## Nebraska, Take Another Look

Possibly it is time Nebraska game, forestation and parks commission took another look at its new policy of charging \$7 a year for a sticker allowing fishermen to fish in certain areas.

In Dixon recently it was pointed out that several "oldtimers" can no longer go fishing at favorite haunts. Pensioners or on social security, they can't afford this fee. Fishing is a recreation they have enjoyed at unusually low cost but the best spots are out of reason for them now.

What is true in Dixon must be true in many other places in Northeast Nebraska where elderly men have sought the pleasure of fishing on a lazy day at mearby Gavins Point. They were born too soon because they never struck it rich and now they live on small monthly checks.

In effect, these are the ones hit hard-

effect these are the ones hit hand-In effect, these are the ones hit hardest by the \$7 state sticker. It's no problem at all to younger men still working or the sportsmen who spend hundreds or thousands for equipment so don't mind \$7 more for a permit.

Another Look

If possible, these older fellows should be issued a free "Nebraska Oldtimer" permit so they can continue to go to the points where they have fished for years. As it is now, the one form of recreation they could afford and enjoy has been taken away.

Sure, there are other spots along the Missouri River where they can fish but these men cannot get into some of the rugged bluff country along the river. They necessarily must stay on the best roads, usually the surfaced ones.

If possible, it would be nice if the game department would see fit to recognize these oldetimers with an honorary lifetime sticker so they can enjoy their pensions and their fishing in peace.

The kid with a bamboo pole, a string and a bent pin fishing in a shady nook is an American tradition. But let's don't forget the gray-haired man who thas weathered the wears of Nebraska's good and bad times, who has managed to stay his own master and who now seeks to spend weil-earned hours fishing close by.



This increase was necessary in order that persons dependent on Social Security could meet the rising costs of living, and I supported this increase in a speech on the Senate floor July 8, 1985. In the process of enacting the increase, however, Congress discriminated against veterans, their widows and their orphans receiving government pensions, The Social Security increase boosted veterans' pensioners into a higher income bracket which in turn reduced their pensions. In some instances, the seven per cent increase resulted in a reduction in total income for persons dependent on veterans' pensioners

shall not be taken into account in determining whether a veteran or his heirs qualify for either a non-service connected death or disability pension or for service connected death or disability compensation

The new G. 1. Bill of Rights is not as broad as the one which provided 'edheational' and training benefits after World War II, and steps now are underway to extend it.
