in Wednesday if there was an outgoing shipment to be picked up or a big enough shipment coming in.

One businessman complained that the line was bringing in money but there was little evidence of the railroad putting any money back in to their line in the way of improvements. Kranz answered this by saying CNW has a five-year plan for rehabilitating lines.

He also cited the taxes and salaries that contribute to the county's economy. He said if businessmen would consider these aspects when they make shipments, they would make use of the railroad more often and thus help themselves and their county.

What if industry comes to Wayne? Kranz said the railroad would provide better service—even daily service—if industry demanded it. He said the railroad wants to carry freight and will go out of its way to get freight but at present the shipments here do not warrant more than two regular trains a week plus a Wednesday evening train from the Wakefield-Crofton line when warranted.

Kranz was sincere and sympathetic in his reception of complaints and suggestions. This alone was worth a lot to the local men who were disturbed over the fact CNW averaged 3 1/2 trips a week with few months ago and now is averaging less than 2 1/2 trips a week.

Local railroad employees were praised for their attitude and their attempts to give top service. Kranz said they should not be faced with complaints or requests but his office should. He urged anyone who had a problem regarding service in or out to contact him personally at Norfolk.

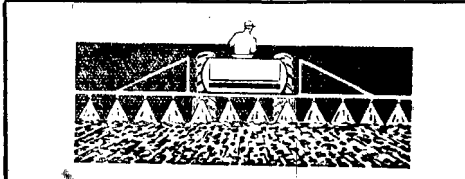

Farm Outlook Brighter, Legislator Tells Big Crowd at Carroll Post Office Rites

"Once again American farmers can start producing to feed our nation and the world," Congressman Clair Callan told a crowd gathered for the Carroll Post Office dedication Saturday afternoon. The crowd far exceeded expectations as to size.

Callan said that for the first time in U. S. history a decision has been made to help the two-thirds of the world that is needy and farmers will do it. He pointed out that the U. S. had acquired surpluses in the past and

In six years the wheat surplus, corn surplus and butter surplus have been decreased a great deal, he said. He added that now farmers can produce to feed the world. Callan said the significance of a new post office in Carroll showed what a community can do when it works together (Carroll had petitioned for new quarters). More significant is the federal realization that the community in one of the richest agricultural areas of the nation has an important position as a town for years to come. On working together, the congressman said there are other federal programs to help towns such as Carroll and swimming pools and other improvements can be obtained.

Postmaster John Rethwisch made opening remarks following music by the Wayne Carroll High School band. Phil Olson was master of ceremonies and Rev. Gail Axen gave the invocation and benediction.

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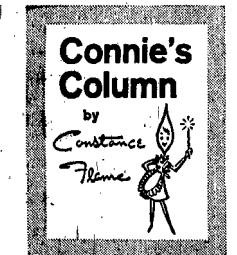

square going from the latter to one of the steering club's dances.

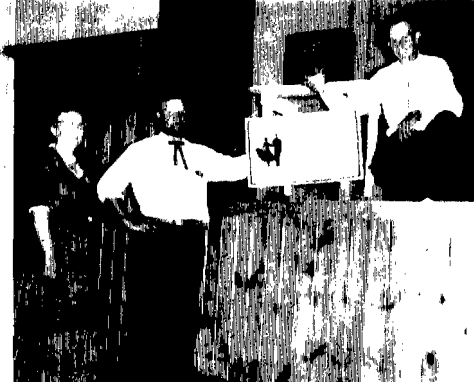
