

## Daylight Saving Time Goes Into Effect Early Sunday

Ready or not, willing or not, Nebraskans must switch to daylight saving time Sunday morning. They will then get used to it for half the year as virtually all of the nation goes on "fast time."

What it means is that residents will turn their clocks ahead one hour when they go to bed Saturday night. Do not turn it back one hour—that comes next October.

If you go to bed at 9, set the clock at 10. Move the hands one hour ahead of what they are when you retire (one hour later than it actually is). This will give you one less hour of sleep (unless you wake up at the usual time, and find it is not really the usual time but one hour later).

Congress has ruled that states having DST must observe it for six months. This means May, June, July, August, September and October will be fast-time months.

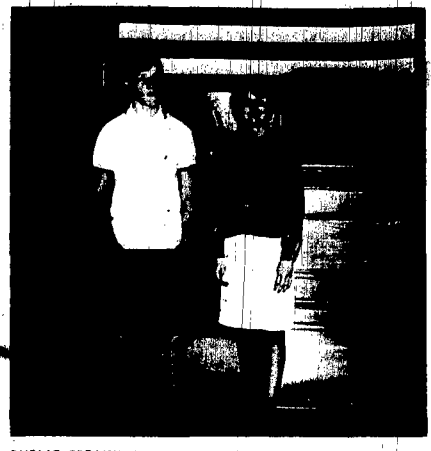
## City Hall Closed

## Three Top Math Testing Scores

Wayne High School's mathematics test "Team" is made up of two boys and a girl. They scored highest in the eighteenth annual high school mathematics contest held this year.

Bob Porter reports the local school improved its record over a year ago with Duane Shell, Sandra Hansen and Jim Williams having the highest scores. The top three from each school were a "team" for comparison in the nationwide testing.

According to Porter, a year ago the WIS team score was just above the mean for national team. This year the WIS team score was about halfway between the mean score and the top score in the nation.

Appointments were announced and approved at the Tuesday night meeting of the Wayne City Council as the new council took over following the adjournment of the old council. Two new boards were created.

R. H. Danister is the only new member of the council, taking over the post of Dr. Lyle Seymour. Jack Kingston was elected president to succeed Dr. Seymour.

A housing authority and a zoning board of adjustment were set up as new boards. Names of those appointed were drawn to decide who would get the various terms.

The housing board came out like this: Rev. Frank Pedersen, one year; William Lynn, two years; Dale Johansen, three years; Robert Lund, four years; and George Thorbeck, five years.

Zoning board of adjustment terms are as follows: Loren Ellis, one year; William Kugler and Warren Bilson, two years; and Richard Arett and Rowan Wiltse, three years.

First National Bank and State National Bank were approved as depositories of city funds. The contract with the Woman's Club for use of the Woman's Club Rooms for council meetings was approved and the attorney ordered to set the contract up in legal terms.

Wayne will earn money on idle money from now on. The council authorized investing surplus funds in city accounts in securities until funds are needed to pay for bonds. Interest will be credited to the respective accounts. This will bring in interest on investments and save the city.

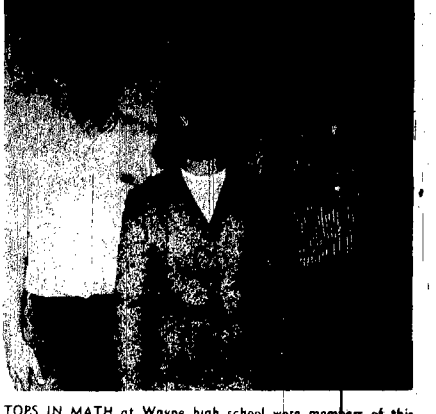

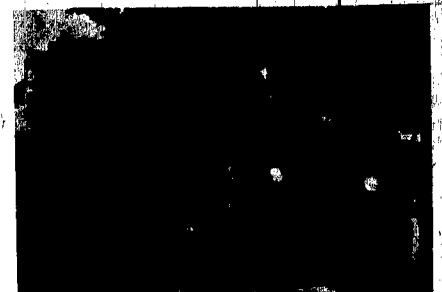
## Police Kept Busy During Past Week

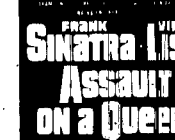

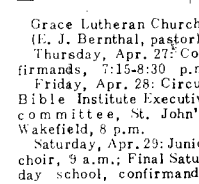

Wayne State suffered its first double loss of the baseball season Monday when Creighton University turned the lead, 10-5 and 6-1.

The victors led all their scoring in two innings of each game, and Wayne mounted one uprising in the opener. Otherwise all four starting pitchers dominated the games, and all lasted the full route.

Wayne started the

scoring with a first-inning in the opener, but Creighton's four-run spree in the third and a six-run avalanche in the sixth were too much. Blazey hurler George Stiles faltered in the bottom of the sixth as Wayne scored four times—two of them on a pinch single by Bob Symonds, making his first appearance after a pro-season leg fracture.

Stiles gave up seven hits while Wayne's Jim Mau allowed a dozen for his first loss in three games. The Bluejays started fast in the nightcap with a two-tally first inning—one more than they needed to win, it turned out, but they added four in the third frame to insure John Moylan's four-hit win. Wayne reached home one in the sixth. Jim Hasticot suffered his third loss for Wayne. He gave up eight hits.

Now 5-5 for the season, Wayne takes an 0-1 conference record to Chadron State Saturday for an NCC doubleheader.

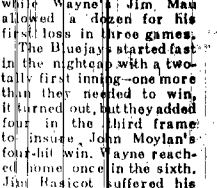

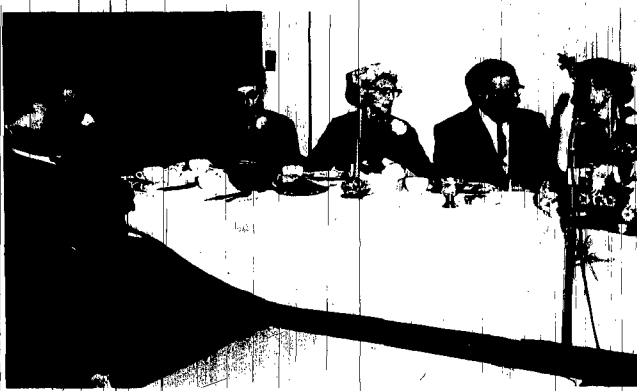
**Ladies Aid Marks 50th Anniversary**

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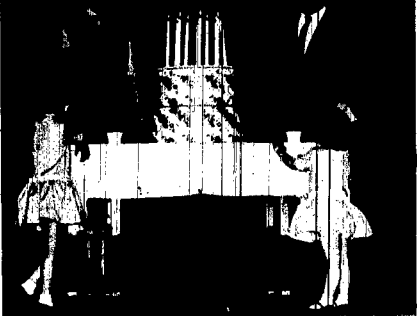

**Article by Wayne Chief of Police Appears in National Publication**  
 CHIEF OF POLICE Vern Fairchild looks at a copy of "Law and Order," a magazine containing an article he wrote. Assistant Chief Pat Hailey, off duty at the time, looks over the chief's shoulder.  
 An article by Vern Fairchild, chief of police in Wayne, has been published in the April issue of "Law & Order," a publication circulated to police departments, sheriff's offices and other law enforcement groups throughout the nation.  
 Entitled "Registering the Door-to-Door Salesman," it tells about Wayne's experience with the transient salesman who had caused considerable trouble here. Since the article appeared, telephone calls have come from a Kansas town and a Nebraska town and letters asking for samples of salesman registration cards and for information have come from Dennis and Revere, Mass., Orchard Park, N. Y. and Wahoo.  
 Chief Fairchild's article tells of the trouble Wayne had with salesmen in the past, a half dozen or more complaints coming in every month. Fairchild and City Attorney John Addison worked out a registration plan, presented it to the city council and Nov. 9, 1965, Ordinance 620 was passed requiring non-resident door-to-door salesmen to register.  
 According to the article, the signs posted at all entrances into town have been warning enough. Over 100 have been photographed and fingerprinted since the law went into effect.  
 Cards are issued showing that the person has registered and fingerprints and photo are on file. The police make no recommendation as to the salesmen's honesty or products but do show that they have registered, which is a pretty good indication.  
 Some have left town indignantly, claiming they were being treated as common criminals. However, the ordinance is not intended to discredit salesmen, Chief Fairchild points out, but is a "starting point" if something happens.  
 Only one complaint has come in on door-to-door salesmen since the ordinance went into effect, the chief said. In this case the salesman was found innocent of charges, someone else having forged his name.  
 Chief Fairchild stated in the article that people call from time to time to make sure salesmen have registered. He encourages this as a service to the city and to other salesmen, the majority of whom are honest.  
 He concludes that the small cost in money and time is offset by time and manpower saved in running down complaints. Several cities have copied the Wayne rules and registration forms, so the plan is gaining followers in other localities.

money since money lying around as in the past draws no interest.

Electricians and plumbers were discussed and it was revealed that a licensing law has been in effect for years but has not been enforced. The law will be enforced from now on and provisions have been made for an inspection to cover checking work of the electricians and plumbers.

Projects under construction will also be checked to avoid improper construction or fills which damage streets. The council approved the service of a full-time engineer to see that the fills are made according to requirements.

City water lines are to be extended through Cecil Wried's Second Addition. Estimated cost is \$24,000, which includes the water mains for the subdivision plus a 12-inch service main for the city extending to the east side of the subdivision to connect with a well which will be put in on the east side of the city.

Sidewalks were again discussed. There were two residents there inquiring about plans. They were informed that the council plans to put the walks in on a 100 per cent basis where feasible west of Main. A description of property affected was contained in a legal notice published in The Herald, but any not included can still be in the sidewalk district, this provision having been made a part of the ordinance.

Asked what the responsibilities of the contractors are as to the condition property is left in following sidewalk construction, the city engineer told what the responsibilities are and how the contractor must care for the property during and after work. Sidewalks on school property connecting with Oak Ridge Addition were discussed also and the council is working on this phase of the project.

The airport construction project is drawing nearer with some of the equipment for runway surfacing moved in. Notices have been sent to the state air-

port manager regarding the closing of the runways when construction starts.

Mobile homes will have a new approved method of hook-ups for water, power and sewer lines. Details were not given but the new set-up is much simpler than the one used in the past.

Mobile homes and regular homes will pay a new minimum on water, \$3 a month. This was set up as a part of the water rate ordinance, No. 646. It sets the tariff for each-type of water consumer. A full schedule of rates will be published in a legal notice in The Herald soon.

Tiedtke's Plumbing, Heating and Appliances was awarded the contract for an air conditioner for the Woman's Club Rooms. It is a three-ton unit with electrostatic air cleaner so it can be used the year around, filtering air even when the air conditioner is not in use.

Wayne Country Club's annual report was heard and received. The club plans expansion soon. The WCC report on expenses and income was a part of the summary.

A resolution was passed reserving an alley stall adjacent to the police station for exclusive use of policemen. With two cars, there is little room on the police drive.

City workers will soon get paid twice as often. Heretofore they have been paid once a month. A report of the finance committee was approved which calls for city workers being paid on the 15th and last day of each month from now on.

Ambulance service came up for discussion again, the fact being made known that bids will be opened May 9 and Hiscox & Wiltse will terminate ambulance service May 15. The council will work out an arrangement for the two funeral homes to continue ambulance service under contract to the city until the new unit is ready for use here.

Mrs. Ruth Ellis was granted a permit for cutting the curb on Douglas Street. Off-street parking is planned at her apartment house.

You as a reader have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

## What's Minimum Tillage?

Do you even know what minimum tillage is? You don't? And here Wayne is soon to play host for a minimum tillage day that is expected to draw 5,000 or more people from four states.

field and Randolph are doing especially well, each having a newspaper of its own to tell of the achievements of the present and the goals of the future. Believe us, in each case the story is impressive.

## Judging By a Few

With no Negro population, Wayne County seems to be far away from the Negro problem. The story is brought to the area by newspapers, magazines, radio and TV. And the picture is not a pretty one.

Sure, we don't know all we should about minimum tillage. We do know that in the most advanced agricultural areas this is the way of doing farming for greater profit, better use of the soil, preservation of fertility and thorough use of all moisture and fertilizer.

Minimum tillage is the move, it is being adopted in other areas and it will reach here. Area farmers have a chance here. They have an opportunity to see all types of tillage under varying conditions using all major makes and some minor makes of equipment. They can see for themselves what is done. Later in the year a second minimum tillage day will be held and they can come back and see for themselves what each variation has meant.

## Hooray for the Little Towns

As happy as we are to see Wayne grow and prosper, we feel that we are equally happy to see the progress the little towns of this area seem determined to make. Not a one of them is willing to drift backward if the people can help it.

What do we get? Cassius Clay voting he will never serve in uniform the country that has given him far greater benefits than many white people have, a country that offers the Negro a greater opportunity than any other nation on earth offers the Negro.

We get Dr. Martin Luther King, degrading the Nobel Peace Prize won in the past by calling this country an aggressor while touting his cause for Negro equality with the Vietnam war where men of his race are fighting, being wounded and being killed in a far greater display of reason for equality than he can ever offer now.

Then we have Adam Clayton Powell, a man who could be a great force in helping his fellow Negroes, but who chooses instead to set himself up as a sacrifice to the cause when he has already benefited far more than he deserves.

We get our fill of Stokely Carmichael, raving, ranting and stirring up a hatred of white for Negro and Negro for white, contributing nothing to the cause of understanding, but undermining many of the gains that have been won so slowly in years past but which have come faster (admittedly not fast enough) in recent years.

As a result of the pictures of such men before us, we have people in Wayne who speak of "black niggers." They scorn them. They speak ill of them. Yet they know few Negroes personally. Their minds have been made up by those few they hear and read about. And they're getting a pretty one-sided picture.

Right here in Nebraska we have some Negroes who are fine people and who should be considered more representative of their race. Joe Orduna is a member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and a great ambassador for Christ and for the Negro people.

Bob Gibson, St. Louis Cardinal pitcher from Omaha, is a gentleman, a great athlete and a credit to his profession and his race. We think of him when we think of men who have helped the cause of the darker-skinned people.

There are men of the past, George Washington Carver and Booker T. Washington. There are great men of the present, Dr. Ralph Bunche, Jackie Robinson, Joe Louis, Sen. Brooke, of Massachusetts.

Why can't we remember them? Why is it their deeds, which far overshadow all that Carmichael, Powell, Clay, King and others of their ilk will ever do, cannot be the things that come to mind when the word "Negro" is mentioned?

Wayne needs to know the problems of the Negro. We need Negro families. We would welcome them, as friends, as fellow human beings, yes, even as brothers, for that is what the Christian believes.

Until we know and understand these people more, we are sitting back and letting a problem go unsolved which we may be called upon to solve some day. We are sitting on our hands when all that is needed is some helping hands, some hands extended in the right direction.

It is not entirely our fault that we have so little knowledge of Negroes and their problems here. However, it is our fault that among us there are those who despise and degrade Negroes although they have had little contact with them and base their views on limited knowledge.

We are ashamed that there are those among us who judge a man by the color of his skin before he has any chance to prove himself. May God have more mercy when He judges us all some day.—CEG.

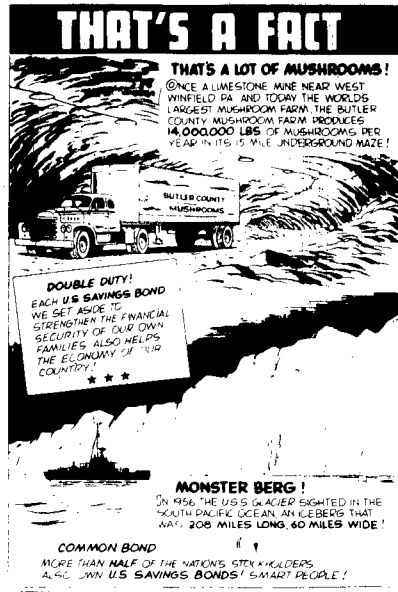
## Month's Reprieve Given On Nebraska's Sales Tax

LINCOLN—Nebraska's taxpayers have been given one month's reprieve from the state's first sales tax. The Legislature, at the urging of Gov. Norbert T. Tiemann, has agreed to delay implementation of the levy until June 1.

Originally, the lawmakers decided to impose the tax—2½ cents on every dollar—on May 1. But this presented too many administrative problems.

The effect of the postponement is to cut potential revenue collections from the new tax system by an estimated \$5 million, according to Sen. Perry Carpenter of Scottsbluff.

He said the practical impact will be to force upward personal and corporate income tax rates when the income tax goes into effect next year.

## Test Calf Feed Ideas at Station

Walt Tolman is conducting a heifer-fattening experiment at Northeast Station, Concord. He intends to find out if calves will eat alfalfa hay when they can get all the corn they want.

Different lots will get 1 1/2 pounds, 3 pounds and 4 1/2 pounds of alfalfa hay per head plus all the corn they want. The experiment aims to find out if heifers' appetites can be gauged to their needs.

Experiments have shown some roughage may have little value for energy or fattening in a high-grain ration. Big feedlots fatten with less and less roughage each year and some use no roughage at all, just grain and concentrated supplement after cattle are on full feed.

Tolman points out that the Concord station has no mixer so chipped hay and rolled corn are being hand-mixed in the bank with a fork and ground corn cobs are being mixed in to prevent cattle from overeating on grain as the corn amount is increased in a full feed. When they get to a full grain feed, no cobs will get hungry and overeat when corn is available again.

Based on analysis of the corn being fed at over 10

per cent protein and also judging from past results, rolled corn and different amounts of hay should furnish all the protein needed for efficient feeding, Tolman said.

Finally, Tolman pointed out that stillbore, fed or implanted, will increase rate of gain and save feed with heifers and steers. Feeders who doubt the advisability of feeding stillbore to heifers may wish the cattle being fattened to see if there are bad effects, he said.

## Over Three Dozen Help Wayne County Farm Family with Work First of Week

Over three dozen men and women showed up at the Wayne County farm of Mr. and Mrs. LeRoy Sievers south of Wakefield Monday. They helped with long-neglected work on the Sievers farm.

To work in the house as there were men in the field, only a few could help inside, but all were willing to help in any way they could.

The 30 men brought tractors to plow 205 acres of land. The women brought food, prepared a meal and a lunch and helped Mrs. Sievers with the work in the home.

Sievers is a young farmer who suffered a ruptured disk in February. He has undergone surgery since then and has been unable to take care of his farm work.

There is a hired man, Curt Brudigan, at the farm, but he has not been able to catch up by himself. Sievers is now under doctor's orders to limit activity to about one hour a day and will be on a "minimum work" schedule all summer.

Several of the men who showed up to help were men who had been the "victims" of similar neighborly acts in the past when they had been unable to do their farm work. They said they knew how much Sievers needed help and how much it meant to see the work get done so they were glad to help.

Women of the area sent food. Since it was impossible for as many women

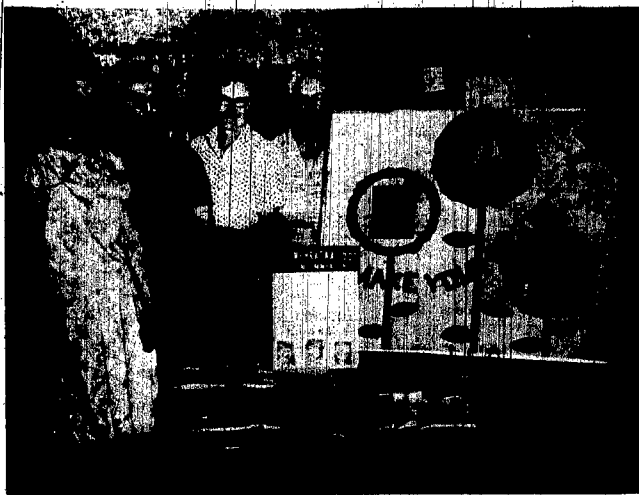

The story is told of a group of businessmen who went on a vacation in Switzerland. One evening, a professional mountaineer climber came to their hotel to deliver a lecture on mountain climbing and to show pictures he had taken during his work.

The men were so intrigued by the event that they asked him to serve as their guide on a climb in the Bavarian Alps.

The day was set and the arrangements were completed. It was agreed that they would start the climb in the early morning. The day came and the men all met at the foot of the great mountain. They were dressed in warm clothing and rugged boots. Each man carried a pack on his back.

The guide gave the signal and the trip was begun. The men followed him up the path, around rocks and brush and through the tall trees. They climbed for several hours. The further they went, the harder the climb became. The path grew steeper, the rocks larger, but they kept climbing through the crisp cold mountain air.

About 9 o'clock in the forenoon they reached a place called the half-way house. This was a small place about half way up the mountain where climbers could stop for rest and refreshment before going on.

The men went into the half-way house where they unloaded their packs. They enjoyed a cup of steaming hot coffee and a sandwich. Some removed their boots. They took advantage of the time to rest and relax.

When it came time to go, the guide walked over to the door and said, "All right fellows, it is time to continue our climb." One of the group approached the guide, and in a low voice said, "You know sir, I seem to be having trouble with my foot. My boot apparently does not fit well. I am afraid it might cause some trouble, so if it doesn't matter too much to you, I think I will just wait here at the half-way house and join you on the way down." Another fellow stepped up to the guide and said, "You see, my knee seems to be bothering me a bit. It is an old injury that I got when I played football in high school. Now, if it is all right with you, I believe I won't go on today. Maybe I can finish the climb some other time. I would rather just wait here at the half-way house and join you

and the others on the way back."

One by one they went to the guide and made one trivial excuse or another until only a very small number were willing to finish the climb. The guide, with his handful of men, began the second half of the climb.

It was mid-afternoon. One of the men who had remained at the half-way house was looking out through a large picture window enjoying the beautiful view of the majestic snow-capped Alpine peaks. He saw something way up the side of the mountain that captured his attention. He called to his companions and pointed out a spot near the top of the peak. He said, "Look fellows, there goes Bill, there goes Tom, there goes Joe. They are going all the way up to the top!"

What a picture of life. We see so many capable men and women who start the climb up the mountain of a successful and happy life; people who have great potential ability and unlimited opportunity; but so few succeed. For one insignificant reason or another, so many choose not to persevere and apply their talents and abilities. They take the path of least resistance. They relax and remain at the half-way house of life when, with just a little more effort and determination, with a little more development and preparation, they could easily go all the way up to the top.
