





The legislation specifically permits the city to issue, revienue bonds to finance construction of a state building. A companion proposal will be considered later to allow the state to appropriate funds to retire the bonds, then purchase the building outright after the debt is repaid in full.

Sponsors said the procedure is necessary because the State Constitution problibits the state from incurring debt beyond \$100,000 at any time.

Estimated cost of the office building, badly needed to relieve crowded conditions in the State-horized construction of a building but indecision overwhere it should be located resulted in the new legislation.

Tornado Protection
, There is no universal protection against tornadoes except caves or underground excavations.



protection against tornadoes except caves or underground excavations. When time permits, go into a "storm cellar" or underground excavation with an air outlet to help equalize air pressure. In open country, move at right angles to the tornadoe's path. Tornadoes usually travel in a southwest to northeast direction. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine. If the ditch is along a road, be sure there are no electrical lines overhead.

In buildings, stay away from windows. If the house has a basement, go to the side from which the storm is approaching. In houses without basements, the safest place is in a center hall or near an interior wall. Get under a table or other piece of furniture for additional protection. Doors and windows on the north and east sides of the house should be opened slightly. Inpublic buildings, avoid auditoriums and gym.






