WHS Buys Two New Buses

The Wayne-Carroll, school district has purchased two new school buses. One will replace the oldest bus now in use and the other will be used on a new route out of Wayne this fall.

Bids were opened Tuesday with four local firms submitting prices. The board vpted to buy one Ford with Superior body and one Chevrolet with Carpenter body.

Wortman Auto bid \$2,350 on the chassis and Superior bid \$4,090 on the chassis and Carpenter bid \$4,245 on the body. This brings costs for one bus to \$6,774.61 and for the other to \$6,744.61 and for the other to \$6,744.61 and for the other to \$6,440.

Four local firms were asked to bid on carpet of four different types, wool broadloom, wool gluedown, nylon gluedown and nylon roudloom. The prices for nylon gluedown prices Nylon gluedown prices

nylon gluedown were lower so the board decided on that type.

Nylon gluedown prices ranged from \$3,245 to \$3,580,50. Other types ranged from \$3,799.07 to \$5,028.42. (Prices quoted are for the lentire carpeting work being planned in the new schotol).

King's Carpets, Wayne, had the low bid for nylon gluedown, \$3,245. Larson's and (arhart's were both within \$350 pf that bid. The board decided to check with the architect to make sure specifications were met by the samples offered. A contract is to be awarded at the June 5 meeting when colors will be selected.

Marshall Yurseries presented landscaping plans. However, the board decided not to go into this phase of the high school campus project until sodding goes in. With the hot, dry weather, it was thought best to wait until fall until making a decision.



The Territorial Capitol
If was not until December of 1868 that Lincoln
became the actual state
capital of Nebraska. For
more than a year and a
half after attaining statehood, Omaha remained the
physical capital of the state,
with the state legislature
meeting in the old territorial capitol building. An
article in the Omaha Weekly
Herald of July 1870, now
in the files of the Nebraska
State Historical Society,
gives a history of the building and an account of its
destruction.

thirteen years ago looked
down upon a small village,

It was constructed in the year 1856, and was first occupied by the Territorial Legislature in 1857. The stone work of the foundation was laid by James Febry, a farmer now residing in McCardie precipit while the contract for the brackwork was let to Messas Bovey and Arm. precipct, while the contract for the prickwork was let to Messys. Bovey and Armstrong, who established a brickyard, where the raitroad shops now stand, for the purpose of manufacturing the material with which to commence the building. A Government appropriation of \$50,000 was made for the purpose of erecting a capitol. Under the management of Governor Mark Izard, this amount was soon exhausted, with the building only half completed. The citizens then took hold of the matter, under the lead of Jesse Howe, who was then Mayor. City scrip was issued to the extent of \$50,000, and the building was completed without delay, under direction of Hon. A. S. Paddocks






