

Federal, State Aeronautics Men Discuss City Airport

Surfacing of Wayne's airport runway moved closer to reality Friday when federal and state aeronautics representatives met with city officials to discuss requirements for federal and state participation and gave approval to plans for surfacing.

The liftoff came on the lighting project, Federal Aviation Administration officials and Nebraska Department of Aeronautics representatives agreed that electrical work costs were set too high and should be re-negotiated and the new agreement sent in for approval.

Blacktop, Inc., Fremont, has the surfacing contract which calls for completion within 90 working days' after signing of the contract. However, the numerous delays have resulted in overlooking this requirement.

Representatives of Blacktop said they hope to get started on surfacing by September but would be working by October for sure. They said Nov. 15 was the target date for completing work.

The cross-runway will be kept open as long as possible while the northeast-southwest runway is being surfaced. Advance notice of the closing of the airport will be given 10 days before it is closed for construction. All aviation bodies will be notified.

FAA and NDA representatives will make periodic unannounced visits to the project while construction is underway in order to keep tabs on the quality of work being done. Lloyd Smith, district FAA official, will also make two inspections to see that the rules are complied with before the finished project is accepted.

There will be some changes made in the operation of the airport. City officials were told it must be open to everyone and no "exclusive contract" will be allowed such as the one presently maintained with Don Jackson.

If regulations are followed, state and federal aid will take care of most of the costs of the surfacing with Wayne paying the remainder. Local representatives agreed with all suggestions on new electric contract, no exclusive contract for operation and steps in closing the airport when construction starts.

Attending the meeting were Henry Wolf of the NDA, Lloyd Smith of the FAA, Mel Wood, area FAA coordinator, Mayor William Koerber, the city clerk, city engineer, city council members and Ron Kuefer from Blacktop, Inc.

Rain Brings Short Respite from Heat; Mercury Climbs Again to Over 100 Mark

A wind storm preceded rain Thursday night of last week, bringing a short respite from the heat. Following some lower readings, the mercury started climbing again and two days the high mark was over 100 degrees.

Taking pleasant things first, the rain was a godsend. It made the air more humid but it also watered the thirsty crops to help them through the heat that has prevailed the better part of two weeks.

Farmers were reluctant to say what it would have been like had the rain not fallen. However, it was obvious the heat would have burnt all crops and cut down on yields.

Heat had been held back after the rain. For instance, it was 98 Tuesday of last week. The following day it was no better than 87 and for two days the mercury never rose above 90.

Then it started all over again. It was 96 July 10, 103 the next day and 101 July 12. Forecasters indicate some showers might fall during the next few days but no real respite from the heat was expected. As if to carry out the forecast, light rain fell in scattered showers Wednesday.

City Breaks Power Mark

The hot weather has sent electric consumption soaring in Wayne. Supt. Norb Brugger of the municipal power plant told Wayne City Council Tuesday night. The plant has been breaking records since June, he said.

Air conditioner use is blamed for the rise in demand for power. However, there are other electrical appliances also in use and the plant has been pushed to capacity.

Brugger said the plant does not get a chance to cool down at night during the low power use period. As a result, the units start out "hot" in the morning and stay hot throughout the day.

An example of what the situation is can be seen in the peak load. Last year it was 57,000 kilowatts in a 24-hour period. From Sunday midnight until Monday midnight the plant hit 68,000 kilowatts generated for a new record.

Another example: A new record peak in use was hit when 4,500 kilowatts load was reached. **POWER MARK** — Page 2

Seven Rural Residents of County Hurt in Accident

Seven members of a rural Wayne County family were hospitalized at Wakefield Saturday after an accident on Highway 16 7 1/2 miles south of Wakefield just inside the Wayne County line.

The Royce Isom, Jr., family, Randolph, was in the mishap. Isom was driving when the car went out of control on a gravel section of a detour being maintained while Highway 16 is being surfaced.

Troopers Barton Cooper and Robert Mavis of the Nebraska Safety Patrol investigated. They reported that the car was all but demolished in the mishap and it was a wonder injuries were not more serious.

Isom said the car swerved in the gravel, hit the north rail over a deep ravine through which a creek runs and dropped about 20 feet into the ravine, landing on the front and then the side.

Mr. and Mrs. Isom seemed to have the most severe injuries when brought to the Wakefield Hospital. She suffered a broken collarbone and a broken pelvis bone and he suffered fractured ribs.

Jolene, 7, broke one leg and Janet, 6, Mayvonne, 3, Kelly, 5, and Rodney, 1, suffered cuts and bruises. The last four named were released from the hospital this week and are being cared for by relatives.

The Isoms had been visiting in the Larry McQuistan home at Pender and were enroute home at the time of the accident.

It occurred on a weekend when Nebraska was having many traffic collisions. A total of 14 people died over the weekend in traffic accidents.

The Isom car was brought to Wolke Motor Co. in Wayne. It was kept in the garage due to so many personal belongings of the family still being inside. Damage was so heavy it was thought to be a total loss.

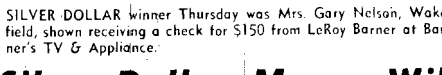

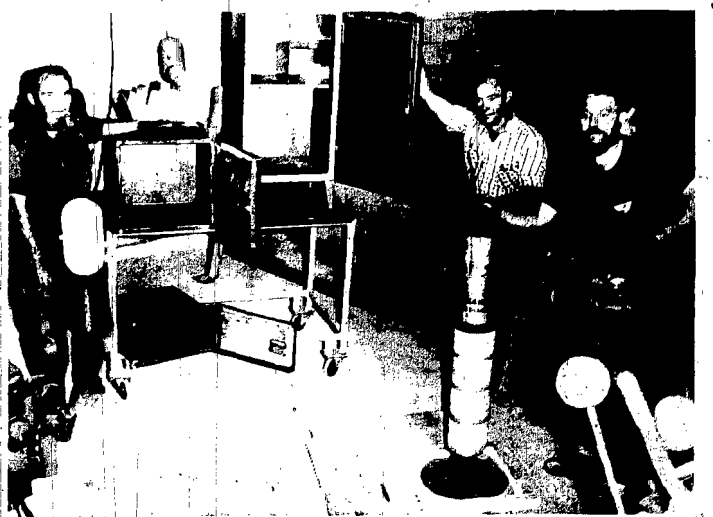

Monday. This was 750 kilowatts after the previous high. What is worse, it didn't last for a minute or five minutes but hung on for hours at a time most of Monday.

The council decided to ask businessmen of Wayne to voluntarily cut down on the use of lights during the rest of the hot spell. If merchants use less lights, they will find their places cooler, their air conditioners will not have such a heavy cooling job to do and the plant will get some respite.

Residents are also asked to help by not running air-conditioners at full capacity. Lights not being used should be shut off and electrical consumption should be cut wherever possible. If the businessmen and householders voluntarily comply, there should be no trouble. If not, it might be necessary to cut down

on air conditioning use and make other restrictions in order to relieve the power plant load. A new engine is on order for Wayne and if it were installed there would be no problem what-so-ever. However, it will not be ready to go until water and the people just have to live with the problem as long as the heat wave hangs on.

Pig Producers Plan Pork Promotions; Chef's Choice Chops Charm Chowhounds

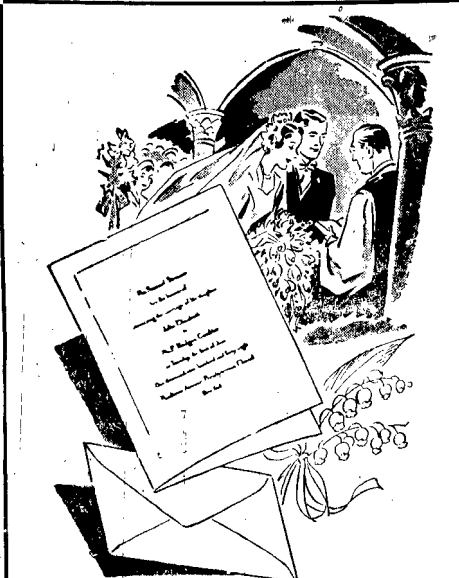

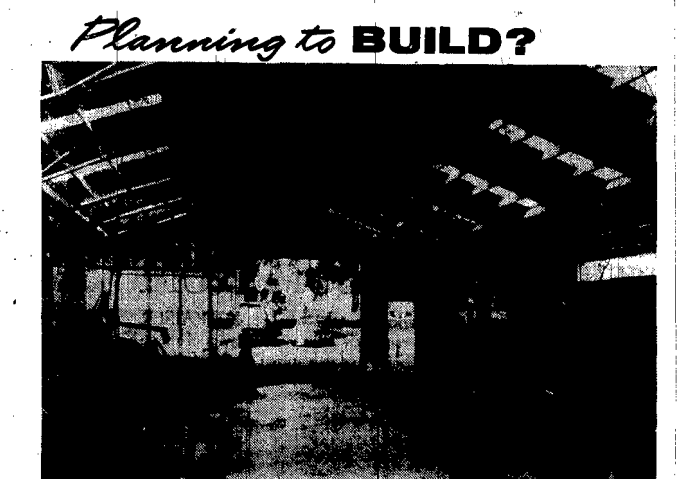

Aerospace Class Visits Colorado

Another memorable trip went into the experience of Wayne State's aerospace education class Friday. The 28 students and four instructors flew on an air force C-97 to Colorado Springs, where they visited the North American Air Defense Command headquarters.

Each year the aerospace class has flown to some unusual center of the Air Force or space activity. Each time the students returned amazed at the scope and complexity of the U. S. military establishment.

This time they were, if anything, more amazed, for NORAD baffles belief, not only in its quarters, buried under a mountain, but by its operations to defend the North American continent.

The physical structure of NORAD's combat operations center is a wonder itself — with three miles of tunnels blasted from granite under Cheyenne Mountain. Some of the tunnels are big enough to house three-story buildings, all of them constructed of steel and resting on numerous coil springs weighing a ton each. A nuclear bomb explosion on the mountain presumably would be dissipated without damage to the NORAD facility or its personnel.

The hurried labyrinth contains complete living accommodations to maintain the staff for a month, sealed off from the outside — in case of attack.

If the structure itself was unbelievable, NORAD's operations seemed more so to the class. Five officers explained the command's purpose — to detect, to determine intent, and to destroy enemy invasion — and the methods used for this purpose.

Some of the methods involve names familiar to the public — DEW Line, BMEWS, SAGE. Not so familiar, perhaps, is the capability of those systems.

So powerful are these radar-computer installations that every item launched into the atmosphere and into space is trackable, even the glove an astronaut lost. It has a number, among more than a thousand separate pieces of space equipment launched by all nations and still orbiting.

Every missile launched in Russia appears on NORAD radar within seconds, and within a minute or two the missile's trajectory and impact point is plotted.

Unfortunately, NORAD has no defense against intercontinental missiles. Its radar can detect invading bombers or space vehicles, and its defenses — interceptor planes and missiles — can destroy the bombers, even the satellites.

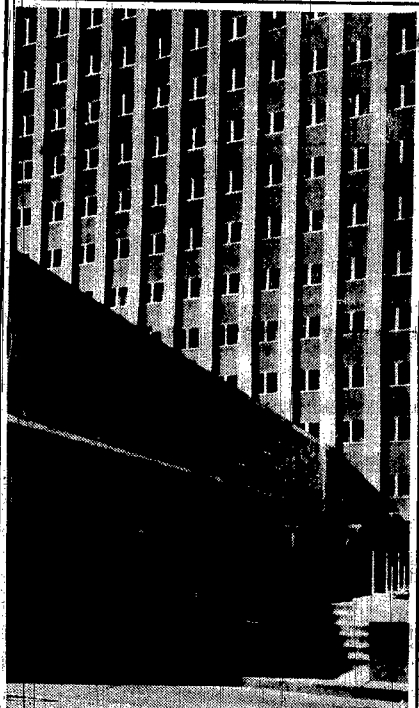
