

Five Memorial Services Set

Five Memorial Day programs are scheduled in this area Tuesday, May 30. In addition, rural cemeteries will be visited for short salutes and all cemeteries will be visited to place flowers on graves of departed and to remember those who died in service of the country.

LaPorte Cemetery for the first time in years will be in visiting condition. While there is considerable work to be done yet, it is now cleared enough so people can get in and out and graves can be recognized with tombstones upright and weeds and grass cut down.

Following is a brief resume for the five services in alphabetical order:

Allen - Legion and Auxiliary sponsor services at 10:30 a.m. in Eastview Cemetery. Rev. John Efranson, pastor of Lutheran churches in Allen and Concord, will speak. Rev. Alfred Winkler, Carol Lippolt, Debbi Clark, the firing squad, Rev. Alfred Winkler and Julie Swanson will have parts in the program. A dinner open to the public will be served at the Legion Hall following the services.

Concord-Dixon - Union services will be held by Concord and Dixon at 2:30 p.m. under the sponsorship of the Ladies Cemetery Association at the Concord Auditorium. Dixon Methodist Church and Concord Lutheran and Evangelical Free Churches of Concord are cooperating.

Wayne - Rev. Marvin Litorja, Evangelical Free Church, will give the main talk. Rev. John Efranson will assist. Girls from the Dixon and Concord communities will serve as flower girls, bringing blossoms to place on graves of veterans.

Garroll - Services at 2:30 p.m. under sponsorship of four veterans organizations will start with a parade at 10 a.m. from the City Auditorium to Main, north to Seventh and then to the veterans plot at the cemetery. In case of rain, all events will be at the auditorium at 10:30.

Winside - The Legion post at Winside is sponsoring services at the cemetery at 10:30 a.m. Zachariah Boghin, Randolph educator, will be the principal speaker. Rev. H. M. Hilpert, with Krueger and the firing squad will also take part.

A smorgasbord will be served at the Legion Hall following the services. Firing squad members will also visit cemeteries in three different areas. Two at Hoskins and the Theophilus community for short salutes starting at 7:30 a.m.

Area post offices will be closed Tuesday, May 30. Memorial Day is a legal holiday. There will be the usual Sunday schedule of mail delivery to boxes only with no rural delivery and no carrier delivery in towns with such service.

Five Rural Pupils Rank High in County

Five rural pupils were named this past week as ranking highest in the high school placement tests given the past year. Supt. Gladys Porter released the names of eighth grade graduates, the schools they will attend, highest grades on tests and averages for the various divisions.

Supt. Porter said this year's group did well. The average scores were: Reading 9.4; language 9.8; new math 10.2; composite 9.8; and science methods 8.7.

Heat Wave Adds to Woe

Nebraska was one of the hottest places in the nation Wednesday and Thursday. While the Northeastern part of the United States was having snow, the Northeastern part of Nebraska was having temperatures over 100.

The mercury set all kinds of records for this time of year as winds helped make it seem hotter than ever. The heat compounded the farm situation which has been gloomy due to the long dry spell.

Farmers stopped planting due to the heat. The soil has lost moisture and farmers feared if the seeds did start growing the young plants would not get a good start.

State crop experts said Thursday the Northeast part of Nebraska has about 40 per cent of normal moisture for the year thus far. Of course, it did not go on to say that some areas (such as the southern part of the county) are drier than other parts (such as

the Laurel area where a heavy thunderstorm brought extra moisture).

Welcome Rain

The area dry spell was temporarily relieved late Friday night and early Saturday morning when .22 of an inch of rain fell from a cloudburst that was short but well appreciated. As of press time Saturday, clouds still hung over the area with light sprinkles falling intermittently.

The state experts estimated that about 70 per cent of the corn crop is in the ground. No figures were given for soybean, but all plantings are said to be behind average.

Friday the front moved through that brought cooler readings to the area. It was welcome relief from the heat but needed even more moisture and forecasters were calling for only a 30 per cent chance of rain for the coming five-day period.

All it would take to change the entire outlook for the area is one good rain that covered most of the area or a series of thunder showers bringing enough rain so that almost everyone gets some moisture.

Areas to the west and south of here are said to be even drier than Wayne County. Pastures have started to burn and the moisture condition is said to be getting critical for the grassland areas to the west.

Weather has been unusual since winter. The area had a warm spell early and then a cold spell too late. Just three weeks ago it was freezing and already the mercury had climbed above the 100-degree mark.

It could be a crazy year yet. Rain is the magic word now, however. With a little moisture right away, residents could be ready to take about any weather idiosyncrasies for a few more weeks.

No More Northeast School



SCHOOL'S REALLY OUT! Wednesday was more than the last regular day of classes at Wayne's Northeast Elementary School. The jubilant kids photographed by Dick Manley as they rushed to summer freedom, did not realize they were the last elementary pupils in Wayne State's Hahn School.

With no fanfare, Northeast School has ceased to exist. The elementary school was dismissed Wednesday but it was just like another "last day of school" and there were no tears.

Northeast Elementary has been one of two grade schools in Wayne for years. Starting next fall the ones who have been attending there will go to West Elementary. Those in the upper grades of elementary school will go to Wayne Middle School.

The school opened in 1926 as WSC's campus laboratory school, according to Dick Manley of the college. WSC students did practice teaching from kindergarten through high school for years.

In 1962 the state closed the high school. In 1964 the elementary school was closed but the school was continued under operation of the Wayne-Carroll school district.

This fall Wayne High School will move into the new structure on West Seventh. Wayne Middle School (grades five, six, seven and eight) will open this fall in the present high school building. Wayne Elementary School will have kindergarten through fourth in what is now called West Elementary.

What is the future of what was once campus school, Wayne Prep, Wayne Hahn High and Northeast Elementary? The college is not sure. Several plans have been proposed, all of which would require some remodeling.

The closing of Northeast has ended an era of 31 years on the WSC campus. Reunions of Prep (Hahn) graduates are still held and many a story can be told about the activities that took place at the campus school.

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WHS Buys Two New Buses

The Wayne-Carroll school district has purchased two new school buses. One will replace the oldest bus now in use and the other will be used on a new route out of Wayne this fall.

Bids were opened Tuesday with four local firms submitting prices. The board voted to buy one Ford with Superior body and one Chevrolet with Carpenter body.

Wortman Auto bid \$2,350 on the chassis and Superior bid \$4,090 on the body. Coryell Auto bid \$2,529.61 on the chassis and Carpenter bid \$4,245 on the body. This brings costs for one bus to \$6,774.61 and for the other to \$6,440.

Four local firms were asked to bid on carpet of four different types, wool broadloom, wool gluedown, nylon gluedown and nylon broadloom. The prices for nylon gluedown were lower so the board decided on that type.

Nylon gluedown prices ranged from \$3,245 to \$3,380.50. Other types ranged from \$3,799.97 to \$5,028.42. (Prices quoted are for the entire carpeting work being planned in the new school.)

King's Carpets, Wayne, had the low bid for nylon gluedown, \$3,245. Larson's and Garhar's were both within \$350 of that bid. The board decided to check with the architect to make sure specifications were met by the samples offered. A contract is to be awarded at the June 5 meeting when colors will be selected.

Marshall Nurseries presented landscaping plans. However, the board decided not to go into this phase of the high school campus project until sodding goes in. With the hot, dry weather, it was thought best to wait until fall until making a decision.

Legion's Commander Favors Observance

Residents of Wayne are cordially invited to attend Memorial Day services on Tuesday, May 30, sponsored by Irwin Sears Post No. 43 of The American Legion, Post Commander Carl Scheel announced today.

The traditional commemorative rites are scheduled to begin with a parade at 10 at City Auditorium, Commander Scheel reported.

The first order for the observance of Memorial Day was issued in May 1868 by Gen. John A. Logan of the Grand Army of the Republic "for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country." For many years after the Civil war, the GAR in the North and the Confederate Veterans in the South took charge of the Memorial Day observances in their respective communities.

When these organizations became unable to carry on actively these rites, The American Legion pledged to help perpetuate the annual observance of Memorial Day, Commander Scheel explained. Although it began as an occasion to commemorate the dead of all wars, Memorial Day has since become a time for the decoration of graves of family and friends.

In urging the widest possible participation by Wayne residents in the Memorial Day rites, Commander Scheel referred to the following excerpts from General Logan's original order:

"Let no avarice or neglect, no ravages of time, testify to present or coming generations that we have forgotten as a people the cost of a free and undivided republic."

Commander Scheel reminded that the observance of Memorial Day in Wayne

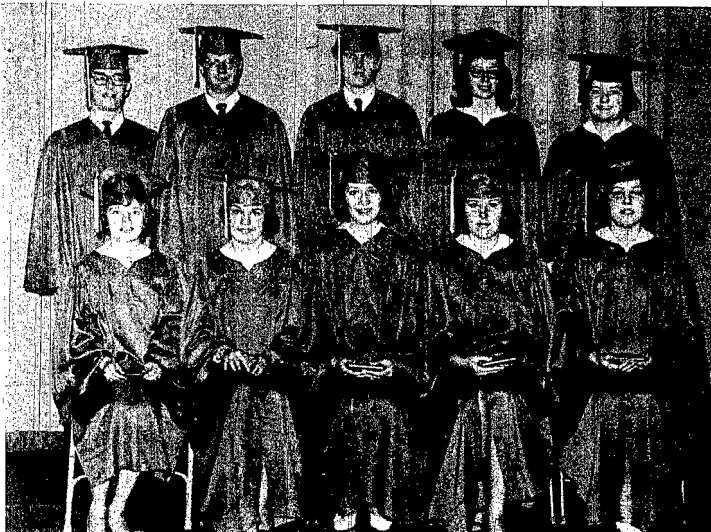
Winside Girl in Summer Workshop

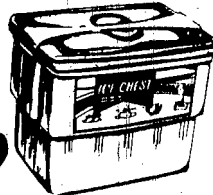

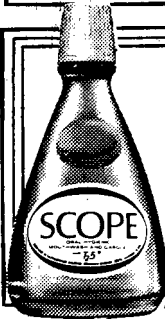

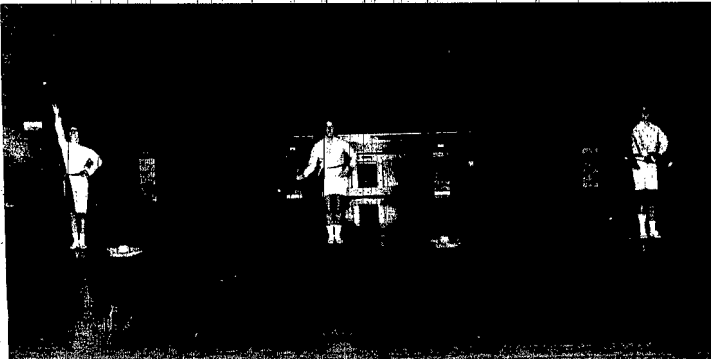

Nine Graduate from Hunter Safety Course at Wayne

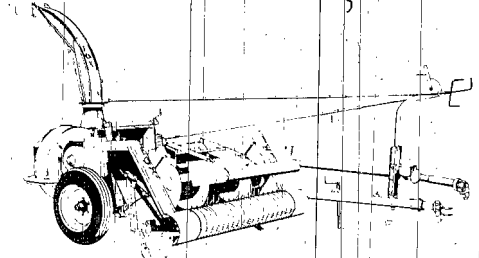

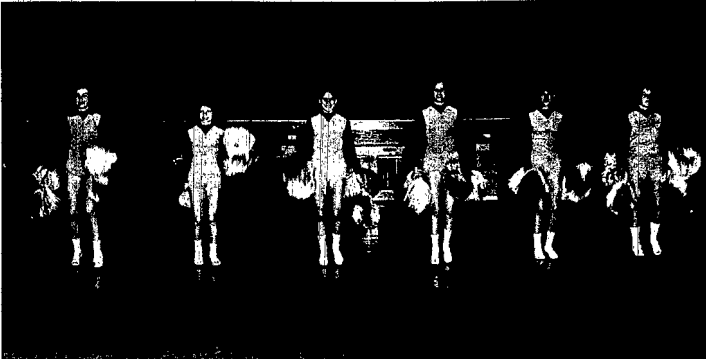

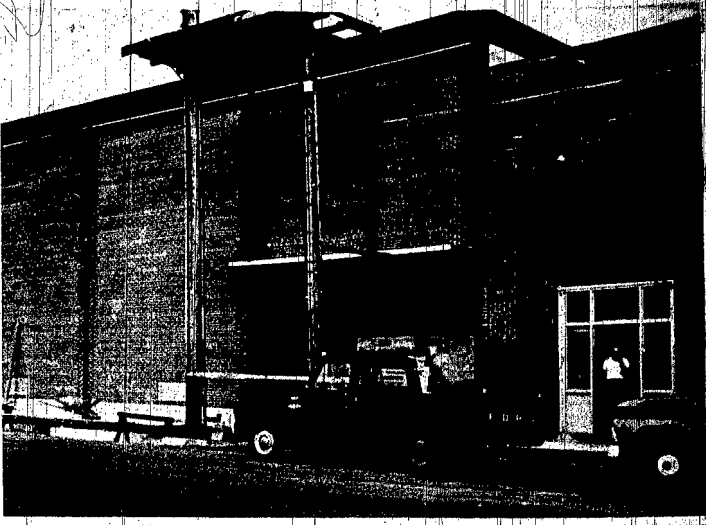

For 2 1/2 years he served

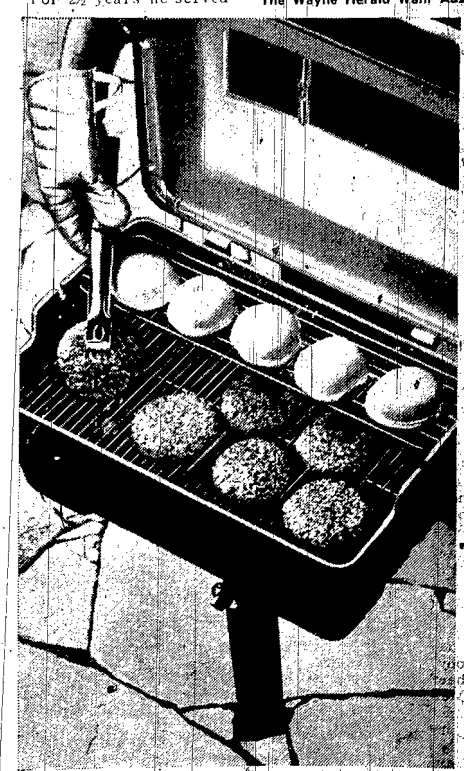
as commanding officer of a company and then as training officer for the Fifteenth Air Force in Europe. His teams won air force titles in both Africa and Italy.

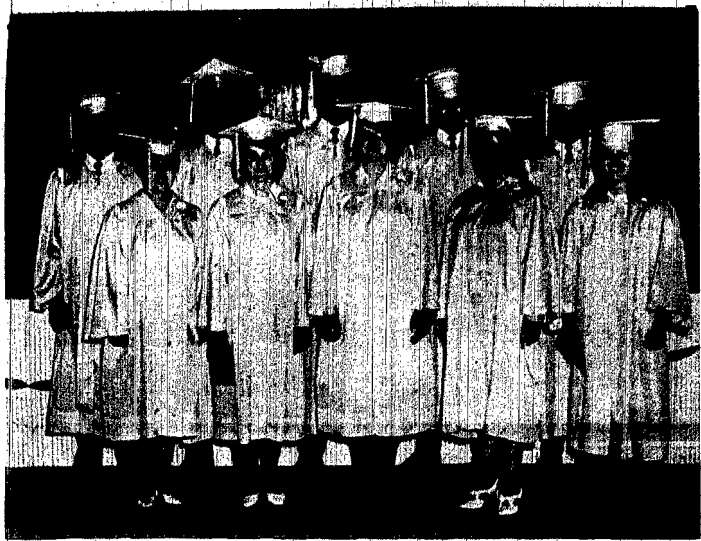

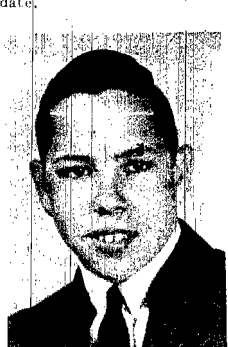

They tell of the man who loved to play an unusual cello. His instrument was different from the ordinary because it had only one string. Whenever he had a few spare moments he could be found in the basement of his home playing his cello. He always sat on a low stool and held the neck of the instrument in his left hand while he drew the bow back and forth across that single string. He kept a finger in one certain spot on the string so he could bring forth the very same sound. Back and forth he moved the bow, hour after hour, always producing the same monotonous tone.

For many years his poor wife had endured the unpleasant sound of his cello, but the time came when she could stand it no longer. She walked down the steps to the basement and back into the little room where her husband was sitting with his cello. When he saw her approaching, he stopped playing. She came near to him and placed her hand on his shoulder. "John," she said, "I have heard many people play the cello but they always have four strings on their instrument and they move their fingers different locations on the strings so they can get a variety of tones as they draw the bow. Why can't you play as others do?"

For a few moments John sat in silence with his head bowed low. Then he looked into the weary but gentle eyes of his patient wife and said, "You see, my dear, they are looking for the place; I have found it."

Cattle in Feedlots Part of Friday Tour

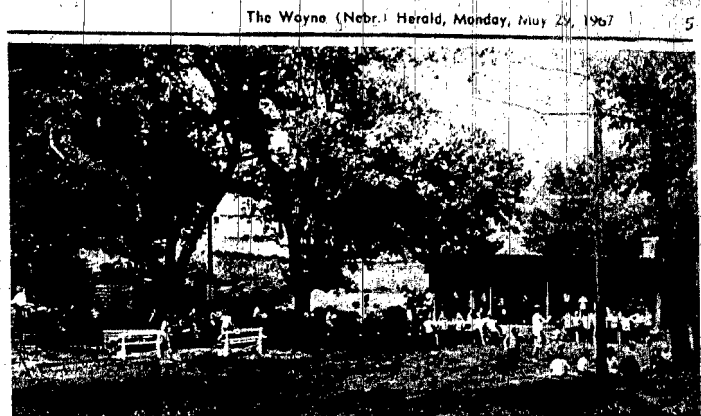

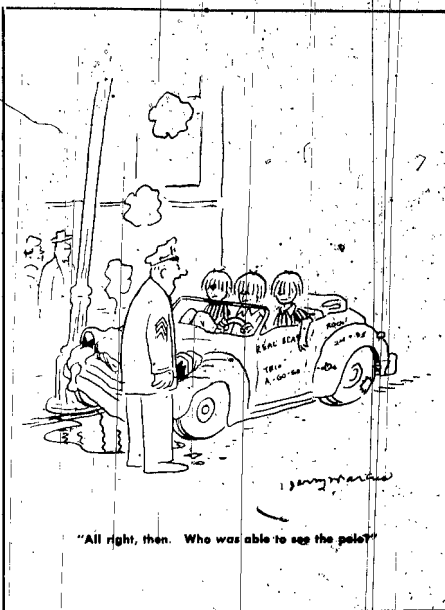
For your sake and ours, get with it, will you? Look a little hungry to work—not just hungry for cash. C.R.G.

Secretary of the Territory. The plan of the building was much more extensive than would appear from its present appearance. Large columns, with heavy casting, were erected on each side of the building, with the roof extending in the shape of a porch; but one stormy night, while the structure was in the process of erection, one of these columns was struck by lightning and demolished, and in consequence of this electrical visitation the others were taken away, and the style of architecture somewhat changed.

"In 1869 the capital was removed to Lincoln, and since that time it has been very little used. Chicago builders, some time ago, examined the building, and declared it unsafe, and hence came what was considered to be the necessity for tearing it down, to make room for the construction of the proposed High School."

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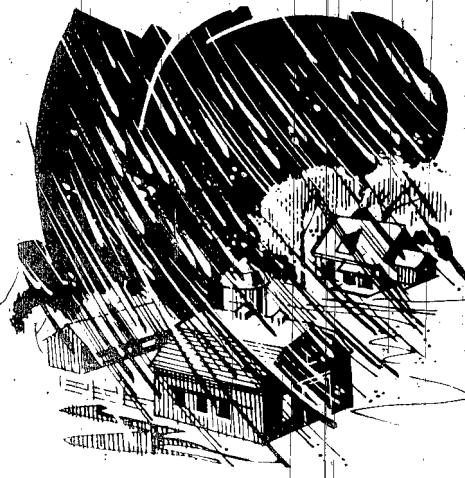

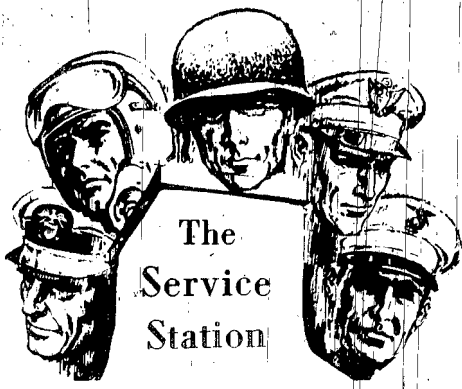
