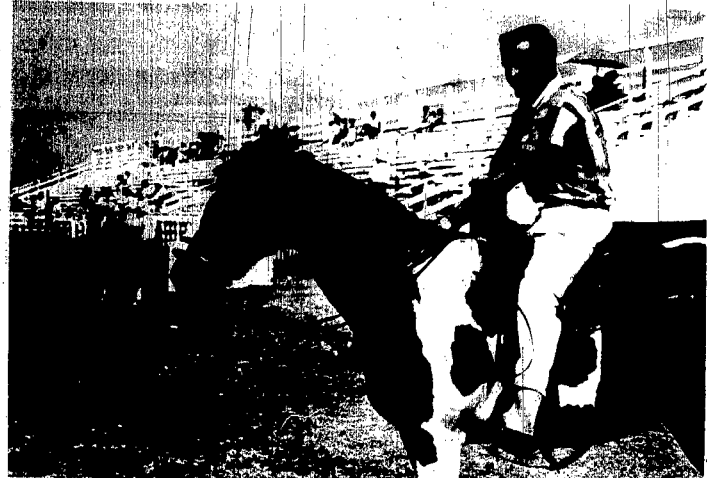

## First Summer Concert by Band to Be Given Friday

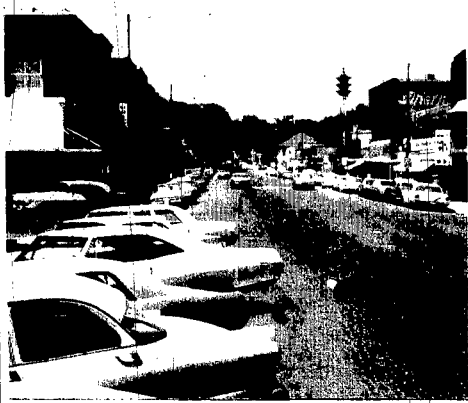

## Numbers on Curbs, Litter Baskets Jaycees' Projects

Wayne Jaycees intend to make it easier to find addresses by sponsoring a drive to paint house numbers on curbs. They also want to make Wayne a cleaner city by obtaining litter baskets for the business area.

The curb-numbering plan would be in the residential area. For 50 cents the Jaycees would paint the house number in front of the residence, a real convenience for those unable to see the variety of house numbers used here — and unable to find numbers on some homes.

# School Budget Up \$40,714; Tax Levy to Be Raised Also

A budget of \$483,984 has been adapted by the school board of District 17 (Wayne) for the 1966-67 term, an increase of \$40,714 over the previous year. This will require an increase in the mill levy about 4.75 mills to 55 mills.

Most of the increase, (\$34,000) is made necessary to take care of increases in salaries for faculty and staff members. Even with the increase, the local district will be paying less than most area schools for beginning and about average for teachers with master's degrees.

## Weather Good for Corn; Too Hot for Most People

If you're a corn stalk, the weather has been great the past week. If you're a human being, it has been a little too hot.

Wayne County has shared a heat wave with the area the past week with warm readings, high humidity and no moisture. It finally broke Tuesday afternoon and forecasters were predicting it would stay a bit cooler than it was last week.

Twice the mercury climbed to 98 the past week, according to People's Natural Gas Co. gauges. June 30 and July 5 hit the peak readings for the period.

The sun beat down unmercifully and the corn thrived in what was described as "good corn growing temperatures." A shower area passed north of here Monday night and the Omaha area had heavy showers Tuesday. The best this area could do was a trace that barely dampened the ground Tuesday afternoon.

High readings every day the past week were in the 90's and most of the night-time lows were in the high 60's or the low 70's. No humidity readings were obtained but it WAS humid.

Air-conditioners ran all night, swimming pools were jammed to capacity, muggy temperatures slowed down activities and in general it was an unpleasant week. Forecasts for "below normal" temperatures the next five days were welcomed.

## School District's Teachers Praised

Wayne-Carroll School District drew praise the past week for its excellent teacher assignment. The praise came from the state school association in announcing schools in the system accredited for the coming term.

In announcing the accreditation, the association pointed out that 95 per cent of the teachers have 24 hours or more in major teaching assignments. This is way above the average for schools.

Complying with the program to eradicate musk thistle, Miller had sprayed a pasture May 19. He did not get a kill. He sprayed again June 16 with a different mixture and this time Larry Willers of the county weed district reported an excellent kill of thistle except in isolated spots in the creek area.

Wednesday of last week the situation changed. Where there had been no musk thistle Tuesday night, there were piles of it Wednesday morning.

Someone had gone along the fence line cutting off musk thistle on county property. This was fine, except they went to the trouble of tossing every thistle into the Miller pasture.

The thistle is far enough along now so it will go to seed. To destroy it, Miller will have to carry it off and burn it or risk the resistant pest start spreading again.

Why would anyone do something that involved going to so much trouble and effort? Miller doesn't know. He can think of no one who has a grudge of would inconvenience himself to purposely do such a thing to his property only. Somewhere someone knows but it may be their secret forever.

Wayne National Guard members were alerted Monday that they might be called by Omaha due to disturbances in the Negro area of the state metropolis. Tuesday evening they were called out and Wednesday morning they were back in Wayne.

Capt. Dan Jochum, who heads Wayne and O'Neill guard units, said 95 men from the two units went to Omaha at 5:30 Tuesday. They reported to Ak-Sar-Ben Field adjacent to the Omaha Armory and spent the night there.

At Ak-Sar-Ben they were given training in riot control and other action they might need if trouble broke out. However, they were never near the Negro section and no trouble occurred so they were released Wednesday morning and left Omaha at 7:30, arriving back about 10:30.

State patrolmen, National Guardsmen and others joined in patrolling Omaha's Negro section where activities had resulted in violence Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Conference promised with action to correct conditions resulted in no outbreaks Tuesday.

Salary of custodians for elementary down to \$7,700 from \$9,000, purchase of home economics equipment, cut in half from \$600 to \$300, and outlay for athletics and physical education on the elementary level, cut from \$450 to \$50.

Major increases come in administration, instruction, school services, plant operation, fixed charges, capital outlay and summer school. The last-named is new to anything put in the budget for summer school would be an increase.

Increased budget costs include: Administration salaries, increased from \$9,700 to \$10,500; clerical salaries, \$5,250 to \$6,000; principal's salary, elementary \$6,050 to \$6,500; principal's salary, secondary, \$9,050 to \$9,300; elementary teachers' salaries, \$127,250 to \$142,000; junior and senior high teachers' salaries, \$144,155 to \$161,000; librarians' salaries, \$8,025 to \$11,220; clerical salary, secondary and elementary, zero to \$2,000; audio-visual, zero to \$750; instruction travel

expense, zero to \$300; transportation service, secondary, zero to \$250. Salary of custodians, secondary, \$6,600 to \$8,800; custodial assistants, elementary and secondary, zero to \$800; social security, \$10,500 to \$15,225; health insurance, zero to \$1,620; piano, zero to \$800; summer school salaries, zero to \$1,584; and other expenses for summer school, zero to \$125. Supt. Haun presented a comprehensive budget study to the board, showing the balances each month, receipts anticipated and realized 1965-66 from 27 sources, expenditures for the past year, surplus in budget balance on hand (\$147,738.07), and accounting for every cent spent and other information on school administration. The budget study and its implications involved hours of study and preparation. Anything in the district wishing to delve more thoroughly into the budget can inspect copies and at the same time will gain an insight into the involved and intricate set-up of school administration and operation has been made.

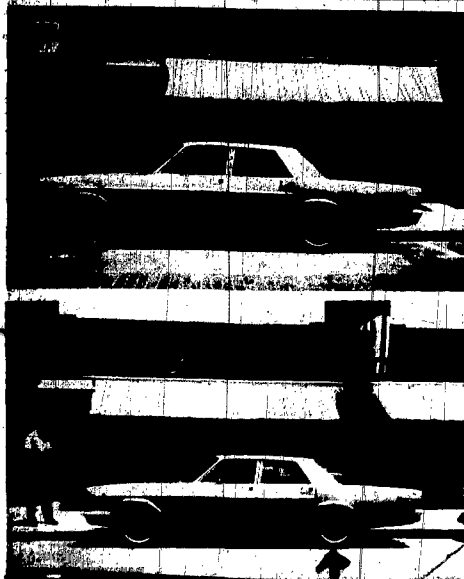

## Hospital Receives Medicare Contract

Norman Olsen, Wayne Hospital administrator, accepted a letter of agreement from Joseph Buglewicz, Norfolk Social Security office manager, the past week. This provides for the hospital accepting older persons for treatment under the program starting July 1.

Based on the book, "Your Medicare Handbook," Buglewicz summarized the way Medicare will work. In addition, he said Social Security office workers will answer questions anyone may have.

Here is the information he supplied on various phases of Medicare:

**Inpatient Hospital Service**  
Will help pay for care in hospital up to 90 days during each spell of illness.

**Dollars and Cents**  
Each spell of illness provides for 90 days of benefit services. For the first 60 days, pays for all but \$40 for covered services. From the 61st to 90th day, \$10 each day for covered services.

**What Insurance Covers**  
Room and board in a semi-private room (24 beds);  
Nursing services ordinarily furnished patients;  
Supplies, appliances and equipment (splints, casts, wheelchairs, crutches, etc.) ordinarily furnished;

Blood transfusions except the first three pints in one spell of illness;  
Medical services ordinarily fur-

ished by the hospital.  
Therapeutic services (x-ray, radium) or linarily furnished patients.  
Drugs and biologicals ordinarily furnished patients.

**What It Will Not Cover**  
Physicians and surgeons' services.  
Private room (unless medically necessary) but you can pay difference between private and semi-private room;

Most people will not have to keep rates in mind. Usually, patients will not stay long enough to use all benefits. SSA will keep track of your "spell of illness" and give information on "benefit days" you have left.

### Nigerian Visitor Likes This Area

Orilo Adetula from Oyo, Western Nigeria, was in this area visiting Dixon and Wayne Counties farms and points of interest Thursday. In spite of heat and humidity being high, he liked it here.

According to Orilo, the heat here is "nothing" compared to what equatorial Africa experiences. Where he lives the temperature never drops below 63 degrees, is often well over 100 degrees and is accompanied by humidity.

Humid? Would you say 80 inches of rain a year would make it humid? That is about the average for this part of Nigeria. However, Northern Nigeria has a dry heat and there is much desert.

This latter point is interesting for Dr. Russell Owen, WSC, who is going to Northern Nigeria as consultant to the ministry of education. He visited with Orilo while he was here and hosted a dinner at which the visitor was honored guest.

Orilo came to the United States in May to spend a year studying under the grain-storage program. His government and the United States made his visit possible through the AID program.

Farms are small where he comes from and it is easy to see why. Because of the heat and humidity, growth is heavy. Farms are about 15 acres and land is usually farmed for three years, allowed to rest three years (during which time it grows back in brush) and then is farmed again.

That humidity is a real problem. Grain is dried but it becomes humid at once. Nigeria hopes to find ways for keeping the grain dry or using it in a humid condition.

Family-type farms of this area proved of interest to Mr. Adetula. He liked what he saw and remarked more than once the genuine warmth of his welcome here was most gratifying. He also said the steaks Dr. Owen ordered at WSC had been a portion of the best meal he had eaten since coming to this country.

Married and coming from the bush country, he feels he will miss his family for a year but hopes to gain a lot to help him

self and his fellow Nigerians. Back home he has a wife and four children, including a set of twins, who will be just as lonely for him.

The personable visitor was a credit to his nation in his visit to a strange country. He was accompanied here by Floyd Butterfield of the state ASCS office and visits to points of interest such as WSC and Northeast Station were arranged by Thomas Roberts of the local ASCS office and representatives of the Dixon County ASCS office, Ponca.

The SCS will stock the pond with bass, blue gill and catfish. A picnic area could even be developed.

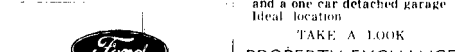

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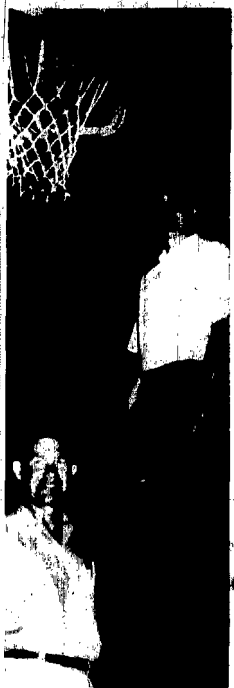


## Another Basketball Honor Announced Citing Dean Elofson of Wayne High

### Final Rites For Mrs. G. Coultter Held At Winside

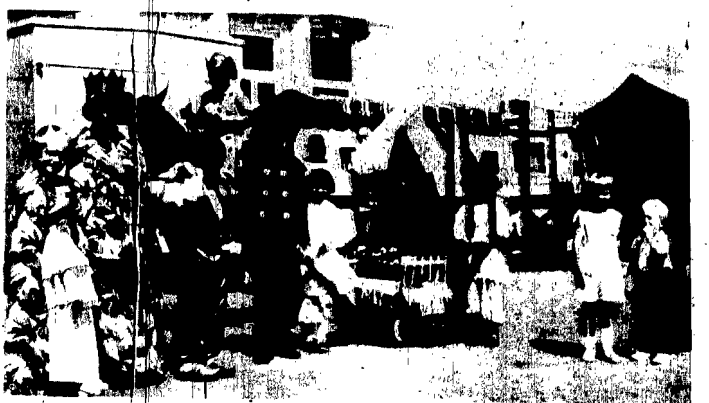

### VA Research Covering Time Since World War

Veterans Administration functions are well-known in many cases, but Chris Bayholz, Wayne County Service Officer, has reported on a little-known facet of VA activities which covers the period since World War II.

Research has been undertaken with the conclusion reached that growing old is not so bad if it doesn't really matter to you. If it bothers you, growing old can be quite a problem.

It was found that individuals who have difficulty in adapting to later life tend to occupy themselves with thoughts of growing old even while young. Those who are effective and productive do not think of themselves as growing old, being unaware that they are aging.

Evaluation included assessing attitudes of different ages toward growing old. With the average age of WWII veterans reaching 46, the VA has functioned long enough on the study to begin making reports.

They have 21.5 million WWII vets, 5.7 million Korean vets who also saw some WWII service and 4.5 million Korean vets who had no previous war experiences on which to base studies which are continuing.

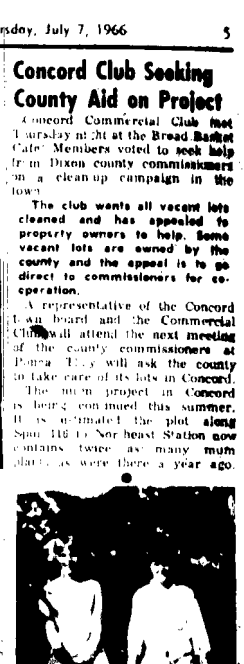

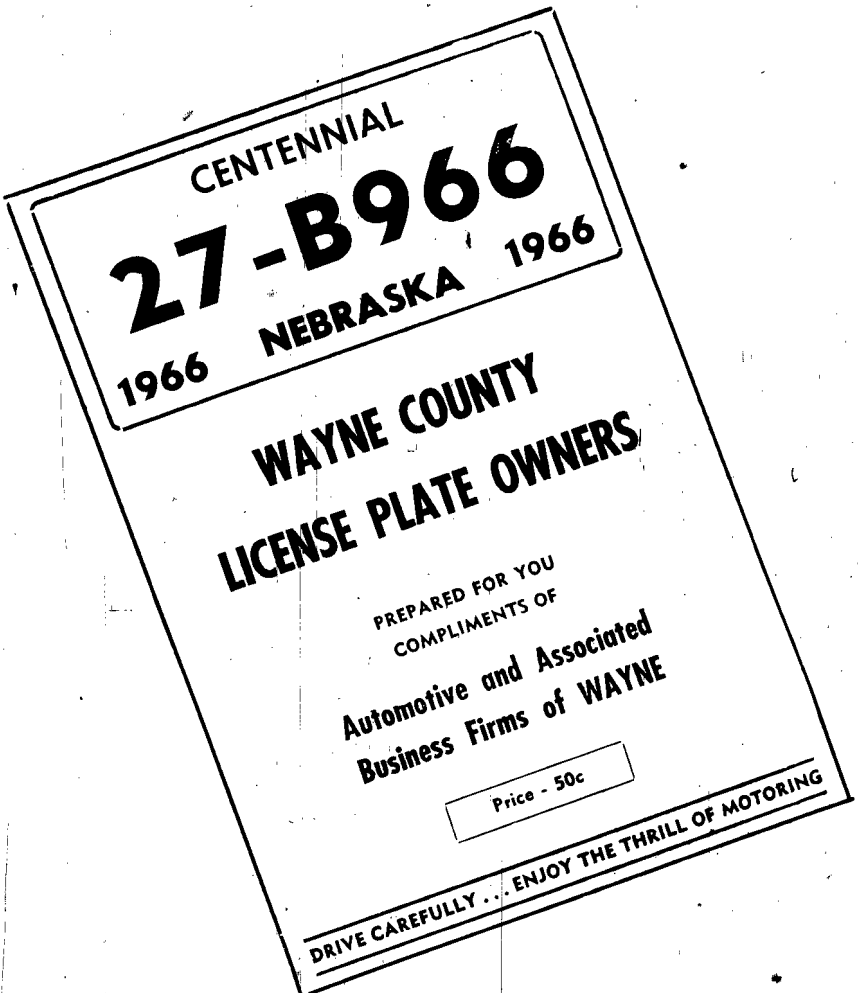
— such as records and record players, projectors, tape recorders, and transparencies.

**History Relived As Oldtimers Come Back**

 Considerable history of half a century ago in Wayne was relived last week. The occasion was a reunion inspired by the visit of Mr. and Mrs. Tracy Kohl, now of Sedona, Ariz.  
 Mr. Kohl is a native of Wayne, graduate of Wayne High in 1912 and of Wayne State in 1914. His father, Phil, was among Wayne citizens who led the campaign for the state legislature to buy the Nebraska Normal College and make it a state school.  
 The Kohls' hosts here, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Mines, also Wayne High graduates of 1912, arranged a dinner with eight other guests. Of the 12 present Wednesday evening last week, 11 had been students at Wayne State about the same time — from 1912 to 1915. And seven of them were in the 1912 Wayne High class.  
 Besides Mr. Kohl and Mr. and Mrs. Mines, the high school classmates present were Mrs. R. W. (Alma Craven) Hahn of Columbus, Mrs. A. T. (Neva Orr) Cavanaugh of Wayne, Mrs. Virginia Chapin McCain of Winside and J. M. Strahan of Wayne.  
 All of these plus four others at the reunion also attended Wayne State: Mr. and Mrs. John T. Bressler, jr., of Wayne, Mrs. Strahan and Mr. Hahn, son of the late H. H. Hahn, long-time dean

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at Wayne State.  
 Mrs. Kohl was the only non-Wayne student in the dozen, but that did not diminish her fascination with the reunion, or with the numerous re-acquaintances and husbands Tracy established in his tours of the town.  
 Since his graduation from the college in 1914, he had returned to Wayne only once, in 1960 for WSC's golden anniversary. In that long span of absence, Wayne and the college both had changed dramatically. And they had changed noticeably since his 1960 visit, Kohl observed.  
 Memories of the classmates, possibly had changed, too, as a reporter could tell from their stories of the old days. Mrs. Mines, for instance, recalled the time when the original college building was to be razed, and all the men students on campus were summoned from classes to help begin the project. (It is not clear what authority did the summoning.)  
 As Mrs. Mines tells it, the fellows attached a rope to the top of the bell tower to pull it down. Pull they did — until the rope broke, dumping all the tuggers into an uproarious tangle.  
 "Do you remember, you were laughing so hard you couldn't pull anymore?" Mrs. Mines asked.  
 Replied Mr. Kohl, with a sly grin: "Better not talk about that on grounds of incrimination."  
 The reunion of course recalled

many incidents, some of that time in school, some of later activities.  
 Kohl served as business manager of Wayne State's first yearbook, the 1914 Spizzerinkum (a name later shortened to Spizz). That book alone could prompt endless stories among the reunionists.  
 After graduation from the college, Kohl attended the University of Nebraska one year. His father was then a state senator. He transferred to Dartmouth, earned a degree there; went to Oxford University in England for a year, then joined the Hoover relief administration in Europe, first in Austria, then in Russia.  
 Returning to America, Kohl entered the advertising business in Chicago and for 22 years was associated with hotel advertising. For a time he was president of the Greater Chicago Hotel Association.  
 Since his retirement in 1958, the Kohls have lived in Sedona, Ariz. — but only in partial retirement while he spends part-time in private hotel management at two national parks.  
 The occasion for Kohl's Wayne visit was to receive a 50-year Mason pin from the Wayne Lodge. Also receiving this recognition Tuesday night last week were Paul Mines, Charles Millie and in absentia, French Penn.

**New Plan at WSC Will Aid Freshmen**

A new plan for orienting freshmen to Wayne State College begins next week.  
 The plan recognizes Wayne's rapid growth by bringing new freshmen and their parents to campus in small groups, about 100 students in each of five one-day sessions.  
 The dates are July 6, 8, 12, 15, 22. All students accepted for enrollment were invited to select a date; 358 already have replied, and the number may reach 600.  
 Director of admissions Jimmy Hummel, in charge of the orientation, believes the new plan will provide newcomers better opportunity to understand college than the previous system of bringing students and parents to one mass meeting in the fall.  
 The schedule has registration a 9-30 in the Peterson Fine Arts Center, followed by a general session at 10:15 in Ramsey Theater, with brief talks by Dean of Instruction Warren Williams, Dean of Students Donald Merriman, and Director of Student Financial Aid Orvid Jwens.  
 At 11 a.m. Student Council members will take the new freshmen to a question-answer chat in the library while Dean Merriman talks to parents in Ramsey Theater. After lunch, the council will conduct a campus tour.  
 At 2 p.m. students will visit the faculty of academic divisions, choosing the area of their main interest. After learning about course opportunities, the students can register for fall classes.  
 Registration at this time, Hummel noted, will take considerable pressure off the enrollment period in September.

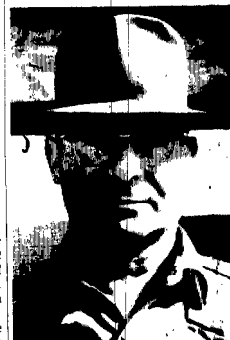

 The most recent bust of Dr. Neihardt was sculptured more than 40 years ago by his wife. That work has been a WSC treasure for many years, and last fall it was cast in bronze for extended permanence. On the occasion of the poet's visit to Wayne in October, the new casting was revealed to him, and Dr. Neihardt responded:  
 "This is the finest thing that ever happened to me. You know, we (he and his wife) talked long ago of wishing that bust could be put in bronze—but never thought it would."  
 Now Sigma Tau Delta has initiated a plan to have William Cotdiner, WSC art faculty member, create a new bust. The fraternity gave \$100 to begin a fund for the work and is asking additional gifts from students, alumni and townspeople. Gifts can be mailed to Sigma Tau Delta, c/o Mr. Charles Curb, Wayne State College.  
 A special appeal is being made to former English students. To compile their names Sigma Tau Delta went to early Spizz yearbooks for membership in the Neihardt Club, a literary club that was formed back in the 1920's when Dr. Neihardt's poetry reached national renown.
