The Ainsworth, Bassett and Atkinson papers are among newspapers in the state reporting last week that solicitors have approached business firms claiming to represent newspapers in selling advertisements. The solicitors have no connection with the papers.

If a stranger should approach you claiming to represent The Wayne Herald, asked to see his credentials, no one is representing this paper except the personnel you already know but if others should be contracted to do so they will carry a letter of identification signed by the publisher, Alan Cramer, on Herald stationery.

According to some papers, the advertising rates as offered are exceptionally high. This means someone could be taking money out of the county if the scheme works.

If you are approached by someone offering a "special deal" on advertising in The Herald, call us. Chances are your refusal to go in on any schemes will save you money because if The Herald is going to offer something special, you will be told about it first in the paper and then the representatives will call not the other way around.

# 'Wayne Needs New Hospital'

"Wayne residents should start immediate plans for a new hospital." This warning was given Thursday night to a meeting of members of the Wayne Hospital Advisory Board and the Wayne Hospital Foundation by Verne Pangborn, state director of hospital and medical facilities.

A survey of the Wayne Hospital two years ago comparing it to Public Health Service requirements showed it deficient in 55 of a possible 125 points, Pangborn said, and

"this building which has served so well for so long is very tired and should be replaced."

Included in such plans should be extended care facilities and special treatment facilities such as physical therapy, Pangborn added.

He repeatedly emphasized the importance of starting the planning immediately. Medicare and Public Health Service requirements will obsolete some older facilities, Pangborn said, and they will

fall by the wayside. He suggested Wayne get together with surrounding communities and see how large an area the medical facilities would serve, then all join forces for the total health needs of that area.

Several ways to organize the hospital were offered. They include:

Non-profit corporation—operating without a profit being returned to stockholders. Money given to the corporation would be a deduct-

ible gift. County hospital—subsidized by a tax levied in the county and operated by a hospital board.

Hospital district—an area organized usually along trade area lines, and operated by a board.

Non-profit organizations may be changed to hospital districts in the future, Pangborn said, but districts cannot change to non-profit corporation after formation.

One problem which is peculiar to Wayne and which should be seriously considered in the planning of a new hospital is Wayne State College, Pangborn said. He emphasized that the college be considered. Both present and projected enrollments of the college will be important factors in the future needs of any hospital which will serve the area.

In discussion following Pangborn's talk, Norman Nordstrom, WSC assistant dean of instruction, said that it could be possible, in the future, assuming a new hospital were built

gelding, "Silver"), softball, knitting, sewing and guitar playing.

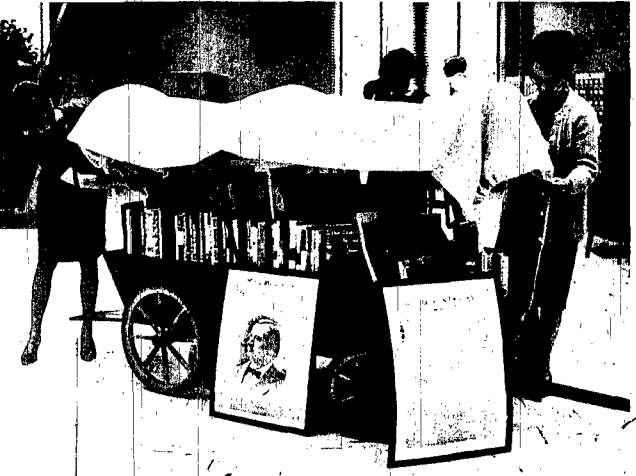

With that note will go a check for a certain amount—\$10 or more, the amount depending on how many merchants choose to take part. A list of those participating will be included.

No big donations are being sought. If each business firm gives a little, there will be plenty in the fund to make drawings possible each week for a year.

Representatives of veterans organizations and business places met last week to make tentative plans. They accented the fact that this is not a promotion for business, but an appreciation gesture on the part of business people in an age when beatniks, profesters, fugitives to Canada and the "I-won't-serve guys" are getting a lot of attention.

The plan is thought to be unique in the nation. In fact, it is so different it is expected other communities and counties may want to copy it.

# Allen Vandalism 'Shocks'

Vandalism to telephone company lines in the Allen area has come as a shock to area residents. It has also been disturbing to Northwestern Bell Telephone Co., owner of the lines.

Ed Jaksha, Fremont, district manager for the region including Allen, said it all started last fall when a pole line from Allen toward South Sioux City was cut and 10 to 15 wires were cut at insulators.

Later two or three other cases of cut wires were reported. Monday of last week a report came in that wires had been cut to Allen farm lines at random and several lines in towns leading from homes or business places had been cut between the outlets and the main lines around town.

Northwestern Bell has sent security officers to the area to follow up leads. Jaksha said the firm would appreciate any information that could help solve the problem and all information will be kept in strictest confidence.

Dixon County Sheriff Gus Shulte has also been working on the case. The feeling is that someone is damaging customers more than the telephone company. However, there is the added factor of lines being needed in emergencies. If someone cut a line needed on a life-or-death call, the cutting of the line might be a contributing factor should the lack of telephone service result in tragic loss.

For this reason, the officials are determined to track down the guilty party or parties. If there are no more instances of such action, it will be assumed the warnings printed in papers will have served their purpose.

## Soil Moisture for Area Below Normal

Northeast Nebraska soil moisture reserves are dangerously low, according to the college of agriculture of the University of Nebraska. Readily available moisture (RAM) is well below the average.

Extension agronomists at NU feel that in view of this fact farmers may want to consider adjustments in crops to be planted, plant populations and fertilizer applications.

Grain sorghums usually outyield corn in dry years. High corn yields are possible in dry years with 12 to 14 thousand plants per acre. For grain sorghum, three to four plants per row-foot will provide adequate stands if moisture is sufficient.

Fertilizer should be used in adequate but judicious amounts. Nitrogen fertilizer, used according to soil test recommendations, will increase water use efficiency and will produce more grain per inch of water used.

The state officials suggest contacting county extension offices for more specific information on crop managements and recommended practices applicable in the area.

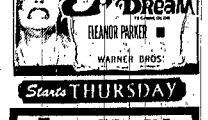
## Boeckenhauer Brothers Get Honors

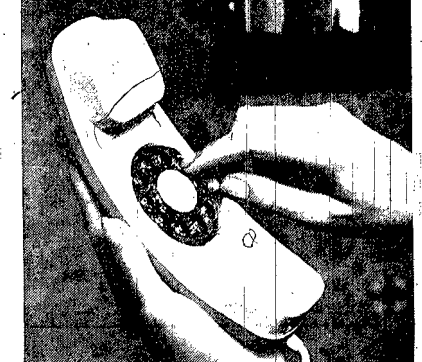
