

Wayne Hospital Director Resigns for Iowa Position

Norman E. Olsen, administrator of the Wayne Municipal Hospital, has resigned to accept a similar position at the Spencer, Ia., Municipal Hospital.

His resignation was given to the Hospital Board Aug. 18, the board chairman, Mrs. Robert Casper, announced. Olsen's new position at Spencer begins Oct. 1, or sooner if a replacement for him in Wayne can be obtained.

"This is one of those opportunities one can't turn down," Olsen said of the Spencer job, where he will administer a new 100-bed hospital. He came to the

Wayne hospital administration from Creighton in January, 1963.

Olsen said his family, including four children, may move to Spencer before school opens.

The Wayne Hospital Board already is searching for a replacement, has several prospects tentatively in mind, but has not arranged interviews. Mrs. Casper said the board welcomes applicants.

Wayne Tax Levy Remains in Doubt

What will tax levies be in Wayne for the coming year?

That's a question which the County Board could not answer at its Tuesday meeting.

Reason: the State Board of Equalization's recent decision to alter property valuations in most counties means that county assessors must figure new valuations on thousands of properties.

Wayne Assessor Henry Arp and staff are busy doing that, but they cannot see the task ending for many days. Until the refiguring is done, the County Board cannot set a new mill levy. A previously set levy would, with higher valuations, produce more money than the proposed budget requires.

There is a deadline approaching soon for levies to be set, but Wayne board members doubt the deadline can be met. However, they noted, most other counties have the same predicament because of state action.

One other matter engaged the board, the Court-house boiler needs replacement. In fact, it has been all but condemned by the insurance officials. So far, the board has received only one bid for a new boiler, from Kinning and Reil, of Pender. A Wayne firm considered bidding but decided to decline.

That leaves the board with no alternates at present, hence no action was taken Tuesday.

Chest to Award Business Firms with 100% Gifts

The Wayne Community Chest board Tuesday continued planning for its annual fund campaign late next month.

A new feature this year will be the award of 100% stickers to each business firm turning in a report which includes donations from every employee of the firm.

The campaign will begin with a kickoff breakfast Sept. 26 and continue for two weeks, till Oct. 9.

Don Reed, chairman of the business area campaign, is selecting men who will lead the various business and institutional divisions.

The board elected Loren Kamish to fill the director term of Dr. Russell Owen, who has moved to Nigeria. The term lasts until the January, 1968, annual meeting. Kamish is director of student activities at Wayne State.

Troop 174 on 4-Day Devil's Nest Trek

Scout Troop 174 went to the wilderness of the Devil's Nest on a four-day trek Aug. 18-21. Fourteen boys and four leaders camped on the sandy beach where the Devil's Nest Creek flows into Lewis and Clark Lake.

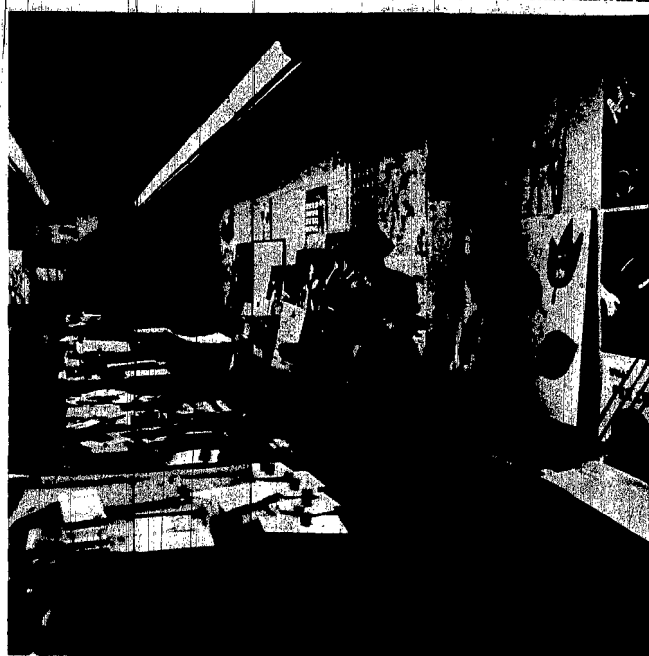
Sunday noon many of the parents joined the troop for a potluck lunch at Weiland state recreation area.

ASC Area Committee Men Voted

Results of the 1966-1967 election of ASC community committees for Wayne County were announced today by John H. Mohr, chairman, Wayne County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The elections were held by mail, and ballots were tabulated publicly Monday by the ASC county committee.

The ASC community committee chairman, vice-chairman and third regular member automatically become delegates to the county convention where farmers are elected to fill vacancies on the ASC county committee. The alternate committee men become alternate delegates to the convention.

The county convention will be held at the Wayne County ASC office August 31 at 9:30 a.m. After the county committeemen are elected, the delegates determine which of the regular committeemen will serve as the committee chairman and vice-chairman for the coming year.

ASC county and community farmer-committeemen are in charge of local administration of such national programs as the agricultural conservation program, the feed grain program, the national wool program, acreage allotments and marketing quotas, commodity loans and storage facility loans. Each year, local farmers earn thousands of dollars through participation in these farm-action programs.

The county convention will be open to the public, and any person interested in observing the voting procedure may attend. However, only farmer delegates to the convention may participate in the election process.

Another .84 inch of liquid gold enriched the soil around Wayne Saturday, adding to the wealth of the previous week's four-inch rain.

The sun hardly needed to shine, so bright were the smiles of farmers surveying crops that seem all but assured now-barring hail or early freeze, of course.

The .84 inch reading came from the State National Bank's rain gauge.

Soil Conservation Service men report that recent rains have penetrated some 36 inches deep in corn land and 24 inches in alfalfa—much deeper than usual this time of year.

Preceding the fair's night show in Stanton, there will be a free barbecue from 5 to 8, sponsored by the Stanton County Centennial Committee and the Northeast Nebraska Livestock Feeders Association.

Plan for New City Park At Fairgrounds Explored

Plans for possible development of a multipurpose Wayne city park on the County Fairgrounds site got a public airing last Friday.

The plans are preliminary, and many steps remain to be taken before the project can even get well started. But at least the talk began Friday.

Providing the spring-board into action was a meeting attended by First District Cong. Clair Allan and about 20 Wayne citizens, representing the Fair Board, City Council,

Planning Commission, and consulting planners. Also present was Ted Swem, representing the Department of Interior from Washington, D. C.

Prospects of federal and state aid are involved. Another major concern is the necessity of approval by stockholders of the County Fair Association to transfer the land to city ownership.

City action likewise is a matter that will require much discussion.

The immediate concern, however, is to suggest pre-

liminary plans for development of a park in order to learn what federal and state aids might be available.

MEETING PLANNED

These plans will be presented at a public meeting Sept. 12, at 7 p.m. in the Chamber of Commerce office.

Actually, a comprehensive plan already exists and may be seen in the Chamber office. The plan book form last winter—put earlier in the mind of Al Bahr, secretary of the Fair Board and the long-time chief promoter of the County Fair.

One tragic day it was about 10 below zero. Bahr told the Herald he visited the fairgrounds with City Engineer Sid Magdanz and several Fair Board members to explain a dream. Despite the frost, they were able to envision quite a plan encompassing the fairgrounds' present wastes and perhaps an adjoining lot.

The vision included not only a modernized fair establishment with new grandstand, pavilions and livestock barns, but a comprehensive park. It might be an athletic field for baseball, football and track, with dressing facilities, picnic and camping areas, bridal paths, playgrounds, a paved parking lot and easier access from the west instead of the present congested eastern approach.

"40 YEARS BEHIND"

Said Bahr: "Our fairground is 40 years behind the times. People don't like to go to places like that any more. And we can't afford to build new facilities for three days of use a year, during the fair."

Magdanz translated many of these ideas into drawings, which Bahr says are merely a starting point for other ideas.

If the development idea catches public fancy, and if federal-state funds are available, then the next action belongs to the Fair Association stockholders. They would have to decide whether to convey the facility to the city.

Leland Herman, president of the Fair Board, told the Herald the board has been concerned about future development ever since the grandstand roof blew off some months ago for the second time.

"I think there is general agreement on the board that some development like this needs to be done—something that can be used more than three days a year," Herman said.

Bahr said it appears several federal and state laws might provide aid for various phases of such a project. This money is being used, he observed, and the taxes are already being paid for it. Why not invest some of this money in Wayne? he asked.

Mrs. Tiemann will speak briefly at the reception in the Ponca Legion Hall.

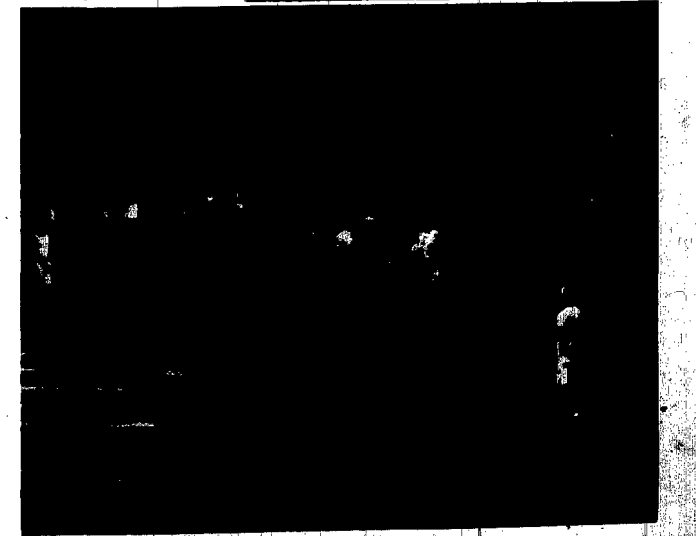
Preceding the coffee, the Republican Central Committee will meet at the Legion Hall at 9:30, with Clifford Gotch, president, in charge.

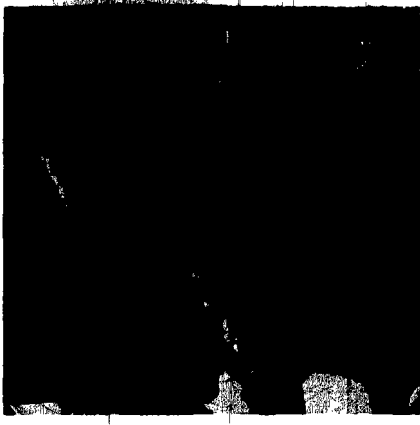

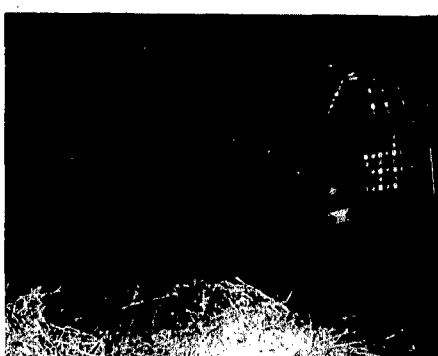

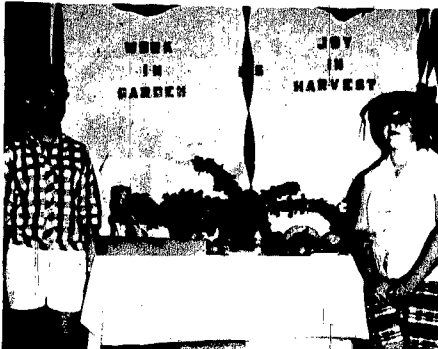
