Mail Truck Leaves Fails to Show Up in Wayne

In the 12-mile stretch between Carroll and Wayne Wednesday morning a truck carrying United States mail disappeared. It was

Postmaster Wightman called at 1:30 with word that the truck had been found abandoned in Sioux City with money scattered around in the cab. A guard was thrown around the truck until an inspector could arrive from Omaha.

classified as a "lost truck" until 10:30 when the patrol was advised it was a stolen truck.

The driver of the truck was a substitute driver by the name of Angelo, full name not known. He is a substitute driver on the star route between Norfolk and Sioux City.

A four-state alert was put out for the truck, a 1965 Chevrolet one ton vehicle with red cab and white box. It had "U S Mail" painted across the back and bore Woodbury County (97-) license plates.

Sheriff Don Weible had Deputy Sheriff Scott Thompson checking the back roads around Carroll and Wayne in case of foul play. It was not known whether the driver took off or was hijacked.

Postmaster Don Wightman said he had numerous calls about the small amount of mail Wednesday. This is understandable since the Norfolk center reported five pouches of mail for Wayne, including some registered mail.

The truck left Norfolk at around 3:30 a.m. and made regular stops at Hoskins, Winfield and Carroll. The mail for Wayne, Wakefield, Emerson and Hubbard did not arrive at post offices in those towns.

James Jacobsma, Sioux City, is operator of the star route that carries the mail under contract between Sioux City and Norfolk. He was in Wayne Wednesday morning helping check on the situation.

Federal postal inspectors from Omaha came to Wayne to help in the investigation. The sheriff, patrol and other law enforcement groups were notified of the alert.

Friday and Saturday of the fair will be children's days with all youngsters up to 13 years of age admitted free. W. A. Thomas Shows will have rides for kids at a reduced rate during afternoon hours both days.

Entry day is Aug. 10 with horse judging at night. Aug. 11 features will include band concert, tractor pulling contest, Joie Chitwood Thrill Show, Hungry 5 concert and other events. Aug. 12 a band concert, races for kids, horse racing, free barbecue, style show, variety stage show and Hungry 5 concert are featured.

The final day there will be band concert, racing for kids, horse racing, centennial queen contest, teen-night stage show featuring a rock and roll band and a dance. Season tickets are being offered at a reduced rate. Anyone planning to attend all days will save money by buying a season ticket card.

Very Few Get X-ray Cards Requiring Further Checks

Only five people who took X-rays in June when the mobile unit was here received notice that they should check with their physicians for possible tuberculosis indications. Another 45 were advised to contact their doctors for other chest variations.

This is the report from Mrs. Robert Bentback, chairman of the Nebraska Tuberculosis Association mobile unit plans here. She received a report the past week from the Nebraska Department of Health.

There were 1,784 X-rays taken, 142 less than the 1,926 taken in 1962 when the unit visited several county towns. The five who had indications of possible tuberculosis represented 28 of one per cent of the total X-rayed and the 45 recommended for other pathology represented 2.52 per cent of the total.

However, the fact that only 29 per cent of the eligible population of the county (those over 18) took time to get X-rays, is a cause for further concern. There are perhaps others who were not X-rayed who could have found out early that they have chest disorders.

If the percentages are typical, it can be assumed that about one-third of the eligible population had X-rays. This one-third showed up with five tuberculosis indications and 45 showing need of further check for other chest disorders.

Assuming this was a typical ratio, it means there possibly could be 10 others in the other two-thirds of the county not X-rayed who have tuberculosis indications. There could also be another 90 who have other chest or respiratory troubles that might have been discovered through X-rays.

However, the unit is here and gone. Anyone who wants to be sure, can check with their physician for a private chest X-ray. It is unadvisable to those who were found to need further checking — as well as reassuring to those who were told the X-rays showed no indications of trouble.

Wayne Having Flurry of All Types of Construction Work

Without any major construction projects at Wayne State College, the City of Wayne is still having an active year in construction. Right now there is a variety of construction work going on in the city.

Among the projects are 14 new houses, a 32-unit apartment complex and plans for more construction for housing of all types. Not included in a survey were many homes just finished and now being occupied and the WSC projects, that are almost completed.

Biggest project is the new high school building which is moving along rapidly under sunny skies. The other major public construction project are a new sewage plant to go up south of the present high school and a new county jail and sheriff's home being built on the courthouse square.

other part of town. Upon reported. A map showing the depth of water main on Wilcliff Drive shows some mains are only three feet below the surface after leveling work. A committee will study this problem and decide what action is needed as pipes should be lower to avoid freezing in winter.

Upon also reported on the survey for sidewalks. It was pointed out that the areas where sidewalks are most urgently needed are points where there is considerable pedestrian traffic leading to the schools and swimming pool. The council indicated it

will also be able to make use of Uttech's services while he is here. In other action, the city approved a contract with Lyttard Exterminators of Grand Forks, N. D., for service at the auditorium for one year; heard a sick leave plan for city employees as presented by Jack Kingston but tabled it for further study.

Approved a permit for Ray Suter for opening a driveway and remodeling his basement at 822 Walnut Drive; allowed a permit to Dr. William Kober for a sidewalk and patio at 312 West 11th; accepted the engineer's certificate of completion on two sewer projects in Westwood Addition; and

Gave consideration to rebuilding of the heating equipment in the city auditorium, planning to have boilers inspected to see the extent of work needed before cold weather comes.

Mel Gleason of Wayne Cablevision appeared to confirm plans for putting in cable television. He said most of the material is here and with good weather and no unforeseen trouble the system would be ready to go by Nov. 1 at the latest.

A member of the District 17 school board, Don Echtenkamp, appeared on behalf of the district in regard to the sanitary sewer district easement through school district property. He pointed out that the land would be developed for football, baseball and playgrounds and said the board wanted the sewer lines in before the land was developed so it would not be necessary to tear up the land for sewer work after the utilization of the area for school purposes is complete.

The council authorized entering into a contract with Vern Uttech for tree trimming for the city of Wayne. Private property owners

laboratory on West Seventh. Wayne Motor Express (formerly Livinghouse, Inc.) is building a new terminal on South First Street.

The Wayne Herald's new newspaper building is nearing completion on Main. Farmers Co-op has a permit for a new station and warehouse on East Seventh. Wayne Book Store is getting a new modern front on its Main Street building. The Wayne Masonic Lodge has a permit for a new temple but work has not started yet.

Cable Television crew members moved into Wayne this week and a tower site has been leased on the Elhardt Pospisil farm 2 miles south and 1 1/2 miles west of Wayne. Work on putting in the system is underway.

Northern Natural Gas, Omaha, has purchased land across the highway south of the municipal airport. A building for sales and storage is planned on that site.

Paving crews have been working at several points in town, putting in new streets, new alleyways and new sidewalks. The runway at the airport is to be surfaced this year and the same crew may give Main Street a new surfacing if costs are low enough. Work on a big complex of lighted tennis courts at Wayne State is well underway.

Biggest housing project is the 32 unit complex by a group headed by Robert Bowman, Fullerton, Carhart Lumber Co. is building three new homes in Westwood Addition and Walden Felber is having a new home put up on Sherman Street on the edge of Westwood.

Two new homes on Oak Drive are being built for Andy Munes and Stanley Smith. A new home for Harold Goshorn is going up at First and Blaine, another for Paul Telgren on Sherman and another for Alvin Reeg at Third and Blaine. Cecil Wriedt is bringing a sub-

division into Wayne which will result in new streets, new lots and several new homes. He plans to start construction in that area in the east part of town as soon as all legal formalities have been met. Dick Carman is building a home on Wilcliff Drive and has permits for four more which will be built as fast as he can build them.

In addition, there are numerous remodeling and repair jobs going on around Wayne. The sound of hammer and saw, the laying of bricks and the mixing of concrete are all familiar in what could be a banner year for the city in spite of the WSC lag in new construction.

would appear anyway. Callan wired Dr. Hansen Tuesday about his predicament. An REA appropriation bill had been defeated in the House Agriculture Committee, he said. Rather than kill the bill, however, the committee referred it to a subcommittee, which Monday scheduled a hearing Thursday and Friday this week.

If the bill does not pass, Callan said, REA units will have to go on the open market for funds. He declared, could seriously hamper REA activity and cause a disservice to many First District residents.

Tuesday night Dr. Hansen telephoned Denney to learn whether he wanted to speak here without the debate format. He replied that he would. Denney made this statement:

"I am convinced that Mr. Callan will not be able to make this appearance and permit the voters to hear the views of both candidates. It is a peculiar situation where Mr. Callan could appear in Columbus last week with Secretary of Agriculture Freeman to defend administration farm programs, yet cannot meet his opponent here to face this week and discuss the farm program and other issues."

"I will be glad to meet Mr. Callan in the future and discuss with him the issues of the campaign, provided mutually satisfactory arrangements can be made. If such a meeting is again arranged, I hope he will find time to be present."

Callan's telegram to Dr. Hansen commented that his visit to the Wayne State Election Institute two years ago was valuable and enjoyable, and that he hoped to cancel this appearance. However, he believed the REA legislation was too important to his district to risk losing it.

approval of the appointment by the State Normal Board.

Dr. Johansen succeeds Dean Russell Owen, who is leaving in August to work with an education project in Nigeria.

A member of the Wayne State faculty since September, 1963, Dr. Johansen has close familiarity with his new duties, having served as assistant dean of administration. He also has been chairman of the business division for the past two years.

He is a native of Coulter, Ia., graduated from high school at Latimer, Ia., earned B.A. and M.A. degrees from the State College of Iowa and his Ph.D. degree from the University of Iowa. He taught for two years at Dunkerton, Ia., High School, three years at SCI, and part-time for two years at the University of Iowa before coming to Wayne.

The dean of administration is responsible for business functions of the college. Dean Owen was the first to fill this position, created at Wayne State in 1958. His new duty will be as consultant to the Ministry of Education in Nigeria, working with the Northern Nigeria Teacher Education Project sponsored by the University of Wisconsin and the Ford Foundation.

Work Begins This Week on Cable TV

Wayne Cablevision began work this week on the cable television system in the city. Mel Gleason, York, who is supervising work, said the system should be in use by November or sooner.

Much of the "hardware" needed for the system is already in. A warehouse and office has been set up in the back of the Morning Shopper building. A crew of men will be here in force Monday to get work underway in earnest. Several local employees will also be added to help with the project.

Gleason said the system will offer eight channels of perfect reception at once. More channels will be added as time and work permit.

First work is putting up the "strand," a wire that supports the cable. Then the cable goes up and then amplifiers are erected. The amplifiers will be located in all parts of the city to insure perfect reception at all points.

Less than 100 feet of a 300-500 foot tower on the Elhardt Pospisil land south of town. Then connections will be made to homes and business places and cable television will be here. Frank "Shorty" Bolge is foreman for the workmen. Other members of the crew are also here and more are expected Monday.

Three Hurt When Auto Leaves Road

The sheriff's report showed Mrs. Lyle Spitzberger as driver of the car. The vehicle had gone out of control after it straddled a ridge left by a road maintainer. Leaving the road, the vehicle went through a bridge railing and landed about 12 feet into a dry creek gully. Extensive damage was done to the bridge and the vehicle.

Mrs. Spitzberger received a deep cut across the face and nose and another across one knee, all requiring stitches to close. Jan, 15 months, had minor skin abrasions and Joey, 2, suffered a cracked bone in his right leg.

All Except Three Donations Come In

Only three pledges not paid prevent Wayne from recording a perfect record on the 1965 Community Chest drive, K. N. Parke reports. They come to a total of \$19.50.

Even without this amount, Wayne has hit 99.987 per cent of its goal for the year. This is a new record for the city in Community Chest pledges, being paid.

Parke attributes the record to the fact that people believe in the Chest and also to the fact that no one has moved away who made a pledge.

Chest workers hope the \$19.50 comes in soon so a perfect record can be chalked up for the city. It may be a long time before Wayne comes this close to being perfect so those with pledges are asked to make payment now.

Books on the 1965 drive will be closed the middle of August and will be turned over to the auditing committee. The Community Chest board meets Aug. 16, at which time the auditing committee will be named.

Public Notice Offers Preview of Two Ballots

A legal notice published by the State of Nebraska in The Herald this week should be of special interest. It covers the vote to be held on the issues of an income tax and a property tax.

The Nebraska Press Association has sent copies of the referendum and initiative petition notice to legal newspapers in the state. Reading the provisions now will give voters a better idea of what they're marking ballots for in the election this fall.

No. 300 asks the people to approve or disapprove the income tax which the legislature has called for the past year. No. 301, a very short petition, merely asks that people approve or disapprove prohibiting the state from levying a property tax.

You are urged to read these, consider all provisions and discuss the issue. Nebraska financing for years to come may depend on how voters mark their ballots on these two issues.

The notices appear on pages four and five in section two.

Cable Cut; Phone Service Goes Out

A workman digging out an area for water drainage in Wayne cut a Northwestern Bell Telephone Co. toll cable Thursday morning. This not only cut off the cable but cut off long distance service to six towns and cut off telephone service entirely for some rural customers of the company.

The cut occurred at the railroad tracks on Douglas Street. A Norfolk-Wayne toll cable was cut. The 75-pair buried toll cable handles long distance from Wayne, Wakefield, Laurel, Emerson, Coleridge and Hartington and resulted in a complete outage for toll service in those communities.

Manager Dan Tize, Wayne, said the telephone company repair crews had temporary restoration of service made within an hour. However, full repair of the cable

was not completed in several hours.

According to Tize, anyone digging deeper than two feet should contact the telephone company to find out if there are buried cables in the area. If there are not, information can be gained at once and if there are, telephone crewmen will come out and mark the cable area and assist with the work to make sure the cable is not cut.

Rural subscribers south of the cut lost all telephone service when the line was cut. Workmen started working at once on restoring service but rain Friday morning while repairs were still underway slowed service and put water in the ditch. Splicing had been completed before the rain came and a protective plastic covering helped keep workmen dry as they continued on the job.

Tize said the cutting of the cable meant that everyone who was talking on a long distance call from any of the six towns was cut off from further conversation at once. He said Winslow service had minor problems but was never completely lost as in the other towns.

Patrol Check Pays Off

The nightly patrol of business places in Wayne to check doors is paying off. For the third time this month a business place has been found unlocked by Wayne Police Department officers. The owner of the firm the past week was called and just went back to bed—after telling the police how to lock the door. In other activities of the department, a death message was relayed, a dog towing a long chain was impounded and one traffic accident was investigated.

Education Service Units Meet Topic

The educational service units provided for in L.B.301 were discussed at the Wayne Kiwanis Club meeting Monday noon. Harry Mills, superintendent of schools at Wakefield, explained the provisions.

According to Mills, Wayne, Knox, Cedar, Dixon, Dakota and Thurston make up one unit. Headquarters are being maintained for the area at Laurel at present.

Mrs. Richard Lund and Ken Olds are the Wayne County representatives on a 10-man board set up to administer the unit. It is hoped supplementary services can be provided to both rural and town schools in several fields.

A one-half unit levy is being paid this year by taxpayers in the district. It will continue in coming years, "here voters approve voting in the unit."

Mills said the supplementary services that can be provided are those needed by school districts but not available locally because of high cost. The most remote rural school can get the services under the plan.

Health services are the most needed item along with more school nurses, doctors and dental health and hygiene aid. Guidance counseling and testing are needed and help for those with speech defects is an important service that could be set up.

Those in favor of the program point out that with the training possible through such a district with administrators handling work in several towns and rural communities youngsters can be helped today so they won't be on welfare tomorrow. In other words we can pay the bill now in assistance to the young or we can pay it later in welfare to the adults.

The bill makes no provision for building any new structures. It merely makes it possible for special services and aids to be offered in every school district instead of just the rich ones. Whether or not Wayne County stays in the program will be carried out somewhere.

A district in the Panhandle has already hired administrators and work is underway providing music, therapy aid to retarded, services for the gifted, audio-

visual aids and other assistance for schools over a wide area. Without the program, none could afford the services, Mills pointed out. Dr. George John formally inducted Carl Lentz and Dr. Rafael Song as new members of Kiwanis. Bob Fuller, salesman, was a guest of Dale Gushall at the meeting.

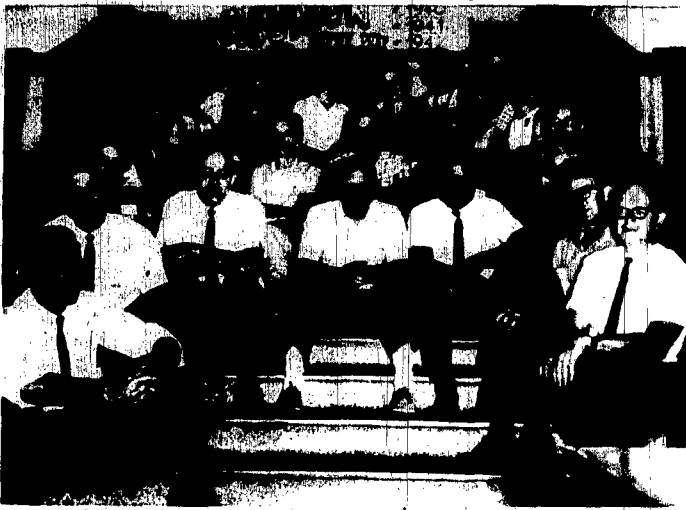

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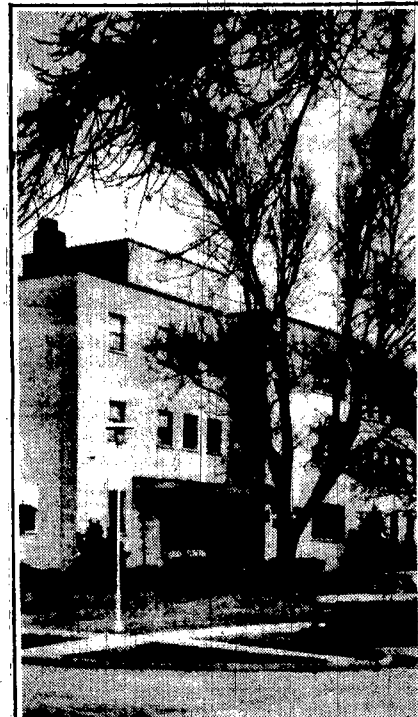

Swedish Youth Sees Pen Pal at Concord

A friendship that started in 1950 between a boy in Stockholm, Sweden, and a girl in Concord, Nebr., resulted in their meeting in Concord this past week. Both admitted the other was "just as pictured."

Georgia Vollers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Vollers, had picked Sven Axelson's name as a pen pal because his likes and dislikes were similar to hers. That was in 1959 and they have exchanged pictures and letters since.

Since last autumn he has planned a seven-week trip to America and June 30, he arrived in New York City. He spent from Saturday to Tuesday (July 16-19) in the Vollers home and then left for San Francisco, Los Angeles, Houston, Washington and New York.

Sven loves the "bargains" in America. He said inflation has hit hard in Sweden and prices in general seem low here. For instance, he bought a bus ticket for \$89 and will be able to travel all

he wants in the US with no further charge.

Dating is something else. Sven likes the Swedish system where the girl pays her own way. Georgia was not so sure she likes this idea.

In his few days in this country, Sven found he had fallen in love with it. He wants to go back to Sweden, take a dentistry course for two more years (he has one year completed) and then come to this country to enter practice.

His big city visits were ahead but he loved the friendliness of the people around Concord. After church services, he found people visiting each other, asking about him and seeming to be one big happy family.

In the big cities he may find a different situation. He will stay in Los Angeles with a boy who was an American exchange student in Sweden and stayed in the Axelson home. In Houston he will stay with an American boy who is attending Stockholm U., where Sven goes to school. They promise to show him the big city from all sides.

Life and schooling are not too much different in America than in

Sweden, the youth said. However, youngsters start school at age seven, take nine years of basic schooling and then three years of high school. There are no interschool competitive events.

Sven is one of four children. His brother was an exchange student in Michigan and he came back to Sweden blowing with stories of life in America.

The father in the family is a major in the army with offices in Stockholm, which means Sven has spent most of his life in a big city. However, he found "an urban touch" in even smaller towns such as Wayne and Concord, apparently a situation not found in small, Swedish villages.

His final comment after a casual visit in Wayne was "I like the American people." He seemed to feel that others who visited this nation and saw it from the angle he did would feel the same. Perhaps those who hate America without ever being here might go back as envoys as Sven will if they could visit here even though he came here liking the country in the first place.
