Chief Ivan Beeks was asked about the hose situation. He referred to the winter fires wayne has had and added that the worst fires, are almost always in the winter. He cited the Surber Furniture fire a few years ago in below zero weather with no place to dry hose. If Wayne had experienced another major fire a few days after that the hose's would not have been ready because they were not dried out.

Two years ago another instance occurred, the Liveringhouse fire. It took firemen five days to get all the hose they used dried out that winter. Only one truck had dry hose until firemen over a period of almost a week got the rest of the hose dried, Wakefield VFD sent firemen here to help dry and load the hose because the situation was so precarious for Wayne. A major fire in that hose-drying period could have meant disaster. Chief Beeks said.

The situation is, firemen have little room in which to lay hose out and dry it. Uhlike homeowners who just let the hose in the garden lay where it is, firemen have to dry hose out, es ecially in dry weather, or they find the hose is useless. It is also expensive and they have to make it last.

Wayne has gotten by in the past, but firemen are not sure the city will always be so lucky. They are willing to fight fires with whatever, is provided but they would appreciate some help on facilities since they donate time for drills, meetings, fires and all the work it takes to get back to readiness after fires.

To show the people what they mean they are planning open house with refreshments Sunday, Apr. 2. They will answer questions about the fire station and the needs. The public is invited to come in and see the true situation before deciding how to vote on the \$75,000 bond issue for a new fire station.

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





If the situation does not change, another year may find the student exchange program on the local level coming to an abrupt halt. It will not be the fault of the pupils if it does. They have more than done their part.

Each parent of a pupil in a Wayne school should consider the far-reaching benefits of this exchange program. Each should ask himself if he has been fair in his support, even a fraction of the support needed in the form of attending a meeting.

Tiemann called it a re-sponsible, realistic, pro-gressive program of action that "will move Nebraska in the right direction at the

ax-supported general fund rise of \$46.3 million to \$220.6 million, including \$137.7 million from his proposed income-sales tax

proposed income-sales tax program. More than \$138.5 million would come from the Fed-eral Government, \$266.3 million from cash funds, and \$6.9 million from so-

called "revolving" funds.

Tiemann said his incomesales fax budget is a downward adjustment of \$11 million a year from whathe had expected to recommend a month ago.

But he acknowledged it could climb again if the Legislature repeals the intengible, head and household goods taxes and enacts programs of state aid to junior colleges, high schools and grade schools.

Legislation on these subjects is currently before the lawmakers and Tie-mann asked they be sup-ported. He did not recom-mend any dollars for them,

This is the first time in state history a governor proposed an overall budget above the half-billion dollar mark.

But Tiemann told the leg-islators that he is prepared to support and defend it "in these chambers and in townhalls throughout Ne-poska"

on the pressing issue of new taxation, the Governor said he takes the same stand.

"The first 60 days of my administration and your legislative session have been hectic, sometimes frustrating, always challenging," the 42-year-old former Wausa banker said.

"The people of Nebraska have thrown down the gauntlet to you and to me. They expect! value received for every dollar spent and they are entitled to that expectation. I will do everything in my power to bring it to fruition."

However, Tiemann added, Nebraskans do not want a "do nothing" governor or legislature.

"They appreciate candor, and courage, and honesty. This is what you and I must offer as we pick up the gauntlet," he said.

"There are legitimate needs to be met in the state of Nebraska...now let us meet them. I want Nebraska to progress, not retrogress, and I ask for your support in carrying out this task."

pected to take a final show-down vote on Tiemann's in-come-sales tax bill (LB 377) early next month. Managers of the contro-

come-sales tax bill (LB 377) early next month. Managers of the controversial legislation are confident they can muster the 33 affirmative votes necessary to put the sales tax into effect this spring, or early summer. The income tax would wait until 1968. The bill imposes a 2½ percent sales tax, and a corporate and individual income tax. Rates on the latter would be flexible. The proposal got 33-13 preliminary approval on the floor, indicating passage is virtually assured. But foes of the bill have vowed to tryto block its passage to the end. Nebraskans have never paid a state sales and income tax. They have relied heavily on the state property tax to finance their government for the past 100 years. But it was abolished by voters last fall.

"We have no other choice," said Chairman Jules W. Burbach of the Revenue Committee, chief pilot of the broadened tax base measure.

The product is said to have a "conditioning" effect on the soil which unlocks and makes available. all of the nutrients found in the soil. The mechanism of this action is never completely explained but is usually attributed to some mysterious chemibut is usually attributed to some mysterious chemi-cal, thiological, or radio-active phenomena. In fact, the product is usually des-ribed as so potent that only a few pounds per acre should be used.

The product usually car-ries no guaranteed analysis for introgen, phosphorus or botassium and conse-quently is not considered a fartilizer under present

In any case, increase in crop value per dollar spent must be the yardstick used to evaluate any such material.

Unnecessary Service Calls You might be one of the homemakers who wastes money on unnecessary service calls for household service calls for household appliances. A survey reported by Electrical Appliance Service News stated that some \$50 million a year is being wasted on unnecessary service calls. The survey estimated that the trouble with

calls. The survey estimated that the trouble with laundry equipment on over 20% of service calls was due to push buttons not pushed all the way in, faucets that were turned off, or conds not plugged in properly.

Another 10% of service complaints could be eliminated if home makers would follow the use and care instructions given by the manufacturer of the appliance.

When calling for service it is suggested the homemaker give the make of the appliance, the model number, and the year it was purchased. The service man can then select the right parts and complete the repairs on the first call to your home.


