Going to Omaha?

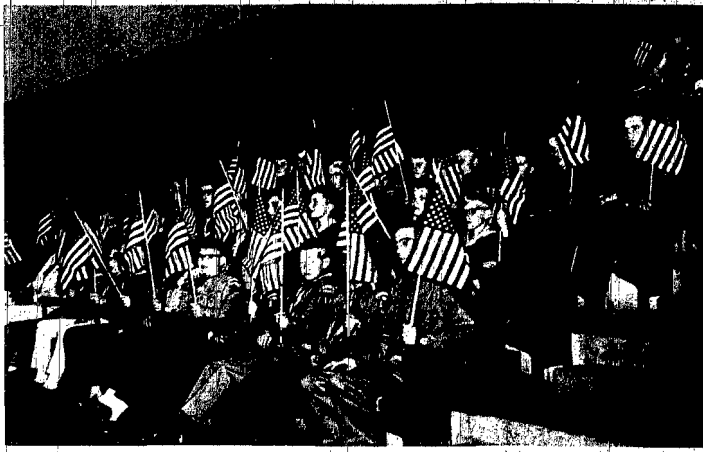

Band Concert Extra

What a difference a day makes! Last Friday the story on the dry spell was ready for the press when a shower fell so a paragraph was added about it. The "pump was primed" and the rains continued falling. At this time (Wednesday morning) rain has fallen off and on for six days, giving the crop outlook in the area a tremendous boost.

Peoples Natural Gas Co. figures show what happened temperaturewise. The area had a heat wave good enough for a big headline in Monday's paper. It got as hot as 104 Friday and is cooler than 68.

Then the rains came. Since then the high has been 60, well below the low readings for several days, and the lows have been in the 40's.

Rainfall Friday through Tuesday was set at 2.13 inches by State National Bank gauges. The bank reported 2.25 Friday, .19 Saturday, .56 Sunday, .97 Monday and .25 Tuesday. Rain also fell Wednesday morning to make it six days in a row.

Ralph Watson, three miles north of Wayne, has government gauges which showed a total of 1.83 inches of rain in the same period. This illustrates the variance brought about through sudden squalls of rain that hit in scattered areas.

The rain was not scattered, however. If ever a rain could be called "general," this was it. Rain was reported in 40 of the 48 adjacent states Tuesday. From the Pacific to the Atlantic and in most of the South there was rain of one type or another.

Strangest feature was where the rain came from the east. Winds from the east were strong at times and clouds moved steadily from east to west for days at a time.

The parched grasslands to the west where rain was needed most received generous amounts. All sections of Nebraska reported rain for thirsty crops. In both Iowa and Nebraska where some sections were considering drought designations the rains brought relief.

Add Three Teachers at WHS; Need Three More

Three new teachers have been signed for Wayne-Carroll schools this coming term, Supt. Francis Haun reports. Three more are needed to complete the staffs at Wayne High, Wayne Middle, Wayne Elementary and Carroll Elementary.

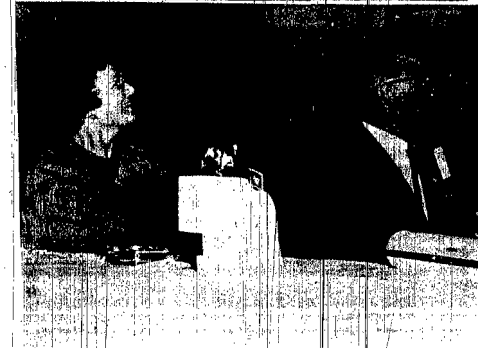

Enough Students to Drive One Anywhere

How would you like to be driven around by 86 different people each week? That's what Mike Mallette and Ron Carnes are faced with at Wayne High School.

They turned up for driver's education this week and found there were 86 enrolled for the summer course, even more than anticipated. As a result, they are being driven literally and figuratively night and day.

Supt. Francis Haun reports the driving course is scheduled to go five days a week until completed. Included are many hours of actual driving plus classroom study that will make the young people better drivers.

According to Prin. Loren Park, around 150 are expected to enroll for other summer courses, remedial reading, remedial math and recreation. Around 180 are eligible in the Wayne, Carroll, St. Mary's and rural district, the latter taking in those who indicated an interest through Co. Supt. Gladys Porter.

The three courses are expected to start June 12. Enrollment could rise above the anticipated 150.

Pat Jolley, Scout executive for the Lewis & Clark District, estimated between 1,000 and 1,500 people attended the Scout Fun Fair in Wayne City Auditorium Saturday. He called it a financial and entertainment success.

The first annual fun fair in Wayne drew praise of visiting Scout executives also. While it did not have as many booths as fun fairs in other districts, it did have more active competition events which proved to be real crowd pleasers.

Jolley paid tribute to the Wayne Jaycees for the success of the venture. He said the young men's civic organization carried the ball and without their sponsorship and work the fair could not have been a success. He also praised the city for use of the auditorium, the Chamber of Commerce for use of the booths, the Cubs, Scouts and Explorers for their work and the parents and friends of Scouting who helped in so many ways.

Finally, he expressed appreciation for Mert Ellis. Jolley said Ellis could be expected to do a certain amount to help out but went far beyond what was expected of him and was

Winside Veterinarian Fights Dead Animal Bill

Dr. Donald Vrbka, Winside, is one of a number of Nebraska veterinarians who have spoken out against LB-344, which would allow the use of dead animals in dog and cat food.

The Nebraska State Journal, Lincoln, quoted the Winside veterinarian on the subject Tuesday. That paper quoted him as saying: "I have seen people eat dog and cat food. You have to stop this at the source before it gets started, which means you don't eat it."

At present, only slaughtered animals can be used in cat and dog food. However, this law has been bypassed by a directive from the state bureau of animal industry.

Dr. Vrbka said the law makes no requirement for determining the cause of death in the animals used. This is quite a point, since those favoring the bill have favored using such animals for dog and cat food so they would not be used in food for humans.

Federal law says 'only

slaughtered animals may be used in food for humans and animals. Some believe the new law would be a direct violation of that food and drug act provision.

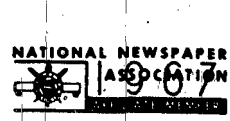

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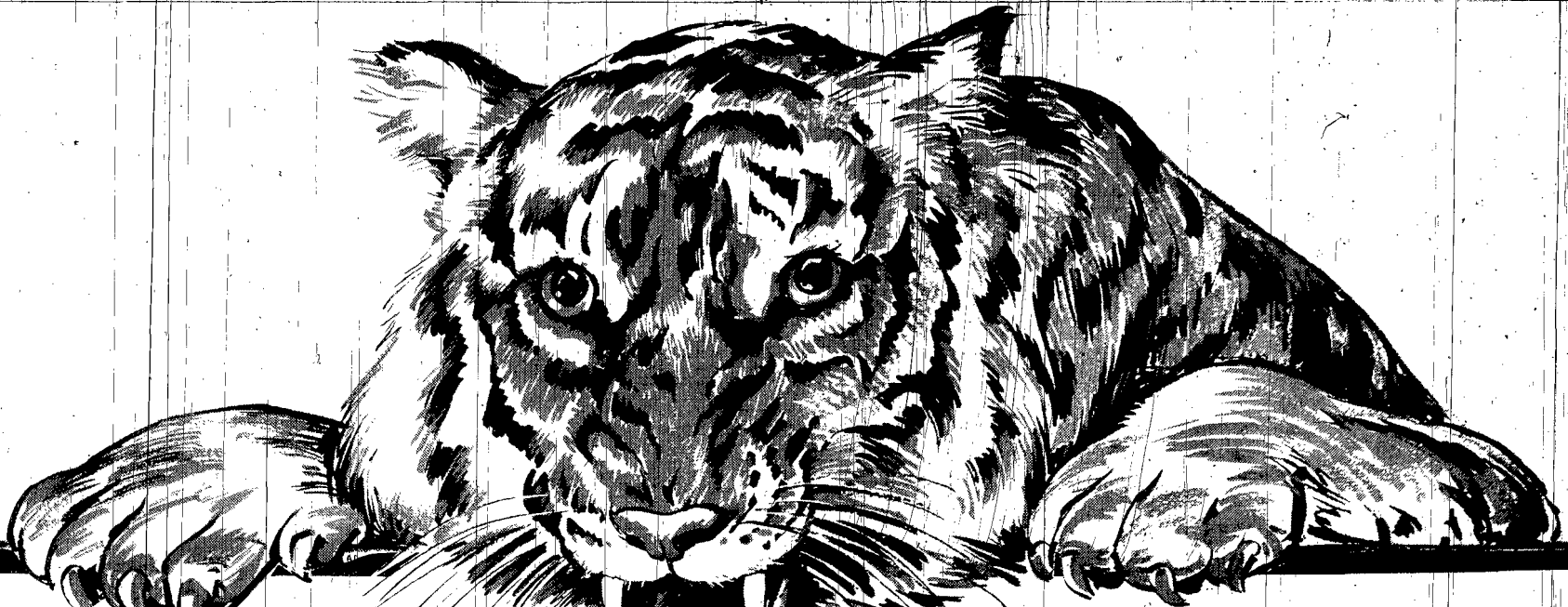

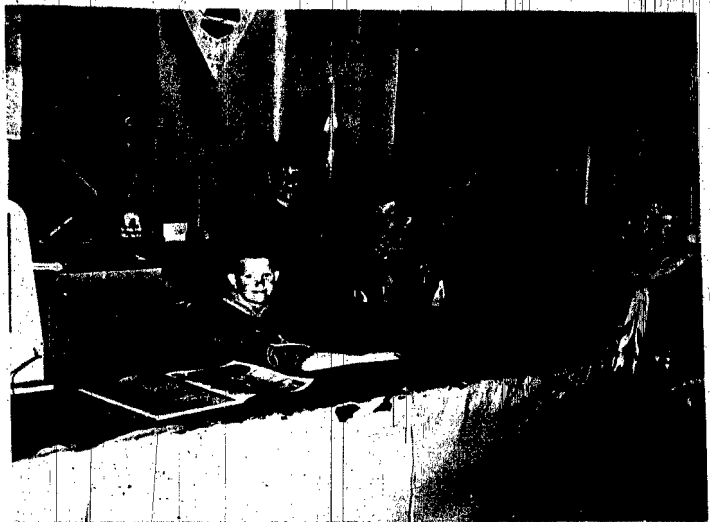

Work Starts on First Unit of Swine Study at Northeast Station, Concord

R. D. Fritschen, swine project leader at Northeast Station, reports the first work on the swine housing-management project at the University of Nebraska Northeast Station, Concord.

A lagoon waste disposal system is being used, the first for the university. About an acre in size and about nine-feet deep, it will be sealed with 10 tons of bentonite to prevent seepage.

Fritschen reports the lagoon is part of the overall project that will include six swine-growing-finishing houses erected with supporting facilities. The units will be used to determine pigs' response to environmental factors, Fritschen said.

"There are several objectives involved in the research," Fritschen reported. "They include: (1) determine amount of slotted floor required for optimum gain; (2) compare a one-unit system with a two-

unit system; (3) compare open front units with environment-controlled units; (4) compare pigs' response to ventilation techniques; (5) evaluate liquid manure disposal; and (6) determine the economic implications of factors involved in confinement reared hogs."

The project leader indicated that pigs used will be purchased as feeder pigs. However, long-range plans included farrowing facilities. Two units currently under construction will be completed in July, Fritschen estimated.

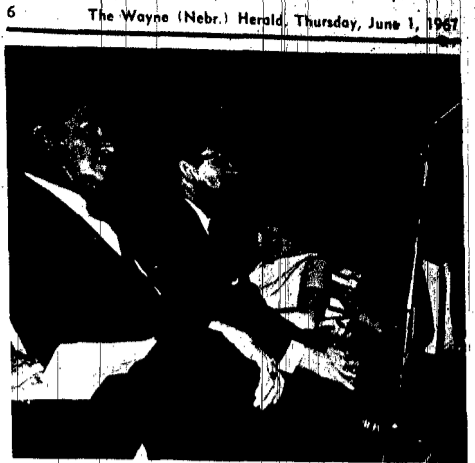

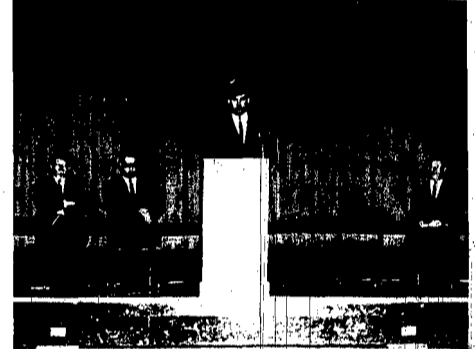

A reading, "In Flanders Fields" by Vida Jones was followed by the benediction. The program ended with the retiring of the colors by the Legion.

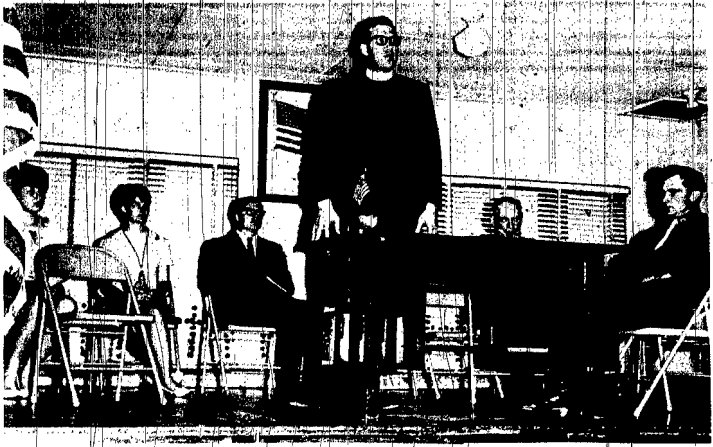

INSURANCE A "MILESTONE" RISE IN U. S. SAVINGS

The past year has been a key one in the history of a unique federal agency that is celebrating its 33rd birthday this month.

That agency is the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, which insures funds in savings and loan associations. And it was during the past year that Congress increased the insurance limit on these funds to \$15,000.

John T. Bressler, president of Wayne Federal Savings and Loan Association, noted that since the FSLIC was created in 1934, the insurance ceiling has been raised only twice.

The first time was in 1950, when the original \$5,000 ceiling was increased to \$10,000. It remained there until Congress authorized the \$15,000 ceiling in late 1966.

Present conditions, he went on, are a lot different than those prevailing when the FSLIC was founded on June 27, 1934.

That was in mid-Depression, he said, and public confidence in the nation's financial system was low. Many of the best-managed banks and savings associations were in trouble because of runs on their resources.

Even then the nation's savings associations were the chief source of funds for home financing, although the Depression had brought real estate and home-building activity to a virtual standstill.

In 1933, Congress sought to restore confidence in the nation's financial structure by creating the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, which insures savings in banks. Creation of the FSLIC followed a year later.

"As intended by the Congress, the FSLIC became a twin agency to the FDIC," Mr. Bressler explained.

The fact that no saver ever lost a penny covered by FSLIC insurance, Mr. Bressler said, is why public confidence in this protection grew to the point where 96 per cent of the nation's savings and loan assets are now held by FSLIC-insured institutions.

"Accounts are now protected to \$15,000, instead of \$5,000. One other important change was made in 1950 when payout provisions of the FSLIC were revised slightly, to make them identical to those for the FDIC.

"But the fact that the FSLIC today is substantially what was created more than 30 years ago is eloquent testimony to the wisdom of the men who wrote the legislation establishing the agency."

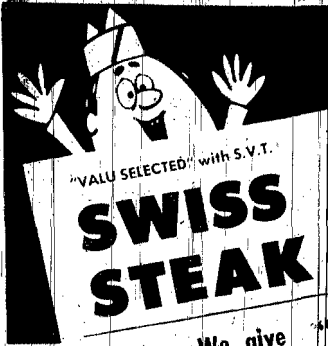

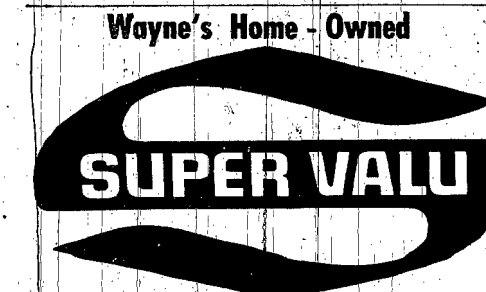

What It Is -
TV Cable is a way of giving you better reception from coaxial cables strung throughout Wayne. The TV signals are received on top of a 300-foot specially constructed tower on more powerful television antennas rather than from individual conventional rooftop antennas.

How CATV Works -
Here in Wayne, professionally-engineered Antennas receive TV signals from the air and pass them thru an electronic control center located at the base of Wayne Cablevision's Tower Construction. Here interference is filtered out and the signals are amplified and converted to Cable Channel Frequencies. A main or "trunk" line carries the signals to smaller Feeder Cables serving a city block or other comparable cluster of homes. Individual connections or "drops" then lead from the Feeder Cable to the Subscriber's Television set. These are neat, unobtrusive wires that connect to the back of the set from an outlet in the wall.

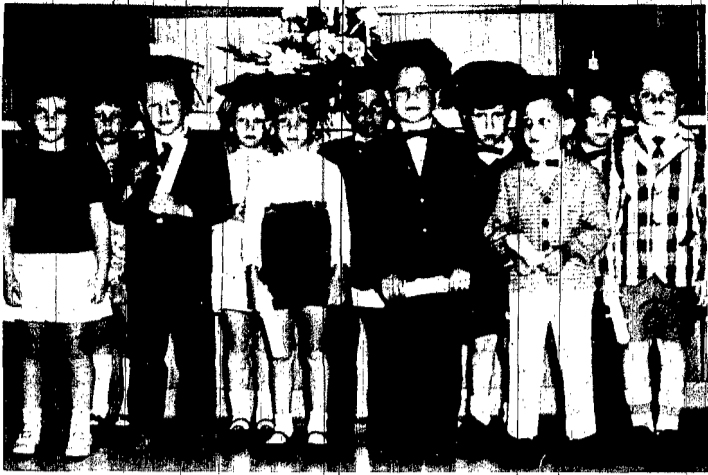

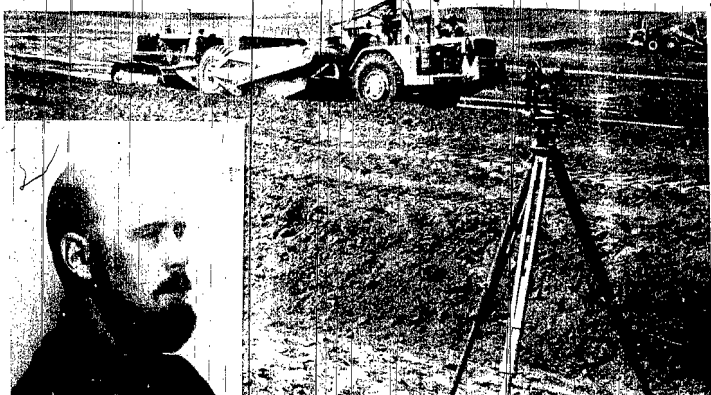

By comparison, the general fund portion is only \$14.1 million or 6.43 per cent below the Governor's recommendation of \$220.5 million.

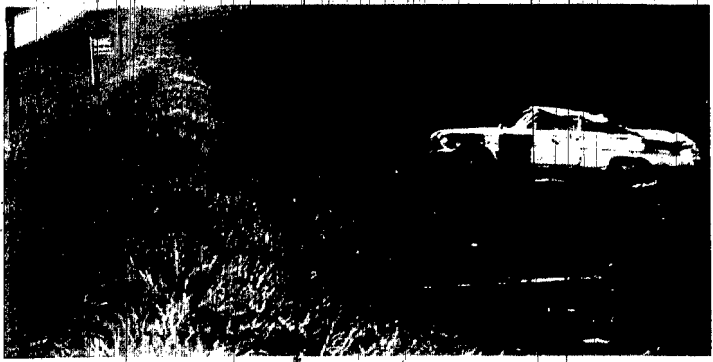
