





Farm Life Fine . . . Except

As much as farm life and farm people are to be admitted, there is one phase locally that seems to be sadly neglected. A joint effort by town and rural residents is needed to correct the situation. During recent weeks a survey of an informal type has been taken among farm youths. Some are among the best athletes in the area, some are muscular from just working hard as farm boys will and others participate in community activities but do not "get around much."

ty activities but do not "get around much."

The one thing that was common among most of them is the inability to swim. Just why Wayne County rural youth should neglect this activity is hard to figure out.

One said he had no desire to learn to swim. However, that's not the point. It's life of the life of a friend or relative could depend on his ability to know something about swimming someday. In this day of farm ponds, fishing trips along the Missouri, outings at Lewis & Clark Lake and pienics along streams, all of its are around water at one time or another. The time may come when someone who doesn't want to swim is in deep water on a non-voluntary basis.

Suppose your farm son or daughter get

Suppose your farm son or daughter slipped into a pond — could they get out without drowning? Do you have little friends or relatives who visit you and who night wander off and fall into a

stream? Is there anyone around who could swim enough to pull them out? All sorts of situations could arise when the ability to swim could mean life or death for yourself or someone else. As the crisis arises the realization comes through that learning to swim is pretty important after all.

important after all.

Farm kids work and they cannot get into town just any hour of the day. However, perhaps a "farmer's special" class could be offered at the Wayne pool or the Wayne State pool. If even one farm boy or girl learns to swim, the course would be worthwhile.

Such an intertaking should also be offered farm then and women. Every rural resident should be given the chance to learn to swim under a special plan devised just-for them. No one knows when they'll need to use the knowledge gained.

when they'll need to use the knowledge gained.

Too many segard swimming as pure recreation. It is fun, but so is living. Learning more about swimming may mean the chance to learn more about life — 'no one wants to find out ahead of time what death is like.

May the day never come when a life is lost because a rural resident was not prepared for the peril he faced. Be it his own life or someone else's, it could depend on something being done now to enable giral residents to correct the existing situation.

Wayne is surrounded by little towns as was pointed out last week in an editorial concerning the numerous communities of over 100 within 10 miles of the county line. In addition, there are four other small towns within the county. Of the 19 towns in the county and close by many are in the 100-1,000 population category. To some this word of encouragement is given! Hang on!

No heed to say such a thing to Laurel and Wakefield, two communities that have shown a lot, of spirit in remaining growing and progressive. Other smaller towns might find it a bit more difficult to keep hoping and boosting for a better future.

The time is coming when Dixon, Concord, Carroll, Winside, Hoskins, Pilger and Belden are going to be looked upon as better places in which to live. No one predicts a "boom" but there should be a comfortable growth.

Low rent will be one boost for them and low taxes another. The cest of living in such towns seems to be llower and as facilities in Wayne and Norfolk be-

come more overhurdened, people are going to look to the smaller towns more and more for lower rent and lower taxes. Many of the towns are within easy driving distance of Wayne, Norfolk and even South Sioux City. With surfaced roads connecting most towns, commuting is apt to becomesmore and more common. One woman searching for a place to live found facilities for \$35 to \$55 a month—three- and four-bedroom homes. A farm home near one of the smaller towns was offered rent-free just for feeding livestock and keeping the house in good shape instead of letting it fall into disrepair as many long-vacant houses have done.

These smaller towns are great places to live and raise families. Like Wayne and Norfolk they are located in a top agricultural region. They just happen to have fallen behind in population growth. Nevertheless, they are worth saving, worth fighting for, worth living in and worth consideration. Hang on, little towns, there are better days ahead.

Integrine yourself dumped into the Omaha 'Negro neighborhood' as a black person. Try to visualize what life would be like to be "guaranteed" the rights of everyone else, rights actually denied because your skin is dark.

As a 'black'', look back on 200 years of little progress in gaining the freedom our forefathers sought for all men! Maybe you'll get upset, demonstrate, and even turn to violence in the

hope that perhaps tomorrow holds something better than today.

something better than today.

This is not to condone violence, but it is to recommend understanding. Here in Wayne we can go home from work to nice homes, enjoy the pleasures of the good life and condemn those Negroes who dare to upset our lives by creating disturbances.

However, if we were in their place wouldn't we do the same things? It's easy to say we wouldn't hecause there is no chance of our ever having to change places with them.



Medicare Benefits Begin

An estimated 175,000 Apéras-kans recently becam eligible for benedi's under the hew feder-al Medicare program. State Health Department officials said. —Hospital insurance plan for persons 65 and over permits coverage for up to 30 days. The patient pays the first \$40 of the bill. Atter 90 days, he contributes \$10 a day toward costs.
—The voluntary insurance plan covers doctor bills and other costs which persons over 65 obtain by paying \$3 a month. The government matches this contribution. The patient pays the first \$50 of his doctor bills each year and 20 per cent of the remainder. The plan picks up the other 80 per cent.
