

Heavy Rain, Some Hail Add Misery to Sodden Territory

Never have so many farmers prayed for less rain. This area was hit by another heavy rain storm Sunday night and Monday morning with hail adding to woes in scattered areas.

Ralph Watson reported government gauges recording 2.0 inches of rain in the Sunday storm. Arnold Juncak, Carroll, said their records show 1.6 inches of rain in that region since May 26.

Handolph had 1.0 to 1.5 inches of rain and some crop-destroying hail. The rain seeped over the banks at Handolph and Belden and farthest down-stream.

Earl Fish, Belden, lost four cattle in drowning. Cunningham, Belden, the north end of Carroll. Main street had water up to the roof in the basement and in the scale pit.

Rolland Victor, seven miles north of Wayne, reported corn stripped with a fall down, the leaves matted to the ground. Willis Meyer, southeast of Wayne thought damage was not so heavy after the storm but Tuesday made a closer inspection and found traces of oak, gum and about 10 acres of corn will have to be replanted. Oats were planted along with alfalfa and the alfalfa will be left.

Initial Step Taken Monday Toward Low-Rent Housing

The first official step toward organizing a Housing Authority for the City of Wayne was taken Monday night. The Authority, which is organized under the Housing Authorities Law for first-class and second-class cities and villages, is making plans for a low-cost rental housing development for the elderly.

George Thorbeck was appointed chairman of the Housing Authority, by Mayor William Koerber and approved by the city council. Other members appointed by the mayor and approved by the council include Dale Johnson (vice chairman), Frank Pedersen (temporary secretary), William Lyonn and Robert Lane.

A date is to be decided upon by the Authority for a meeting with a number of architects who will present their plans for the project. One of the architects at the meeting will be hired to help determine the building site, the number of units to be constructed, the cost and other facets of the development.

The Housing Authority will meet on the first Monday of every month. However, special meetings may also be called according to B. B. Hornhoff, lawyer and legal counsel for the group.

County Will Help Decide Issue of Vocational School

Tuesday, June 27, the people of this part of Nebraska will decide the fate of a vocational-technical school. A special election will be held from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m. in the usual polling places.

At issue is a school to serve the counties with training not presently available. If the people approve, a one-mill levy (no more than 1/2 mills at most) will be set up to provide for a new school at a site not yet selected.

The matter first came up when the 1965 legislature provided for the establishment of such special districts. Two have been set up, one at Hastings, the other at North Platte.

County boards in 14 counties have passed resolutions asking for inclusion in the district. The state board of education approved the plan proposed.

Counties to vote Tuesday are Wayne, Dixon, Cedar, Stanton, Boyd, Holl, Wheeler, Knox, Antelope, Pierce, Madison, Thurston, Cumming and Burt. They have a valuation of \$440 million and a population of 143,935.

Eventual site selection if the people vote 'yes' will be left up to men from O'Neill, Neligh, Osmond, Wayne, Laurel, Allen, Decatur, Beemer, Norfolk and Stanton.

Crippled Kids Having Clinic

A crippled children's clinic will be held Saturday, June 24, at the Elks Lodge, Norfolk. Registration is from 7:30 to 10:30 a.m. with examinations starting at 8.

William Hamsa, MD, and John Yost, MD, orthopedists, and George Robertson, MD, pediatrician, will examine the children. The Elks Lodge will furnish a noon lunch for all children and families.

Children being seen for the first time with the following handicaps may be seen at the clinic: Orthopedic handicaps, cerebral palsy, cleft lip and cleft palate and eye conditions amenable to surgery.

A program for children afflicted with congenital, traumatic or neoplastic deformities of face, neck and oral cavity was initiated two years ago by Services for Crippled Children.

A free barbecue is a feature of the centennial celebration in Hoskins Saturday, July 1. Everyone planning to attend must get their tickets from Hoskins business places no later than Monday, June 26.

Free Tuition Cards Due in Office Soon

Cards for free high school tuition must be in the office of the county superintendent of schools by Saturday, July 1, according to Supt. Gladys Porter. Many have neglected sending these in so far.

Parents or guardians must send in a card for each pupil who does not reside in a high school district. The free tuition period covered by the cards is the 1967-68 school year.

State law sets the deadline for getting the cards in. It makes no provisions for any exceptions for late-arriving cards.

Residents who wish to send their youngsters to the Wayne or Winside high schools, should take care of this at once, according to Mrs. Porter. Further details can be secured at her office.

Warnings Given Concerning Fog, Grass Cuttings

Vern Schulz, street commissioner for Wayne, has two warnings for Wayne residents this week. One concerns the fog used to kill mosquitoes and the other concerns grass cuttings.

Schulz has given his yearly warning concerning the fogging machine used on streets and alleys. Although the fog is not poisonous, it could cause illness if breathed over a long period. For that reason, parents are asked to warn children that they should not run into the fog.

Another reason for staying out of the white smoke is the danger of not being seen and not being able to see. There have been some close calls in the past when cars have come along and drivers have failed to see someone walking or running in the fog.

Grass cuttings are a yearly problem too. Schulz points out that a city ordinance forbids putting cuttings from lawns in the street. During the wet spell, lawns have become water soaked and this grass can be even worse in the street. Pulled into the sweeper, the cuttings cause all sorts of troubles. Violators of the ordinance governing this can be prosecuted.

Methodists Deciding on Erection of New Church

Members of First Methodist Church are scheduling a pair of informational meetings to learn more about plans for a new church building. A vote on whether or not to build will be held later.

The site would be on what is now farmland north of Wayne in the area of where Pearl Street would extend northwest of the Igloo Drive-in. However, nothing else is definite yet.

Wallwey Says State Aid to Schools Will Be Approved

Sen. Elmer Wallwey, Emerson, speaking to a group of educators and laymen at Emerson Saturday, said state aid to schools will be approved in some form by the legislature. He pointed out features of the bill which is now out of select file for final reading.

He did not have figures for all schools, but did cite what the possibilities were for three districts in the immediate area, Allen, Wakefield and Wayne data had been furnished and information compiled on 13 different aspects of the plan.

His figures had been compiled on the basis of state aid to schools levying 22 mills or more. This has since been amended to all schools levying 16 mills or more so some changes in the figures would be made, but just how much is not known.

Supt. Francis Haun, who attended from the Wayne-Carroll District, said the new plan will help schools operating on low levies. However, it will lower the amount available for the bigger districts by including more districts.

Included in the plan are Class I (rural) schools that levy 10 mills or more, Class II, III, IV and V districts (high school and

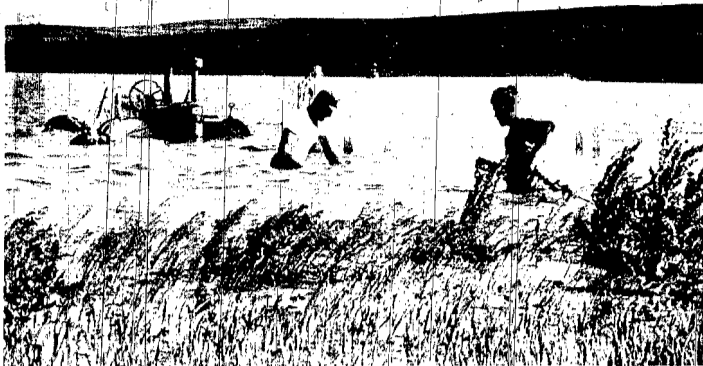
Phadet Gawsombat Will Leave Wayne Next Week

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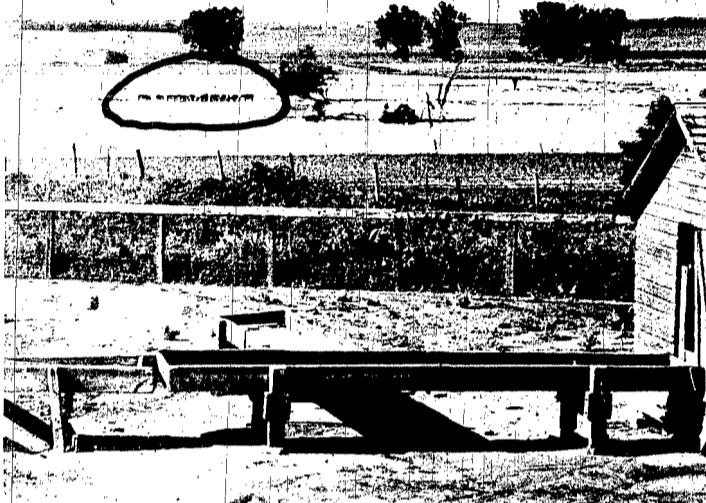

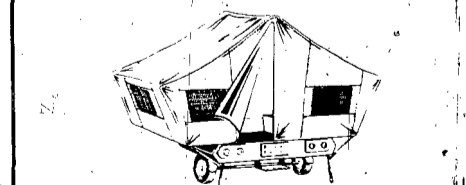

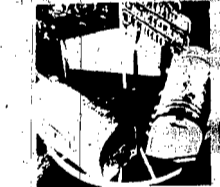

He is looking forward to the sightseeing trip with other exchange students. Highlight will be a visit with President Lyndon Johnson in Washington. Interviews with AFS officials in New York and a jet flight to England, Moscow and India are other coming events. He leaves New York Aug. 4 and arrives in Thailand Aug. 5.

Queried about why he came, he said he had first seen pictures of Americans in an Apollo moon shot film. He also saw cowboys in the movies and wanted to learn more.

In Thailand there are many American soldiers. He visited with them and found them most helpful. He asked if they thought he would be welcome in this country and when he found out he would be decided to try to come here.

Teachers helped him. They trained him for what to expect. He tried American food in a restaurant. He visited a Nebraska man who was working in adult education. From him he learned about Nebraska and her people.

Interested in the US, he learned about American presidents. His two favorites are John Kennedy and Abraham Lincoln, because of the work they did for the colored. He liked Kennedy also when he stopped the Russians in Cuba.

"I like the adventure of being in a strange land," he said. "I knew nothing of the people and language here but I liked to study in this country."

When the Browns wrote of the farms in Nebraska, he tried to visualize them. His ideas were wrong for he thought they would be flooded as they are in Thailand (and some have been flooded here in recent weeks) but he found machines and men in fields here contrasted to animals and men in fields in Thailand.

Phadet thinks American teenagers have a lot of fun and he feels dating is especially nice. In Thailand he could not date as a teenager.

If anything, he thinks American teenagers have too much freedom. He cited those who are not typical—the ones who smoke, drink, fight and get into trouble. He took time to ask some what American teen customs are. They seemed unable to answer.

He likes peace. He especially likes Wayne as a peaceful and quiet stay. "I'm lucky I got to stay in Wayne," he said.

Admittedly, he does not understand government here. He found some are not as interested in politics as he is. He talked politics with American people. He found a variance of opinions. Communism, he said, is not thought to be all bad or all good—but Thailand doesn't want it.

What did he enjoy most in Wayne? Walking. He couldn't go anywhere for a walk without little kids coming up and walking with him, teenagers joining him or adults greeting him. It was just fun going around and being greeted as a friend wherever he walked, he said.

He said life in Thailand is good. His is a happy people and they do not want to change but want to live as they did in the years, decades and centuries past. "We're proud to live as free and happy people," he said. (This has been brought out before in numerous places that the Thai are among the happiest people in the world).

Finally, he liked the freedom people enjoy in expressing different opinions. He talked with those he did not understand and learned to understand them. He found that when people do not agree they

can still be friends. He found all types of people, clever, stupid, spoiled, nice, bad, otherwise. He liked them all. "You're all my friends," he said.

Sponsored and financed by the Nebraska Centennial Commission, the institute is designed to acquaint outstanding young men with opportunities in agricultural careers. Scholarships are sponsored by organizations in local communities with the extension service helping to organize the award program.

influence in the community with the probationers and those either directly or indirectly involved in his case.

While assisting their probationers, officers attempt to modify the situations that produce delinquency, thus joining other agencies and public opinion as instruments for the prevention of crime.

According to Eynon, "The formulation of inadequate probation investigation by probation officers not only informs the courts as to the desirability of placing offenders on probation but also shows the relative danger to the community and society in general if the subject is not suitable for probation."

Figures cited by Eynon show the ten probation districts last year collected \$107,000 in restitution, child support and court costs. At the end of the year those on probation had earned \$2,017,000. Thus, instead of costing taxpayers in penal complex confinement, they were income-producing individuals contributing to the welfare of their families and themselves.

Eynon hammered home this point: "The cost of imprisonment is many times the cost of probation. The savings to the state in nearly every district would more than pay for the entire budget of the statewide probation system." However, he pointed out that "The true value of the system is in its deterrent effect on crime and the rehabilitation of the offenders."

Following Eynon's address a business session was held. Francis Svoboda of the Schuyler Sun was named to the board of directors of the group, and was elected secretary-treasurer. Other officers named are: Les Falter, Tilden Citizen, president and George Miller, Papillion Times, vice-president, Alan Cramer, Wayne Herald, is retiring president.

east Nebraska editors and their families at the NE Nebraska Press meeting in Wayne Saturday.

Eynon explained that the state-wide probation system handled about 1600 probationers last year. There are ten districts. He said that the cost to the taxpayers for each person sent to state penal institutions averages between \$1400 and \$1900 annually.

If we can rehabilitate only a small portion of those placed on probation and help make them productive citizens, our system is doing much to reduce the financial burden for the State. In addition, when a probationer is kept from penal punishment, he is much more useful to his family."

Eynon emphasized that the probation officers handle both adult and juvenile offenders. He also explained the difference between probation and parole and asked the press to be more careful in their writings about the two agencies which are often confused by newspapers.

Parole refers to offenders who have been detained for a crime as punishment in any of the penal institutions and who have been released prior to serving their full time," Eynon said. Individuals, oftentimes first offenders, who the court feels can be rehabilitated are placed on probation to an officer such as Eynon and not detained in one of the state penal complexes. While on probation, these persons must comply with certain regulations, Eynon explained.

He said his office is charged "with the duty of preparing pre-sentence investigations as directed by the courts and for supervision of offenders placed on probation as well as formulating a desirable rehabilitation program for the probationers."

Eynon said the probation system offers the offender an opportunity to improve his conduct and readjust his position in the community under the guidance and supervision of the probation officer. The officer also acts as a stabilizing

Whenever I think about it I get all excited just like a kid at Christmas, but after 14 months, it doesn't get to you.

Don't know how long it's going to take to get processed out of the army but it shouldn't be more than a day or so at the longest so when I get back to the States I'll let you know when I'll be home.

Mom asked me what I wanted to eat when I get back. Steve said, "Dont-Noodle" or whatever those roll things are called. Well, they are right up on my list but I'm thinking more on the line of a big steak, real potatoes, a fresh salad and maybe some strawberry shortcake. Now that sounds like quite the thing for a hungry boy. By the way, Mom, that's a hint. We don't get anything fresh and either it's powdered or dehydrated junk. We get just about everything but

Chamber Group Opposes LB 929

Strong opposition to a new bill, LB 929, was expressed by the Wayne Chamber of Commerce legislative committee at its meeting Wednesday. The bill would provide that the mayor of a town could hire or fire a police chief without the approval of his council. In a letter to Senator Elmer Wallwey expressing reasons for the opposition, the committee said it felt that the bill would:

- 1-Give too much arbitrary power to the mayor,
- 2-Open the door to graft, political patronage and job selling,
- 3-Make a police chief's tenure subject to the day-by-day whims of the mayor, and
- 4-Result in many good men leaving Nebraska because they would refuse to work under such conditions.

The bill, which was introduced last Friday, was listed as "non-controversial" and advanced to general file without the usual references to committee.

Wayne's Mayor William Koerber also expressed opposition to the bill.

The committee also discussed—but tabled—any action on a bill that would bring all 93 county assessors under control of the state tax commissioner's office. Under this bill the assessing of property for tax purposes would be centralized in the tax commissioner's office. The proposal is an outgrowth of a recent state supreme court decision overruling tax valuation increases in 14 counties and assessments which would be considered in allocating funds under pending state aid to schools legislation.

Because no copy of the bill was available the committee withheld action until further information becomes available.

In other action the com-

mitter discussed LB 689—a bill which would provide a specific cut-off date for retirement of state employees, and make mandatory an employee's retirement at the end of the month in which his sixty-eighth birthday occurs and voted to support the bill.

An amendment to the bill, however, would permit the retirement of the employee to be postponed indefinitely with the approval of the employee and the department concerned. The committee voted to support the bill but to oppose the amendment.

Two accidents involving parked cars were investi-

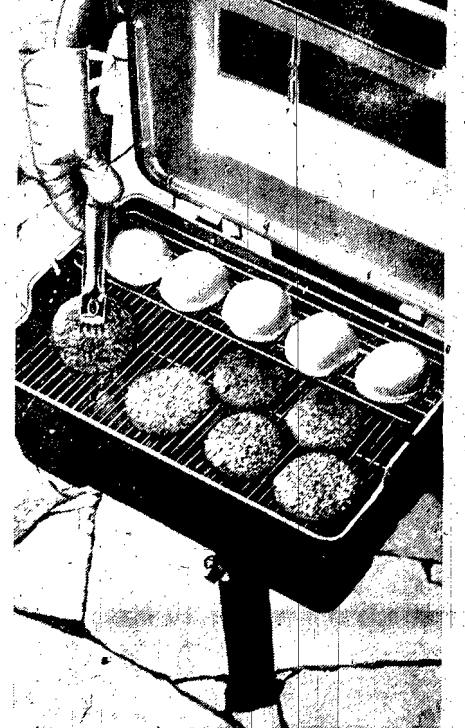
gated by the Wayne Police Department during the past half week. Neither of the accidents resulted in expensive damage.

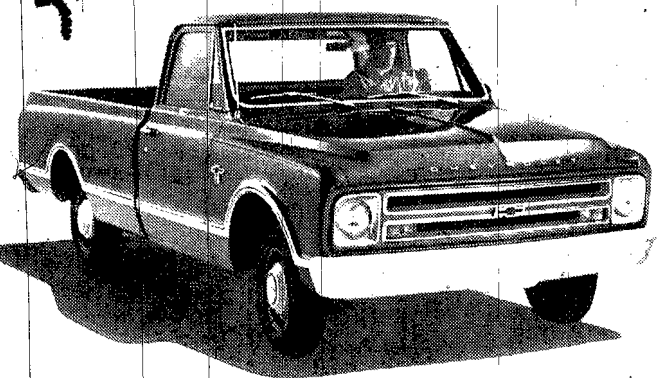

Erosion Control Big SCS Concern

The following article was written by Don Kerl, Wayne County Soil and Water Conservation District: It Can Be Done. Erosion control is our

main concern in the Soil Conservation Service. When we find a field with little or no erosion after heavy rains like we have had, we want to know what happened.

The field pictured here has a slope of 11 percent, it is terraced and was plant-

ed with minimum tillage methods. Atrazine was used for early weed control. Notice how little water washed into the terrace channel. Why? Look at each row of corn. Here is proof that water has been standing in each corn row. The water was kept here until

it had a chance to soak in. Why let it soak in? Silly question; more money at harvest time and very little erosion. You can buy a lot of things in the bog but you can't buy moisture. This moisture is seeping into the subsoil where it will be available for use during the hot spells of July and August. How many years could this extra stored moisture make the difference between a good crop and very little crop? Some farmers spend a lot of money on irrigation to get moisture into the soil; why not try the method pictured here to store moisture in the subsoil of your soils?

As we walked across this field it was very noticeable how soft the soil was. This soil has a lot of organic matter in it just like the soil under Mother Nature's protective covering of native grass. This soil is just like a sponge, ready to soak up more moisture.

Notice the heavy amount of last year's corn stalks. These stalks were already soft and pretty well rotted.

These stalks will cause very little trouble at cultivation time. Most fellows will admit they don't like the "looks" of this seedbed but can you afford those square fields with black, smooth seedbeds? They just don't work out on the hillsides of Wayne County.



Gambling Game

The Historical Society has in its library holdings many published accounts of early travels and expeditions among the Indian tribes along the Missouri and on the Plains. These contain much information on the life and customs of the aborigines.

Such an expedition was that of Major Stephen H. Long in 1819-1820. His party went up the Missouri establishing a camp, known as Engineers' Cantonment in what is now Washington County, where the expedition wintered. The narrative of Long's travels was compiled by Edwin James, geologist of the group. During the encampment there were many opportunities to observe the Omaha Indians in the vicinity and the narrative contains a great amount of information concerning them. In Volume I pp. 306-307 of Long's Expedition, James has a somewhat detailed description of a gambling game to which the women of the Omaha tribe were inordinately addicted. It was called by them, Kom-se-ke-da or plumstone shooting. This was a dice-like game which could be played by any number of persons, and the procedure was, in general, as follows:

Five plumstones were ordinarily provided, three of them marked, on one side only, with a greater or smaller number of black dots or lines. Two of the stones were sometimes marked on both sides. On occasion bones of a rounded and flattened form were used instead of plumstones. A wide bowl of fiber or pottery and a certain number of small sticks for counters completed the equipment for the game.

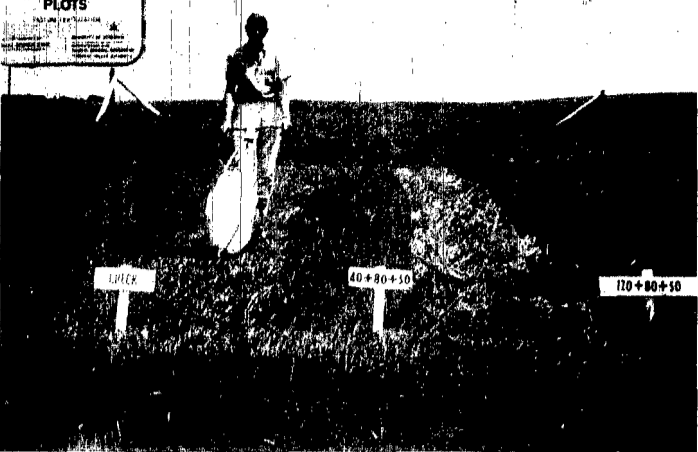

Fertilization of Pasture Studied

An extensive pasture fertilization project is being conducted at 11 plots in Northeast Nebraska, according to Eugene Schwartz, area extension agronomist at Northeast Station, Concord. Plots have been established in Knox, Antelope, Pierce, Cedar, Dixon and Stanton Counties.

Primary response is to nitrogen with some phosphate response on upland soils, Schwartz recommends fertilizing cool-season pastures with 4 to 60 pounds of nitrogen in upland pastures and 8 to 120 pounds on bottomland pastures. Phosphate should be applied according to soil test.

Other phases of pasture management, weed control, rotation grazing and proper stocking rates, are a must in order for pasture fertilization to be profitable.

Fertilization of Pasture Studied

So far, tests indicate that returns are not as great as for corn, small grains or alfalfa. Nitrogen at various rates, phosphate, potash, zinc and sulfur treatments are included in the experiment.

Warm-season grasses have shown response to nitrogen and phosphate. These should be fertilized in late May or early June so as not to encourage cool-season grass growth.

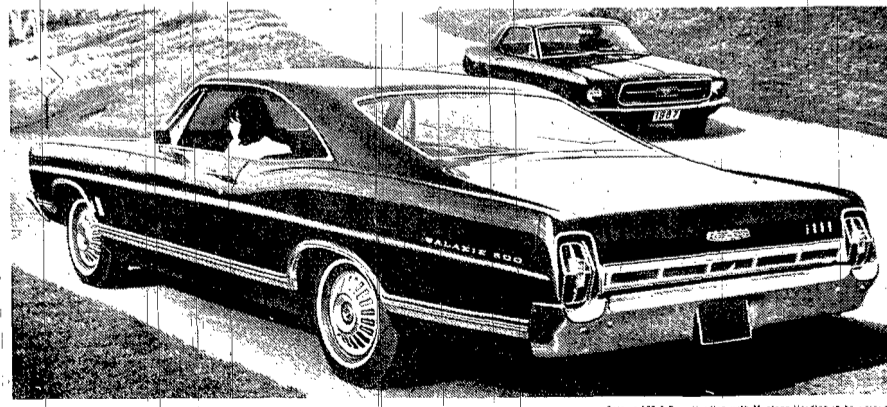
