Going on Tour

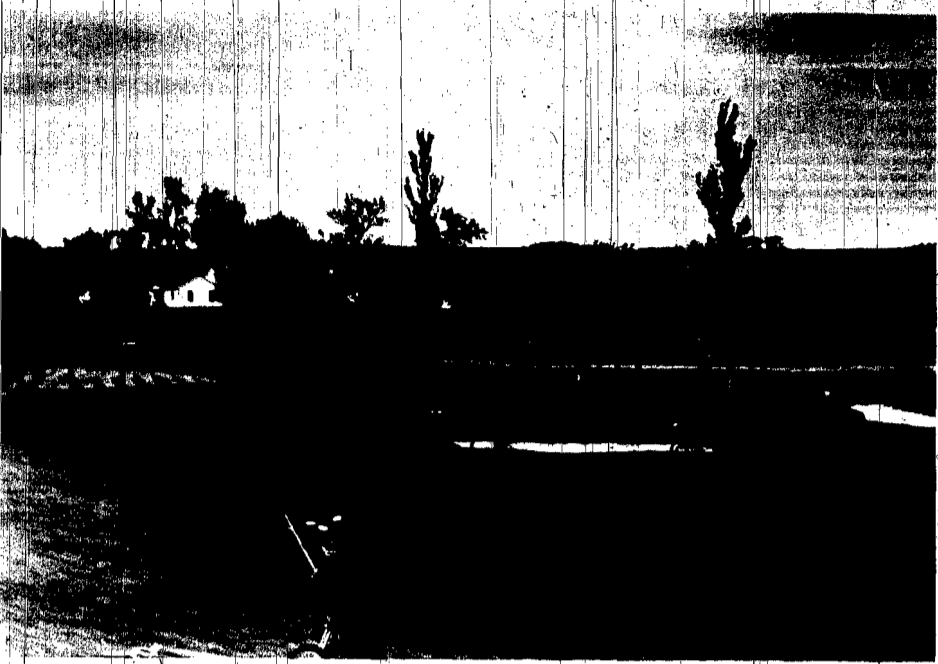

Winside Man Injured During Water Fight

Winside fire chief George Voss was injured in a freak accident during Pierce's Nebraska Centennial observance Sunday afternoon. The mishap occurred when a water hose burst from high pressure during a water fight between the Hoskins and Neligh fire departments. The stream of water from the broken hose hurled Voss into the air and he struck his head on the pavement when he came down. Following emergency treatment by a Pierce doctor, Voss was rushed to the Norfolk Lutheran hospital where he was treated for a concussion, bruises and lacerations. He was released from the Norfolk hospital Wednesday morning and is now resting at home.

USDA to Give Farm Loans

Emergency farm loans are now being made available to farmers in Wayne, Cumby and Stanton counties as a result of the widespread damage caused by the storms of the past three weeks. The Wayne area has been declared an emergency area by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman. The Emergency Loans are available through the Farmers Home Administration of the United States Department of Agriculture according to FHA Supervisor Thomas Lambert. Lambert stated that Emergency Loan areas are designated by the Secretary of Agriculture where serious losses in agricultural production have occurred as a result of drought, floods, storms or some other natural calamity. Lambert also stated there is a definite need

among farmers of this area for credit to continue their normal farming operations and that such credit cannot be obtained through commercial banks, cooperative lending institutions or other similar sources. The Department of Agriculture will provide area farmers with all possible help in assessing damaged property. Any established farmer or rancher in this area is eligible for a loan if he: (1) is a citizen of the United States, (2) is unable to obtain the credit required to continue his normal operations, (3) has reasonable prospects for success with the assistance of a loan, and (4) possesses the legal capacity to contract for a loan. Loans can be made for the purchase of seed, fertilizer, replacement of equipment and livestock and replacement or repair of buildings, fences, drainage and irrigation systems. Loans will not be made for refinancing existing debts or to compensate applicants for their losses. Application forms and full information concerning Emergency Loans may be obtained at the Farmers Home Administration office at 112 West Second Street, Wayne, Nebraska. In addition to this emergency program, farmers who signed up to take part in the 1967 feed grain program, but who haven't been able to plant or have had the crop destroyed as a result of heavy rainfall, may be permitted to plant an alternate crop on affected acreage and still receive available price-support payments that would have been earned if the crop had been harvested.

Floats Sought for Centennial Parade

Organizations and businesses of this area have been invited to participate in the Centennial Day parade scheduled for August 11 at Wayne. Commemorative plaques will be awarded for their efforts. The Wayne Centennial Parade committee is seeking floats for entries in their parade to be held at 10:30 a.m. Of special interest are floats depicting early days or special events in Nebraska, but all floats will be welcomed according to Parade Chairman Cletus Sharer.

Wayne Man Involved in Fatal Mishap

Duane Beckman, 24, of Wayne was involved in a car-truck collision Wednesday afternoon in which a 70-year old Wyoming man was fatally injured. The Wyoming resident, John Boettcher, was pronounced dead by a doctor at the scene of the accident. The mishap occurred a quarter of a mile north of Wyoming at five o'clock when Boettcher pulled away from a stop sign and crossed the path of the truck owned by Bull Creek, Inc. of Arlington. Beckman, the driver of the cattle truck, was unable to avoid the car and the collision resulted. Neither Beckman nor another passenger in the truck, Don Nielsen, formerly of Wayne, were seriously injured. Seven of the cattle in the truck were killed either as a result of the crash or suffocation. The Gage County Sheriff's Office investigated the accident.

N. E. Swine Show Slated August '28

First annual carcass hog show of the Northeast Nebraska Swine association has been set for Aug. 28 in the Laurel Sale barn. The show is open to active 4-H and FFA members and commercial producers from Wayne, Cedar, Dixon and Thurston counties. Each family or firm may enter two pens of three barrows or gilts. 4-H and FFA members are limited to one pen of three each. Hogs will be judged on the hoof then sent to slaughter at Hornell and company at Fremont. Carcasses then will be judged and placed on percent ham and loin. More than \$150 in cash premiums and trophies will be awarded on both the live and carcass divisions. Also included will be a judging contest for audience participation at the Laurel Sale barn. Ham and loin awards will be given to the winners.

Weather

Rains continued to plague Northeast Nebraska this week although they lessened in intensity and farmers in some areas were able to work some fields. Thursday and Friday farmers were cultivating hill-sides in an effort to get ahead of weeds that had been growing unmolested by the cultivator shovel since the rains started four weeks ago. Planting and replanting in washed out spots was done as fields dried. Many fields, however, remained too wet to work. Rainfall in the government gauges at the Ralph Watson farm shows a total of 13.67 inches since May 26. Friday night's rain was 1.17 inches while only .29 fell here Thursday night. Thursday night's rain was heavier in other places though, totaling as much as 1.50 inches west of Wayne.

Vo-Tech School Vote Tuesday

The fate of a vocational-technical school for Northeast Nebraska will be decided Tuesday when voters in a 14-county area will go to the polls. The school would serve the counties with vocational training not now available. The choice will be simple: Vote either 'yes' or 'no'. Proponents of the issue feel that after high school the educational emphasis is on college and those who wish to develop their skills in crafts must go outside the area to further their training and education and, as a result, remain away. A school in the area would offer special tuition rates to its residents who want to use the proposed school's facilities. Those from outside the district would pay more tuition. Two such schools have already been set up in the state. One is at North Platte, the other at Hastings. Counties in the area include Wayne, Dixon, Cedar,

Thurston, Wheeler, Boyd, Antelope, Bart, Cumby, Holt, Knox, Madison, Pierce, and Stanton. A levy of 1 to 1.5 mills in the 14 counties would provide facilities for 800 or more pupils. This is figured on the present valuation of \$140 million. Wayne residents needing a ride to the polls to vote in Tuesday's election on the Vocational-Technical school proposal may get free transportation, compliments of the Wayne Jaycees. Three telephone numbers have been listed as those to call to get the transportation. The numbers are: 375-2418, 375-1922, and 375-3296. Courses could be offered in radio, television, art, sheet metal work, cabinet making, electricity, mechanics, body repair, drafting, carpentry, needlework, baking, welding, medical tech-

nology, architecture and many other subjects. Persons 16 years old or older would be eligible for training or retraining. The training of such persons would make the area more attractive to industry, providing skilled labor and trained craftsmen for jobs of the more exacting type to be filled. Eligible voters planning to be gone Tuesday should be sure to vote before leaving. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the usual polling places. County boards in the 14 counties have asked for inclusion in the state board of education approved plan. The actual site of the school, should the plan be approved, will be left to a committee of men from O'Neill, Neligh, Osmond, Wayne, Laurel, Allen, Decatur, Beemer, Norfolk and Stanton. Supporters of the plan say that, no matter where the school is located it will work for the benefit of every county in the district.

Jaycees Make '67-'68 Plans

The Wayne Jaycees held a general membership meeting Tuesday night and decided upon the proposed plan of action for the Jaycee Year which began June 1. Also included in the meeting was the acceptance of a new member, Richard Korn, who works at the International Harvester Company. Among the short-range plans approved at the meeting were repair work on the Wayne County float (June 21), a trip to Winside and Hoskins with the public address system to support the proposed vocational-technical school (June 24), and a caravan through Wayne with the loudspeaker urging everyone to vote in the vo-tech election (June 27).

The Roughnotes will continue to be the official publication of the Jaycees.

Wayne Ball Teams Busy This Week

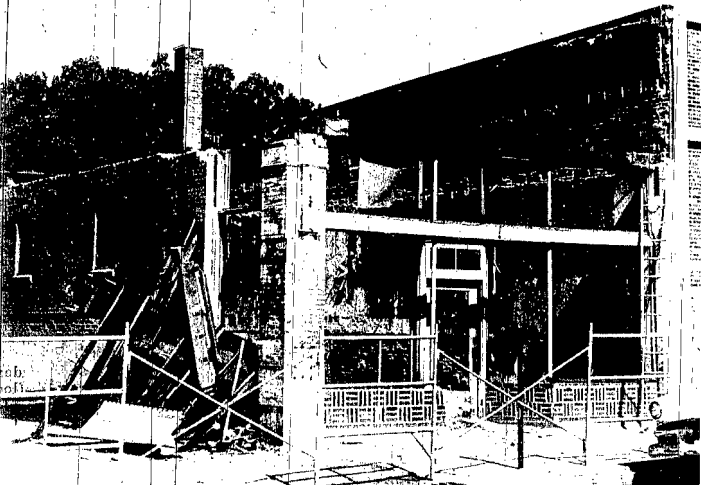

Harvester Has New Tractor Drive

Introduction of the first hydrostatic drive farm tractor was announced here this week by Jack Niles, manager of the International Harvester company in Wayne.

Niles said the Hydrostatic Farmall 650 is the first farm tractor to give the user any speed he wants from nine mph in reverse to 20 mph forward and changes speed on the go without use of clutch or changing the throttle.

Hydrostatic drive is defined by engineers as an energy transfer system composed of a hydraulic pump and a hydraulic motor for transmission of power. The engine drives the pump to produce a pressurized oil flow and the hydraulic motor converts the oil flow back to rotary output power.

Quick response is listed as a prime advantage because of the solid link characteristics of the fluid between the pump and motor which permits the

operator to get exactly what he calls for with the controls at the instant he desires.

The exact output speed desired can be obtained by adjusting the flow in the hydrostatic transmission. Reversing the direction of flow reverses the direction of tractor travel... and may be done without changing engine speed.

A foot-inch pedal, located in the conventional clutch pedal location provides an alternate control for emergency stops or for more convenient foot control when backing to or attaching implements.

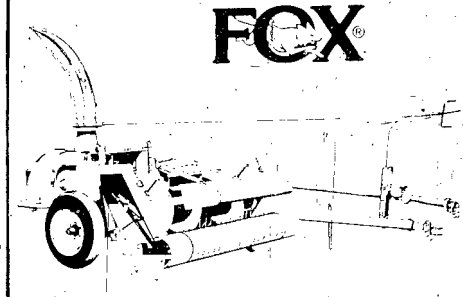

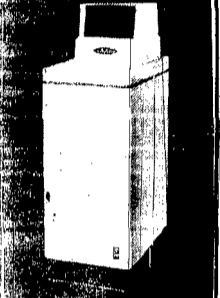

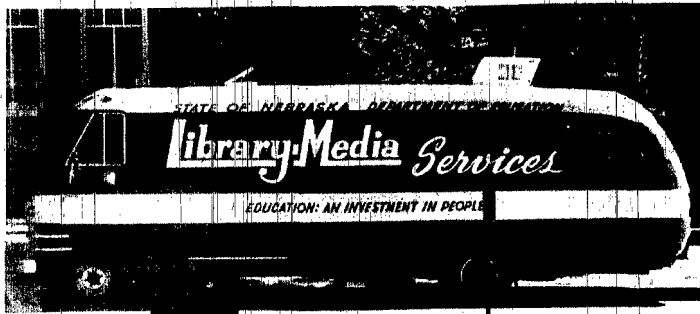

Suggestions Given To Aid in Cleanup After Flood Damage

Anna Marie Kreifels, area extension agent at the Northeast Station, has offered some suggestions to aid the housewife in cleaning up after flood damage to canned goods in the basement or to furniture.

According to Miss Kreifels, some flood damaged foods must be destroyed. All fresh foods, cereals, dried fruits and flour, which have been in contact with flood water should be destroyed. Root vegetables should be washed carefully, peeled and cooked before eating.

Canned foods should be checked for leaks in containers. Questionable ones should be discarded. Containers with tight seals should be washed then disinfected by soaking for 15 minutes in a solution of one tablespoon chlorine bleach to one gallon water. Rinse in fresh water.

Furniture may develop white spots or whitish film from dampness, even if it wasn't submerged in flood water. If the entire surface is affected, try rubbing with a cloth wrung from a mixture of 1/2 cup household ammonia and 1/2 cup water. Wipe dry at once and polish with wax or furniture polish.

For smaller areas or spots on varnished surfaces, rub with a cloth moistened with camphorated oil or oil of peppermint. Cigarette ashes rubbed in with the finger are

often effective in removing white spots. According to Miss Kreifels, rugs which have been in contact with flood water should be dried thoroughly before cleaning is attempted. In some cases beating, sweeping or vacuuming will be all that is necessary for the cleaning job. However, if it is necessary the rug can be shampooed with commercial rug shampoo available at drug and department stores.

Bulletins giving first aid flood information for rugs, bedding, clothing, food, furniture, floors and appliances are available at the County Extension Office or from the Nebraska Northeast Station at Concord.

Two Draw Fines in Wayne County Court

Two out-of-town people were fined by Judge David Hamer in Wayne County Court Monday. Their cases were the first ones heard by Judge Hamer since June 15.

June 19 Dorothy Chambers, Crofton, was fined \$25 plus \$5 costs for intoxication. Chief of Police Vern Fairchild signed the complaint.

The same day Warren Millikan, Bloomfield, paid \$10 and \$5 costs for speeding. State Patrolman B. L. Cooper filed the charge.

Beef Field Day Set One Month Earlier

Beef Field Day at Northeast Station will be a month earlier this year than last because the experimental cattle have made such good gains. The twilight Field Day has been set for Tuesday, July 18 at 6 p.m. One set of heifers and one of steers will be ready for market according to Walt Tolman, beef researcher at the station. The heifers were received Sept. 16 with a purchase weight of 425 pounds. They will be marketed in two groups according to how large and fat they were when they were lotted into the present experiment Mar. 29. The heavier group is expected to average at least 950 pounds by July 18.

Grain feeding began Mar. 29 in an experiment to study the results of a corn and alfalfa hay fattening ration with three different levels of hay daily. During the first two months gains have been over three pounds daily. Corn and alfalfa is supplemented with vitamin A, minerals and stilbestrol but no protein concentrate. Corn intake has had to be limited to get the heifers to eat 4 1/2 pounds of hay and the cattle do not appear as fat as those getting more

corn and less hay, according to Tolman.

Tolman believes some of the heifers may be too fat by July 18. Stockmen attending the Field Day will have an opportunity to estimate the effect of this over finish on carcass value during a cutability judging contest. Cutability is the percent of desirable red meat compared to live weight and the factor, including waste fat, which affect cutability will be studied that evening.

Two other experiments will be reported at the Field Day. These tests cover steers fattening at two different levels of alfalfa haylage, each with and without additional protein concentrate and a group of mixed steers and heifers on pasture, one lot of which has had a full corn feed on pasture and one which will not receive corn until the brome pasture becomes short or dry. Co-sponsoring the Field Day are the University of Nebraska, the Cuming County Livestock Feeders Association and the Northeast Nebraska Livestock Feeders Association.
