

Hectic Night Tuesday as Tornadoes Seen in Region

Tuesday night was "one of those nights" in the area. Tornado sightings were reported in the area and warning sirens were sounded in at least two towns.

Walthill was hit by a tornado that damaged ten homes but injured none. Tornadoes were also reported to have touched down in rural areas near Battle Creek and Meadow Grove.

Wayne police were on watch all night. They had connections with Norfolk police and Civil Defense and were prepared to sound an alarm if any dangerous clouds were seen in the area.

Closest sighting here was at 9:02 when a sighting was reported four miles east of Wayne. About that time the first of two warnings were sounded in Wakefield alerting residents of the danger. A second alarm was sounded in Wakefield later in the night.

The Norfolk weather bureau station reported a funnel cloud sighted seven miles north of Carroll at 7:30. At 7:12 a sighting was reported, two miles

Here again is the Wayne tornado alarm to be given if a tornado is sighted in the area or one has hit nearby and could be heading toward the city. Three long blasts of the fire siren with no rise and fall. A minute silence between each blast. Police cars will also go up and down streets with sirens blowing. Do not go out to watch for tornadoes; seek shelter. A tornado "watch" is given when tornadoes could be spawned. A tornado "warning" is given when one has been seen.

City Sidewalk District Killed; Levy to Go Down 3.35 Mills

With over 60 per cent of the residents of a sidewalk district having valid signatures on it, a petition presented several weeks ago to the city council was termed legal and sufficient to kill the district west of Main Street, it was decided Tuesday at the city council meeting. The mill levy for the city was or-

dered out in another council action. There are 367 legal resident voters in the sidewalk district. In a drive, 268 signed petitions but 30 were unqualified and ruled out. Another 8 were improper signatures (Mrs. Jim Blank, instead of Mrs. Mary Blank, etc.) and another 8 were contested. This left 222 names that were proper and valid. With only 51 per cent needed to kill the plan, the council declared the district null and void.

The city's mill levy is going down. The council in Ordinance 649 reduced the levy 3.35 mills for the coming fiscal year, down to 24.69 from 27.95. In this day and age that is big news, a tax decrease. Making it possible in part were paying off bonds on the See **COUNCIL**, pg. 2.

Area's Voters to Decide on Vo-Tech School This Month

Will Northeast Nebraska join Central Nebraska and Southwest Nebraska in establishing a vocational-technical school? The question will be answered in 14 area counties at a special election Tuesday, June 27.

Central Nebraska established a school first, voters overwhelmingly approving a school which is now operating at Hastings. Southwest Nebraska voted in favor of one next, that school not being in operation yet.

A Northeast Nebraska school to serve over 800 students within a year is the aim. The 14 counties voting have a total population of almost 145,000 and a valuation of over \$440 million.

The school would train or re-train persons 16 or over in a variety of technical, clerical, skilled and semi-skilled crafts to increase their income capabilities for the increasing number of jobs available in the area.

Students from this region would get preference in enrolling. Tuition rates would be much lower for them than for those enrolling from outside the area. Unless such a school is set up, the area will continue to send people out of the area to learn skills. When they go elsewhere to study, they often stay outside the area to work.

Other states with re-

Deadline Set for 1966 Crop Loans

Loans may still be taken out on 1966 crops of corn, grain sorghum and soybeans, according to John Mohr, chairman of the Wayne County ASCS. Loan availability date is June 30 and loan maturity date is July 31.

Anyone wishing to secure a price-support loan on the three crops should contact the ASCS office and fill out an application by June 30. Crops put under loan are then eligible to put under resale and earn storage credit beginning Aug. 1.

Mohr adds, however, that all crops must be kept under resale 60 days before credit can be given on full or partial redemption of a loan.

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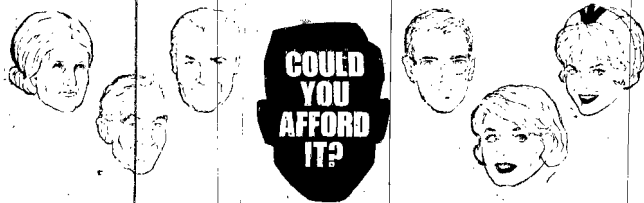

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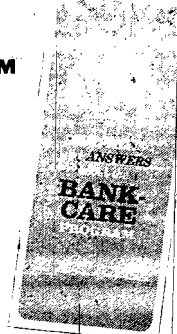

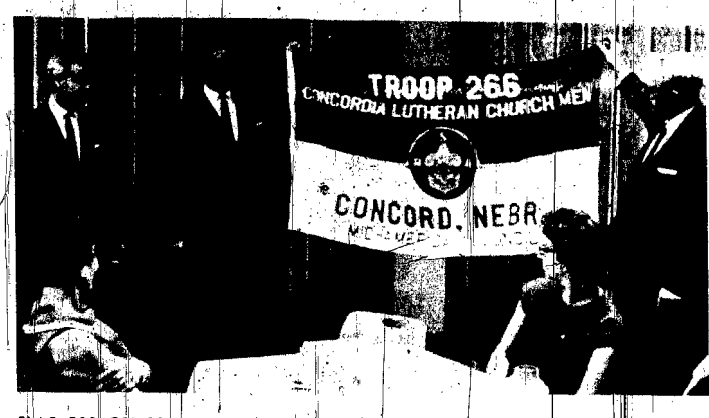

around 100 more unlicensed bicycles remain in the city. The little plates serve several purposes. They discourage stealing; they can be used to locate owners of found bikes; they can be traced through registration numbers; and they can be used for identifying reckless riders.

A small fee is charged for each plate. Officers record the serial number, size wheel, color, type brake and other identification when issuing plates, all part of a program to make bicycle ownership safer and bicycle stealing less safe.

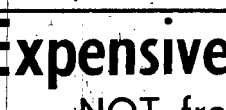

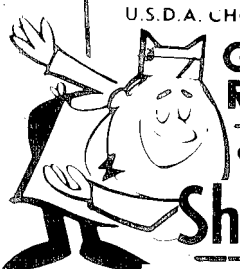

Area Dairymen Using Records

Area dairy farmers are keeping production records more than ever before, Don Kubik of Northeast Station, Concord, reports. Kubik is area dairy extension agent at the state facility.

Kubik feels dairymen are looking for help in improving efficiency in view of rising production costs. Dairy farmers have to be different businessmen than their fathers were, he said.

"Dairying in Northeast Nebraska is almost entirely new as we look at it today," Kubik said. "Markets have changed, cows have changed and producers have changed," he added.

A record amount of milk is sold as bulk fluid milk and processed through butter powder plants or cheese plants, contrasted to a few years ago when almost all milk was sold as cream. More bulk tanks, milking machines, pipelines and cows are found on farms today.

DAIRY PRODUCTION records such as those shown here by Don Kubik, area dairy extension agent at Northeast Station, Concord, are in a head at Northeast Station, Concord, are in a rapid increase in the area.

Dairying is more specialized with increased investment and size of operation. Dairy farmers become more interested as more income depends on dairy operations and that's why they keep records for help in feeding, breeding and culling to beat the cost-price squeeze, according to Kubik.

The Northeast Station has production records for every type of operation. University of Nebraska, DANA, milk cooperatives and county extension offices make this possible. Any of these can supply information or Kubik can be contacted at the station near Concord.

We hope you've made up your mind to vote in favor of the vocational-technical

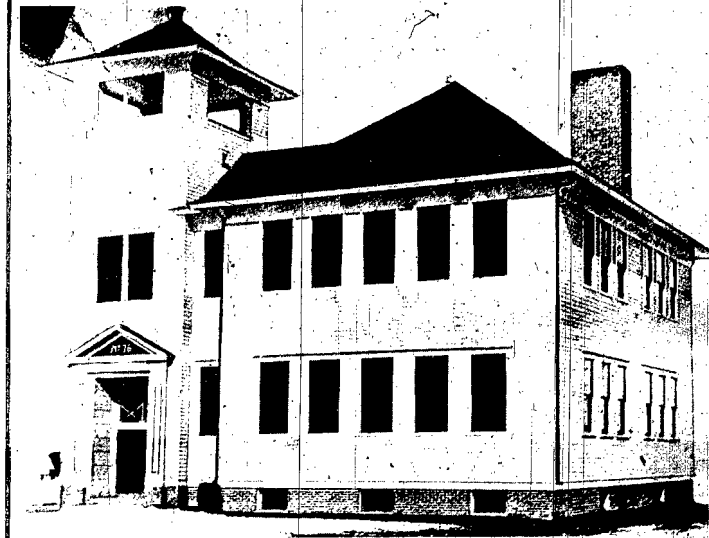

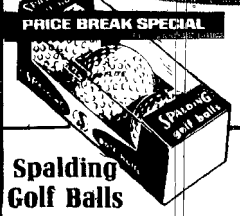

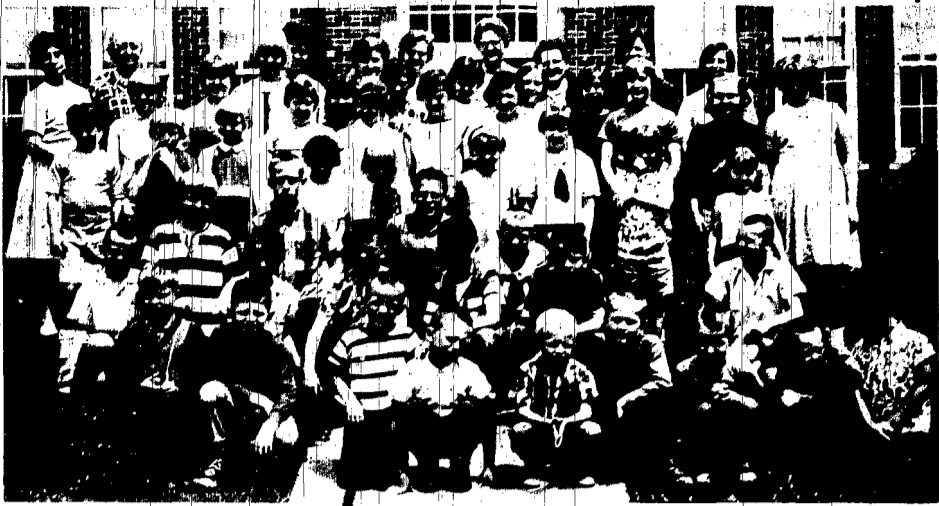

A sale bill in the Anderson, Ky., News Apr. 2, 1843, gives an idea of how the change in time has brought changes in other things. This information from the sale bill was supplied by Mrs. George Meyer, Wayne, from a Ponca paper which reprinted the information in 1950.

Having sold my farm and am leaving for Oregon territory by ox team will offer on March 1, 1843 all my personal property to-wit: All ox teams except two teams, Buck and Tom and Ben and Jerry, 2 milch cows, 1 gray mare and colt, one pair of oxen and yoke, 1 baby yoke, 2 ox carts, 1 iron plow with wood moldboard, 800 feet popular weather boards, 1000 three foot clapboards, 1500 ten foot fence rails, 60 gallon soap kettle, 85 sugar troughs made of white ash timber, 10 gallons maple syrup, 2 spinning wheels, 30 pounds mutton tallow, 20 pounds beef venison, 300 poles, 100 split hoops, 100 pounds tallow, 1 large loom made by Berry, empty barrels, 32 gallon barrel of Johnson Miller whiskey, seven years old, 20 gallons apple brandy, 40 gallon still (copper), four side oak tanned leather, one dozen reel hooks, 2 handled hooks, 3 scythes and cradles, one dozen wooden pitchforks, one half interest in a tan yard, 32 calibre rifle, bullet molds and power horn, rifle made by Ben Miller, 50 gallon soft soap, hams, bacon, lard, forty gallons sorghum, six head of fox hounds, all soft mouthed

Couple from England Prefers Wayne After Visit to "Glamorous" Points

A young English couple visiting in Wayne prefers the tree-lined streets, the quiet atmosphere and the beautiful old homes of this city to the brassy and garish hubbub of Phoenix and other more "glamorous" cities they have visited in the US.

Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Sanger of Orpington, Kent, are visiting her uncle, Anthony Garlick, and Mrs. Garlick. They have been gone from England four years and are taking an extended trip back from Malaysia to the United Kingdom to look over possible sites for making their home.

He had been on three-year contract in Malaysia as an architect designing multi-storied buildings, university buildings and a church. The pair left Malaysia in January, going to Australia, where he was commissioned by an organization to carry out a project, then to Fiji, Hawaii and San Francisco.

The Sangers had heard about the American Midwest and expected a big flat and drab area. They found instead a rolling garden-like area.

They love the tree-lined avenues in Wayne and feel the brick streets in sections of the city set off the loveliness even more. They also like the older homes for their architectural beauty and for their individual beauty.

They found Phoenix an area of flashing neon signs, gas stations and commercial activity in a dry desert area. It was not their idea of a place to stay.

Before they reached the Grand Canyon, he became sick. He remained sick the first two weeks here and has been in bed much

of the time. The latter part of last week he was able to get around and see a little more of Wayne and the surrounding area.

Showing a knowledge of the American West some natives do not know, the Sangers have tried to visualize what it was like in days of pioneer treks to the West, homesteading on treeless plains, Indian attacks and other events of a colorful era. Everywhere they go in the region they see reminders of the historical days at the turn of the century.

Sangers have found the people friendly everywhere they have been in this country. The expressed regret over not being able to meet more Wayne people due to his illness.

Both of them are younger looking than their ages (around 30). But they notice the elderly of Wayne. They expressed a amazement over the way the older people remain so active here. In the Garlick neighborhood they note many older residents who are working hard in yards, gardens and other projects.

Sanger, looking a bit like a "young Buffalo Bill," said he grew a beard and mustache just to prove he could. In Malaysia a fellow worker had a beard which Sanger told him was "insensitive." The friend said: "If you can do better, grow one." So Sanger did and he found he was more mature looking so he just kept it.

He and his wife are con-

sidering relocating in Australia, the United States, Canada, England or Europe. They plan to take a "good" look before they decide where they want to live.

Congenial, outgoing and easy to converse with, they seem to have a easy task wherever they locate for they will have no trouble getting acquainted and adapting themselves to the way of life.

Garlick is also a native of England and his wife is a native of Italy. He is professor of music at Wayne State College. They live in one of the "old houses" in Wayne but have made it into an attractive dwelling that makes it more of a "home" than a "house."
