The scene was the Russel Hoffman farm four miles south of Winside. Hoffmans lost their daughter in an accident the previous week and work was forgotten in the sorrow of the tragedy.

Earners in the area brought farmers and other equipment to the Hoffman farm. Before they left they had disked 114 acres and planted them to corn and disked an additional 10 acres to be planted to beans.

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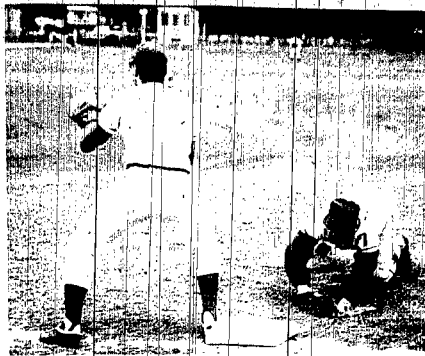

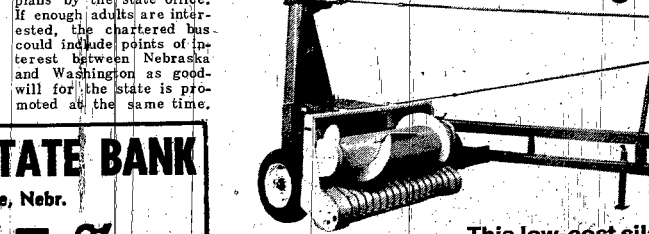

Weather Damage Winter and Spring Reported in Evergreen Shelterbelts

Young evergreen trees in the area were damaged by weather conditions last winter and this spring, according to Dick Gavitt, extension forester at Northeast Station, Concord. He reports the losses extensive and expensive. "Weather injury is the No. 1 enemy of the evergreen tree in Nebraska," Gavitt said. "Tree losses in farm windbreaks and home plantings are visible now."

He pointed out that injured trees will have brown tips, brown limbs or will be entirely brown. It is not unusual to find them side by side with healthy trees. Winter damage is expected, but the spring damage was more severe than usual, according to Gavitt. He pointed out that warm weather came and was followed by freezing weather that hurt the growing trees.

He recommends the following five steps to keep from losing more trees:

1. Select a well-drained soil for planting.
2. Water the evergreens in the fall, soaking ground around the trees before the ground freezes.
3. Mutch around trees to prevent deep freezing.
4. Plant trees and shrubs where protected from wind and sun.
5. Maintain a fertile, well-aerated soil to encourage deeper root growth.

per inch of trunk diameter seal evenly around the tree or shrub and not all right up against the trunk. Gavitt points out that in some instances if winter damage is severe those shrubs and trees hurt worst should be replaced. Then every measure possible should be taken to protect them through the summer, fall, winter and spring that follow.

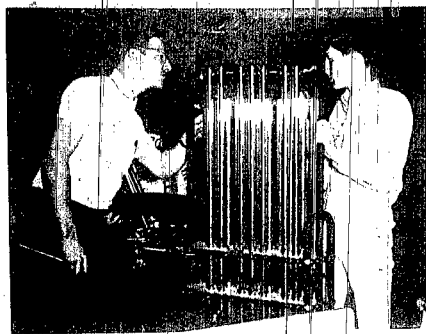

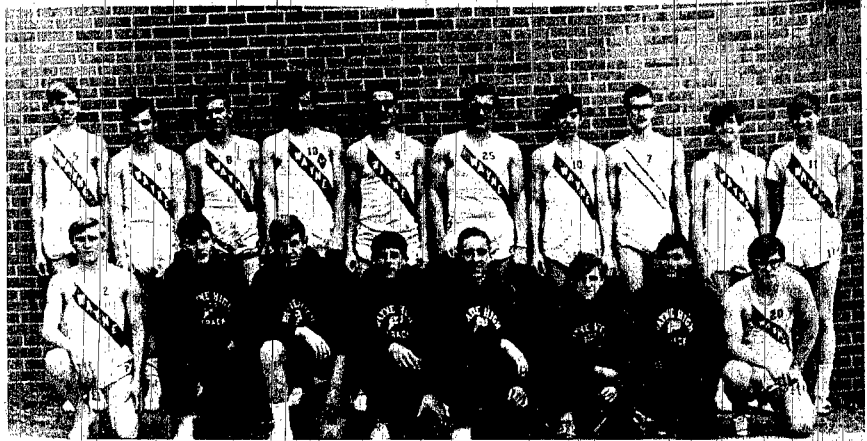

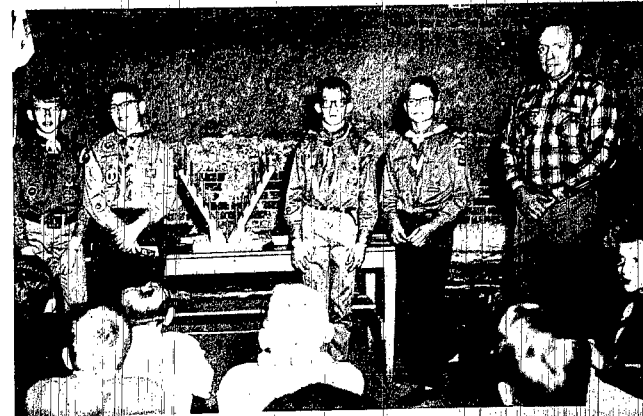

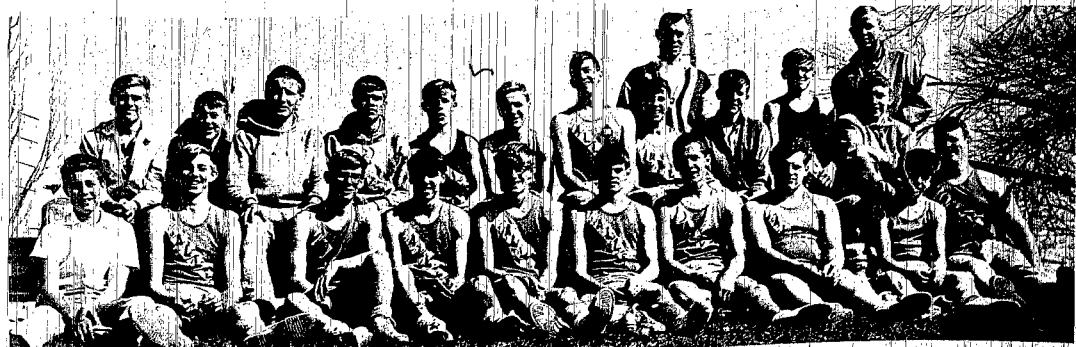
