Wayne Headquarters for New Area Education Lab

Wayne will be the headquarters of the new Mid-Continent Regional Educational Laboratory, Inc., serving Northeast Nebraska, and its coordinator, Bill Stafford, plans to open his office Monday in the Professional Building, 112 West Second.

Stafford resigned recently as superintendent of schools at Red Cloud to accept the MCREL position, one of four in Nebraska.

In a letter sent this week to school administrators, Stafford explained the organization's purpose. It is established under Title IV of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, which authorizes regional laboratories.

Their purpose, Stafford wrote, "to find and define the best practices in education and to overcome the 10- to 50-year 'lag' of putting the benefits of research into practical application."

Four area service centers are to be located in Nebraska, at Wayne, Omaha, Lincoln and Kearney, all functioning under regional headquarters at Kansas City.

Each service center will be governed by an advisory committee of school representatives — "to insure local control and grass roots domination of the laboratory," Stafford said. An interim committee for this area was selected early in July.

Stafford plans to visit as many of the area's 140 schools as he can reach before school opens to explain MCREL, and he is available to talk at pre-opening meetings of school faculties, also available as a service club speaker.

"It is our hope," Stafford wrote, "that each and every school will become a member of MCREL and participate in the potential benefits See EDUCATION LAB—page 8

Will Wayne Lose Most of Its Trees to Elm Disease?

Will Wayne lose 90 per cent or more of its elm trees? That is a question facing the city after learning Tuesday that dutch elm disease has been verified in Norfolk. If it is that close, it could be here now too.

Street Commissioner Vern Schulz made a survey of Wayne the first of the week and estimated 80 per cent of the trees are elms. Without trimming of dead or dying branches, it is possible 90 to 95 per cent of them will be lost.

Schulz said a tree-trimming expert is to be in Wayne this coming week to trim trees for the city. The same expert may also trim for private property.

Dutch elm disease is carried by a beetle that carries a fungus. The beetle lays eggs in the dead or dying branches only.

According to Schulz, he feels that if the local residents trim or have trimmed all trees, it could save the shaded streets, lawns and parks of Wayne. Any dead or dying branches should be eliminated at once to cut down the chance of spread of the disease.

The city will cooperate in every way possible to keep Wayne from becoming virtually treeless in a few years. City officials hope every resident takes this warning seriously and will act to help save the elms.

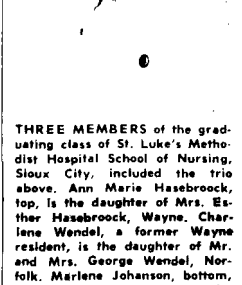

Winside lost a lot of veterans from the team that won second in the Lewis & Clark Conference last year. Assessment of the situation this year will await the first few practice sessions.

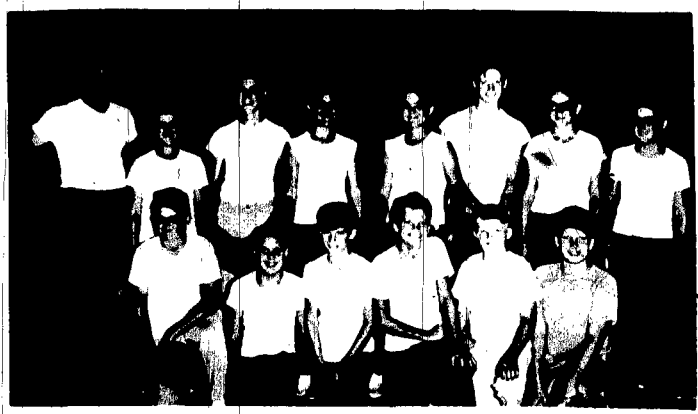

Cattle Field Day Set for Concord

Cattle Feeders Field day will be held at Northeast Station, Concord, Thursday, Aug. 18. Cattlemen will see stock that gained 150 pounds in two months on bromo pasture and will learn whether such a gain can be continued.

Walt Tolman of the NU station says cattlemen will get the three-month gain figures for the steers and will see the cattle themselves. They will also be able to check the effect of feeding stilbestrol in fattening steers already implanted with stilbestrol or Synovex.

The beef nutritionist at the station, Tolman said this "doubling up" practice looked good in weight figures a month ago. He feels stockmen will be doubly interested in what another month's feeding has revealed.

Wintering tests in which calves were grown on alfalfa hay, haylage or corn silage will be reported. These tests studied results of adding corn in different amounts to alfalfa feeds and effectiveness of urea as part or all of the protein supplement for corn silage.

Walter Woods, beef nutritionist from NU, Lincoln, will tell what he has seen of new methods of beef feeding, including steam and flake processing of grain and substituting oyster shell for roughage in fattening cattle rations.

Bob Fritschen, area swine agent at Concord, will explain his work and plan for additional help for pork producers.

Stockmen will be able to visit new and old friends and exchange ideas. Doughnuts and coffee will be furnished by the Northeast Nebraska Livestock Feeders Association.

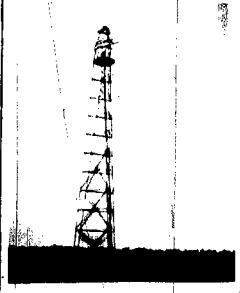
Unusual Mishap Causes Injury to Carroll Boy

Yields have been above average. One small field near Wayne is said to have yielded 85 bushels to the acre and in the Leslie district the correspondent reports several fields have produced 70 bushels to the acre.

Elevator men say the yields are coming nearer to 15 to 50 bushels to the acre for the county. They held they have not had a large amount of oats brought in this year.

The oats price is up a little from last year, bringing around 63 cents per bushel with a bushel averaging around 32 pounds. There is some support price on oats but few area farmers are in this program.

 prospect for the Wriedt Addition.
 Engineer Maglianz gave a comprehensive report on why the new power plant cost is "high" (\$160,000). He explained that the site is former landfill and is spongy, requiring caissons driven into the ground for foundation firmness. He also pointed out that power plant building costs have to be figured on a different basis than other buildings due to the load and use factors of the structure.

Council members voted to meet Monday and make a decision after a complete study of the proposal. Committee members will seek more information on why the costs seem so high.

Three complete sound systems were considered for the Wayne City Auditorium to replace the present system. Two proposals came from local firms and one from an outside firm. The council decided to return the matter to the building committee for further study before any definite action is taken.

Additional lighting in downtown alleys is being sought. The idea has been expressed that with added lights more people will park in alleys at night, taking a load off the street parking.

A new tar truck to be used by the street department in paving repair was authorized. Street sweeper manufacturers were also asked to bring equipment here for demonstrations on all types of surfacing but no plan was outlined for purchasing such equipment.

The completed and revised plans of the planning commission were received. Councilmen voted to accept the planning commission proposal for zoning regulations but will study them thoroughly again, make a final decision and then set a meeting for public hearing on the new plans.

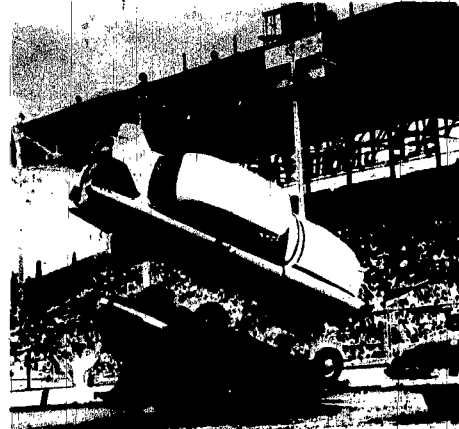

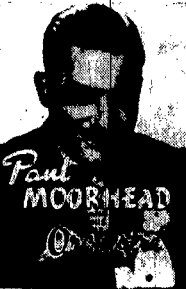

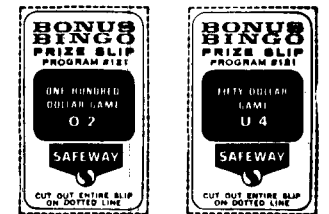

Concord Gets Extra Service from Pastor

When Concord's Lutheran Church, Concord, was assigned as the pastorate for Rev. John Erlandson last year, the community little realized the "bargain" it was getting. Pastor Erlandson has gone beyond his pastoral duties to serve members of all faiths in the community.

Last summer when he arrived, he jumped right into work with the boys' baseball program. This year he started in June with girls softball and boys' baseball. The teams' win-loss records don't really matter for the youngsters' good training, character building, and knowledge of the games they play and many other benefits. Even if they lose a game, they have won something in their competition.

Serving without pay, Pastor Erlandson has worked with 17 boys in the 11-14 age group and 22 girls in the 11-18 age group. Most of

the time they have just had practice games but Carroll and Laurel have provided some inter-city competition.

Mrs. Dale Pearson has assisted with the girls' softball team and Verdel Erwin and Everett Johnson have helped with the boys and have lined up games. Quinten Erwin and son, Rod, and Wendell Hanson have kept the fairgrounds diamond and outfield in playing condition all summer.

This is the young pastor's first experience with little kids in sports. He had worked as an assistant coach at Augustana College, Rock Island, Ill., and had played in intramural and church league ball.

"Working with kids is really different," he says. "These kids put everything into it. Everything about the game is important to them."

As "coach" sometimes and "pastor" the next, the Concord minister-coach has to deal with some weighty problems. In addition to remembering he's a pastor, he has to remember he's coaching to win

and he has to use a little psychology on his players at times.

One youngster was heard to ask: "Pastor, when there are men on second and third with two men out and the ball comes to me (he's an infielder), where do I throw the ball?" Pastor Erlandson had the answer for that one and numerous other questions that came from boys who expect him to know everything there is to know about the game.

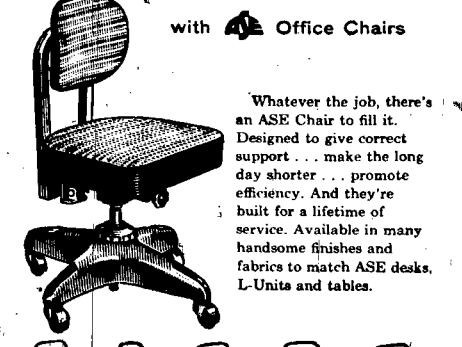
