Number of Live Healthy Pigs, Sets Sows' Value

The number of live, healthy pigs a sow farrows in large measure determines her value. According to Bob Fritschen, Area Swine Specialist at the University of Nebraska Northeast Station, the herdsman plays a large role in post-farrowing success.

Producers must realize that the first 10 days following farrowing are the critical time in a pig's life. Anything done to maintain litter size and vigor during this period will be reflected in increased profit at market time according to Fritschen.

Following are some considerations and practices the Area Swine Specialist suggests producers consider.

At farrowing:
-Check heat lamps, make sure they are operating safely. Adjust so heat lamps are 12 inches out from the udder and 20 inches from the floor.

-Pay attention to the sow's disposition—constipation may cause nervousness, use a laxative ingredient in the diet at farrowing time. If sow is unduly nervous consult a veterinarian.

-Be present as sow farrows, observe frequently.

-As pigs arrive, dry them off and assure breathing.

-Clip or tie navel cord and disinfect with 7 percent tincture of iodine solution.

-Remove afterbirth from building and destroy by burning or burying.

-Clip the tips of needle teeth to prevent injury to sow's udder.

-Make sure all pigs nurse as soon as possible.

-Ear notch pigs for identification for future selection.

-Give pigs supplemental iron on about third day. If using a solution use 20 gauge needle and inject in neck.

-Castrate early—preferably at 3-4 weeks using sanitary techniques.

Fritschen also advises hog producers to evaluate their management problems on a personal basis. He stated that too many diagnoses are based on what a neighbor or friend has experienced or advises. If a producer has scours or possible disease

problems consulting a veterinarian may be the best investment he could make. For nutrition and management problems the Area Specialist suggested producers use their University Extension Service personnel or other qualified individuals.

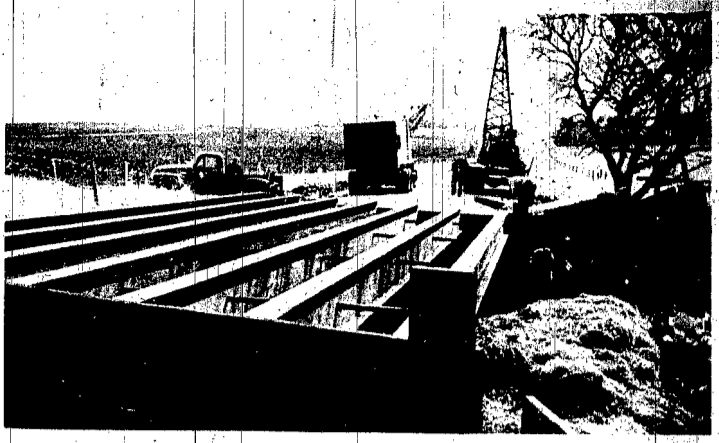

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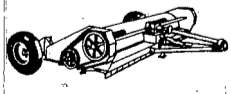

Bob Kruse, Wayne State's All-America football guard, has signed a contract with the Oakland Raiders of the American Football League.

Although he played guard for some 10 years in school, the Raiders suggested that Kruse might eventually switch to center, replacing an eight-year veteran when he retires in future years.

Kruse expresses enthusiasm at the chance to play with Oakland, a team frequently near the top of AFL standings. He declined to reveal the bonus he received, but said it is pleasing. 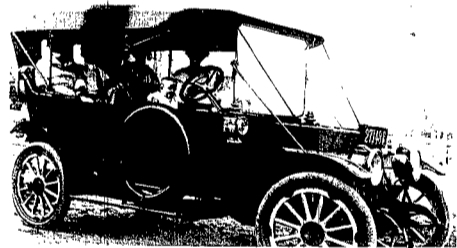

According to Mohr, the period for diverted acres under the 1967 feed grain program started Apr. 1. Farmers who are diverting acreage under the program have agreed not to graze diverted acres during the growing period.

This six-month portion of the year is for grazing only. No hay is to be cut from diverted acres at any time.



The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Someone Didn't Vote

It is presumed there were some disappointed people and some elated people after Tuesday's bond issue election. There must have been a great many more who just didn't give a darn.

Certainly it is no credit to Wayne that the turnout for such a proposal was so small. It would have been better if two or three times as many had voted and rejected or approved the issue.

As it stands now, who knows how the people of Wayne feel about better facilities for the fire department. Certainly the vote in favor of the bond issue indicates a majority of those voting were in favor but that's about all that can be read into the vote totals.

Some did not like the eight bays. Some thought the amount was too high. Some did not think the firemen needed better quarters. Some thought the firemen might need something better but the proposed structure was not the answer. Some just vote against everything. These then make up the "against" votes.

But who were the ones who cast the "for" votes? They must have had a reason. Could it be possible that among them were most of those who took time enough to visit the fire station when open house was held? Is it possible they favored the proposal because they felt the firemen did need something?

Some have suggested using another building in town that has truck bays. It is possible it could be purchased, but an estimated price mentioned would be almost equal to the \$75,000 proposed and in turn would give the firemen a building not planned for a fire station, a building several years old and a building with less adequate facilities.

You can watch television Monday, Apr. 10, and see the Academy Award presentations. What your opinion of them is, is a matter of personal taste.

It is doubtful if the people of Sholes would vote the same way as the people of Omaha. It is certain the people of Northeast Nebraska would not vote the same way as the members of the Academy of Motion Picture, Arts and Sciences do.

Out of Old Nebraska



Skirmish at the Pawnee Agency

The Nebraska State Historical Society receives many requests from all parts of the nation for information concerning Nebraska pioneers. A recent letter from a lady in Wyoming inquiring about her great-grandfather who had been killed by Indians led to the uncovering of a violent episode in Nebraska history.

Joseph Dyson of Bellevue, Nebraska had joined Company D of the Second Nebraska Cavalry in October 1862 even though he was 42 years old. His nephew William D. Rowles aged 37 joined with him. Both men became sergeants and in June 1863 were stationed with their company at the Pawnee Reservation near the present town of Genoa. The soldiers were there be-

cause the government had promised to protect the Pawnee from the Sioux.

On June 22 the commander of Company D, Captain Edwards, was having lunch with the Pawnee agent, B. F. Lushbaugh. They saw mounted warriors rush down into the Agency and kill two Pawnee women within a hundred yards of the two men.

The newspaper the Nebraska Advertiser of Brownville described the subsequent action.

"Capt. E. immediately mounted his horse and joined a band which he supposed to be Pawnee Indians and ordered them to give chase... They, being Sioux, commenced shooting at him with their arrows, a glancing shot striking and wounding him above the eye; another hitting his revolver. He then drew his revolver and fired two shots at the Sioux. At this

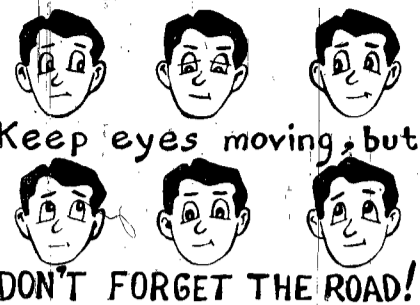
time, one of them struck him from behind with a war club knocking him out of the saddle onto the neck of his horse. Before he righted himself his horse had carried him safely out of range.

"In the meantime the agent with the promptness for which he is noted had sent a courier to the camp of Co. D, which was about two miles distant and also gathered up about one hundred of his red children the Pawnees."

A portion of Company D including Sergeant Dyson pursued the Sioux for fifteen or twenty miles. Following the advance party of the pursuit was Agent Lushbaugh with his Pawnee warriors and reinforcements from Co. D under the command of Captain Edwards. Suddenly the leaders of the pursuit including Sergeant Dyson came upon the main body of Sioux—about four hundred warriors in ambush. The newspaper reported:

"Dyson and his men fought bravely against the savage and exultant foe, until his horse was killed and himself mortally wounded, raising himself upon one elbow he fired

Family tradition has it that Sergeant Rowles placed the slain Dyson over his saddle and carried him back to the Agency, "his boots overflowing with blood."

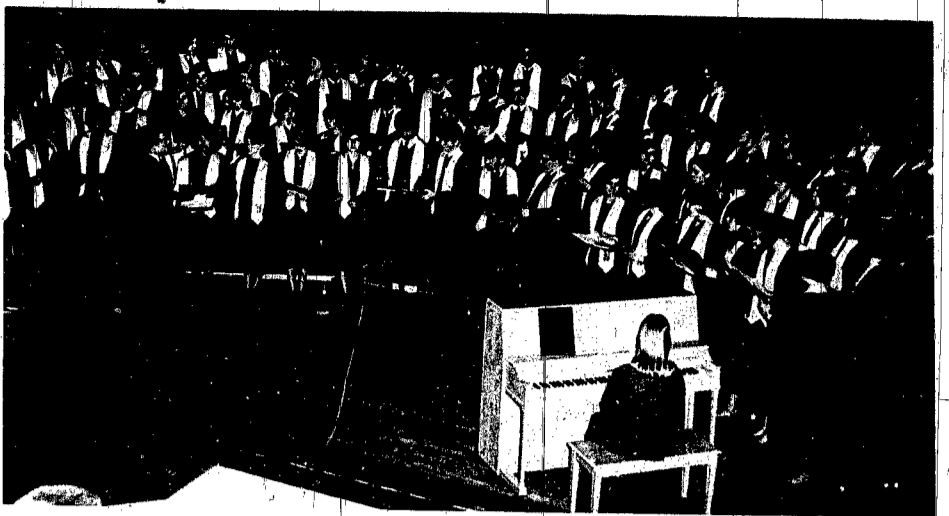
